## TEC Gets Jobs For 1,037,593 During Year

The Texas Employment Commission during the last year found 1,037,593 jobs that was only a part of the agency's work. Also, the Texas Employment Commission points out in its annual report, that agency also collected over \$16 millions in payroll taxes and investigated 161,234 claims for unemployment compensation.

The job placements represented an increase over the 1954 figure and the taxes collected were lower than last year's by four and one-quarter millions, a change of pace for governmental agencies. But then no other tax collecting unit can offer what the TEC may hold out under Texas unemployment compensation statutes, a chance for taxpayers to reduce their own liability.

## B. D. Tidwell Funeral Rites Are Conducted

Bernard D. Tidwell, pioneer Rising Star area resident, died at his home at Rising Star after a serious illness of five weeks. He was 74.

Funeral services were held Friday at the First Methodist Church, Rising Star, with the Rev. R. A. Brooks, Jr., pastor, officiating, assisted by Harry Tansil, minister of the Rising Star Church of Christ. Burial was in the Rising Star Cemetery.

Mr. Tidwell was born May 15, 1881 in Beebe, Ark., and came to Texas when a boy with his parents. He had lived in the Rising Star area for 33 years and farmed for several years in the Okra community. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Surviving are his wife: three daughters, Mrs. Nona Sanders and Miss Leota Tidwell, both of Abilene, and Mrs. Aline Pittman of Killeen; and two grandchildren.

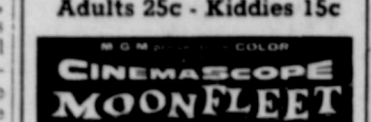

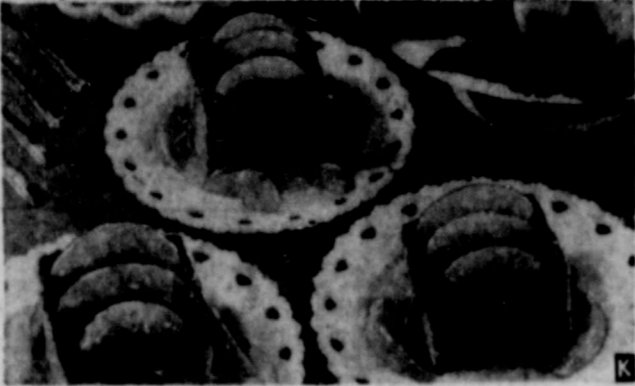

### Saucy Topping for Spice Cake

Fresh peaches go saucy when they top squares of spice cake for a summertime treat. The tender cake is made by the wonder-quick method with only one bowl for the mixing, while the sauce, tapioca-thickened and so easy to make, is the perfect accompaniment.



**SPICE CAKE WITH FRESH PEACH SAUCE**

2 1/2 cups sifted Swans Down Cake Flour  
1 cup granulated sugar  
1 tsp. double-acting baking powder  
1 tsp. soda  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. cinnamon

2/3 cup sifted Swans Down Cake Flour  
1/2 tsp. cloves  
1/2 cup shortening  
1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar  
1/2 cup sour milk or buttermilk  
2 eggs, unbeaten

\*With vegetable shortening, use 1 1/2 cups sour milk or buttermilk. With butter or margarine, use 1 cup plus 2 tbs. sour milk or buttermilk.

1. Into sifter, measure sifted flour, sugar, baking powder, soda, salt and spices.  
2. Into mixing bowl, place shortening; stir just to soften. Sift in dry ingredients. Then BEAT 2 MINUTES at a low speed of electric mixer, or 30 vigorous strokes by hand.  
3. Add eggs and remaining milk and BEAT 1 MINUTE longer in mixer, or 100 strokes by hand.

**BAKING:** Pour batter into two 9x9 1/2-inch square pans, which have been lined on bottoms with paper. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 25 to 30 minutes. Cool.

Serving cut cake in squares. Serve with Fresh Peach Sauce.

**FRESH PEACH SAUCE**

2 cups sliced fresh peaches  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 to 2 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca

1 1/2 cup water  
1/2 tbs. lemon juice  
Dash of salt

Combine peaches and sugar in saucepan; let stand 15 minutes. Add quick-cooking tapioca, water and salt. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil. Add lemon juice. Remove from heat. Cool 15 minutes; stir. Makes 2 1/2 cups sauce.

**Food Sense—Not Nonsense**



**Would You Be Fooled—About Food Faddism?**

Everyone prides himself on not being gullible—the sidekick is a fake, the mystic is "pooh-poohed." No one fools him here.

What draws us to the carnival? Probably it's the desire for the magic. The same desire leads us to believe exciting claims for some specific food. Without scientific proof, this food or food product is said to make us, or cure our ills—that is, for a fancy price. Of such, is the beginning of food faddism.

It is this human urge to be healthy or to be slim in "one fell swoop," that opens the way for the promoter of food fads. He often is short on knowledge and long on sales appeal. Some make a fanatical play of "health foods" and "natural foods." They are foods, true enough, but not wonder foods. A good varied diet of foods that any grocery store can supply will provide just as good nutritional health.

