Colony Creek Philosopher Wants To Borrow Money If He Can Get Same Terms England Is Getting

Editor's note: The Colony Creek Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Colony Creek has caused a little comment, and we asked him for his picture, which we wish we hadn't done. But since he sent it along, we're publishing it with his second letter, which this week incidentally reveals a considerable ignorance of international finance.

Dear editor: I read in a copy of the City Courier which I got in town Saturday because it was wrapped around the shoes I had half-soled when England some time ago negotiated a loan from the United States and the terms was so interesting to me I have been wondering why we can't have some banking like that down here in Eastland County.

As I understand it, the United States loaned Great Britain four billion dollars and won't no interest start until 1956 and when it does start it will be 2 per cent, with the provision that England can ignore the interest if her exports fall below six percent of what they were immediately before the last war started.

Now there's a system of banking which I admire and I would like to know why local bankers don't get their banking principles up on the international level and really do some business.

If the bank will loan me money without no interest until 1956 and none then if my farm don't produce sixty per cent of what it did before the war, and I figure I can arrange to keep production down to that figure without no effort at all to speak of, there ain't no tellin how far I could go or how much business the bank could do with me.

I understand the United States is making this loan because it is worried about England and gold under and the same thing would apply in my case. I could meet them terms satisfactorily. But it is my opinion England ain't in no serious danger of losing as the United States is in heart enough to negotiate them kinds of loans.

If you know of any bank in this area that will loan me money on these terms as possible and I here to get there before the money's all gone.

Last year 1,000,000 destructive fires in all parts of the nation destroyed nearly a billion dollars of property and more than 11,000 lives were lost.

More than half of the loss was in business or industrial establishments, the places where people work and produce. Yet the dollar loss was only a fraction of the total destruction caused by fire. The indirect losses, in medical costs, in jobs, wages and production lost, savings reduced and business failures, were probably two or three times greater.

Next football action for a Hardin-Simmons University football team will be Saturday night when Coach Sammy Baugh takes a second string team to Ranger where they will play Ranger Junior College.

Baugh, and one of his aides, Wayne Miller, who like Baugh, played for the Washington Redskins, will take a pretty good group of freshmen who earned district and all-state honors before coming to the "Forty Acres" this fall.

Baugh, the Babe Ruth of football, is in his first year as head football coach at Hardin-Simmons. Other Cowboy Coaches, who to the former TCU great, are assistants or associates, will be out scouting.

In their only start of the young football season, the Purple and Gold B team took the measure of Cisco Junior College.

Baugh is not expected to name the Butten starting lineup until Friday, but some of the players who are expected to make the trip will include Dewey Bahling, former all-stater from Albuquerque, New Mexico. He is a fullback, packs better than some 200 pounds, and can play the line destroying position with the best of them. He played for Baugh and Miller when they coached the West football team in the All-American high school games last summer in Memphis. School Taxes Show Decrease From 1955 Rolls

The current Ranger Independent School District and Junior College tax rolls were set at \$4,097,970 in assessed valuation with \$81,959.49 due in collections.

The total amount is based on a \$2 rate for each \$100 property evaluation.

Total tax this year represents a slight decrease from last year when the assessments totaled \$83,712.40.

Last year collections amounted to \$82,842.79, not \$1,600 less than the assessments.

H. C. Wilkerson, tax collector contributed the decrease in evaluation to less activity in local oil business. Oil and gas tax rates are set on wells by the amount of their production.

Wilkerson said, however, that there were more expensive homes added to the tax rolls for this year than the previous 12 months.

Loan Increase Urged Under FHA Program

Further improvements in credit services to farmers are being made by the Farmers Home Administration, Walter T. McKay, the agency's Texas state director, said today.

Improvements in the management of the agency's operations were discussed at a training meeting held in St. Louis, Missouri, last week which McKay attended. A new employees training program, careful calendaring of state

and county office work, public information responsibilities of agency employees, and how to get maximum use from administrative funds were discussed.

McKay said that the meeting was held to take every step possible to further increase the participation by private lenders in the insured lending program. These funds advanced by private lenders and insured by the agency along with funds appropriated by Congress are used by farmers to buy, develop and operate family-type farms.

"With the expansion in our activities that has taken place in the last two years it is more important than ever before that we place our operations in high gear and give prompt and careful attention to every loan application," McKay said.

During the past year the agricultural loans made and insured by the agency reached a record total of \$29,190,000 throughout the United States. Loans in Texas totaled \$47,480,000.

