Police Recover Car Stolen At Denton Sunday

Two Latin American youths were arrested here by city police Sunday night in a car that had been stolen in Denton at about 4 p.m. Sunday afternoon.

The pair also admitted stealing another car in Fort Worth earlier in the day but ditched it in Denton because "it wouldn't run fast enough." The 1955 Ford was returned to Denton with the suspects Sunday night by officers of the sheriff's department there.

The teen-age boys rushed from a Weatherford service station without paying for gas they had put into the car. The service station attendant managed to copy the license number on the car and he immediately phoned the sheriff's office there, who was unable to catch the suspects.

Ranger police notified by radio made the catch, however.

Area Scouts Rate First In Three State Ranking

Local Boy Scout Leaders have every reason to be proud of the membership gains, which has been made throughout the eight and one half counties, served by the Comanche Trail Council.

"The Council ranks first among thirty-six councils in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico in highest percent of membership gain, with 23.4 percent gain in boys. There are 1968 boys in the Scouting movement in this area", according to W. Doyle Graves of Stephenville, Chairman of Organization and Extension.

The Council rated second in the highest percent of new units gained in the three-state-area with 51.3 percent. There are 84 Cub Packs, Scout Troops and Explorer Posts in our area.

Comanche Trail is the only Council that did not drop a single Scouting unit last year. There are 64 churches, schools, civic groups and veteran organizations which sponsor these units for boys ages eight through 17 to join.

Dr. T. C. Graves of Goldthwaite was president of the Council for the past five years which reached the peak year in 1955.

Rio Cox of Brownwood is president this year. Joe O. Galbraith is scout executive.

Straw Rites Held For Man Killed In Fall

Services were held at the First Baptist Church at Strawn Thursday for James Alva Tibbs, formerly of Mingo and Thurber, who was killed in an accident earlier in the week.

Tibbs, 30, of Abilene, and an employee of Halliburton Oil Well Cementing Co., was killed when he fell from the top of a 600-barrel storage tank located west of Winters.

The tank was being moved and Tibbs reportedly caught hold of a "hot" wire while lifting several strands of wire to clear the large tank. He apparently struck his head in the fall.

Tibbs had been associated with Halliburton at Cisco and Snyder before moving to Abilene three years ago. He was a veteran of World War II.

Rev. Rooker, pastor of the First Baptist Church at Strawn, and Rev. James E. Crites, of the First Christian Church at Ranger, officiated at the services.

Survivors included his wife, two sons, Fred, 5, and Glenn, 3; mother, Mrs. Pearl Tibbs of Mingo; and one brother, Dwane Tibbs of Palo Alto, Calif.

Lobbying Tame Now Compared To Unsavory Peak After Civil War

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Stories about lobbyists and lobbying activities have held the headlines, both in Texas and in the Nation, during the last several weeks.

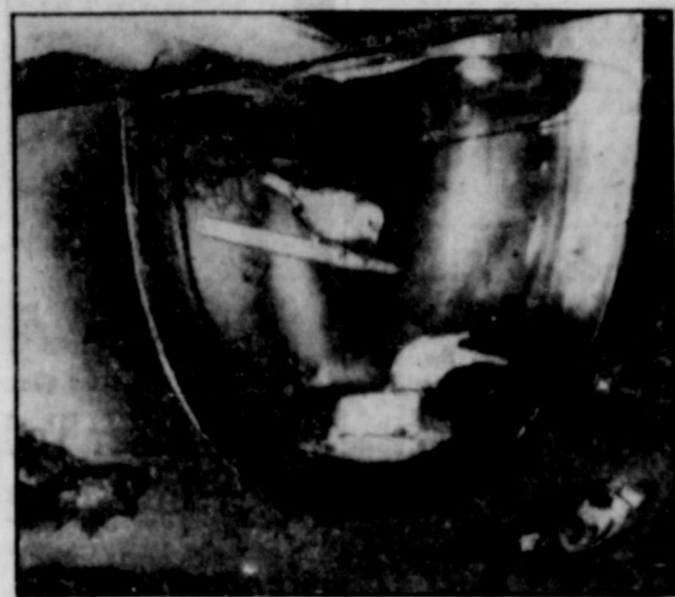
Just what is lobbying? There are several definitions, but Webster defines it as "the effort to influence the proceedings in Congress."

If we let this definition stand without qualification, everyone who writes a letter to his or her Congressman in behalf of a certain Bill must be a lobbyist. If I as a Congressman write my constituents for their views on legislation and they give them to me, they are, under this narrow definition, lobbyists. In other words, they do not have to be in the "lobby" of the halls of the Congress to "influence the proceedings."

