Guard CO Here Plans To Attend Atom Conference

Capt. Cecil C. Carr, commanding officer of Service Battery, 648th Field Artillery Battalion of Ranger will be among the staff and units commanders of the 49th Armored Division of the National Guard from 46 Texas cities to attend a two-day conference in Fort Worth, Feb. 18-19.

The session will deal with atomic weapons and their employment. The conference will be conducted by officers from the anti-aircraft artillery and guided missile school at Fort Bliss.

Subjects to be discussed are classified as secret.

An elaborate security program has been outlined for the two-day conference to make certain only those qualified to attend are admitted.

Heading the group of more than 200 officers scheduled to attend the conference will be Major General Albert S. Johnson, commanding general of the 9th Armored Division, Texas National Guard.

General Johnson participated in the atomic detonation series at Yucca Flats, Nevada, last spring when men rode in tanks above ground—the first time in history, during an A-bomb blast.

It comes as somewhat of a surprise that E. F. (Junior) Arterburn was appointed as backfield coach at Texas Tech this week.

This particular position with a school the size of Tech is a momentous task, but what with the records that this Ranger product has established, will probably have no bearing whatsoever.

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Fire Department Undertaking To Purchase Resuscitator Assistance Is Asked By Firemen On Fund

Confident that numerous contributions will come in to help defray the cost of the important device, the Ranger Volunteer Fire Department is undertaking to purchase a Stephenson portable resuscitator, a machine which has saved many, many lives.

Cost of the device is \$575.00. The resuscitator will be on display in the lobby of the Commercial State Bank later for two or three weeks and also will be shown several nights at the Police Station.

Volunteer Chief T. C. Weaver who is familiar with resuscitation through study, said:

"I consider this machine as good or better than manual resuscitation and it sooner or later will save a life, in some emergency. It is the latest model, one brought out in very recent years, and its service can be used up a pole, down in a hole, or anywhere. We'll be only too glad for the hospital or any other institution or individual to have its use, as the purpose, of course, is a public service to the community."

No larger than a suitcase, the Stephenson resuscitator has been described as an amazing gadget which can work miracles on victims of accidents causing breathing failures, such as drowning, electric shock, smoke suffocation, gas poisoning, or shock from an automobile accident.

It also works for a patient struggling to breathe after a heart attack or bad spell of asthma, breathing for the patient until nature can take over, he said.

The instrument is easy to operate and the only fuel needed is oxygen, available at any filling station or welding shop.

Proven cases of lives saved by the resuscitator are on record in almost every city of any size in the country, it was explained.

The Fire Department wants to keep the midget miracle worker on the job here, but needs cooperation from the public, whose lives will be made more secure through its purchase.

Funeral arrangements were made for 2 p.m. Thursday at the First Baptist Church at Strawn, the Rev. Rucker of Strawn conducting, and interment following in Indian Creek Cemetery near Mineral Wells.

A native of Indian Creek, she was born March 4, 1876. She married Mr. Whitley, a dairy farmer, at Palo Pinto in 1895. He died in April, 1939.

Strawn had been Mrs. Whitley's home the past 35 years.

Surviving Mrs. Whitley are seven children: four sons, Mr. Whitley of Eastland, A. S. Whitley, Bronie, S. L. Whitley, Hico, and R. Q. Whitley, Mulchoe; three daughters, Mrs. Earl Moon, Strawn, Mrs. A. A. Pesch, Meran, and Mrs. Howard Hanyan, Groesbeck. She also leaves 16 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren.

Whiskey Case Bond Set; Woman Released

Mrs. Lola Harris, 59, of Ranger, was released on \$500 bond in Eastland Tuesday after Ranger police filed charges against her for "possession of alcoholic beverages for sale."

Police seized nearly \$2,000 of whiskey from a small shack type house belonging to the Negro woman in a surprise raid Monday afternoon.

The contraband had been stored in a cement trough underneath the floor of the house that was nearly filled with old household items.

