Little League Spring Training Dates Expected

Little League officers and managers are expected to set spring training opening dates in a called meeting tonight at 6:30 p.m.

The meeting is to be held at the Ranger Times office.

Previously the meeting to set the formal opening date had been set for April 19 but interest to start league activity earlier this year has created the new date.

Officers are also expected to name new managers for the Dodgers and Yankees whose managers from last year resigned. Early reports indicate that spring training will probably begin about May 1 although the date will not be official until officers take action tonight.

The officers will select the two new managers upon recommendation of a manager selection committee appointed a week ago, at the season's first organizational meeting.

Re-contracting of signs on the fence around Little League Park is expected to begin early next week and other operations are expected to be well underway before the spring training begins.

Drilling Near Desdemona Tops County Oil News

Oil activity in the Eastland County area continue to look favorable this week.

Jarbo Oil Company's W. H. Davis drilling, three miles north-east of Desdemona in Eastland County, was reported at 1758 feet in shale. It is slated for 1850 feet.

Tamehill Petroleum Co. of Abilene has drilled well number 8A, R. J. Mahery Jr., 400 feet from the east line of Section 12, Block 11, Texas and Pacific survey. It is located three miles west of Albany and schedule to go 1250 feet with rotary.

Texcon Oil Co. of Dallas has received a permit to drill their number 1 S. Horne, which spots 500 feet from the south line and 950 feet from the east line of the Robinson Survey 06, one mile west of Coleman in Coleman County, which is a step out from discovery well in Gardner by H. A. Birdwell and Son Drilling Co., which was drilled in January.

Kewanee Oil Company has received permit to drill a salt water disposal well on their Hawkins lease near Ovalo in Taylor County.

Crappie fishermen in the past three or four weeks have found that the fish have been more active from about midnight until 3 o'clock in the morning. In fact nearly all the sizeable catches have been made during that time.

Spud Summers and T. C. Herring fished at this time of the night on at least two occasions to take from the lake some of the year's largest catches.

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Health Officer Hits Disease Spreading

Due to the increasing number of cases of whooping cough, mumps and measles which have spread through the schools here in the past weeks, Dr. A. W. Brazda, city health officer, said that it is

admissible to give booster injections for those who have been exposed and also as prophylactic measures.

Dr. Brazda said that 12 new cases of mumps and whooping have been reported in schools this week.

The city health officer criticized the return of students too early after a bout with one of the diseases mentioned.

He cited Article 4477, Rule 15 of the Public Health Laws of Texas which states: Persons suffering from measles, whooping cough, mumps, German measles and chickenpox shall be required to be barred from school for 21 days from date of onset of the disease with such additional time as may be determined by the health officer.

Local Service Reduces Military Requirements

The importance of basic training for a young man in the National Guard was emphasized today by Capt. Cecil C. Carr, commanding officer of the Ranger unit of the Texas National Guard, in which he urged young men of the Eastland County area to join the National Guard and take the six months of basic training with the Reserve Forces Act of 1955.

A man who enlists in the National Guard before he is 18 1/2 will be deferred from induction into federal service until age 28 so long as he performs satisfactory Guard service and he is not required to take active duty training. However, he may volunteer for the six months of basic training and thus reduce the time he must serve in the National Guard from "until age 28" to a total of eight years of service.

What this means, Capt. Carr explained, is that a young man who enlists when he is 17 years old will finish his period of reserve military service at age 25. In other words, stated Capt. Carr, this young man can chop three years off his total military obligation.

Soil Conservation Put To Use In Area

By E. E. McALISTER

The true value of a terrace system on cropland has been recognized by many landowners of this area as evidenced by their construction of terraces on their farms.

Terraces and contour cultivation, in conjunction with a good vegetative program, hold the maximum of rainfall and soil in place. Terraces are the basic mechanical means of protecting croplands. Both the supervisors of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District and the Eastland County A.C.C. committee recognize the need for terraces and recommend their construction where needed on cropland. Federal cost share for terrace construction is 70 percent not to exceed \$3.50 per one hundred feet of completed terrace. With construction cost priced at the rate of \$5 per hundred feet of completed terrace, the federal share would be \$3.50 and the farmer's share would be \$1.50 per hundred feet.

The following land owners have completed terrace systems on their cultivated fields: Joe Carlton of Kokomo, two miles; N. E. Richardson of Morton Valley, three miles; Flora Snoddy of Nimrod, two miles; D. L. Norton of Ranger, one mile; Fred Walker, South west of Eastland, 1.7 miles; J. W. Young, south west of Eastland, .7 mile; Jim Cook, east of Eastland, 1.5 miles; M. O. Hayford of Staff, 1.5 miles; J. M. Smith of Olden, 1.8 miles; John Thurman, south of Eastland, 2 miles; and D. G. Fambrough, north of Cisco, .5 mile.

Soil Conservation Service technicians of the Eastland office assisting the upper Leon Soil Conservation District Supervisors have run terrace line for the following land owners: Ellis Cooper, north west Ranger .5 mile; V. E. Brown of Cisco, 1 mile; W. C. Reddell of Desdemona .6 mile; Bill Wende of Cisco, 1.5 miles; M. S. James of Ranger, .7 mile; J. W. Mosley of Ranger, 3 miles; and John Reed

of Carbon, .8 mile.