The increased cost of developing farming systems that will make full use of a farm family's land and labor resources and provide a good income, and the emergency conditions brought on by the drought, were the main reason for the increased credit activity.

Farmers in Texas are served through 195 county offices located throughout the State.

Scholarships Totaling \$100,000 To Be Given In Betty Crocker Contest

The scholarship of the national winner, who will be announced April 12 in Philadelphia, will be \$5,000.

The basis for selection of winners will be test scores in a written homemaking knowledge and attitude test developed by Science Research Associates of Chicago. The test will be given in all participating high schools on Dec. 6. The project has the endorsement of the national contest and activities committee of the National Association of Secondary School Principals, a department of the National Education Association. "The enthusiastic endorsement of thousands of educators, religious leaders, civic leaders and parents throughout the nation and the extensive participation of students in our first year project have made General Mills pleased to renew this worthwhile activity and increase the scholarship funds," declared Charles H. Bell, president of the company. "We believe in sponsoring programs which contribute to a better way of living for all. We are happy to assist public, private and parochial high schools in training girls for successful family life after marriage, and we are equally happy to focus public attention on the fine work these schools are doing. "We have faith in the American teen-ager of today. Given the opportunity, the guidance and encouragement, this teen-ager will become the type of American homemaker who will assure the health, happiness and security of our communities and nation in the years ahead." All 12th grade girls in the nation's public, private and parochial high schools who will graduate in 1956 are eligible to participate in the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. They must be enrolled by their school not later than Oct. 31. Study materials for use in teaching many subjects will be sent to participating schools. The girl with the highest test score in each school will be named Homemaker of Tomorrow for that school. She will receive a pin designed by Trifari of New York. Her school will receive a copy of the Good and Easy Cook Book and her test paper will be entered in the competition for her state. The school of each state Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica. Each state winner and a female faculty adviser will be invited to participate in an expense-paid educational tour of Washington, D.C., Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Philadelphia April 8-12. Miss Arnette, the first year national winner, is using her scholarship at Judson college in Alabama.

