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They'll Ask for 'Seconds' of Spring's Menu Treats

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

WITH spring in the air, our appetites perk up. So let's try two special recipes. The first recipe is a real quickie that tastes as though it had been cooking for hours. Prepared this way, corned beef has a wonderful flavor.

Barbecue Corned Beef Medley (4 servings)

Three tablespoons fat, 1/2 cup chopped onions, 1/2 cup chopped celery, 1 cup tomato sauce (8 ounces), 1/2 cup catsup, 1 cup water, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons sugar, 3 tablespoons vinegar, 2 tablespoons kitchen bouquet, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 2 cups cooked corned beef, julienne style (1/2 pound), 1 1/2 cups corn cut off cob or one 12-ounce can whole kernel corn, drained; 1 tablespoon cornstarch, 2 tablespoons water.

Heat fat in 2-quart saucepan. Cook onion over moderate heat until soft but not brown. Add celery, tomato sauce, pepper, sugar, vinegar, kitchen bouquet and Worcestershire sauce. Simmer for 10 minutes. Add corned beef and corn and cook until thoroughly heated. Serve over toasted picnic buns or split, hot biscuits.

Dark Chocolate-Frosted Cake

Three squares unsweetened chocolate, 1 package instant fluffy frosting mix, two 9-inch devil's food layers, baked and cooled, made of instant mix.

Melt chocolate over hot water. Remove from heat and COOL TO ROOM TEMPERATURE. Prepare frosting mix according to package directions, using 1/2 teaspoon vanilla (optional). Then, with a spoon, carefully fold in the COOLED chocolate.

Spread generously between layers and cover top and sides of cake. Cover cake to keep frosting soft and glossy.



Chocolate-frosted cake is ready in a jiffy when made with a prepared mix. It's an ideal dessert to make on springtime days.

Clyde Pool pleaded guilty to first offense driving while intoxicated charges and was fined \$50 and given a three day jail sentence by County Judge John Hart.

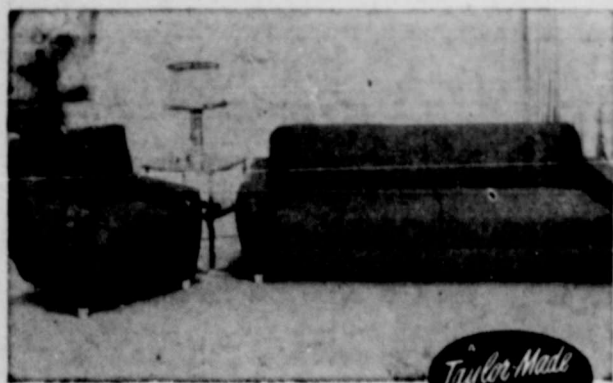
His driver's license was automatically suspended for six months.

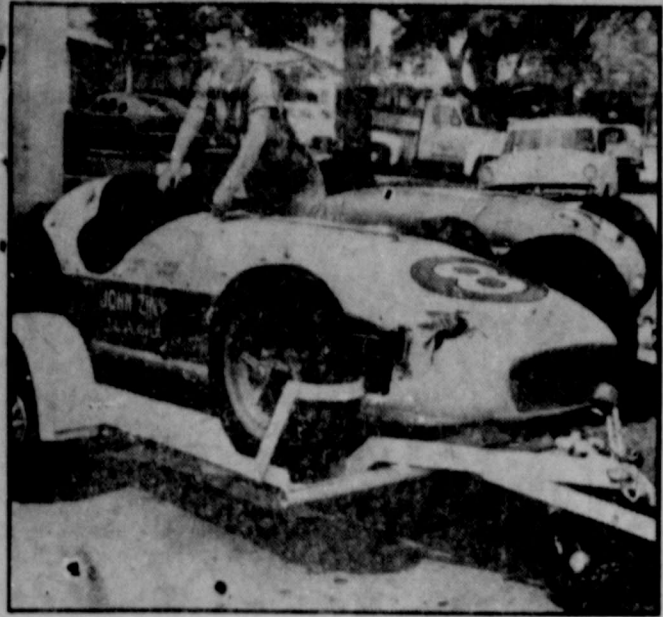

(Continued from Page One) Latin-American influence is found in geographic names, architecture, law, and the general culture of way of life in Texas.

