## O'Daniel Hits Graft, Corruption, Scandals In Texas Government

### Heading To Austin 'To Put Out Fire'

A small crowd of about 100 followers, that dwindled to no more than 60, heard former governor W. Lee O'Daniel knock graft, corruption and scandals in Austin in a public address here in front of the Gholson Hotel Wednesday at 1 p.m.  
An hour behind his high noon

schedule, the weather beaten former governor and senator wasted little time in outlining his proposed reforms in the Texas government, soon after his Hillbilly Band opened with "Pass the Biscuits Pappy."  
"The burning issue in Texas is this graft and corruption and we're heading to Austin to put out the fire," O'Daniel said from the platform of his fire truck.

### Father Of Local Man Dies at Dublin

### Times Editor To Resign Post Here Saturday

Lee Harr, editor of The Ranger Times for the past 18 months, resigned his position here recently.

His resignation will become effective Saturday, Harr said that he would return to school, probably at Southwest Texas State College in San Marcos, where he was attending until entering the military service in 1950.

Following the Korean War he was employed by the Liquidation Division of the Insurance Commission, and the American Automobile Association at Austin.

He came to Ranger in October, 1954.

A replacement has not yet been named.

He reminded that in his campaign tours the Negroes were just as ardent supporters of his as were the whites, but "it's because we're along with the Negroes here."

O'Daniel drew his most support on the segregation problem from an old Negro lady sitting at his feet on the street curbing.

"You are the political power in Texas—each of you individually. You are the kings and queens with even more power than those who carry the title in England," the presiding gubernatorial candidate told the group. "You just have to know how to use it," he declared.

He said the trouble with politicians today was that they didn't know if they were Democrats or Republicans. "They don't know if the money in their pocket is theirs or belongs to the state. They caught one, he's in Huntsville," O'Daniel declared.

"The capitol building in Austin is beginning to lean," the former governor said, "it's leaning toward Huntsville."  
On the veteran's problem, the fireball candidate promised a bonus for all former members of the armed forces. He said, "They went over and won the war—with a little help from the other states—and when they came back, the people wanted to do something for them. So they set up a land board" he recalled. "But the governor, the attorney general and the chairman of the program thought that it was to benefit them rather than the veterans," he laughed.

"Now when I go into office in January, I'm going to see what else stole money and how much. I'm going to find how many of the other 58 departments are corrupt," he added.

Several of the crowd, especially the older set, some who were undoubtedly pensioners themselves, pushed green bills into collection barrels that were passed through the group hearing the address. O'Daniel explained, "This is the way we get our campaign money. We don't take money from the millionaires because that way we don't have to make any promises."

O'Daniel, now completely wet with perspiration, visited through the crowd shaking hands with each person. His first short visit was with his colored adviser, who shortly after hobbled off with the help of a walking cane.

### Police Character Returned From Nevada Jails

John Loyd, Eastland County deputy sheriff, and Jim Riddle, Texas Ranger from Breckenridge, returned from Nevada early Tuesday morning with Jim Riddling, a well-known Eastland County police character, who was held there for the local authorities on a felony warrant.

Riddling, along with Neil Langford, who is awaiting trial in the Breckenridge jail, were placed on wanted lists several weeks ago. Langford was picked up in Arizona previously. Both have been close companions for several years and in and out of various jails throughout the state and county.

Langford is to be tried in Breckenridge on a second felony warrant, then returned to Eastland County for a second trial. Both warrants, for Riddling and Langford, were issued for forgery counts.

Riddling was picked up in Caliente, Nev., and transferred to the county jail at Pioche where local officers took him into custody for the return trip.

### Local Mayor Named Duke Of Albuquerque

Ivo N. Novakovich, a former Ranger resident, recently made Mayor Lee Dockery of Albuquerque, N. M., honorary duke of Albuquerque for the New Mexico city's 250th anniversary celebration July 4-14.

Novakovich came wearing a mustache and goatee, a requirement of every "Duke of Albuquerque" as an official representative of the anniversary celebration.

The "Duke," making a circuit which included Oklahoma City, Lubbock, Dallas, Fort Worth, Mineral Wells, Odessa, Midland, Ranger, Eastland and Cisco, delivered an official invitation to the celebration from Maurice Sanchez, chairman of the Albuquerque city commission.