There is hardly an organization of any size, whether business, professional or otherwise, which does not have a "representative" in Washington. They are here to (Continued on Page 2)

It is V. M. Gambelin, Cisco, No. 1 Mrs. Clara L. Trammell. Drilling is 1,020 feet from the north line of Section 51, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

L. R. Pearson of Ranger completed No. 1 W. E. Rice, Mary Furt Survey, regular field project 1 1-2 miles northwest of Olden.

Daily potential was six barrels of 39 gravity oil, plus 10 percent water. It is pumping from 24 perforations at 1,474-78 feet. Total depth is 1,500 feet.

Resuscitator's Life Salvage Grows Daily

(Editor's Note: This series of articles has been written as an arm of assistance toward the Volunteer Fire Department's drive to raise necessary funds for the purchase of a resuscitator.)

From all over the nation, reports of the life-saving values of the resuscitator have poured into all phases and functions of news reporting.

The telephone operators of Concord, Mass., staged a series of dances and other social affairs to buy a resuscitator for the police department. One day after the machine arrived they could cut a notch in the case. The resuscitator was credited with saving its first life that of a young girl found unconscious in a gas-filled room.

The Lions of Missoula, Montana, sat around waiting for their fire chief to appear, so they could make a formal presentation of the new resuscitator. The fire chief was delayed; he was using the machine to revive a boy who had fallen into a creek. In Needles, California, the first man treated was a citizen who had taken a terrific jolt of electricity while working atop a pole. He was thought to be beyond help, but the resuscitator pulled him out of it. That was only fair — he was the man who had led the campaign to buy one.

In Youngstown, Ohio, a woman was pronounced dead. The doctor was filling out the death certificate. Name of the deceased, date, the cause — in this case, carbon monoxide. Before the ink was dry on the white diploma, the patient was reviving, and she lived a long time.

Death wasn't necessarily fatal, again, for the fire surgeon in

Philadelphia. He collapsed at the scene of a big blaze. Here again, competent physicians called him dead, but, he, too, came out of it. As a matter of fact, a Lazarus Club, limited to those who have apparently risen from the dead, could assemble quite a membership. The wife of one of the victims of the Morro Castle disaster grew so hysterical at seeing her husband's body among the dead that rescue workers went through the motions — empty, they supposed — of trying to revive him. To their astonishment, he came back to life.

So did the "drowned boy" at Northville, Mich. Firemen had rescued him from Wayne, and nobody remembered to tell them that the boy had been pronounced dead. It was just as well. He revived 36 minutes later.

 watch Bills introduced and to determine how it affects the particular interest which they represent. Many of them are never seen personally. If legislation is introduced which adversely affects a certain group, their representative in Washington often interprets this effect and writes the members requesting that they in turn write their Congressmen. The constituents reflect the views of their representative in Washington and many times the messages are exactly the same. These become known as "pressure groups."
 It is not so much that there are lobbyists as it is the kind of lobbyists. Why should not all groups who have banded together for a common purpose be watchful of legislation which affects them? It is representative government when they make known to members of Congress their feelings.
 It is said by many who have served or have observed both State Legislatures and activities in the United States Capitol that the activities of lobbyists in Washington are much milder than in State Capitols.
 Personally I have never had a so-called lobbyist to offer me anything of value or to even intimate any sort of reward for favoring his viewpoint. The vast majority of these representatives simply present their arguments for or against legislation in which they are interested.
 In many instances, it is humanly impossible for a member of Congress to study legislation with such thoroughness as to become completely informed on the total effect it may have on all segments of our complex present day economy. I have never found anything wrong in listening to those who have an opinion to present.
 The evil of lobbying comes from the evil that is in a few unscrupulous people. It takes a combination of the unscrupulous lobbyist and the unscrupulous public official to produce this evil.
 Lobbying has a long history. It actually started in George Washington's administration on the tariff issue. It reached unsavory heights in the decades from the Civil War to the turn of the century.
 Lobbying activity in Washington today is very tame as compared with what the record shows it must have been back in the early 1870s when Jay Gould offered members of Congress \$1000 cash and \$5,000 when the Bill was passed, plus \$10,000 of the bonds, to approve a railroad route across the continent.
 Even the ministers have lobbies in Washington - even the Indians. Educational institutions, churches, foundations, hundreds of big corporations, farmers' organizations, labor unions, and just about everything and everybody have representatives in Washington. They are lobbyists. There are good apples and bad, but it is my observation and experience that the vast majority are honest, sincere, and serve a useful purpose.
 Pressures - yes. But to believe that there is widespread dishonesty is to destroy our confidence in our representative form of government. A scrutinizing investigation

