## Five County Accidents Injure Six Persons During Past Weekend

### Man Hurt Twice In 2 Wrecks

A rash of accidents in Eastland County over the weekend injured six persons.

In the most serious of three separate accidents, Thomas Montoya of Fort Worth, who is stationed at Higgs AFB in El Paso with the Air Force paid a \$200 fine plus court costs in district court after the car he was driving struck another car from behind at the east foot of Dübber Hill, Saturday.

Mrs. Carrie Smith of Breckenridge and Mrs. Lottie Anderson of Knox City were traveling in the car struck from behind. Mrs. Smith suffered head injuries and possible internal injuries.

Mrs. Anderson had injuries to her head and right shoulder. Alvin Jone of Sinton, traveling with Montoya, and also stationed at Higgs AFB had cuts and lacerations about the head.

In an accident Sunday night at 6:15 a car driven by Claude B. Weekes of Strawn collided head-on with another vehicle being driven by Charles Foster, a government inspector from Fostoria, Ohio, three miles east of the Ranger city limits.

Weekes received head cuts and possible chest injuries. Mrs. Weekes suffered a broken arm and Bobby Lowe Wallace of Ranger, received injuries he suffered Saturday night when the car he was driving overturned at least once near Marton Valley.

Foster, driving the second car, had head and face bruises and cuts.

## Arlington Rebs Dampen H'coming Spirit, 20-6

The inspired Arlington State Rebels partially dampened the homecoming spirit here Saturday night as they toppled the Ranger Junior College Rangers 20-6 in a crucial Pioneer Conference contest.

A corp trip for the Arlington State ROTC, the Rebels fought that it should have been the Rangers who were inspired by the homecoming crowd of almost 3,500 fans.

In one of the roughest first half of play at Bulldog Stadium this year which ended in a scoreless deadlock, guard Charles Smith put his mates ahead temporarily in the third quarter when he returned a pass interception 73 yards for a touchdown, looking like a big touch-down.

In scoring on the long touch-down gallop Smith looked like a seasoned quarterback, as he lumbered downfield picking up his blockers and sauntered down the middle of the field flanked on either side, the front and back by a bevy of teammates.

Ranger's lead was shortlived however. Arlington moved to the Ranger end of the field to the 4 yard line following the Ranger's return kickoff before losing the ball on downs. Three plays moved

the Rangers out to the 12 but short of a first down and Quarterback Lonnie Wood punted out to Rogers Bruce on the 48. Bruce danced momentarily without any forward momentum and as the Ranger defenders moved in, zipped through the entire Ranger group for a tally.

David Webster converted.

Ranger was unable to move from the 13 after the kickoff while the ball had been kicked by a 15-yard penalty. Wood booted a tremendous 45-yard punt to the Arlington 34. Three plays later, Arlington got its second score off the strong passing arm of Jimmy Hardin, the conference's leading passer, who nailed end David Webster 47 yards downfield for Arlington's second score. Bruce converted.

After the ensuing kickoff, the Rangers moved from their own eight yard line out to the 48 before they gave up the ball on downs. Arlington moved quickly to the Ranger 14 with two pass completions to end Bill Hunnicutt before guard Buddy Caddell intercepted a pass on the Ranger eight.

the Rangers returned the compliment and handed the ball to the Rebels by the fumble route. Hardin showed his appreciation by hitting Bruce in the end zone for the final score of the night.

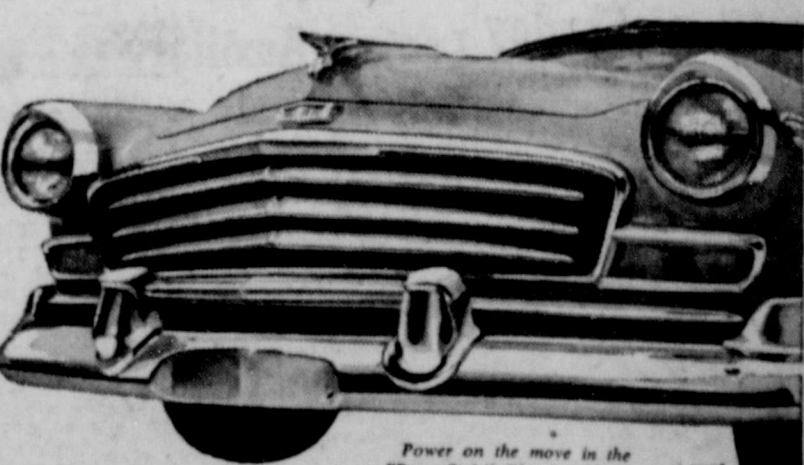

**Christmas Mailing Tips**

**Postmaster Suggests Shop And Mail Early**

Postmaster A. E. Crawley today gave some tips on how to mail for Christmas.

At the same time, he urged mail patrons to start planning now to shop early and mail early for Christmas.