The pageant which will last nine days will have 2,000 persons acting in it. Vice-President Richard Nixon and several movie stars will participate in the affair.

### Services For Heart Attack Victim Complete

Tom Kimbro, 49, died Tuesday afternoon at his residence on the Fambro Ranch near Strawn following a heart attack while driving a herd of goats.

### City Tax Rate Does Not Compare Favorable With Others In State

AUSTIN (Sp.)—Municipal tax rates in Texas in 1955 ranged from 15 cents to the constitutional maximum of \$2.50 per \$100 of assessed valuation, a survey by Lynn F. Anderson, University of Texas Institute of Public Affairs assistant director, reveals.

The biennial report on municipal tax rates, assessed valuations and debts of Texas cities and towns appears in the latest issue of Texas Municipalities, monthly journal of the League of Texas Municipalities.

Nine small cities levied no property tax whatsoever: Olmos Park and Terrell Hills (both in Tarrant County), Richland Hills (Tarrant County), Fairfield (Freestone County), Roma (Starr County), Iraan (Pecos County), Newton (Newton County), Camp Wood (Red County) and Roanoke (Denton County).

Round Top (Fayette County) had the lowest tax rate, 15 cents, while seven towns had 25-cent rates: Avery (Red River County), Beverly Hills (McLennan County), Beverly Hills (McLennan County), Blum (Hill County), Beem (Clay County), Point Comfort (Calhoun County), Rio Vista (Johnson County) and Woodshoro (Refugio County).

The eight cities that levied the maximum legal rate of \$2.50 are Breckenridge, Cisco, Eastland,

Edinburg, Lockhart, Mercedes, Ranger and Weslaco.

The average tax rates, by population groups, were \$2.01 for cities of 200,000 or more; \$1.50, \$5,000-199,999; \$1.58, \$15,000-44,999; \$1.49, 7,500-14,999; \$1.65, 5,000-7,499; \$1.43, 2,500-4,999; \$1.31, 1,500-2,499; \$1.38, 1,000-1,499, and \$1.27, under 1,000. The average rate for all 189 cities included in the survey was \$1.45.

"The property tax is frequently criticized as being inadequate to the increased revenue demands of Texas cities," Anderson says. "In many instances there is much untappable truth in this assertion. However, this survey leaves considerable doubt that this particular tax has reached the point of extinction in even a majority of Texas cities, much less the entire lot."

He finds evidence that the property tax can still, "with adequate administration, produce more revenue for many cities without resort to some of the newer forms of taxation which have blossomed throughout the U.S. in recent years."

"Whether it should do so is, of course, a matter to be determined in a particular municipality on the basis of local conditions and requirements," he adds.

### New Producer, Five New Tries Highlight Oil News In County

Oil activity in Eastland County reached a high peak this week as five new locations were spotted and a 20 barrel an hour well was brought in in the southwest part of the county.

The new producer is the No. 1 H. Dunning, drilled by KLB Oil Corp. In potential tests the well flowed at a rate of 20 barrels per hour.

Bottomed at 2870 feet in the Caddo Lime, the well was placed on production as a flowing well. The 20 barrel potential test flowed through a 26-64-inch choke with 240 pounds of pressure. Oil-gas ratio was 450-1. The oil tested 42.3 gravity. A spokesman for the company said the well was one of the best prospective producers he had ever drilled.

New well locations in the county include a regular field try by Joe Felts of Denver, Colo. It is the No. 1 A. E. Stapp and spots 330 feet from the south line and

1200 feet from the east line of the Andrey Kent Survey, five miles south of Carbon on a 205 acre lease. Proposed depth is 2590 feet.

A wildcard try has been staked by J. D. Barefield of Ranger in the A. Tartar Survey, 12 miles southeast of Ranger on a 52-acre lease. It is located one mile north of a lone 3000 foot producer. Proposed depth is 2995 feet with casing tools to the Caddo sand. The well is the No. 1 W. O. Dawson.

