Forty-four of the 80 "heating days" recorded freezing temperatures, marked by a low of 13 degrees on January 19. None of the low readings during the 80 days exceeded 50 degrees. November recorded nine days with freezing temperatures, December had 17 and January produced 18 freezing

Lone Star's systemwide gas delivery figures also pointed to increased consumption. In December, 1954, the company delivered 22,372,700,000 cubic feet of gas to 756,235 customers in 450 communities, towns and cities in Texas and Oklahoma. The send-out for December, 1955, reached an alltime monthly high of 25,207,700,-000 cubic feet.

At 7 a.m. on January 22, 1955, Lone Star had delivered 16,308. 700,000 cubic feet of gas to system customers since the first of that month. For the same period of 1956, the delivery was 18,190,800,000 cubic feet. The company delivered more than a billion cubic feet of gas for five consecutive days beginning January 16. A record 25-hour send-out of 1,218,90,000 cubic feet of gas was established at 7 a.m. on January 19. "The prolonged period of heat-

ing weather has resulted in increased gas consumption," the gas company spokesman said. "But a lot of persons have been deceived by the sunshine and clear skies which have accompanied some of the cold weather. They measured the chilly mornings and nights in terms of balmy afternoons, There was a minimum of spectacularly cold or blustry weather during the 92-day period, making the public less aware of the extent to which heating equipment has been in operation.
