As often happens when a woman is approaching 40, Miss Robinson, who was not without hope kept going back to her fortune teller. Not wanting to lose a customer, but being essentially honest the fortune teller said:

"He, I see a tall man. He's going to propose to you!" "Dark?" the anxious Miss Robinson cried in ecstacy.

"Yes," the fortune teller said. "Dark. It will have to be."

Speaking of fishing, though it hardly the weather for it, Robert H. Hughes of Tuffkin, a man who took his Texas fishing savy to Tennessee and earned a reputation of being able to catch more catfish than anyone else has become the Annual Catfish Derby champ at Pickwick Dam near Savannah, Tenn.

Hughes' claim to the title, "King of the Catfishermen," rests on the fact that he has caught more catfish during each annual Catfish Derby than any other fisherman during the past three years in marathon month-long tournament.

During the first Derby, held in July of 1952 he landed 1,306 blue cats, most of them ranging from one to four pounds. In 1953, he again caught 1,306, then in 1954, he fell off to 1,070 and that's some fishing.

Surprisingly, little research directly indicates that what happens on the land surrounding a body of water such as Lake Leon, or any other reservoir or stream, for that matter, definitely affects the water.

So to speak, overgrazing is an enemy of good fishing. In a certain portion of rolling country where the farmers raised many acres of row crops, mud washed down the hillides during heavy rains. The mud entered the streams. So the rivers and lakes in this area were usually very muddy. The game fish, which feed by sight, couldn't find their food. The food was scarce too, because it couldn't grow well in the dark, muddy water.

In this particular area, the farming has changed. The farmers began to raise more cattle, less row crops. Some of the land which had been cultivated was made in pastureland. Grass was grown in many of the fields which formerly supported corn and tobacco.

Then, during rains, most of the water soaked into the soil. The grass held the soil on the land. It no longer washed into the streams. The streams became clear again.

In this instance, grazing restored the fishing. In many places, though, overgrazing destroys the fishing. There is overgrazing on some of our federal land, and also on some private land.

When too many livestock are grazed on the pasture, the grasses are destroyed. The rain water no longer soaks into the ground. It rushes down the hillides and into the streams, where it causes floods.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

"NEGOTIABLE INSTRUMENTS"

The average person does not often use the term "negotiable instruments" in his everyday conversation, and the words may not mean much to him. Actually, it is just a mouth-filling term used in law to describe certain important pieces of paper that we normally call by simpler names.

Even though we seldom use the words, we deal with negotiable instruments all the time. Every check we write to pay the gas bill is a negotiable instrument, and so is your paycheck or pension check. The note you sign to buy a new car, the money order you purchase at the bank or post office, or the traveler's checks you take with you on a trip instead of cash, all are negotiable instruments.

It was all started by merchants who had to send large sums of gold or currency between cities or nations. They worked out a way to exchange money, or the values of money, by written messages, much of the time through a third

party like a broker or bank. But when you deal in pieces of negotiable paper instead of hard money, there have to be certain standards and safeguards or the paper could lose its value.

Consequently, there developed a whole system of laws within nations and between nations, upon which all our business rests. Through the courts, if necessary, the owners of negotiable instruments may enforce the terms written on the paper.

In the United States things used to be confusing some times because of different state laws, but by 1924 all 48 states had adopted a Uniform Negotiable Instrument Law which sets up the same rules nationwide.