The Blue Danube Oil Co. of Fort Worth has staked the No. 1 C. E. Allen as a wildcard in Subdivision 7 of the Thomas A. Howell Survey. The well is located eight miles southeast of Ranger on a 96 acre lease. Proposed depth is 3300 feet with casing tools.

C. A. McCown, et al, of Eastland has spotted the No. 1 L. R. Pearson in Section 9, Block 4, H & T C Survey, 4 1/2 miles north of Eastland. Proposed depth is 1900 feet. Elevation is 1600 feet.

The No. 1 D. S. Rogers is a wildcard try being put down by Jarbo Oil Co. of Houston. Location for the try is in the Sonata A-443 Section, 3 1/2 miles northeast of Dushmons on an 80.5 acre lease. Proposed depth is 19-95 feet with rotary to the Strawn sand.

W. J. Gourley of Graham has spotted the No. 3-B Joe Winston in Section 30, Block 4, T&P Survey, 1/2 mile northeast of Caddo. Proposed depth is 5000 feet.

Jack Chamberlain of Eastland will drill a 2800 feet wildcard in Section 64, Block 6, T&P Survey. It is the No. 1 W. Brazda.

The No. 6 R. M. Rogers is a regular field try being drilled by W. J. Gourley of Graham. The well is located in Section 29, Block 5, T&P Survey, 1 1/2 miles northeast of Caddo. Proposed depth: 5000 feet.

Oban Brothers, Inc. of Dallas will drill the No. 1-B Black Brothers B as a wildcard in Section 1144, T&P Survey. Proposed depth is 2550 feet with rotary to the Strawn sand.

John Burgoyne Ely, who will graduate Saturday with honors from UCLA at Los Angeles, Calif., at the age of 86, had his first formal schooling at Hogtown, it has been revealed.

"I'll miss those coeds, 8 o'clock classes and coffee breaks," the honor student who got A's and B's through his four years of college work.

Born in Arkansas in a eye-room cabin in 1870, he was living in Texas when the nation celebrated the first centennial of the Declaration of Independence.

It was the same year that he took his only eight months of grammar school.

By the time he was 16, he says, he had taught himself to read all of the classics and had finished four years of high school in one term. He also taught himself to play the violin and piano and knocked around the world, working as everything from telegrapher to florist.

Seaberry's election was announced this week by Maurice Bullock, retiring president. Elected as president of the State Bar was Newton Gresham of Houston.

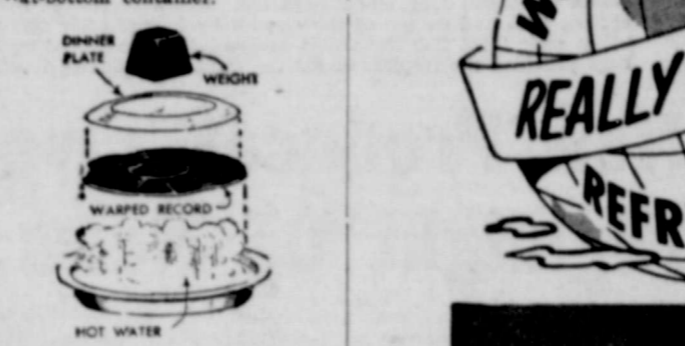

To Straighten Records SINCE warped phonograph records are useless in that condition, Popular Mechanics offers a suggestion for straightening them. Simply immerse the record in hot water, 140 to 160 degrees, in a cake pan or similar shallow, flat-bottom container.



Over the record invert a dinner plate of a diameter permitting its edge to contact only the edge of the record. In other words, don't let the plate touch the grooves of the record. Place a one-pound weight on the plate, leaving the record under pressure until the water has cooled to room temperature.