A new illustrated pamphlet, "Packaging and Wrapping Parcels For Mailing," describes the type and sizes of cartons best suited for shipping, and lists hints that will help with special Christmas mailing problems, such as shipping chinaware. Copies are available — free — at the Ran-

ger post office.

Right packing, right wrapping, and right addressing are the three keys to easy, trouble-free Christmas mailing, Crawley noted.

Detailed packaging instructions may be obtained easily from the packaging and wrapping pamphlet. But, the Postmaster did have a few do's and don'ts to offer, as follows:

Don't go for flimsy light cardboard and paper boxes in packaging your Christmas presents for the mail.

Do pick strong containers in good condition. An empty corrugated fiberboard box of the type that may be found in your neighborhood grocery is good for mailing gifts, for example, if it is rigid and undamaged. Be sure the container is the right size; if it is too large, the contents are apt to shift in transit; if too small, an overstuffed carton may burst in shipping. If necessary, cut your container down to fit contents.

Cushioning material, such as excelsior, shredded newspapers or tissue paper, should be evenly and firmly placed on all sides of the gift item. Two or more inches of such covering is the minimum.

The carton should be wrapped in heavy brown paper and tied with strong twine.

Articles of a delicate nature, such as glass, china, electrical appliances, musical instruments and radios, must be marked "Fragile" by the mailer. Food stuffs should be marked "Perishable," if subject to spoilage. But don't mark the wrapping with unnecessary wording. For example, "Do not Delay," is superfluous. "Rush" does not properly belong on a parcel. If it is desired to expedite delivery of a parcel, use special handling or special delivery service.

Do address plainly and properly, using postal zone numbers where available. Addresses should be printed in ink or typed, and a return address should appear on every parcel, no matter how near or far it may be going.

The proper place for the return address, incidentally, is the upper left hand corner of the parcel — not on the back, side, or one of the other corners.

The overwhelming bulk of Christmas mail will be by parcel post, of course, and it should be remembered that size and weight limits vary, depending upon the post office of address.

Mailers may check with their post office and ask for the free pamphlet "Post Office Department Publication 3," which contains the rates of postage and limits of size and weight for domestic mail.

Books may be sent at a special low rate of postage, but mailers must not enclose other articles with books at this rate.

**Q. Where does it come from and how is it identified?**  
A. It is from the loin section of the animal. It contains portion of the blade bone, ribs and backbone. There is no tenderloin muscle.

**Q. How is it prepared?**  
A. It is placed fat side up on a rack in an open roasting pan. A roast meat thermometer is inserted so that the bulb reaches the center of the thickest part, but does not rest in fat or on bone. Water is not added and the pan is not covered. Fresh pork is roasted in a moderate oven (350° F.) until the thermometer registers 185° F. If you do not have a thermometer allow 33 to 40 minutes per pound.

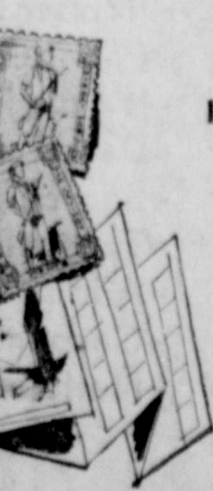

Fishing To Pick Up Sharply

21 Farmers and Ranchers Of County Given Fish

Twenty-one farmers and ranchers of Eastland County received fish Thursday from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Fish were ordered for the farmers and ranchers by Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting the

Upper Leon Soil Conservation District supervisors. W. A. Latch, U. E. Brown, A. H. Perdue, J. H. Elam and Gordon Woods of the Cisco area received fish. Farmers and ranchers of the

Bas, bluegill (perch), and channel catfish were delivered, each farmer and rancher receiving the number of fish to properly stock his farm pond. A properly stocked farm pond, which is well managed, will offer benefits both for recreation and as a food supply.

Two of the most important things in fish pond management are the control of the fish population (kinds and numbers) and the production of food for the fish. The most practical way to provide food for the fish is to grow it in the pond where the fish live. This will consist of plant and animal life found in the water, technicians say.

The production of microscopic plant and animal life often referred to as plankton or bloom is the first and most important step in the whole food chain. An abundant supply of plankton can be produced in water containing lots of food such as all fertilizers contain. This plant food normally finds its way into the pond by being dissolved from the soil as the water flows in from over the watershed.

The plant food in the water is largely determined by the fertility of the watershed over which the water flows. Poor land means poor water and poor water means little food for the fish.

