





AFAT COOKERY This is the question I'd like to



What is the name of this cut of

Pork Tenderloin.

Where does it come from and how is it identified? It is a long tapering round muscle from the loin section of the hog.

Q. How is it prepared? It may be cooked whole by roasting in a 350° F. oven or by braising, allowing approximately 1 hour for cooking, or it may be cut into individual servings and cooked slowly by braising 30 to 45 minutes.
