Home Garden Melons Need Lots of Food, Water

It is a proud home gardener who can feast his friends on sweet muskmelons or water melons grown in his own garden Melons and squash are usuall the last vegetables sown in the spring, as they require warn weather from start to finish.

A light, well drained soil, lot of water and more plant food than you are accustomed to use on other vegetables pay off especially well with the melons. The vines of squash and muskmelons can be grown as climb-ers, provided large fruits are supported. A mesh bag such as often used for fruits in super-markets provides a good support. With melons the time required

With melons the time required from seed sowing to maturity will determine the variety you sow. Muskmelons take from 80 to 100 days, watermelons from 75 to 100 days. Seed cannot be sown until at least a week after the frost-proof date when the ground is thoroughly warm. If nights continue cold it may be desirable to protect seedling plants with waxed paper tents at first



Both muskmelons and water melons are usually grown in hills, which may be as close to gether as three feet each way, in small gardens. Such close spacing is likely to reduce the size of the fruits, and more room should be given where possible. Heavy fertilizing pays well. As much as a pint of balanced plant food may be mixed well with the soil beneath each hill several days before the seed is planted. Or use a shovel of well rotted manure, and half a pint of plant food. Sow ten seeds to the hill and thin out to the two strongest plants that develop.

Do not harvest watermelons or muskmelons until they are ripe, as they improve in flavor very little after they are picked. It takes some study to determine when a watermelon is ripe, with-

To Save Watersin Garden Learn How It Behaves

watering the lawn and garden often becomes a difficult problem in summer. In desert areas where water is scarcest, scientists have studied ways of using it efficiently.

In their findings are some facts which all gaudeners will find helpful. For example, the storage capacity of different kinds of soil. When water is applied to soil it is held as surface film on soil particles. A cubic foot of sand will hold ½-gallon of water for plant roots to take up. The same amount of loam will hold one gallon, and of clay 1½ gallons.

An inch of water applied evenly over your lawn or garden area should wet a clay soil to a depth of 5 inches, a good garden loam 10 inches and a sandy soil 15 inches.

Note that in all types of soil the water stays near the surface, unless applied in quantities larger than 1-inch. It is on this moisture that plants depend. Rarely is the water table so near the surface that significant quantities of water rise from below to help the plants.

Lateral movement also is limited. Moisture does not spread far outward in the soil, but must be applied evenly to the surface in order to cover the area.

Root growth is governed by the depth of moisture. When soil is sprinkled frequently and never gets a good soaking, roots are short. They may be so short as to suffer from drying by evaporation, which affects the top two or three inches of soil. Short roots do not make vigorous