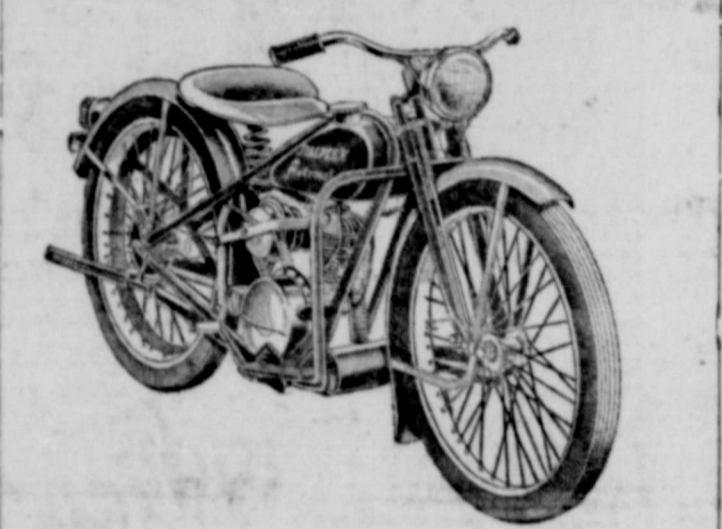
Since so-called negotiable instruments are so important; since they are ordinarily just like money in many ways; since they often are used like money, or are sold to other persons or companies, and since there are special laws defining the ins-and-outs of negotiable instruments which we wouldn't ordinarily have any reason to know about, there are one or two simple rules we should follow:

We should make certain we read what's on the paper, that we know what the words mean, and what the penalties and dangers may be, before signing our name.

Remember: You are the only person in the world with that signature, and the courts, as a rule, must take your signed promises at their face value.

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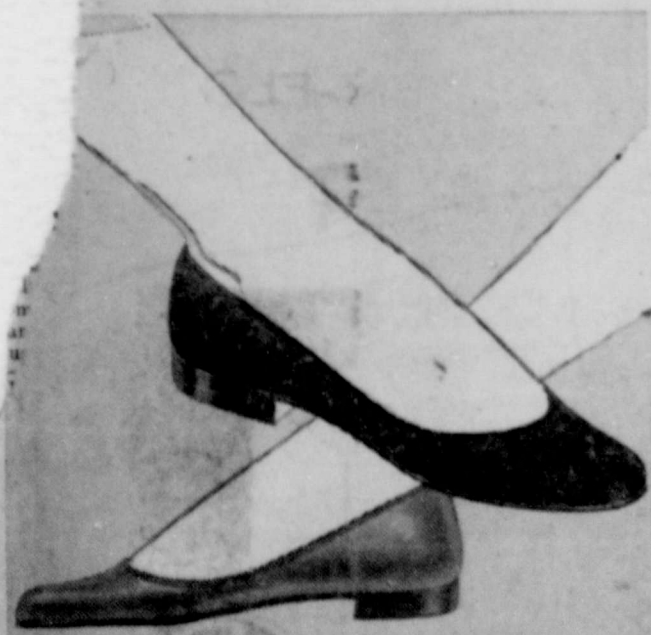

Graham's Tour Proves Heart And Soul Of Man Same Among All Races

HONOLULU — Billy Graham's 40,000 mile speaking tour of seven countries in the Far East has proved that the heart and soul of man is the same among all races.

The tour has shown beyond all question that people react the same way to the message of God even though they may have skins of different color, speak many languages and live in cultures centuries apart.

Billy preached one message, with little variation, to an estimated 1,000,000 people of India, Thailand, Philippines, China, Formosa, Japan and Korea. He had been warned there would be little response in most of these countries where dominant religions are Hinduism, Buddhism and Shintoism. Over 10,000 responded. There seemed to be no difference in reaction to that when he preached at Chattanooga, St. Louis, Toronto, London, Paris or Berlin.

What was the message with such strange powers? What text could produce such results? Readers are likely to be amazed with its simplicity. His text for every major address was John 3:16, the most familiar verse in the Bible: "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." Billy explained it in a language a child could understand, but adults were gripped with attention.

Here are the highlights of the sermon just as delivered by Billy:

"All of you know about this verse but few of you know what it says. It begins with these words 'For God.' Who is God, some of you may ask. I'm going to tell you what the Bible says about Him. God is the one who created the universe. He made the sun, the moon and the stars. He made you. Now God does not have a body like us. God is a spirit. He is in Russia. He is in Africa. He is in India. He is here tonight. There's something else I want you to understand about God. He is an impartial God. He is no respecter of persons. You can't pull any strings with Him. He loves Russians just as much as He loves Americans. He is holy, pure and righteous.