State Liquor Control agents took the beverages into possession Tuesday morning and charges were filed Tuesday afternoon. The whiskey was removed to the Liquor Control Board's warehouse in Abilene.

Mrs. Harris, when contacted by a reporter this morning, would not reveal whether she would plead "guilty" or "not guilty." She said, "It's not up to me to decide." She would not say who would make the decision for her.

Her only answer to questions was "you'll have to get your information from the police." She would not reveal whether or not she had yet retained the services of an attorney.

However, District Attorney Joe Nussle and Sheriff J. B. Williams said today that she was planning to plead "not guilty," when the court hearing occurs.

Sheriff Williams said plainly, "She intends to fight it."

Heavy Rain Brings .75 Inches To City Area

Heavy hail, varying in size, and a sweeping .75 inch rain, pelted this area for about 30 minutes Wednesday night.

The rain and hail fell amidst a severe thunder and electrical storm that knocked electrical power out in some parts of the city momentarily.

There was no major damage reported in the city, however.

The hail storm appeared to fall mostly on a line down U. S. Highway 80 in the Ranger-Eastland and Cisco areas. Mineral Wells reported rain but no hail. The hail stones here left the ground white.

The rains preceded a second mild cold front that is expected to drop temperatures in this area Friday. The first cold front Wednesday dropped temperatures 15 to 18 degrees and the second is expected to bring about almost the same affects.

A low pressure area centered in northern New Mexico is expected to move eastward bringing in the second front behind it.

Partly cloudy skies are expected to prevail in this area through Friday, but the cold front is not expected to bring any additional moisture.

However, the low pressure area could trigger scattered showers over most of the state today. Freezing rain or snow was expected today in parts of West Texas.

Also reporting rain in this area were Breckenridge, Baird and a 4 Rising Star although no hail was reported.

