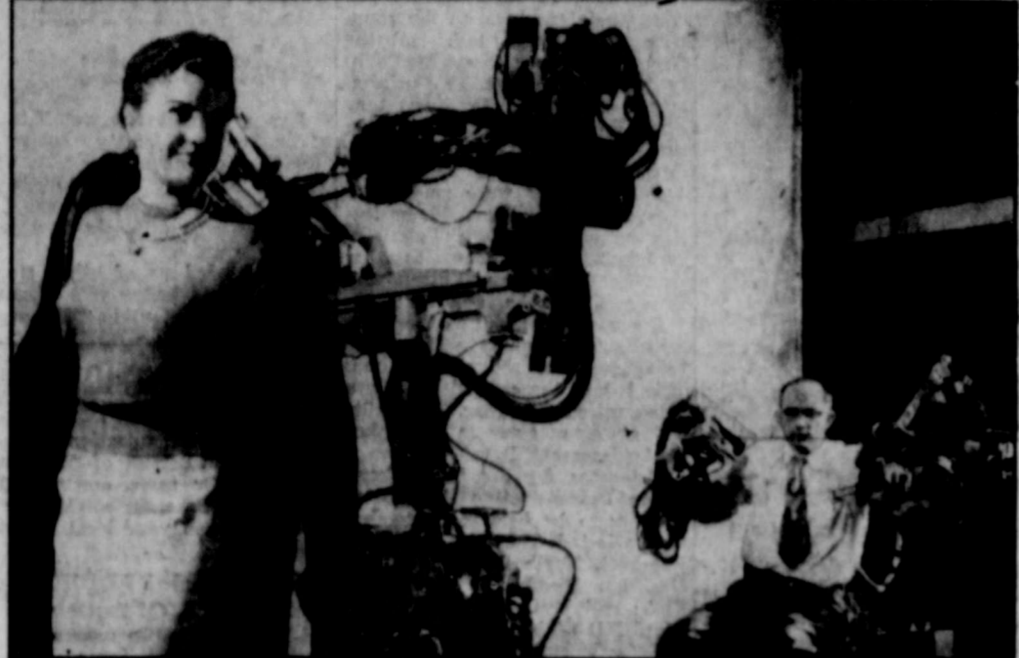

Pecan Crop Brightest Circle In Local Agriculture Picture

High, hard winds during the past month have begun to take a definite toll on Eastland County crops as the howling gust have all but sapped the remaining moisture from the earth. Prospects were bright for good crops during the year as heavy rains pounded the area in April. Only light, spotty moisture has fallen since then and some early crops have taken on a dull yellow, burning appearance. Some areas are prospering better than others as crops in some vicinities have been sprinkled with heavier rains during the past month. But in the Ranger - Eastland area, probably the area suffering most from lack of moisture now, the farming outlook can be bettered only by rain in the next two or three weeks which farmers feel is necessary if the high winds are not to completely strangle out the tender plants. The entire county does not face an immediate peril as does this immediate area, however. It has been reported that the Rising Star area and the southern part of the county are in excellent condition and if they receive summer rains, they should produce excellent peanut and feed crops. County Agent J. M. Cooper said that in the "right" land areas where grass cover has been lost through years of drought and by overgrazing, pastures were in poor condition. In the sandy land districts and in sections where good soil management practices have been followed, the range is fair. However, the bright spot in the county agriculture picture is the pecan crop. "I have never seen a bigger crop of pecans on the trees at this time of the year," Cooper said. Over the entire county, peach growers are expected to harvest about a one-third peach crop. Fruit crops were hurt earlier in the year by late freezes and severe hail damage. The fruit crops appeared to be completely lost immediately following the late freezes. Most of the major pecan growers in the county have sprayed their orchards against the pecan nut case bearer insuring a better quality pecan.

College To Benefit

Money from the proposed sale of a downtown Ranger building would be used for the construction of a new hall at Ranger Junior College, it was disclosed today. O. G. Lanier, former Elder of the Mesquite Street Church of Christ and prominent lay leader in the church, said the church is interested in the immediate construction of a hall for the teaching of Bible at the college. Tentative plans for the building are drawn and bids have been made, Lanier said. "If we can find a buyer for the Piggly Wiggly building we'll use the money for the construction of the building at the college and perhaps a portion of it for a new parsonage," Lanier continued. The church has endowed a chair in Bible at the college and the minister of the church teaches the course which is required for virtually every degree in nearly all colleges. Dodgers Pace Little League Top Batters

When the Little League schedule resumes again Monday night, the League leading Premier Dodgers will go into the contest with the two leading batters and two more in the top ten. Gerald Hodgins, the Dodger cleanup hitter, is currently pacing all batsmen with 13 hits in 22 trips to the plate for a respectable .566 average. Teammate Tommy Camacho, Hodgins' teammate who follows the league's heaviest hitter to the plate has collected 12 hits in 22 trips to the plate for a .545 average. He also leads the league in the home run department with two round trippers. Richard Guest of the Dodgers, actually has the league's highest average with two hits in three times to the plate for a .666 average, but his few at-bats cannot be fairly compared with those batting 20 or more times. Such is the case of the Indians' Dwight Squires who has compiled a .559 average but who has been at bat only two times. Third highest man among the top ten is Tommy Smith, Indian second baseman, who is pounding the pellet at a .478 rate. He is followed by Tommy Robinson and Bob Koenig, both of the Yankees, who are spanking the ball at .421 and .428 respectively. Others among the top ten are: Dodgers - Richard Cozby, 368 and Bato Jimenez, 388; Ronnie Hinds, 386 and Roland Goodwin, 400; Yankees - Billy Johnson, 388.

Ray Newham was the leading batter for the winners with a double and a single in four trips to the plate.