Even in 1821, Dr. Norton pointed out, 300 years after white man first set foot on Texas soil, the white population in Texas was not more than 7,000 and it had declined during the preceding 30 years.

Even among the few white people, civil authority was uncertain. The Texas seat of government at San Antonio was separated from Mexico City by a wide wilderness. A few Anglo-Americans were filtering into Texas from the East, most of whom were adventurers. Just east of the Lower Sabine lay the Neutral Ground with neither the United States nor Spanish sovereignty definitely established. It was a home for desperate characters," Dr. Norton said.

"At this point the destiny of Texas pivoted on the decision of a single man. Moses Austin traveled from his home in Missouri in 1820 to San Antonio to seek permission to establish a colony of Americans in Texas. He chose land between the Colorado and the Brazos below the San Antonio Road for the site of his colony.

Dr. Norton recalled Texas' battles against the Mexican government before obtaining their final independence. He asserted that Lamar, second president of the new nation, whose slogan was "The cultivated mind is the guardian genius of democracy," was the father of education in Texas.

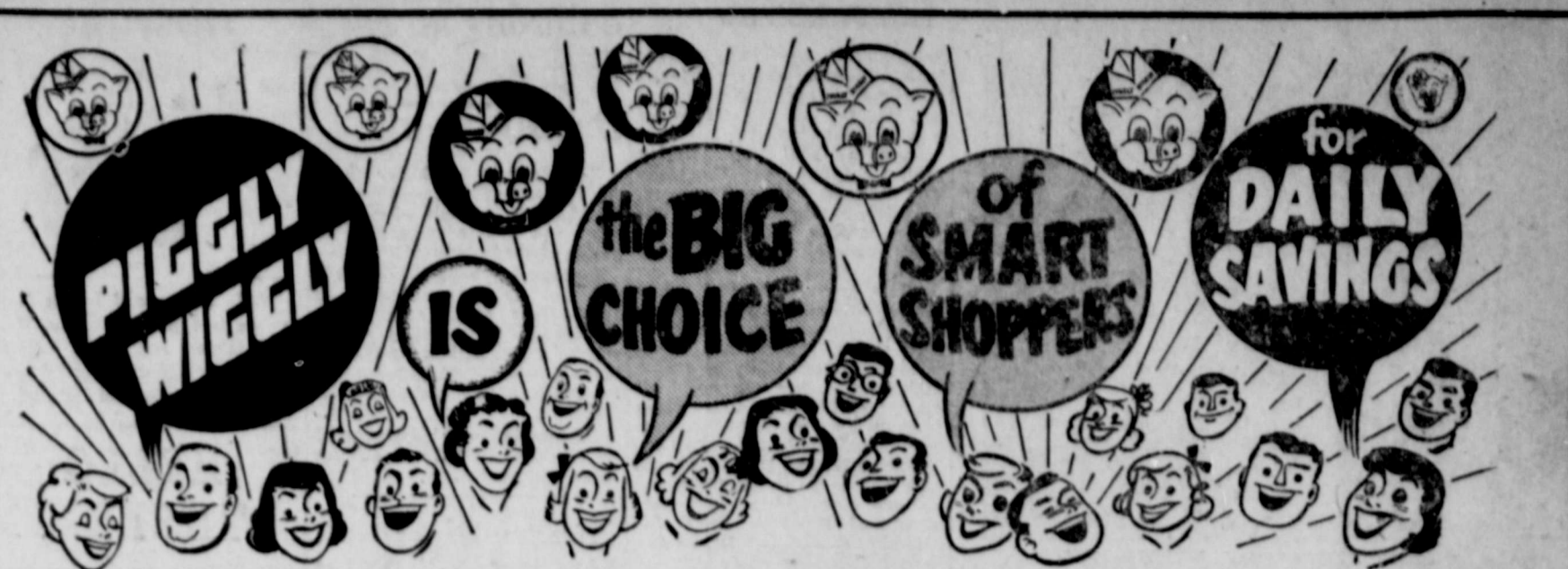
