Delegation To Be Organized For Highway Commissioner Meeting

Paving Of Ranger-Leon Road Is Goal

The Ranger and Eastland Chamber of Commerce have been notified of their appointment with the State Highway Commission at 10:30 a.m. Thursday, March 23, it was announced today.

Working as a single group, the two Chambers of Commerce will seek the paving of the road leading from U. S. Highway 80 near Ranger across the Lake Leon dam through their spokesmen, L. R. Pearson of Ranger and Virgil Seaberry of Eastland.

The group will ask that the road be paved on an emergency basis. Both Chambers of Commerce have urged that a large delegation attend the meeting. "We want everyone who is interested in the highway to attend," R. V. Galloway, manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, urged.

Especially those owning lots and cabins on the lake and members of the Lone Cedar Country Club will be asked to attend, he implied. "We're going to try to have representatives of every town in the county there," Galloway said. The paving of the road will be requested from the standpoint of potential recreational facilities that the lake poses, as in keeping with the State Highway Department's program.

Galloway pointed out that only this week, D. C. Greer, State Highway engineer stated that, "Texas has been slow to realize the potential value of the tourist industry as a source of cash income, but that the steady rise of out-of-state visitors since the end of the war indicates that people in other states are becoming increasingly aware of the state's many attractions as vacation spots."

Greer added, "We believe that the daily expenditure for a vacation (in Texas) is substantially less than is necessary in some of the other 'big' vacation states, thus allowing our out-of-state visitors to stay with us longer and see more of Texas."

"In spite of the limitations imposed on us, we in the Highway Department are doing everything possible to bring Texas to the attention of vacationers from other states. We believe that we have only begun to tap this source of direct cash income, and in years to come we expect to see tourism move even higher on the scale of top Texas industries."

In cash value the tourist industry ranks next to the state's annual cotton crop, with cotton listed at \$700 million and tourists at \$412 million for the year just past.

"In other words, we are working along the very lines that the Highway Commission itself is trying to promote," Galloway said. "We're trying to develop Lake Leon into one of these recreational or vacation spots."

Those who plan to attend the meeting in Austin with the delegation have been asked to group at the Highway Commission building before the appointment and to enter as a group. Those planning to attend should notify either the Ranger or Eastland Chamber of Commerce. The goal now is to entice at least 100 delegates to attend the meeting.

The Highway Commission building is located at the corner of the first block East of the capitol building.

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More U. S. 80 Highway Traffic Program Pledged

Representatives of more than a dozen Texas cities voted at Big Spring Saturday to intensify their campaign for more traffic on U.S. Highway 80 through a more free use of road signs and strip maps.

The delegates to the Central Division meeting of the U.S. Highway 80 Association voted to install a minimum of 15 highway signs west of El Paso and east of Weatherford, to purchase strip maps showing U.S. 80 from Savannah, Ga. to San Diego, Calif., and to push the formation of U.S. 80 clubs in all towns along the route.

Membership fees for the local clubs were set at \$10, with the money to be used in putting up signs calling attention to advantages of travel on U.S. 80 and purchasing the maps.

The group adopted a resolution commending the Texas Highway Department and its district engineers for development of U.S. 80 in Texas.

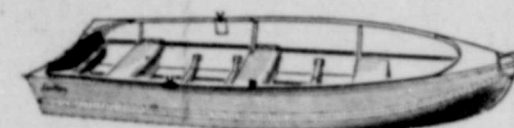

Peaches And Cream In Golden Pastry



Here's an idea for glorious spring and summer dining! Fill a rich, golden pastry shell with velvety pudding and top it with peach halves. There are many glamorous ideas such as this one in an exciting new book titled "Creative Cooking Made Easy" now being offered throughout the country.

PEACH CREAM TART

1 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup flake (new golden yellow shortening)
3 tablespoons water
2 packages vanilla pudding
Cooked peach halves, drained

In a mixing bowl combine flour and salt. With a pastry blender or two knives cut in fluff until mixture looks like coarse cornmeal. Sprinkle water over mixture, one tablespoon at a time, and mix lightly with a fork until all flour is moistened. With the hands gather dough into a ball and roll it out on a lightly floured board into a circle 1/4 inch thick and about 1 1/2 inches larger in diameter than the pie plate. Line pie plate and flute edge of pastry. Prick pastry with a fork and bake at 425 F for 15 minutes, or until browned. Cool shell and fill with vanilla filling prepared according to package directions. Top with fruit and decorate with whipped cream.

County Dairy Farmer Given Bull As Prize

Grand prize of a registered Holstein bull was awarded recently to Marston Surles, Cisco dairyman, as top producer of the area in a contest sponsored by an Abilene milk plant.

The bull, from the Texas A&M College herd, was delivered to Surles' farm west of Cisco by John Jenkins, field man of the milk company.

Surles' score, determined on the basis of the quality of milk, flavor, bacteria count, temperature and other factors figured in grading both by the health department and the receiving plant, was 270 out of a possible 300 for the six months that records were kept on the producers' work. He was the only dairyman in the contest who maintained a score of 90 or more for every month of the contest.

The contest was divided into two 3-month periods, and awards were made to the top three producers each month in three different areas from which milk is shipped to the Abilene plant. Surles was given an electric skillet as a winner in the first 3-month period.

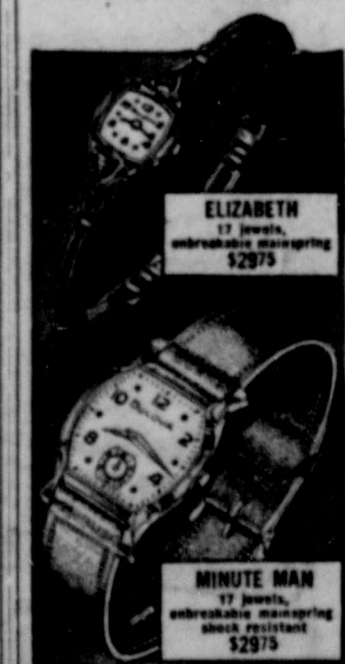
