In a surprise sweeping raid, the Ranger Police Department dealt a crippling blow to one of the city's largest bootlegging rings Monday afternoon, when they took into possession nearly \$2,000 worth of illegal whiskey.

The police struck Monday afternoon at a vacant part of a dwelling which belongs to Mrs. Lola Harris who was arrested this morning, following the filing of legal action. The entire seizure of alcoholic beverages, which included an assortment of whiskey, gin, wine and vodka, includ-ing 185 pints, 519 half pints, 21 fifths and three fifths of

Police officials believed that the raid netted more illegal alcoholic beverages than had ever been seized here in a single raid in recent years.



Molasses Bran Muffins

4 cup shortening
4 cup unsulphured molasses
1 egg
1 cup bran
4 cup milk
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
2½ teaspoons baking powder
3 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup finely cut dates Blend together shortening and unsulphured molasses. Add egg; beat well. Stir in bran and milk; let stand until most of moisture is taken up. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add to molasses mixture with dates, stir only until blended. Fill greased muffin pans 3/2 full. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 30 minutes.

YIELD: 12 small muffins.

Mólasses Brown Bread

1 cup sifted all-purpose flour 2 teaspoons baking soda cup unsulphured molasses 2 cups sour milk 1 cup raisins teaspoon salt cup quick rolled oats

Sift together flour, soda and salt. Add quick rolled oats and corn meal; reserve ¼ cup in which to coat raisins. Stir in unsulphured molasses and sour milk, Mix raisins with ¼ cup dry mixere; add to batter and mix well. Turn into 4 greased No. 2 cans, filling each % full. Cover with metal foil or 2 layers of brown paper tied in place with strong cord. Place on rack in large kettle with tight fitting cover. Pour in boiling water to approximately ½ of the height of can. Steam 2 hours. YIELD: 4 loaves.





Hunting Fines During Past Season Disclosed

The sordid side of the recent unting season including four persons fined for selling deer, was evealed in the latest arrest report announced by the Director of Law Enforcement for the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

The new compilation showed 462 arrests during December with all but 57 of those charged, paying fines ranging from \$5.00 for trespassing to \$200 for possessiof game birds before the legal season opened and the same fine for shooting deer from an automobile Fines paid totaled \$14,222.90 plus \$826.33 in court costs.



The old established date of March 15 by which income tax returns must be filed was abolishe ed effective last year. All federal tax returns for individuals may now be filed on or before April 15. Although many persons believe that a tax return need nly be postmarked by the due late, such is not the intent of he statute. Tax returns are supposed to be in the office of the Internal Revenue Service by the the due date specified.

Tax forms and instructions will nue Act, all persons who have a be received by most persons durome over \$600 must file ing January. The instructions being distributed this year contain the following statement Internal Revenue Service will mail Form 1040 ES, as far as is practical, to each person who may need it. Anyone else required to file should obtain the form from an Internal Revenue Service of fice in time to file by April 15,

> Declarations of estimated tax are required from all persons who expect gross income of more than \$400, plus \$600 times the number of exemptions which may be claim ed, if more than \$100 of the in come will not be subject to withholding.

> Single persons with more than \$5,000 and married persons with more than \$10,000 expected gross income must file reclarations of



Declarations of estimated tax, keept those for farmers, must be led by April 15. Like the income ax return, this date is one month ater than the deadline for years efore the new Revenue Act went nto effect. However, the quartery installment payment dates rember 15, and the last one of 5 of the following year.

If a person, other than a farmdesires to file his income tax return and pay his tax in full, he may do this on or before January 5 instead of paying his last quar-erly installment. It does not reeve anyone from filling the orig nal declaration of stimated tax and making three payments on it. lowever, in most cases this provision does remove the possibility of a penalty for an under esti-

ate of tax liability. Farmers have special provisions ncerning declarations of estiated tax, and may postpone the iling of any estimate until Jan-ary 15 of the following year.

The penalty for underpayment of estimated tax was reduced by he 1954 act. There is now no inderpayment if the taxpayer remits at least 70 per cent of his ax as shown on his final tax reum. If there is an underpayent, the penalty is 6 per cen er annum interest on the additional amount which should have been remitted. It is expected hat there will be more strict enment of this provision in the uture by the Internal Revenue