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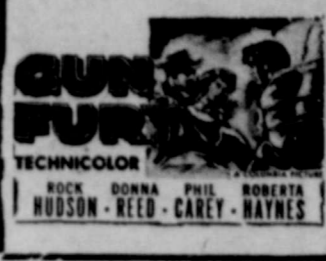

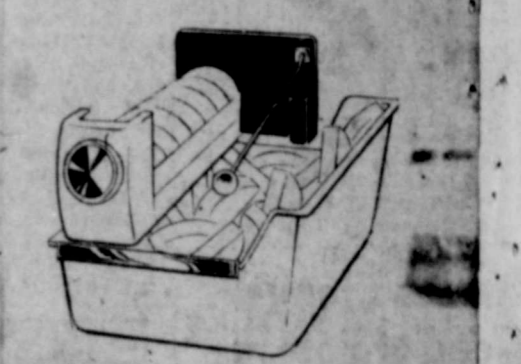

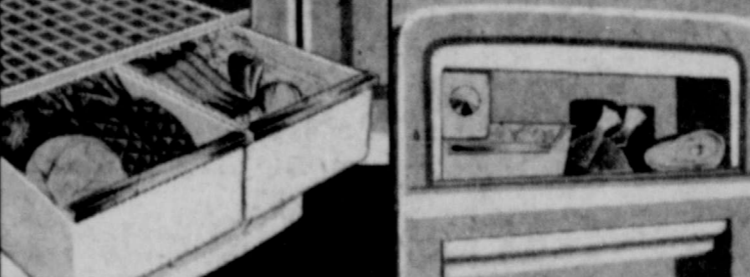

Nothing but Christ's Christianity can supply the answer to the tremendously challenging problems facing humanity. The Christian Science Board of Directors said today.

"The world needs the Science of Christianity as it has never needed it before," the Directors declared in a special statement.

Thousands of Christian Scientists from many parts of the world heard the Directors' message at the Annual Meeting of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts.

Taking note of the significant changes taking place in the world, the Directors said: "With the

breaking of the barriers of time and space the mental outlook of men stands out in increasingly sharp relief, revealing an unprecedented clashing of ideologies.

"Materia medica is more and more tracing physical effects to mental causes. The churches are reaching out for spiritual healing."

Application of the healing power of the Christ, Truth, demands individual consecration, the Directors emphasized.

"We need to retain the spirit of the sturdy pioneer, to guard against apathy, superficiality, and the intoxication of ease in matter," they stated.

Their message, read by Theo-

dore Wallach, retiring First Reader of The Mother Church, highlighted a session at which progress was reported on the far-flung activities of the denomination which now has branches in some 48 countries.

In his keynote address Clifford A. Woodard of Cambridge, Mass., Christian Science practitioner and incoming President of The Mother Church, underscored the vital role of practical Christianity today. Growing interest in spiritual healing as a result of the television and radio series "How Christian Science Heals" was reported by a number of key officials, including Roy Garrett Watson, treasurer, and Gordon V. Comer, clerk.

Will E. Davis, manager of Committees on Publication said: "The response has been most gratifying. We are receiving reports of increased church and lecture attendance and increased use of our free Reading Rooms."

Nearly 200 television stations in the United States and Canada have carried the filmed Christian Science TV programs, Davis reported. Radio programs in the series, he added, will continue to be broadcast by more than 800 stations throughout the world.

### MARRIAGE DOES NOT CHANGE PROPERTY OWNERSHIP

June is traditionally the month for weddings, and many couples will be taking marriage vows within the next few weeks. But, while a certain symbolic transfer of "worldly goods" is often associated with the wedding ceremony, under Texas law, the act of marrying another does not give you the authorization to take control of his property.

Generally speaking, each spouse has the right to control and dispose of his or her own separate property. The separate property of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Aside from the ordinary community estate, there is a class of property known as the wife's "special community," which includes all the income from her separate real property, and probably the interest on bonds or notes, and dividends on stocks owned in her separate right.

While the husband may have similar assets, the law accords them no particular distinction from ordinary community property.

Although the history of the matter is somewhat confusing, it appears that under present day law the husband has control of ordinary community property; but control of the wife's special community property is reserved to her.

Certain restrictions are imposed upon both husband and wife in exercising such control. For instance, the husband cannot legally dispose of community property in such a way as to defraud the wife, nor can he sell the homestead without her signature and acknowledgment. And the wife's sale or mortgage of her separate real estate, stocks or bonds is not valid unless her husband joins with her in the transaction — he must sign and execute the necessary legal papers along with her.

There are laws exempting the wife's separate and special community property from liability for debts incurred by the husband. Such liability is restricted to his separate property and the ordinary community property.