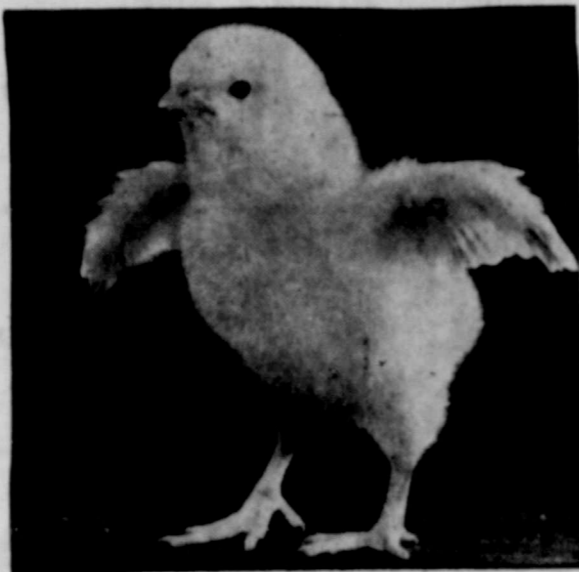

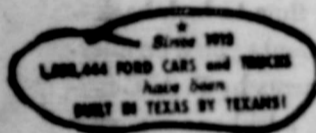

January 5. The lowest average temperature for the period was 24 degrees on January 18.

Forty-four of the 80 "heating days" recorded freezing temperatures, marked by a low of 13 degrees on January 19. None of the low readings during the 80 days exceeded 50 degrees, November recorded nine days with freezing temperatures, December had 17 and January produced 18 freezing days.

Lone Star's systemwide gas delivery figures also pointed to increased consumption. In December, 1954, the company delivered 22,372,700 cubic feet of gas to 756,235 customers in 450 communities, towns and cities in Texas and Oklahoma. The send-out for December, 1955, reached an all-time monthly high of 25,207,700 cubic feet.

At 7 a.m. on January 22, 1955, Lone Star had delivered 16,305,700 cubic feet of gas to system customers since the first of that month. For the same period of 1955, the delivery was 18,190,500 cubic feet. The company delivered more than a billion cubic feet of gas for five consecutive days beginning January 16. A record 25-hour send-out of 1,218,500 cubic feet of gas was established at 7 a.m. on January 19.

"The prolonged period of heating weather has resulted in increased gas consumption," the gas company spokesman said. "But a lot of persons have been deceived by the sunshine and clear skies which have accompanied some of the cold weather. They measured the chilly mornings and nights in terms of balmy afternoons. There was a minimum of spectacularly cold or blustery weather during the 92-day period, making the public less aware of the extent to which heating equipment has been in operation."

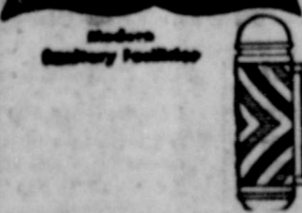

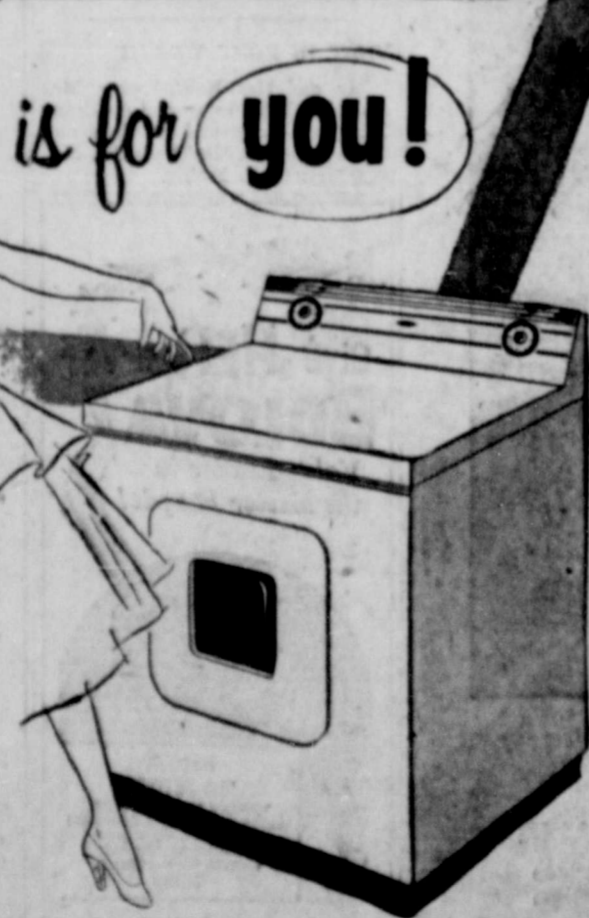
