

WHERE ARE YOU SEEKING? By JACKIE HEATH

Many times we find ourselves standing in the shoes of individuals who lived in years gone by. We reflect their attitudes, accept their beliefs, and make the same mistakes. As we are faced with problems so were the early Christians. One difficulty that has faced all mankind is brought out in Luke 24:3-5. "And they entered the tomb and found the body of the Lord Jesus. And it came to pass, as they were much perplexed thereabout, behold, two men stood by them in shining garments: and as they were afraid, and bowed down their faces to the earth, they said unto them, 'Why seek ye the living among the dead?'"

Christ had been crucified and buried in a borrowed tomb for two days. The women followers of Christ came early the third day to care for His body, but were "much perplexed" when they found the body gone. Man is perplexed and spiritually lost without the presence of Christ today. One great difficulty is that we fail to realize that we are searching for the living among the dead. Christ is not dead but as He promised, He is alive. Therefore, let us take heed as to the place of our searching — is it among the dead, or is it a search for a living Savior. If we are striving to find the presence of peace, love, and hope in any outward practice or material possession of this world, then we are searching for the qualities of Christ, the living, among the dead.

Some would direct us away from the living, all sufficient Christ, and point us toward the tombs of self-righteousness, the graves of false gods; however, let us just remember that Jesus says, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me."

When we realize that Christ is a living person, we realize that we do not have to search for Him but that we must completely give ourselves unto His ever-present leadership. This realization will bring about a greater respect in our hearts for God's Word, God's purpose in the world, God's people, and God's house. It will bring about a greater understanding of the character of God and of the duty of the Christian. It will create a greater concern for ourselves and for others. It will draw us far more closely together through scripture reading and prayer. It will make our church life more consistent, more willing, and more dedicated. Above all it is the realization that Christ is a Living Savior, the resignation of self, and a complete dedication of self to His will that brings salvation.

Charles Tibbels Announces Service Station Opening

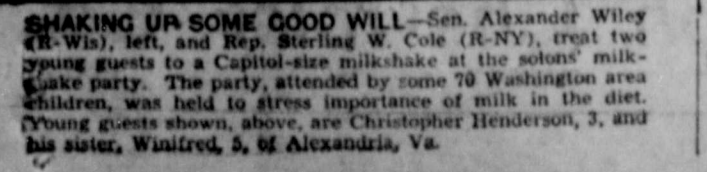
Charles Tibbels has announced the re-opening of the Magnolia Service Station across the street from the Post Office.

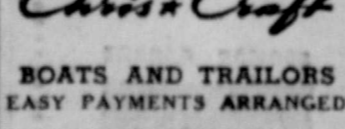
