The ten-week course includes instruction in all basic nullitary subjects and the firing of all basic infantry weapons.







Food Sense—Not Nonsense



Would You Be Fooled - About Food Faddism? Everyone prides himself on not being gullible—the sideshow is a cythe mystic is "pooh-poohed." No one fools him here.

What draws us to the carnival? Probably it's the desire for the

magic. The same desire leads us to believe exciting claims for some specific food. Without scientific proof, this food or food product is said to make us strong or cure our ills—that is, for a fancy price. Of such, is the beginning of food faddism.

It is this human urge to be healthy or to be slim in "one fell swoop," that opens the way for the promoter of food fads. He often is short on knowledge and long on sales appeal. Some make a fanatical play of "health foods" and "natural foods." They are foods, true enough, but not wonder foods. A good varied diet of foods that any grocery store can supply will provide just as good nutritional health.

One of the country's eminent nutrition authorities, Dr. Fredrich, Stare of Harvard University, recently wrote, "Refined and processed foods are a favorite target of the 'food specialist,' who would have us believe these foods are not nutritious. Actually, we get as much food value from refined foods which have been enriched as from natural foods, and sometimes more. This is not to say that enriched white bread is better than brown bread or vice versa. For all practical purposes, in typical American diets, they are identical in food walue. Choose whichever tastes better to you."

Whether or not a food is "natural" is not important. The natural

Whether or not a food is "natural" is not important. The nutritional value of any food as the source of a specific nutrient, as the B vitamins, depends upon the composition of that food. For example, peanuts and eggs are both natural foods, yet peanuts contain 200 times more niacin (a B vitamin) than eggs. On the other hand, the same size slices of whole wheat and enriched white bread—natural and food tooks respectively, contain almost identical amounts of plants. refined foods, respectively—contain almost identical amounts of niacin and thiamin—the whole wheat containing slightly less riboflavin.

Good nutrition is easy to accomplish when thought of in terms of a wide variety of meats, fish, enriched or whole wheat breads, fruits and vegetables, dairy products and eggs. No foolin', no one food or group of foods has the "complete magical answer."

Christmas Snacks Ring Bell With Young Folk



Festive and filling-that's how to describe this holiday fare for young folk. Chocolate milk-mocha punch and cookies are wonderful to serve under the Christmas tree.

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

WHEN the young folk want to give a party during the holiday season, let them plan simple but festive fare. We suggest some of these good things:

Chocolate Milk-Mocha Punch (Makes 12 servings)

Three quarts chocolate milk, well chilled; 1½ quarts coffee ice cream, 6 tablespoons instant coffee. Combine all ingredients; beat with rotary beater or electric mixer until frothy.

Cherry Holiday Sugar Cookies (Makes about 5 dozen)

Four cups sifted cake flour, 2½ teaspoons baking powder, ½ teaspoon salt, ½ cup softened shortening, 1¾ cups sugar, 2 eggs, I teaspoon vanilla, 2 tablespoons maraschino cherry juice.

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cream shortening with sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs and vanilla and mix well. Add sifted ingredients alternately with cherry juice, mixing well after each addition. Chill thoroughly. Roll out on lightly floured surface to ¼-inch thickness. Cut with floured cookie cutters.

Place on lightly ground having shorts. Bake in her way 400 decrees the source of the cookie.

Place on lightly greased baking sheets. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees F.) 5 to 7 minutes, or until lightly browned. Frost and garnish with maraschino cherries, as desired.

Cherry Christmas Wreaths (Makes about 3 dozen) One cup softened shortening, ½ cup firmly-packed brown sugar, 2 eggs, separated; 2 cups sifted, sil-purpose flour; ¼ teaspoon salt, ½ cup chopped maraschino cherries, drained (about 20 cherries); 1 cup chopped walnuts, 1 cup shredded coconut, maraschino cherry halves, drained.

Cream shortening with sugar until light and fluffy. Add egg yolks, flour, salt and chopped cherries, mix well. Shape into 1-inch balls. Combine nuts and coconut. Dip cherry balls into egg whites and roll in coconut mixture. Place on greased baking sheets. Make slight depression in center of cookies; fill with cherry halves. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F) 15 minutes, or until lightly browned.

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


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
