Local Business Here Starts 35th Year

Burnham Inks McMurry Pact

Stan Burnham, athletic director at Ranger Junior College since February, 1955, has accepted the position as basketball coach at McMurry College at Abilene.

His appointment becomes effective Sept. 1.

Burnham, who was also assistant professor of biology at Ranger Junior College will teach in the science department at McMurry.

A 1949 graduate of Daniel Baker College, Burnham came to Ranger from Mineral Wells. He received his B. A. degree in biology in 1949 and has completed one year of graduate study at Texas University.

At Daniel Baker, Burnham played basketball and football two years, lettering both years in each sport. He was quarterback in football and a forward in basketball during the 1947-49 season. He has coached at Rusk, Iredell and Mineral Wells.

Dr. Harold G. Cooke, president of McMurry in announcing the appointment, said that Burnham would conduct spring training there for 15 days later in the year.

Burnham has been invited to attend a Founder's Day Dinner Thursday in the McMurry dining hall to meet the faculty and administration and for a social gathering of McMurry ex-students Thursday.

Mrs. Burnham, formerly of Georgetown, is currently teaching at Ranger High School. Mr. and Mrs. Burnham have three children. He is a native of San Saba.

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\$530 Paid For Champion Steer

Four-H and FFA youth of Eastland County have been mailed checks totaling \$13,430.11 as a result of a sale of their Eastland County Livestock Show champions which was held Tuesday by Sig Faircloth's auction organization at his barn on Highway 80 east of Eastland.

It was a successful climax to a good show season. Mr. Faircloth extended all services to the young stock raisers without charge. He said that "the finest possible spirit" existed on the part of buyers, including many businessmen from about the county.

Top price of the sale, 50 cents per pound, went to Clinton (Button) Humphrey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon (Brandy) Humphrey of Eastland for his grand champion steer, which brought \$530.00. Button's reserve champion, at 40 cents per pound, brought \$372.00.

When then sold to the packers, the animal brought about 22 cents a pound. The steers were bought originally by the five Eastland County banks: Eastland National, Ranger Commercial State, Cisco First National, Rising Star First State and Gorman First State.

In the fat hogs division, the grand champion of Ed Blackwell of Ranger, bought by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, brought \$64.00, at 32 cents per pound, as against a market price of around 16 cents. Eastland FFA, for its reserve champion, received \$47.50 from Kincaid Feed & Seed, at 25 cents per pound.

In the fat lambs section, the grand champion of Mark Kurkin of Cisco brought \$94.50 at 99 cents a pound, paid by the Cisco First National Bank, and the reserve champion of Terry Gossnell, also of Cisco brought \$29.00 at 29 cents per pound, while the market was 17c.

Two hundred and sixty-four FFA and 4-H animals were sold and 500 were sold in the "regular" auction at the Faircloth barn, the occasion being such a busy one that the Faircloth organization did not leave the barn office until 5 o'clock the next morning.

Several firms individually bought animals shown by the boys at a price much higher than the market quotations, and the Agricultural and Livestock committee of the Chamber of Commerce sponsored the raising of a pool to assist in bringing the price of fat lambs, hogs and calves up to an amount that will probably be quite as incentive to Ranger FFA boys next year.

The pool also bought some animals shown by Olden FFA boys.

Representatives from more than 14 area towns will attend the Eastern Star School of Instruction at Ranger Monday and Tuesday, it has been announced.

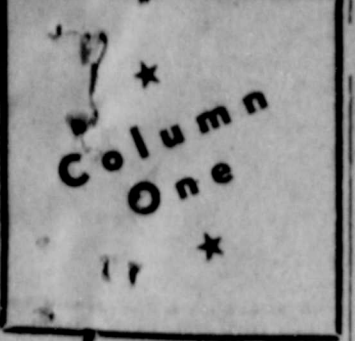
For the occasion, a luncheon will be held at the First Methodist Church Tuesday noon and a banquet will be held at the Masonic hall 6 p.m. Tuesday.

Cisco is to be the host city for the next district convention which is to be held July 10.

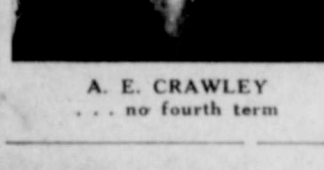
Three Seek Seats In Regents Election Here

Board Learns May Draft For Tex. Takes 593

Texas Local Board, Selective Service, officing in the Petroleum Building, has been informed by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service Director, that the May draft call for Texas asks for 953 men, compared to 301 for April.

This is the state's share of a national call for 12,000 men, all for the Army.

At the same time, the state Selective Service director announced a call on half the state's draft boards for 1,152 men to take pre-induction physical and mental examinations for future calls.

He said that the boards not receiving a quota for these examinations in May would be called upon to furnish men for examination in June.

Both local board calls for May induction and pre-induction examination are scheduled to be mailed from the state Selective Service headquarters this week.

The May quota will be filled with men who are 21 years of age, or older, on May 1st, with the exception of delinquents, or volunteers, who may be older.

Colonel Schwartz said he expected the May call to be filled with volunteers and men without children. He said delinquents were liable first, but the state doesn't have many delinquents.