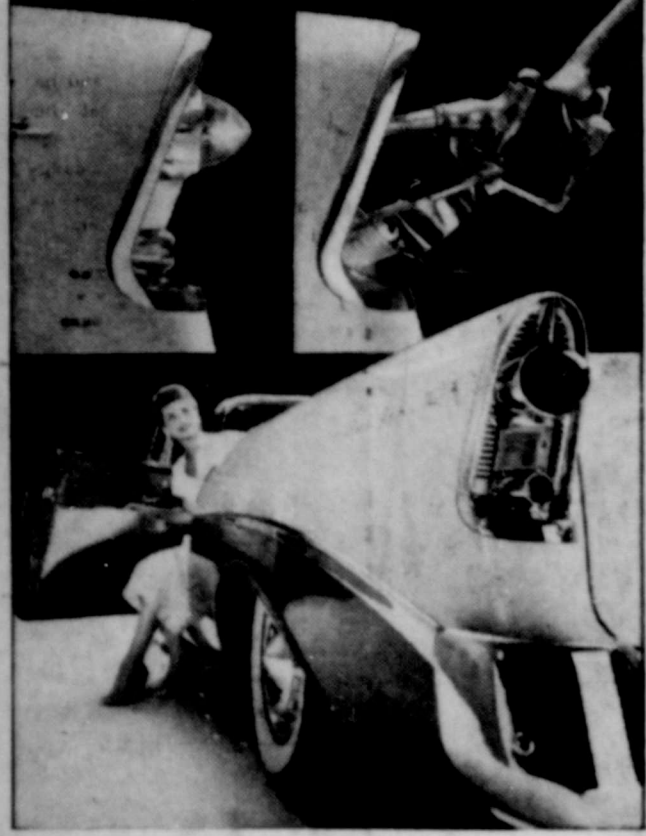
food in the pond, we now think in terms of fertilizing these acres of water as we fertilize land for crops. The principle is the same, and same kinds of fertilizer may be used," it was explained.

"Various mixtures of fertilizers may be used to fertilize ponds: One recommended fertilizer is 200 pounds of cottonseed meal plus 100 pounds of 20 per cent superphosphate. The 300 pounds of this mixture is suggested for ponds of 1/2 surface acre of water or less, for one year.

"Apply as follows: First application 150 pounds broadcast over pond in early spring. Second, third, and fourth applications of 50 pounds each at four to six-week intervals. Using the same method of application as with cottonseed meal and superphosphate you could use 300 pounds of a high grade commercial fertilizer or use 250 pounds of barnyard manure per application."