One of the country's eminent nutrition authorities, Dr. Fredrick J. Stare of Harvard University, recently wrote, "Refined and processed foods are a favorite target of the 'food specialist,' who would have us believe these foods are not nutritious. Actually, we get as much food value from refined foods which have been enriched as from natural foods, and sometimes more. This is not to say that enriched white bread is better than brown bread or vice versa. For all practical purposes, in typical American diets, they are identical in food value. Choose whichever tastes better to you."

Whether or not a food is "natural" is not important. The nutritional value of any food as the source of a specific nutrient, as the B vitamins, depends upon the composition of that food. For example, peanuts and eggs are both natural foods, yet peanuts contain 200 times more niacin (a B vitamin) than eggs. On the other hand, the same size slices of whole wheat and enriched white bread—natural and refined foods, respectively—contain almost identical amounts of niacin and thiamin—the whole wheat containing slightly less riboflavin.

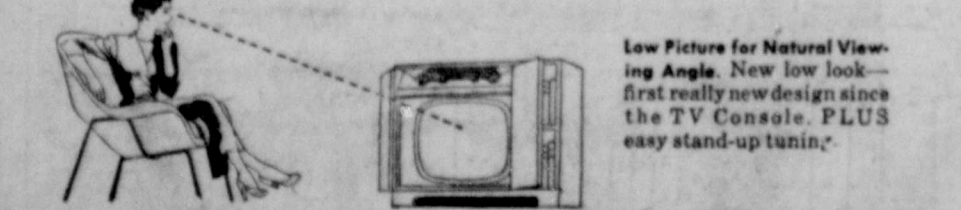

3 cups water  
1 No. 303 can tomatoes  
1-2 to 2 cups uncooked fresh or frozen lima beans.

Melt the butter or margarine in a large skillet or large saucepan. Add the beef and onion and cook until the meat browns. Stir in the

salt, pepper, steak sauce, garlic powder, rice and water. Add the tomatoes, and the lima beans. Cover and simmer for about 30 minutes or until the lima beans are cooked and most of the water is absorbed. Stir occasionally. If a thinner mixture is desired, add additional water.

**Christmas Snacks Ring Bell With Young Folk**



Festive and filling—that's how to describe this holiday fare for young folk. Chocolate milk-mocha punch and cookies are wonderful to serve under the Christmas tree.

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

WHEN the young folk want to give a party during the holiday season, let them plan simple but festive fare. We suggest some of these good things:

- Chocolate Milk-Mocha Punch (Makes 12 servings)**  
Three quarts chocolate milk, well chilled; 1 1/2 quarts coffee ice cream, 6 tablespoons instant coffee. Combine all ingredients; beat with rotary beater or electric mixer until frothy.
- Cherry Holiday Sugar Cookies (Makes about 5 dozen)**  
Four cups sifted cake flour, 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup softened shortening, 1 3/4 cups sugar, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 2 tablespoons maraschino cherry juice.  
Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cream shortening with sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs and vanilla and mix well. Add sifted ingredients alternately with cherry juice, mixing well after each addition. Chill thoroughly. Roll out on lightly floured surface to 1/4-inch thickness. Cut with floured cookie cutters.  
Place on lightly greased baking sheets. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees F.) 5 to 7 minutes, or until lightly browned. Frost and garnish with maraschino cherries, as desired.
- Cherry Christmas Wreaths (Makes about 3 dozen)**  
One cup softened shortening, 1/2 cup firmly-packed brown sugar, 2 eggs, separated; 2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour; 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries, drained (about 20 cherries); 1 cup chopped walnuts, 1 cup shredded coconut, maraschino cherry halves, drained.  
Cream shortening with sugar until light and fluffy. Add egg yolks, flour, salt and chopped cherries, mix well. Shape into 1-inch balls. Combine nuts and coconut. Dip cherry balls into egg whites and roll in coconut mixture. Place on greased baking sheets. Make slight depression in center of cookies; fill with cherry halves. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 15 minutes, or until lightly browned.

The principal reported causes which throw families into financial difficulties are: Inflation and high taxes, inability to resist "impulse" buying, combined with easy credit, illness or other emergencies, or just plain bad judgment and mismanagement.

Some people in financial difficulty, when threatened with legal proceedings to collect outstanding debts, seek the relief offered them by federal bankruptcy laws.

The purpose of bankruptcy laws is to permit an honest but unfortunate or weak debtor to surrender or account for all his

property for the benefit of his creditors and in exchange be discharged of his debts.

Any adult who is insolvent may become a voluntary bankrupt by having his attorney prepare for him a bankruptcy petition, together with schedules of his assets and liabilities, and then file the same in the proper United States district court.

After the debtor is adjudicated a bankrupt he is required to appear for examination as to his assets in the bankruptcy court, and if he fully accounts for his assets and has not violated any of the bankruptcy laws he will thereafter receive a discharge of his debts.

If he is granted a discharge of his debts, he has started a new financial life as of the date he filed bankruptcy. The assets which he thereafter acquires cannot be reached to satisfy the old debts, nor will creditors be permitted to sue him on the old debts.