He warned young fathers that they had better be alert in advising their draft boards about children or an expected child.

"They may get drafted if they don't," he said. "Fathers have to let their draft boards know about these little family events. If they don't, they may get those greetings from their friends and neighbors. Then it's too late."

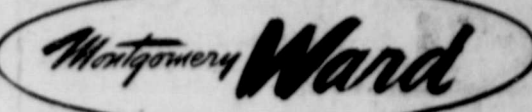

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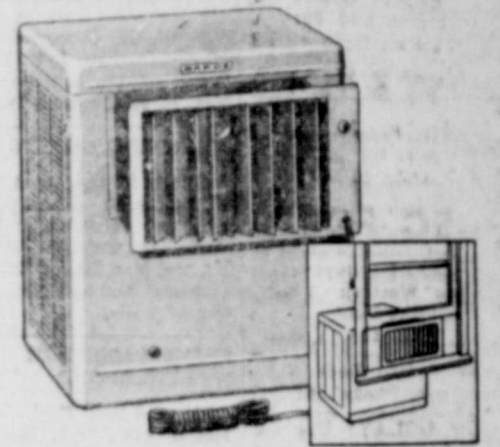


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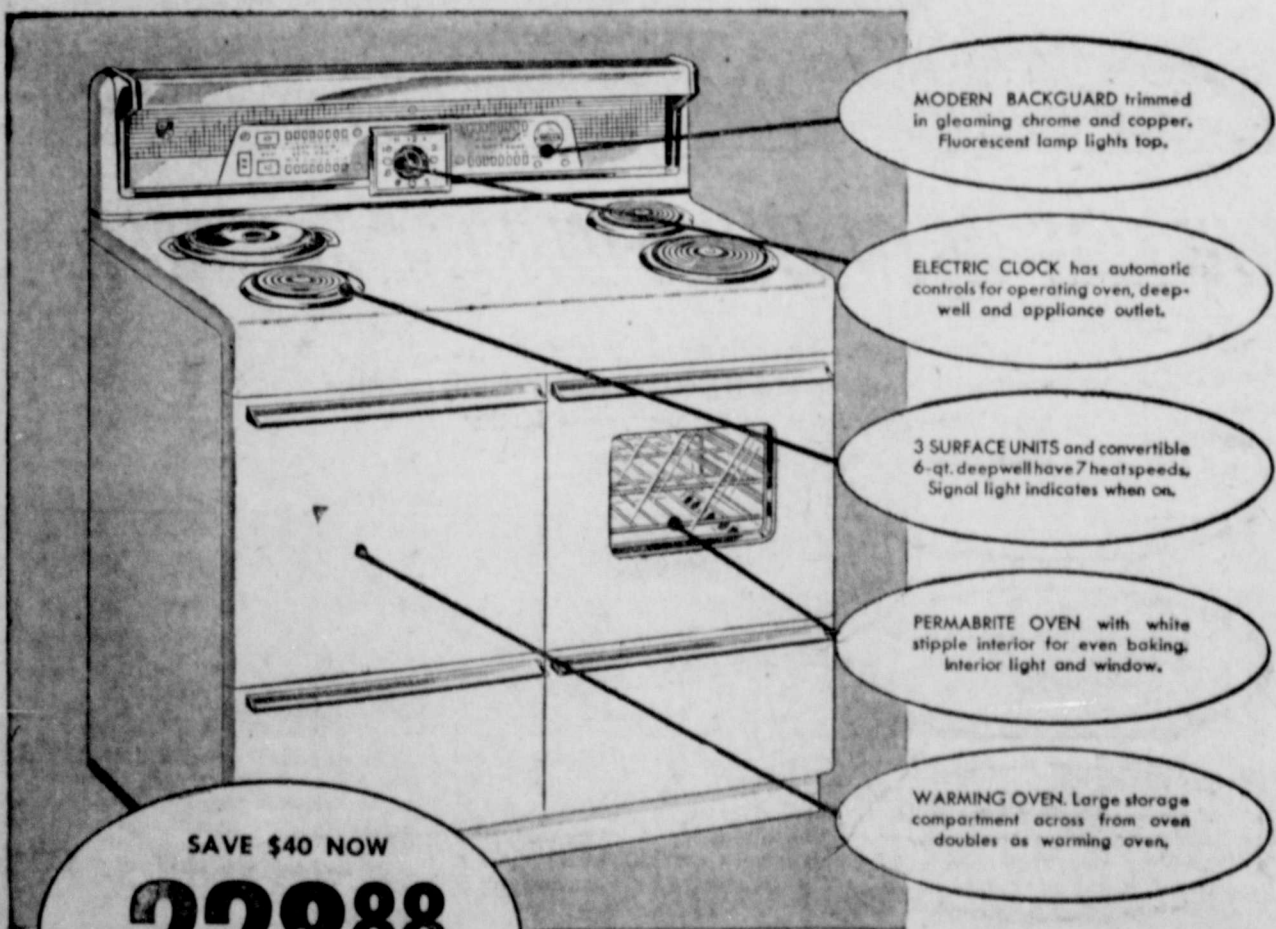
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WARMING OVEN. Large storage compartment across from oven doubles as warming oven.