On the other hand, debts incurred by the wife in obtaining necessities for herself or the chil-

drren bind all property belonging to either party, including the husband's separate property. For other debts which she has power to incur, only her separate and special community property are liable.

All of these distinctions emphasize the advisability of keeping proper records. By doing so the various classes of community and separate property owned by a married couple will always be easily distinguishable. Each category will then receive the special protection afforded to it by our laws.

### State Home Accident Cures Being Studied

AUSTIN — A unique study in home accident prevention got underway in Round Rock this month, under sponsorship of the Texas State Department of Health.

Every home in the Williamson County community 20 miles north of Austin is being visited by a junior class student from local high school. Students are filling out questionnaires from information provided by householders on accidents occurring in the homes during the preceding week.

Then, approximately eight months from the time the first questionnaire is completed, students will again visit each household with an identical questionnaire.

In the interim between questionnaires, an intensive educational program on home accidents via radio, television, newspapers, and group meetings will be conducted by the Round Rock Safety Council, the intention being to see how much home accidents can be reduced in eight months.

The campaign, the first ever conducted in Texas, is being sponsored by the State Department of Health as a "pilot" study. If suc-

cessful in reducing home accidents, similar studies will be started in other communities.

Tentative programs have already been formulated in San Marcos and in Guadalupe County.

In announcing the Round Rock program, State Health Commissioner Henry A. Holle pointed out that home accidents annually kill more Americans than were killed in all branches of the armed forces during the entire three years of the Korean War.

Each one of the 403 homes comprising the Round Rock community will be provided with a "hazard sheet" and a check list describing potentially dangerous conditions in homes. Each home

owner is requested to be on the lookout for similar conditions in his home. If hazards are found, he is asked to make corrections and to describe the corrections on the "hazard sheets," which will be tabulated and evaluated by a volunteer citizens' committee locally chartered as the Round Rock Safety Council.

Fred Coffey of the Round Rock Chamber of Commerce is chairman of the Council. Other members and the organizations they represent are:

E. C. Nelson, a State Department of Health sanitarian, is acting as technical advisor to the Council.

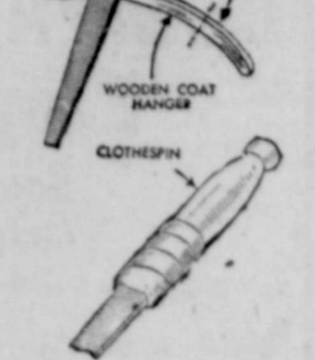

Searching Rules For Contraband Game Noted Peace officers may search a person for contraband wild game only when there is "probable cause" for law violations, according to an interpretation by the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission based on the Attorney General's opinion. Primary authority for this law enforcement function, the opinion stated, is vested within the Commission's warden force. The opinion cited that the "probable cause" provision is frequently defined as "a reasonable ground of suspicion, supported by circumstances sufficiently strong in themselves to warrant a cautious man in the belief that the person accused is guilty of the offense with which he is charged."