Dishonest debtors sometimes endeavor to gain advantages for themselves not allowed by the bankruptcy laws. In these instances, upon objections to discharge by creditors, they not only will be denied a discharge of their

debts, but the courts will be prone to deal harshly with the offenders if they have violated the criminal laws.

The head of a family is entitled to claim as exempt any property which is exempt under Texas homestead laws, which in the ordinary case will be his home, household furniture, wearing apparel, the family automobile and tools of his trade or profession. However, if any of this property is covered by a mortgage or conditional sales contract he must pay any balance due thereon, or the owner of such mortgage or contract may repossess.

Bankruptcy has a lasting effect upon a person's future credit and in the usual case causes the creditors to lose their entire debt.

Many bankruptcies could be avoided if the "overloaded" debtor would make a timely effort to sit down with his creditors and work out plans for reduced payments over extended periods.

**LAW NOT AN EXACT SCIENCE**

Many people have the impression that a lawyer can tell them with finality what the law is in any and every fact situation. Few realize that in many instances the lawyer, like the doctor, can only give his expert opinion on the state of the law as applied to a particular set of facts.

There are some fact situations, which arise repeatedly, where the law is well-settled, and the lawyer can state with considerable conviction the exact rule of law applicable.

However, in many situations, the lawyer, after studying the statutes and the court decisions that are applicable, can only give his best judgment as to what a court would hold the law to be as applied to the particular set of facts presented to him.

How does a lawyer learn how to advise clients on legal questions? First, he must have had six or seven years of academic education. In Texas this means at least three years of college work and three years in a recognized law

school. Because the community at large has an interest in the qualifications and conduct of members of the bar, these minimum educational requirements must be met before examination for admission to the bar may be taken.

During the three years of formal legal education, the law student attempts to read, digest, reconcile and understand from 10,000 to 20,000 separate cases, statutes, and monographs. He must draw from these an understanding of basic legal principles, of processes of legal reasoning, of methods of fact and legal investigation, and of court procedures which bring relief to clients.

In both counselling and litigation, a lawyer must draw upon a wealth of precedent which he has attempted to store in his memory in order to apply one or more principles of law to the fact situation presented by his client. Ordinarily, many legal principles and rules of statute or decision are involved in even the simplest situation. Too, the problems raised by various clients, like fingerprints, are never exactly the same.

After searching his memory, the lawyer will usually check the pertinent rules and precedents. These

are found in an ever-increasing volume of statutes with which modern legislation seeks to regulate many aspects of our life, and in the decisions of the courts, boards and bureaus.

Almost every problem presented to a lawyer requires research in the statutes and law books before a proper answer can be given.

Therefore, you will not receive an immediate answer to your problem from your lawyer, unless it is of the most elemental type. Your lawyer should, and you should

give him time to, form his opinions from the authoritative statutes and decisions. You should also understand that, due to the constant fluctuations in our laws, he will sometimes be able to give you only an informed opinion, rather than an absolute statement of the law applicable to your situation.

# Mail Early Drive Is Striking High Gear

Reporting that the "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign is really in high gear, Postmaster A. E. Crawley today gave some helpful hints on how you can be sure that your Christmas cards will reach everyone on your list before December 25. Now is the time to buy a full supply of stamps.

"When you use three cent stamps on your Christmas cards, you get first-class mail service," he said. "First-class friends deserve first-class mail and the use of first-class postage makes it certain that your Christmas cards will be delivered promptly. Also, use of first-class postage insures forwarding services if the addressee has moved or the card will be returned to you if the recipient cannot be located. Then, too, on Christmas cards sent by first-class mail, you can include handwritten messages making your greetings more personal."

It is perfectly correct and, in fact, advisable to include your return name and address on each Christmas card envelope. This helps your friends to keep their mailing list up-to-date and insures correction of your list if the card is returned as undeliverable. The postmaster warns that if any of your Christmas card envelopes are larger than 9" x 12" or smaller than 2 1/4" x 4" they must be sent by first-class mail because such cards require hand cancellation.

When your Christmas cards are ready to mail, you will do both yourself and the local Post Office a real favor by putting the cards with local addresses in one bundle and those for out-of-town destinations in another. Then mark each bundle with special identification labels you can get free at the Post Office which read "All For Out-Of-Town Delivery" and "All For Local Delivery."

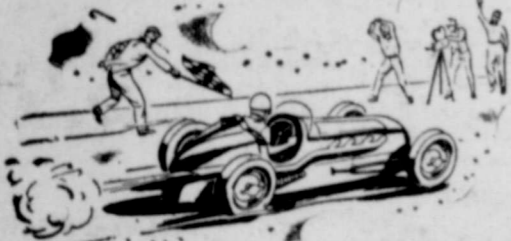

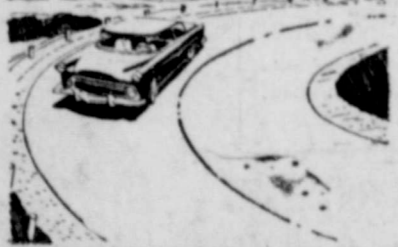