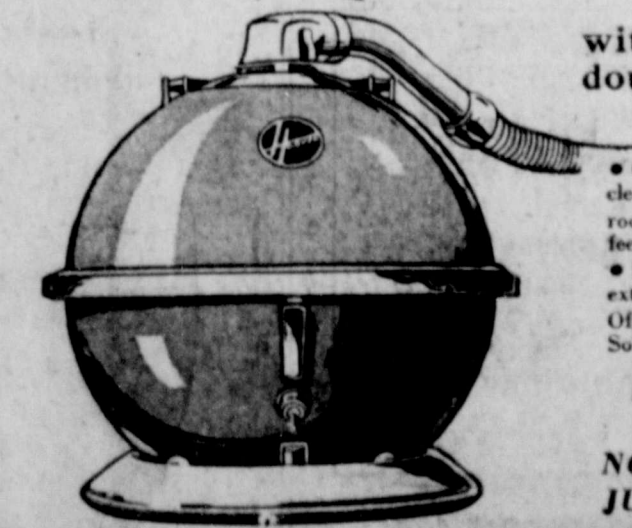

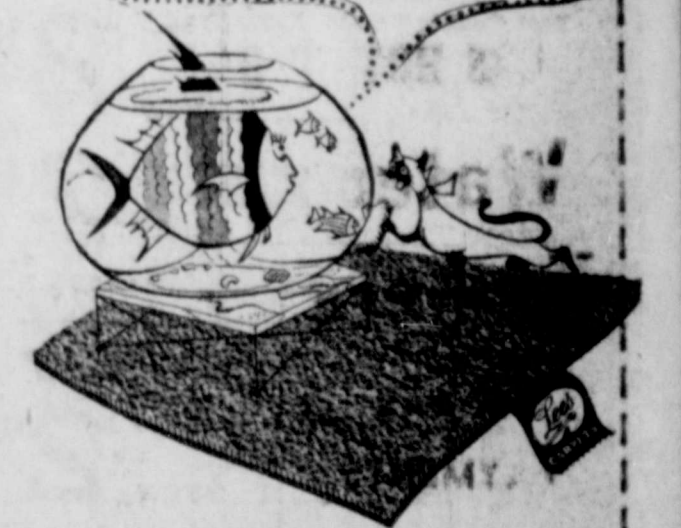

New Toppings Spice Pumpkin Pie for Any-Season Treat

No need to wait for autumn to savor the deliciousness of pumpkin pie. Canned and frozen pumpkin is at your finger tips in the stores, all year around. And if you're in the baking mood, the old-time favorite of grandma's kitchen is waiting for you on the shelves of your bakery or food shop.

Now comes the modern touch—a dramatic topping—for a spicy pumpkin pie, purchased or homemade. The toppings are a new idea but their flavors are time-tested.

Apple-Cream Topping

One cup heavy cream, 1 tablespoon confectioners' sugar, 2 tablespoons apple butter, 8 banana slices, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 8 pecan halves, one 8 or 9-inch pumpkin pie.

Whip cream with confectioners' sugar until stiff. Fold in apple butter and spoon onto pie in 8 mounds. Dip banana slices into lemon juice. Place 1 banana slice and 1 pecan half on each whipped cream mound.

Walnut-Crunch Topping

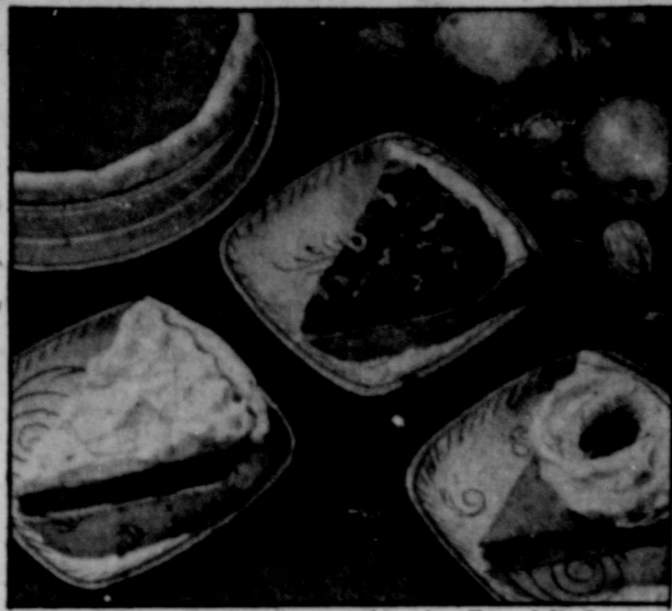
One-half cup brown sugar, firmly packed, 1 tablespoon milk, 1 tablespoon honey, 1/2 cup chopped walnuts, one 8 or 9-inch pumpkin pie.

Combine brown sugar, milk, honey and chopped nuts. Spread over top of pumpkin pie. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F) for 18 minutes.

Orange-Cheese Topping

One egg white, 2 tablespoons brown sugar, dash of salt, 1/4 cup orange marmalade, 1 (3-ounce) package cream cheese, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 tablespoon orange marmalade, one 8 or 9-inch pumpkin pie.

Combine egg white, brown sugar and salt. Beat until meringue

Bible Comment:

Apocryphal Books Bridge Gap In Bible History

THE period between the Old and New Testaments is one to which comparatively little attention is paid by Bible readers, but it was of great importance in the development of Judaism and in the preparation for Christianity.

Over 400 years elapsed between the last writing of the Old Testament and the first writing in the New. The period was not without religious writing, as readers of the Apocryphal Books of the Old Testament well know; but the 14 books, varying in value, were not a part of the Hebrew Canon, which closed with the Book of Malachi.

This period of over 400 years saw the rise and fall of the Persian empire, its overthrow in the world conquest of Alexander the Great and the ascendancy of Greece, and the domination of the world by Rome, completed shortly before the Christian era, which was to continue throughout four centuries of Christian development.

