 on 149 carries for an 8.8 yard average, is extremely effective on punt and kickoff returns and has developed into a fine pass receiver.
 According to statistics, anytime two Bulldog backfield men carry the ball on consecutive trips, they represent a potential first down for not one has a rushing average of less than five yards per carry.
 David Wharton, more of a power runner than Jerry, has amassed 35 points during season as has Hinds, Sutton and Bennie Robinson, a senior tri-captain. David has missed three contests with injuries and Robinson has missed four with a shoulder separation and broken leg. He will definitely not see action Saturday at Childress.
Late Developing
 Sutton, likewise, was hampered with Charlie-horse during most of the early season and his power running did not develop until district play was well along.
 On the rib-rock forward wall, the Bulldogs have what has been considered one of the best lines in the state fr. tackle-to-tackle and one far above average from end-to-end.
 On the left side of the line, the Bulldogs have 195 pound Pete Jameson at tackle and Tommy Young, a 190 pound guard, who have both been classified as all-state contenders.
 Versatile and aggressive John Hagaman, a 185 pound center, who likes to crash enemy lines on defense, is a match for the finest. Smallest man on the line, 145-pound Dan Cruise, got his starting position not by his weight, but by his tough aggressiveness.
 Robinson, a 185 pounder at the right tackle position, is the type of lineman that is seldom heard of, who is hurt most when he doesn't have a part in every tackle, even though it may be across the field.

 Each entry will become the property of the Bake Show and will be sold. All proceeds go to the Eastland County Home Demonstration Council as sponsors.
 "The home demonstration club women will have baked products, sandwiches and coffee for sale in addition to the Bake Show products. The general public is cordially invited to attend and to participate in the Bake Show," announced Mrs. Minnie Mae Hart, Eastland County Home Demonstration Council secretary.
 All entries must be in place in the Reynolds Building by 11 a.m. Friday. Each entry must contain pecans, and anyone from this county or an adjoining county may enter products in the show. Those making entries are to attach a recipe to each entry.
 All proceeds from the Pecan Bake Show, held in connection with the Pecan Show, will go toward furthering home demonstration work in Eastland County.
 There will be five divisions in the Bake Show with a requirement for each: cakes—must enter one whole cake; pies—must enter one whole pie; cookies—must enter at least six; candy—must enter six pieces, and nut bread—must enter one whole loaf.
 Score cards will be used to judge entries and cash prizes and ribbons will be given according to the score.

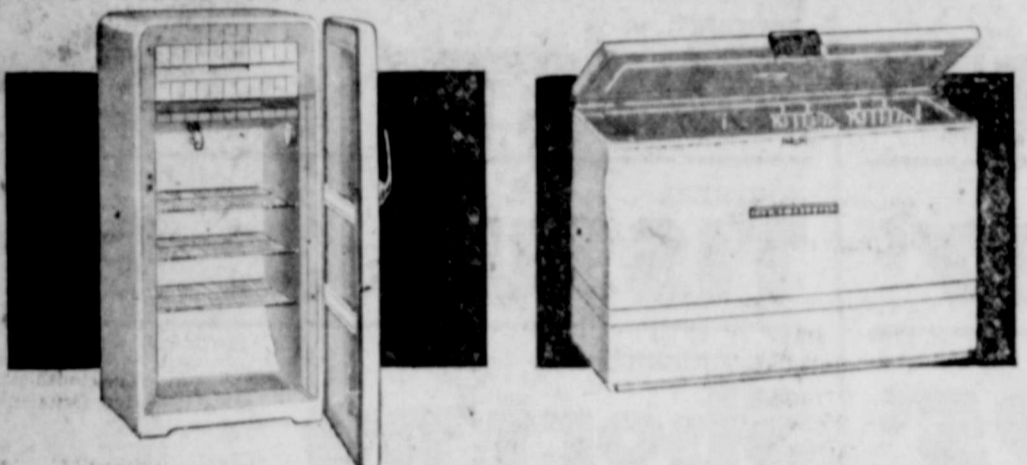

New Producer Reported For North of Cisco

A new Ellenberger oil producer was reported six miles north of Cisco this week after the J. H. Elder, Midland, No. 1 Tipton, showed a potential of from 90 to 100 barrels per day on tests. The well was producing from about 4,150 feet.

The Tex-Ace Drilling Company of Cisco had set surface pipe on another Ellenberger test for that area—Elder's No. 1-A Tipton—and expected to begin drilling within a few days. The wells are located in Section 471, SP, Rail-way Survey, Eastland County. Nearest production is on the Mitcham Ranch land which adjoins the Tipton tract on the west.

A new wildcat for the area seven miles north of Rising Star, west of the Cisco highway, is the C. J. Clark No. 1 C. B. Cruteh-field. Location is 330 feet from the north and east lines of Sec-tion 8, T. J. Fennell Survey. Per-mit calls for a 3,500 foot test.

Near Nimrod, 12 miles south-west of Cisco, the Jack Chamber-lain No. 1 A. A. Hansen, a wild-cat test, was drilling below 2,000 feet. Location is 330 feet from the south and 1,650 feet from the east lines of Block 10, Winfrey Sur-vey. Plans call for an Ellenber-ger test.

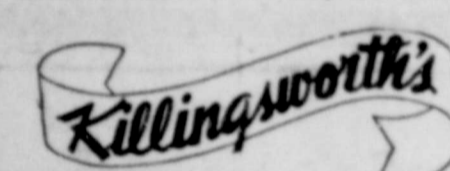