Farm ponds have been recently completed on N. E. Richardson, Peggy Gallagher, Clydell Lewis, Odus Echols, L. D. Holliday, Kenneth Brown, Junior Stacey, O. M. Pilgrim, J. L. Morrow, Walter Tonne, Doyle Johnson, E. P. Fambro, J. C. Day, C. M. Kelly, Ernest Stroeb, R. M. Sneed, A. H. Blackwell and W. H. Cooper. Land owners and Soil Conservation Service technicians have worked together on finding suitable locations for these ponds to include soil that will hold water a suitable drainage area into ponds and suitable spillways to frechon properly when ponds are full and discharging flood water.

Diversion terraces which are designed to divert outside water from cropland and in some instances divert extra water to farm ponds have been completed on Ernest Park, Curtis Kimbrell, J.

M. Dillon, J. W. Young, C. M. Kelly and R. M. Sneed.

Waterways to handle outside drainage and water from terrace systems have been planned on John Leveridge, J. M. Smith, F. M. Spurten, D. J. West, J. W. Young, Cecu Copeland, M. O. Hayford, E. N. Jones, Bill Wende, Jim Cook and J. D. Griffin.

Anderson Brothers of Cisco, E. and F. M. Spurlen of Eastland have seeded 460 acres of grass.

Peanut farmers are reminded that it will be time to plant peanuts and strip crops. Wind erosion damages not only the land from which it blows robbing it of its life giving top soil, but also in many other ways. Blowing sand will cut off small peanuts thus destroying a possible crop. It forms drifts in fields and along fence rows and in some instances creates a traffic hazard. According to the Board of Supervisors of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District one of the better control measures along with cover crops is strip cropping and the Board encourages their use by peanut farmers.

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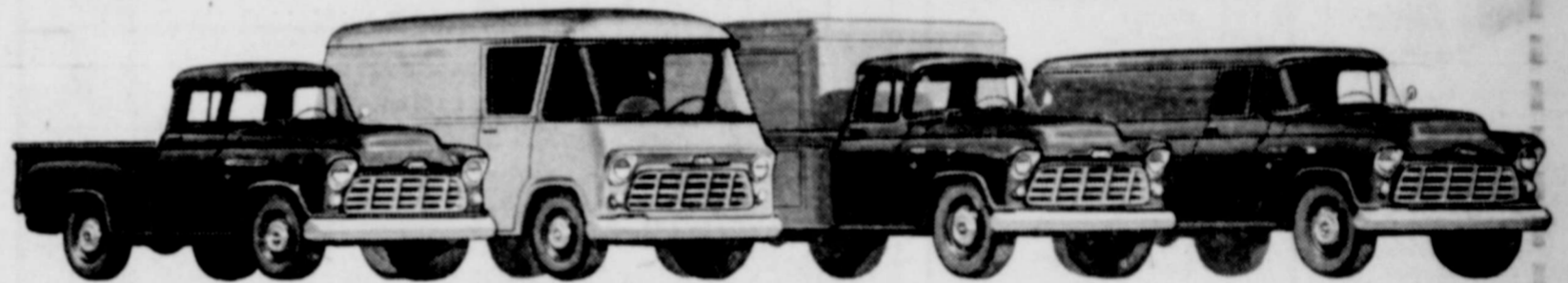

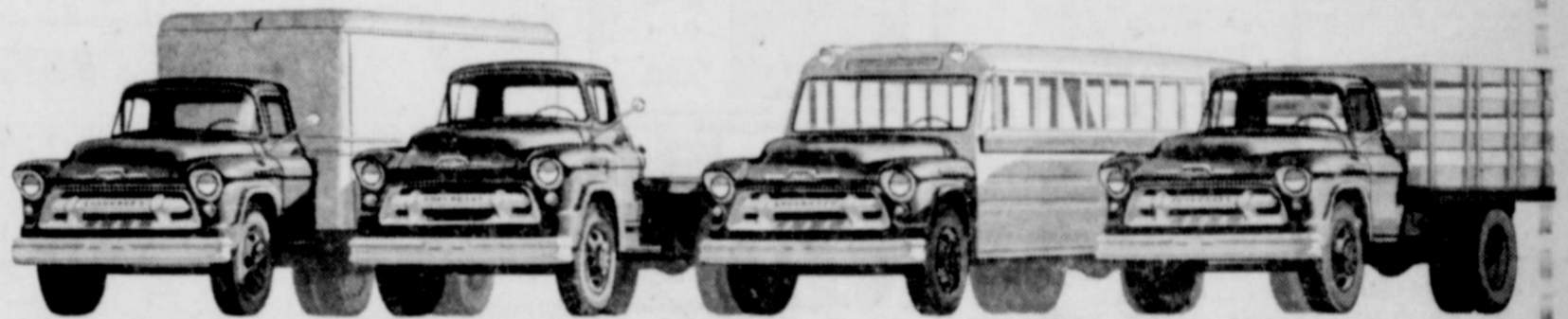