That faith and hope and goodness and devout expectation of the coming of the Messiah could persist through all the persecutions and cruelties, the murderous rivalries and struggles for power and the repeated and determined efforts to pervert the purity of religion, ought to give us faith that out of darkness would in our own new era of truth and love and righteousness will dawn for mankind.

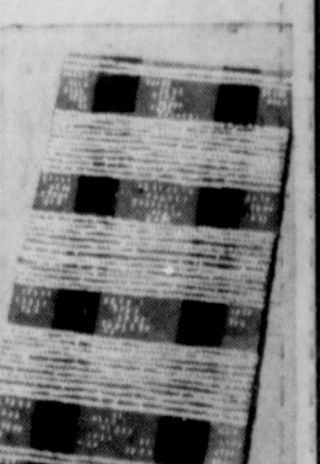

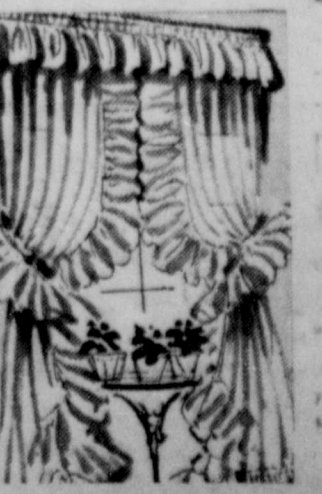

95% Texans Affected By Dental Disorder

AUSTIN — Over 95 per cent of our population is afflicted with some sort of dental disorder. However, if parents took advantage of all the preventive measures available, their children would grow up relatively free from dental disorders, asserts Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of Health.

Since these dental disorders have their start in children, early attention to proper dental health procedures helps the child avoid the dental disease that plagues his parents, he said.

"Tooth decay," Dr. Holle said, "is probably the most widespread dental disorder among children and improper diet can be blamed for the large incidence of the disease. Sugar, one of the main factors in decay, is consumed in 10 times larger quantities today than it was 100 years ago."

He urged parents to substitute fresh fruits such as apples and oranges and uncooked vegetables such as carrots and celery for sweets as between-meal snacks for their children.

The toothbrush, Dr. Holle pointed out, is one of the best weapons against decay. He stressed, however, that to achieve maximum benefits the timing and method of toothbrushing are vitally important.

He explained that since toothbrushing removes bits of food which have become lodged in the teeth, the teeth should be brushed immediately after eating. The brush, he said, should be firm and small enough to get to all surfaces of the teeth easily. For best results, he suggested that the upper teeth be brushed down and the lower teeth brushed up.

Another weapon against decay, Dr. Holle said, is fluoridation of public water supplies.

"Scientific studies have shown that fluoridation has reduced tooth decay as much as 65 per cent," he said. "No ill effects have been discovered from the measure which is currently in effect in more than 1,100 communities in the United States."

In communities that have no public water supply it is suggested that children receive direct applications of a fluoride solution from their dentists. These treatments have been found to reduce decay up to 40 per cent.

Parents are urged not to neglect periodic dental for their children in order that small cavities and other irregularities can be detected before they become serious. He also advised that early visits tend to eliminate any fears in the child, since little or no discomfort is involved.

U. S. Dist. Judge R. E. Thomson found Deputy Robert William Burkett, 37, of Odessa, formerly of Eastland, guilty of beating a prisoner at the Ector County Jail in Odessa, according to dispatches from Pecos. Sentencing was deferred until May 14.

The prisoner, a trusty—Henry Cecil Cope—testified that the officer struck him with his pistol and fist and Burkett testified, dispatches said, that Cope appeared to be reaching for a knife at the time he struck him.

Deputy Burkett was defended by his uncle, Joe Burkett, a prominent San Antonio attorney.

Much later in the evening, we are told, Mr. Rush returned to Eastland with the bus driver, looking for us, to straighten things out a little more, but we missed them.