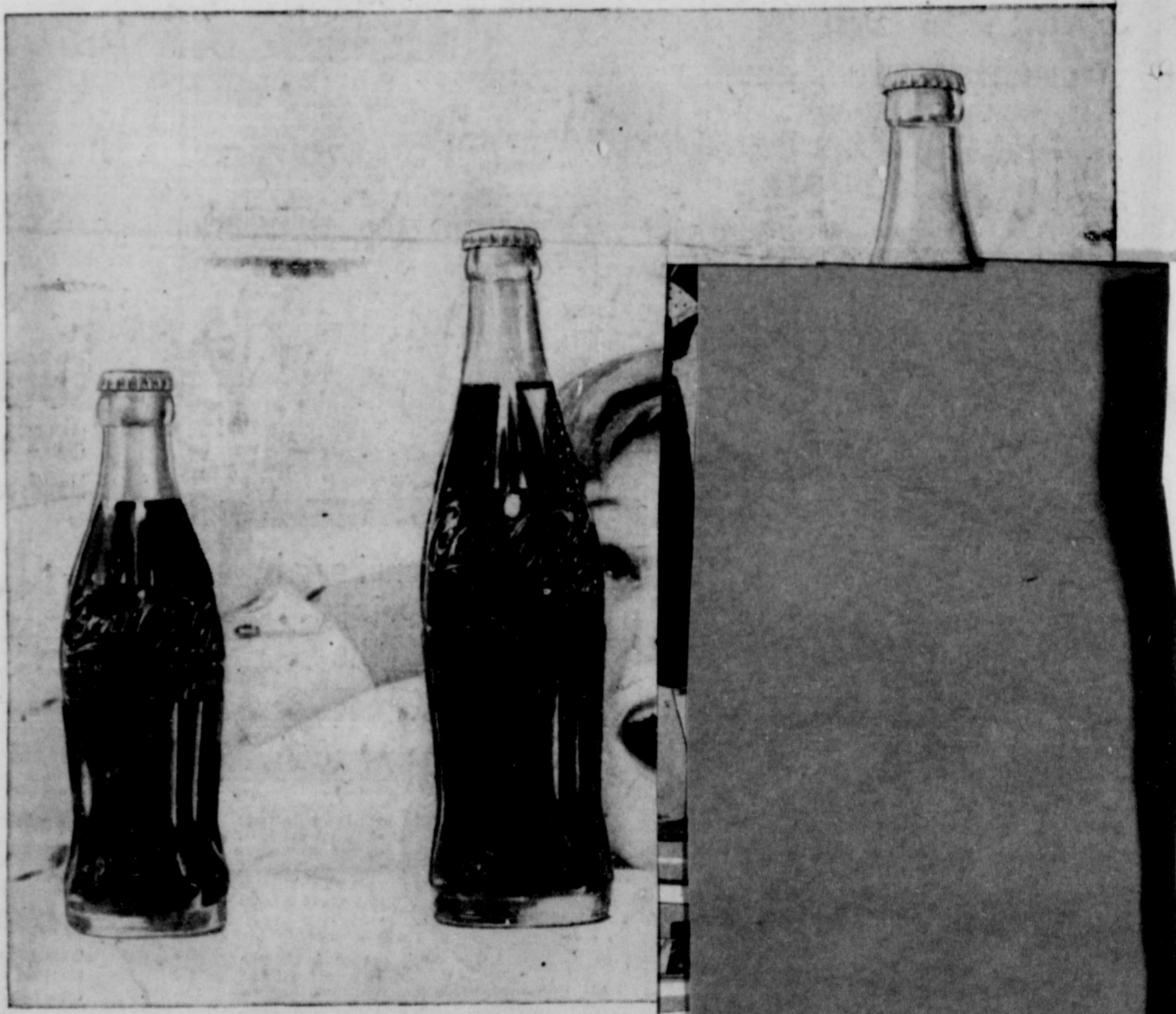