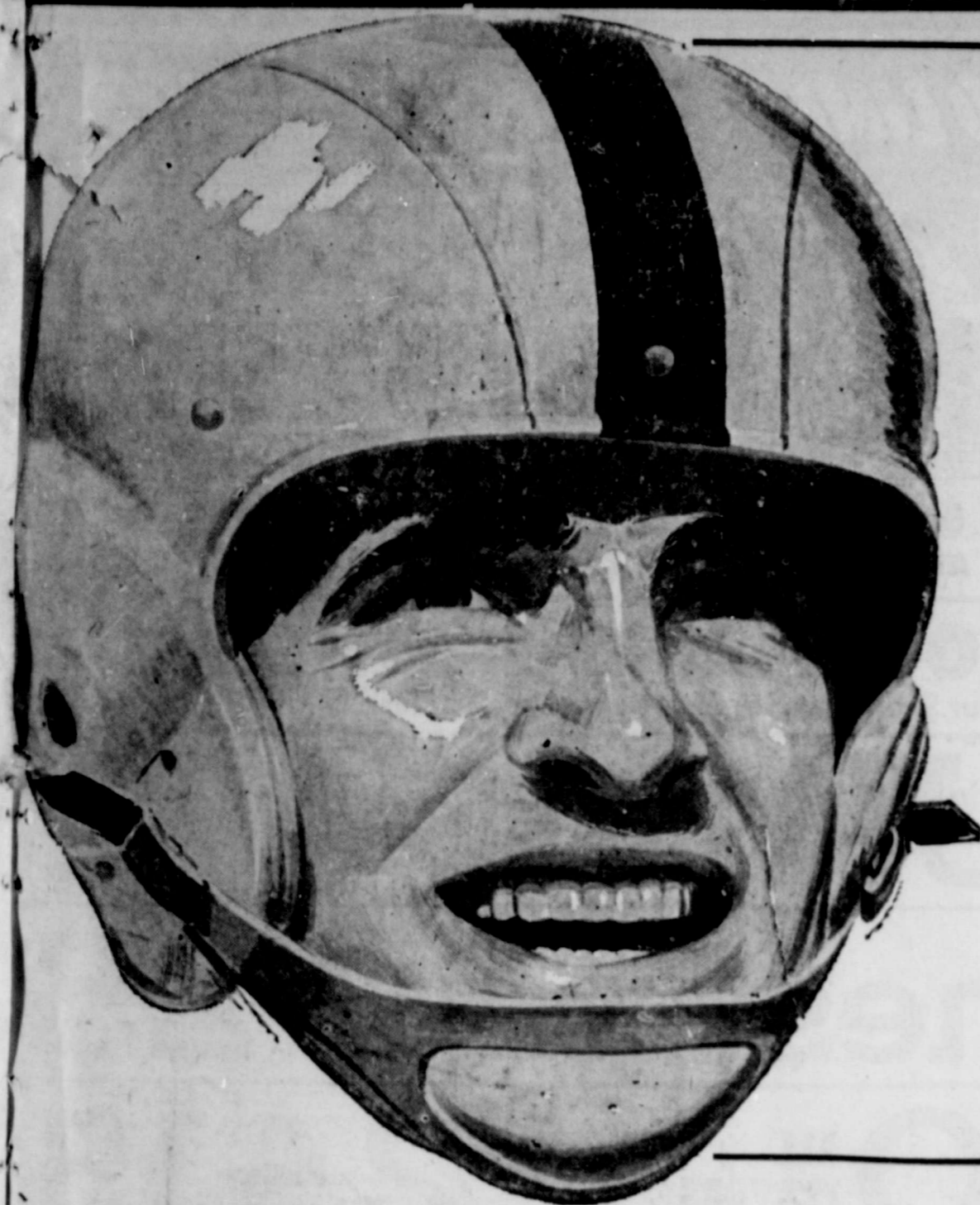

Fig D's Biggest Do-in's, State Fair of Texas, Is To Open Friday

DALLAS — The 1955 State Fair of Texas, Big D's biggest do-in's, will throw open the gates for its 1955 exposition at 5 p.m. Friday, Oct. 7.

The traditional parade through downtown Dallas will start at 3 p.m. Friday, with the SMU Mustang band heading the line of march. Two hours later Gov. Allan Shivers will snip a silken ribbon with a pair of golden shears to officially open the nation's largest annual fair.

Two big-time football games are scheduled in the Cotton Bowl for the opening weekend — SMU vs. Missouri at 8 p.m. Friday and Texas vs. Oklahoma at 2 p.m. Saturday.

"The Pajama Game," "Ice Capades," and the Joie Chitwood Auto Thrill Show will all open Friday night. The three shows will each present 24 shows during the 16 days and 12 nights of the fair. Color television is the big, new attraction at the 1955 State Fair. Both Dallas TV stations will present live programs in the studios in the Agriculture Building, and there will be a series of 23 "closed circuit" variety shows which can only be seen on the TV sets at the fairgrounds.

Over 7,000 entries are listed in the Pan-American Livestock Exposition, Junior Livestock Show and Poultry Show. The Pan-American show runs the first week of the fair, and the juniors take over in the second week. Horse shows are scheduled each of the three weekends.

The Women's Department has been deluged with over 10,000 entries in the household arts divisions, about three times as many as ever before. Also in the air-conditioned Women's Building, free fashion shows will be presented two and three times daily.

The world will be on display in the thousands of exhibits of automobiles, luxury items for the ladies, farm machinery, foods, electric and gas appliances, home furnishings. The new International Center features exhibits of nine foreign countries — Japan, Great Britain, India, Egypt, Sweden, Belgium, Finland, Germany and France.

"The Family of Man," the greatest collection of photography ever assembled, will include 503 pictures from 68 countries. Special days and events the

first week include: Oct. 10, "Fiesta Mexicana;" Oct. 11, Music Festival; Oct. 12, Dallas Day; Oct. 13, Crippled Children's Day; Oct. 14, Elementary School Day; Oct. 15, Rural Youth Day. Admission prices are 60 cents for adults, 30 cents for children under 12, and 75 cents for automobiles.

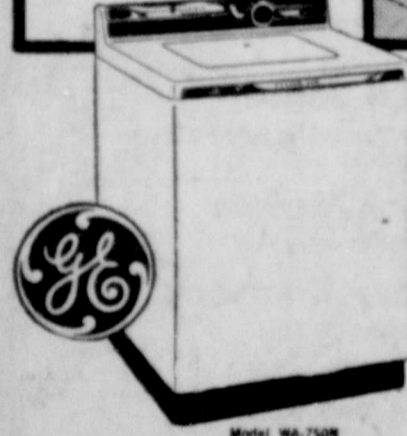

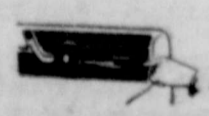