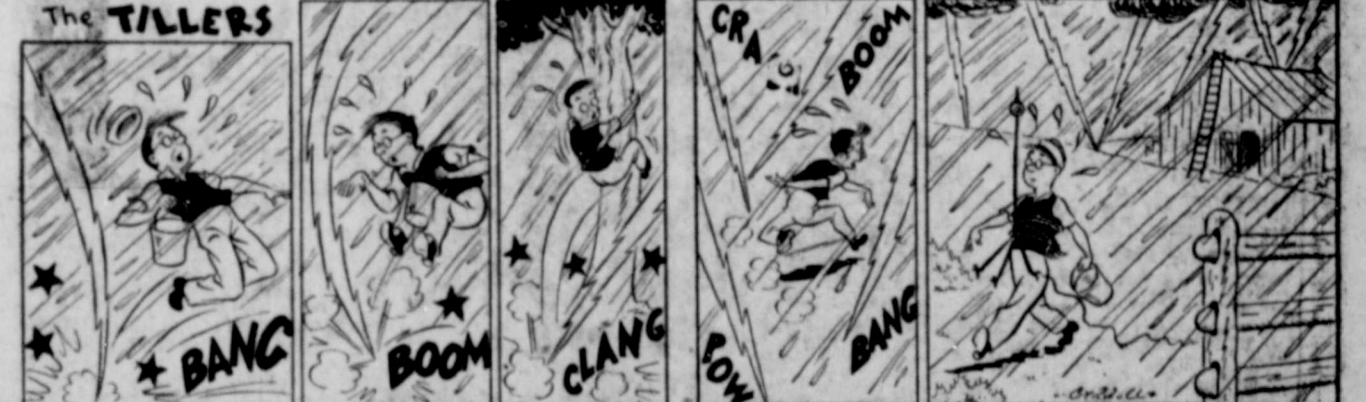

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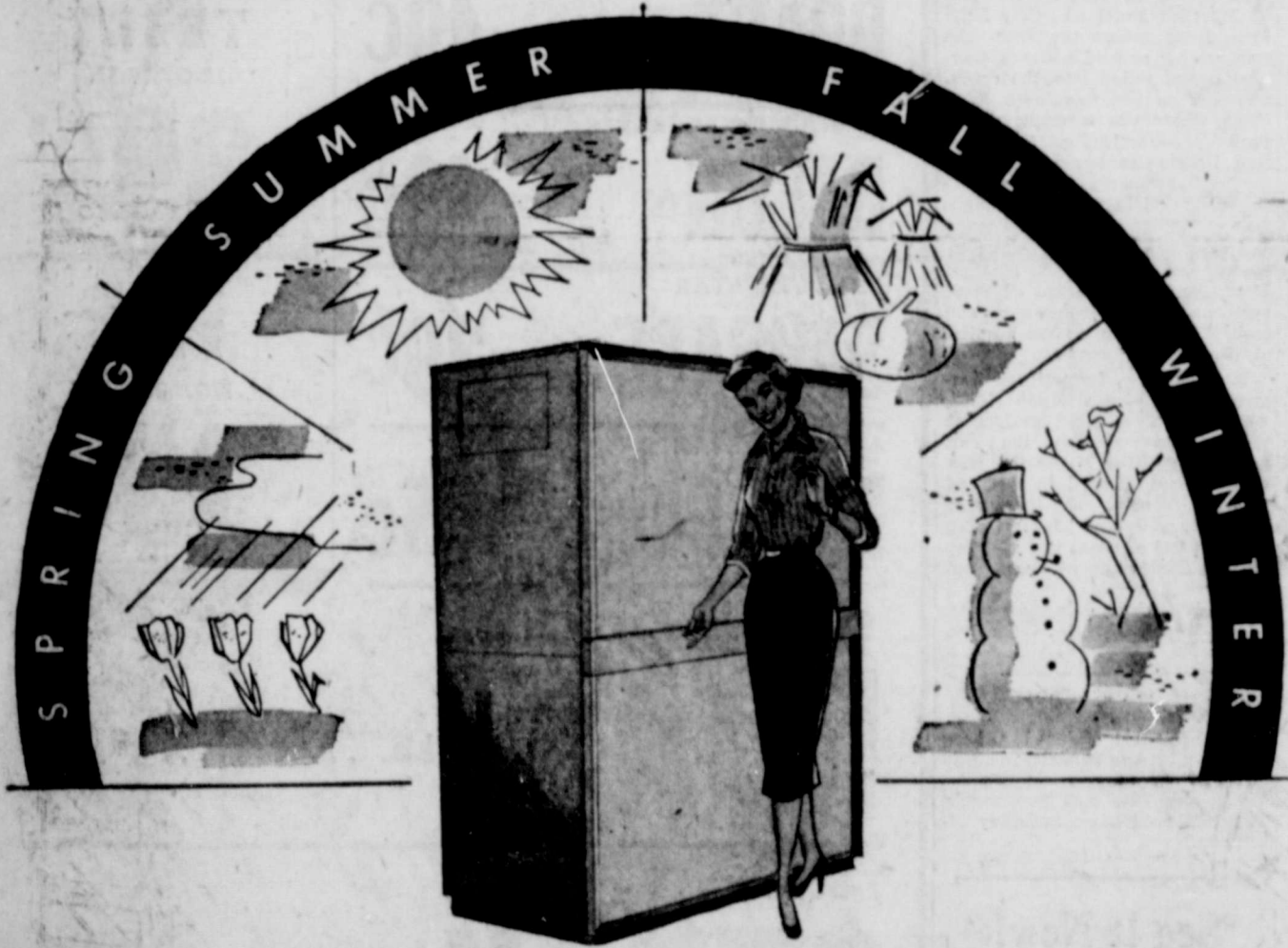

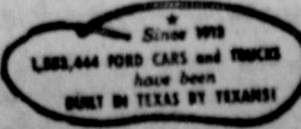

### Battle Creek Water Project To Start Soon

Contracts have been signed and work will begin soon on the City of Cisco's Battle Creek water project, Cisco Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported. Plans call for the flowing of water from Battle Creek into Lake Cisco by early spring.

E. E. Farrow Company of Dallas was awarded the contract for building the channel dam on Battle Creek and the erection of the pump station and pipe line connecting the channel dam with Lake Cisco. The Farrow company estimates that the job will be completed in March, 1956.

Farrow's bid on the channel dam was \$67,286. It also included \$127,930 to lay a 24-inch pipe line from the dam to a point where the water will flow by creek into Lake Cisco \$44,244 for pipe line work in the city and \$5,950 to build a concrete foundation for a new overhead storage tank. His total bid was \$245,469.

In separate bidding Pittsburgh-Des Moines Steel Co. was awarded a contract to erect a new 500,000 gallon overhead storage tank on its bid of \$67,120. This brought the total costs of the bids for the improvement of the water system to \$312,529. Total cost of the project, including engineers' fees, right-of-way costs and incidentals will approximate \$348,400. Cisco citizens recently voted a \$400,000 bond issue to pay for the improvements.

It is estimated by the engineers employed to study the situation that the Battle Creek project would more than double the present flow into Lake Cisco and take care of present needs and future growth of the community.

The new lines to be laid in the city will increase pressure throughout the town and will allow for future growth. Three truck loads of 12-inch pipe to be used in providing larger water mains have arrived and work will begin soon on the project.