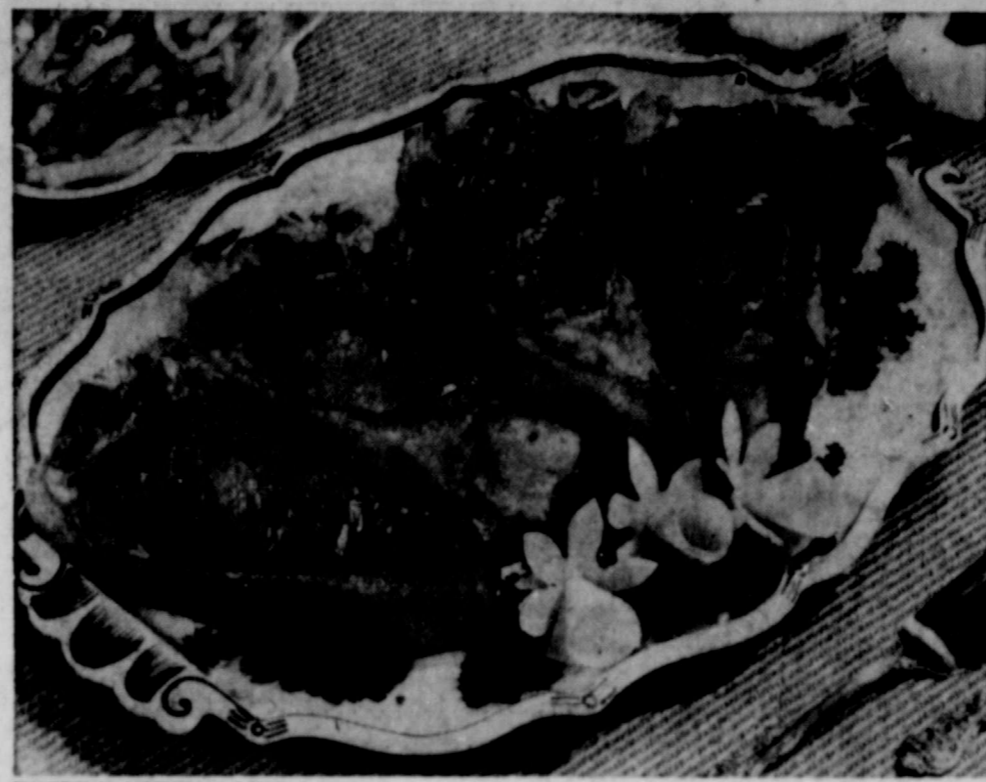

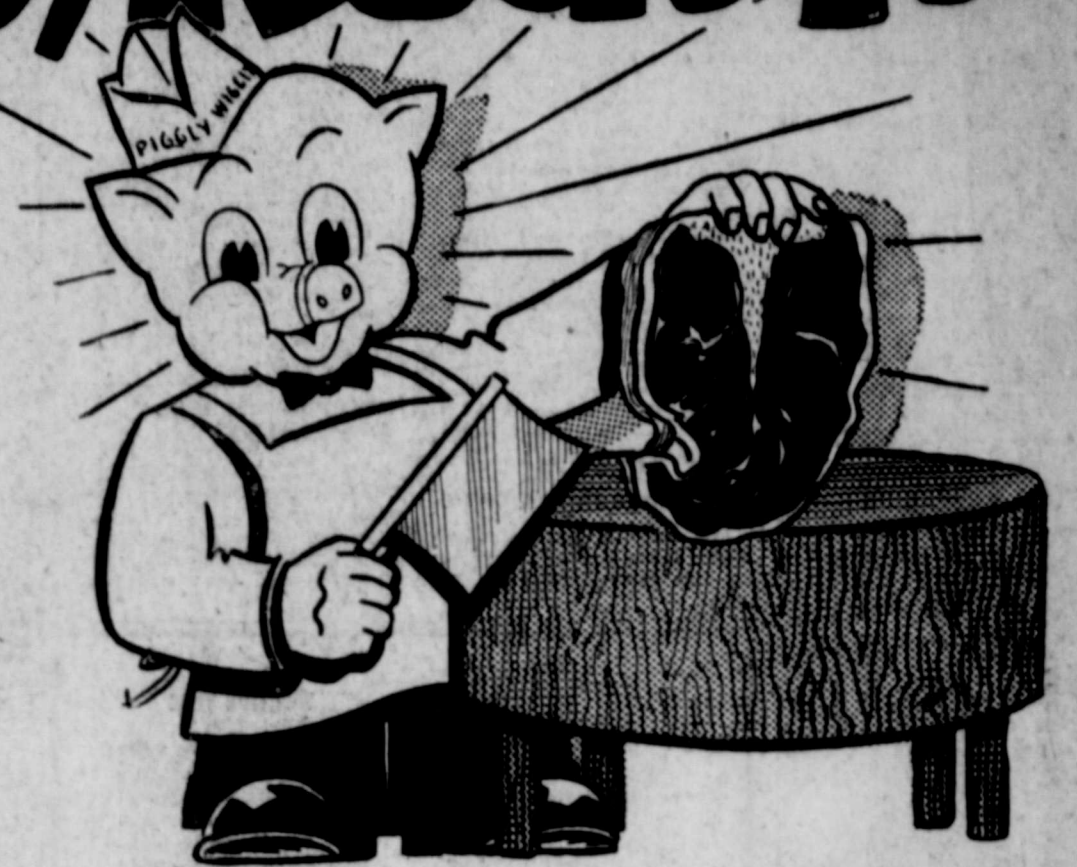
