

There are three important en-tries you should make on this form. First, sign and date it, and rive your title - that is, owner, resident, partner, member, etc of the agricultural enterprise. Second, be sure to enter each your employees' social security account numbers correctly, als his full name and the total of tax able cash wages paid to him dur ng the year.

It is best to copy the number and his name directly from his ocial security card. This is portant in order that the emoloyee's taxable wages can be redited to the right social secur account. In case it is impe ber, write "Unknown" and Third, enter the amount of the total taxable cash wages you paid

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
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
