



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

11/2 cups sifted enriched flour 1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup Fluito (new golden yellow shortening)

In a mixing bowl combine flour and salt. With a pastry blender or two knives cut in Fluffo until mixture looks like coarse cornmeal. Sprinkle water over mixture, one tablespoon at a time, and mix lightly with a fork until all flour is moistened. With the hands gather dough into a ball and roll it out on a lightly floured board into a circle % inch thick and about 1½ inches larger in diameter than the pie plate. Line pie plate and flute edge of pastry. Prick pastry with a fork and bake at 425 F for 15 minutes, or until browned. Cool shell and fill with vanilla filling prepared according to package directions. Top with fruit and decorate with whipped cream.