"Let's see what else the verse has to say. It says 'For God so loved.' Some may ask, Why was the human race created? Were we created to have all these troubles, frustrations and fears? No. God created man to love Him. God is a God of love. In order for there to be love there has to be an object to love. God created man and placed him in a paradise. They walked together in the cool of evening. They loved each other.

"But God gave man a great gift. He didn't create him like we do an automobile with push button control. He gave him freedom of choice. He didn't want man to love Him because he had to do it. He wanted man to love Him by choice. So He gave man a test.

"He told him there was one fruit in the garden that he should

not eat. If you do, God said, you shall die. Man ate the fruit. He disobeyed God. He rebelled against God. With that rebellion sin came into the world. Every person since that time has been born in sin. But, you say, wait a minute, Billy. Surely you aren't going to say that all of us will be punished because of Adam's sin. That's not all of it. When you reached the age of accountability — an age when you could make decisions for yourself — you became a sinner by choice. You disobeyed God because you wanted to.

"Your soul was created in the image of Almighty God, but sin has separated your soul from God. He is holy and righteous. Sin cannot stand in His presence. Your soul longs and hungers for God but cannot make contact because of sin.

"God loves you. He cares for you. He knows everything about you. Don't ever think this is such a great big world that God doesn't have time for you. He has the hairs of your head counted and He has a name for every hair. He knows where you live. He knows every thought of your head and heart.

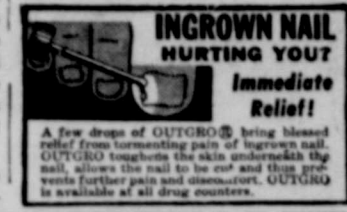
"God looked down from heaven one day. He saw all the unhappy-

ness and trouble in the world. He loved us and wanted to help us... God decided to become a man. That man was Jesus Christ. Jesus Christ is God. He walked among us. He spoke our language. He healed the sick. He made the blind to see, the deaf to hear and the lame to walk. He was God.

"Christ did something about the sinful condition of man. He went to the cross and died. The cross is a symbol of Christianity. He died and was placed in the grave. But He didn't stay in the grave. In three days He arose again. He is now sitting at the right hand of God the Father in heaven to make intercession for you.

That's the message. It's as simple and profound as that, and people respond to it — a Hindu professor, Buddhist priest, drunkard, European royalty, American millionaire and street sweeper.

"You don't have to believe it," said Billy. "That's your academic privilege. I have only told you what the Bible has to say."

"HOMEMAKING CHATTER"

BY MINNIE MAE HART

As Easter approaches most of us are turning our thoughts toward something new in wearing apparel. The new slim silhouette dress is popular again this spring. This will present several problems when it comes to keeping a crisp, unwrinkled look.

The dress may lose its shape across the back if the material you choose has a tendency to stretch. Also, wrinkles may develop across the front.

To guard against this, I suggest lining the dress, so a light-weight rayon lining or other material that isn't too heavy, and doesn't cling.

Cut the lining about one-eighth inch smaller than your regular

dress pattern and bring it eight to ten inches below the hip line. Machine baste to the front and back pieces of the dress before putting the seams together. This keeps the fabric from slipping and puckering as you stitch it in place.

You know it is commonplace nowadays to have a long life. Proper food can help to make those extra years happier and healthier.

Complaints of a chronic tired feeling, a gloomy outlook on life, anxiety over small things, and loss of sleep often are caused from being poorly nourished. The right food helps the body to be at its best and, if illness strikes, a well-nourished body responds better to treatment than one in a run down condition.

I have a delicious recipe which I'd like for you to try and see if you don't like it too. It is for Banana Nut Bread.

1-3 cup fat; 3-4 cup sugar; 1 egg; 2-3 cup bananas; 2 cups of flour; 1-2 teaspoon baking powder; 1-4 teaspoon soda; 1-3 cup sweet milk; 1-4 teaspoon salt; 1-2 cup nuts.

Cream shortening and sugar; add beaten egg. Add the mashed bananas; add the milk and sifted dry ingredients and nuts alternately. Bake in a pound-size greased loaf pan 8" x 4" in preheated oven 350 F. for 1 hour.

Try it, won't you? I have enjoyed chatting with you. Hope that it has been helpful to you.
