Tice has been with the Ranger school since 1954. He and Mrs. Tice took their bachelor degrees at East Texas.

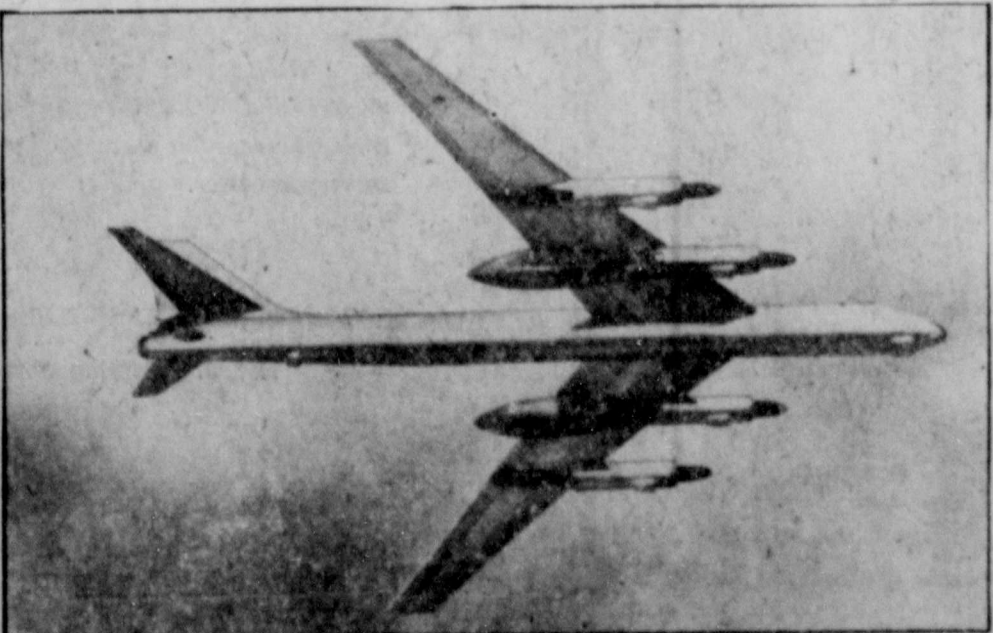
Lewis Barron Dies In Graham; Funeral Today

Darrow Is Upped By Lone Star

Joe C. Darrow, a Lone Star Gas Company vice president, has been placed in charge of all distribution properties of the company, according to an announcement by Chester L. May of Dallas, senior vice president. The properties consist of company-owned and operated gas systems in Ranger and 450 other cities and towns in Texas and Oklahoma, May said.

With headquarters in Dallas, Darrow takes over his new assignment June 16 after serving as general manager of the Fort Worth division of distribution from 1951 until January 1954, and as vice president in charge of the division since that date.

Darrow's successor in Fort Worth is A. P. Rowland, recently elected vice president, who began his career with Lone Star in 1924.

Darrow, a native of Milford, Texas, attended the University of Texas and went to work for Lone Star in 1927 as a construction timekeeper. He was appointed local manager at Hugo, Oklahoma, in 1932, then held district managerial assignments at Itasca, Terrell, and Brownwood until 1946 when he was appointed superintendent of distribution operations for the Dallas Division of Distribution. He was transferred to Abilene in 1949 as superintendent of Lone Star's West Texas distribution properties. Two years later he was appointed to the Fort Worth division as general manager.

Soil Bank No Aid To Local Peanut Farmer, Wylie Say

Yurgs At Home After 2-Week Hospital Stay

Mr. and Mrs. Ben Yurg of Ranger have returned to their home after a lengthy stay in West Texas Clinic where they were treated for extensive injuries received in an automobile accident.

Mrs. Yurg, who received several broken ribs and a punctured lung in the accident, reported direct to The Times that she and her husband were still "pretty sore", but that "we're up and about."

The granddaughter of the couple, Becky Maers, also in the accident, had been released from the hospital earlier. Mrs. Yurg said, and most of the bruises are beginning to leave her face.

The trio were in a head-on collision with a car driven by J. B. Soule of Fort Worth who was being chased by a sheriff's car.

Full Retirement Not Necessary For SS Check

Workers or self-employed persons now 65 or over who are considering either partial or complete retirement should get in touch with the social-security office for information which may be helpful in planning for the years ahead. R. R. Tuley, Manager of the Abilene social security office, said yesterday.

"Even though a worker may be eligible for benefits, they are not payable under certain earning conditions," he explained. "Workers under age 72 who earn less than \$2080 in a year can be paid one or more benefit checks, depending on the total amount earned and how much work is done. All checks for a year are due if earnings do not go over \$1200. After age 72 benefits are payable to insured workers regardless of the amount earned."

No benefits can be paid until an application is filed, Tuley added as a reminder.

Ag Plant Awaits New Kiln

Foundations are rising for installation of the first 85-foot kiln to be installed in the vast expansion program of the American Aggregate Corp. It was disclosed by Emmett Korff and Charles Bomar, local corporation executives.

The kiln is being constructed by a firm in Georgetown, Texas, near Lousiville, and should be in Ranger within the next three or four weeks, the company officials said.

In addition to the kilns themselves, the company is spending more than \$100,000 on other equipment which is to be installed at the Glenn Addition plant, making it, when completed, the largest aggregate plant in the world.

The firm manufactures lightweight aggregate for the masonry-construction industry.

All of the equipment to be installed under the expansion program, Bomar said, will have from 50 per cent to 100 per cent greater capacity than equipment in the present plant.

At present, the largest kiln is 70 feet long.

Bomar's Engineering innovations in the handling of the aggregate will make the Ranger plant not only the largest in the world, but the most modern according to Korff.

In the past, the hot aggregate, which is baked at 2300 degrees, has been dumped into a pit and then removed by a clam-shell on a drag line.

The new plant will have a continuous conveyor, or elevator operating from the pit to the crusher, the engineers reported.

This elevator will consist, they said, of huge buckets conveyed by heavy chains between eight-inch channel iron.

The aggregate will be conveyed from the pit to a crusher thence via another conveyor either to a

Burleson Also Hits Ike Plan

The Department of Agriculture's Soil Bank Program will have little if any effect on the local peanut farmer, in the opinion of T. C. Wylie, general manager of the Ranger Peanut Company.

Wylie explained to The Times that because the area farmers have so little acreage devoted to the production of peanuts they must plant it all.

The soil bank program was designed to pay for land left out of production.

"Peanuts are about the only cash crop our farmers around here have," Wylie said, "and unless they have a bad drought they will not benefit by the soil bank program at all."

The interview with Wylie was prompted by a news release from Washington in which it was reported U. S. Rep. Omar Burleson had severely criticized the Department of Agriculture's announced handling of the 1956 Soil Bank program as it applies to peanuts.

The congressman said, "it is obvious that the Secretary of Agriculture is favoring the farm areas where the Republicans hope to get their votes. A base rate of pay on corn was fixed at 60 per cent of the national average, whereas the rate on peanuts was fixed at about 25 percent. The fixed rate of pay for peanuts was set at 3c per pound. This means that the peanut farmer cannot very well afford to participate in the so-called soil bank program."

Burleson stated that, "Department of Agriculture officials had promised that the rate would be about 50 percent on all crops, and the record is clear that this was the intent of Congress in passing the bill. But in the handling of peanuts the department has completely reneged."

"Never before have I seen government officials so flagrantly flaunt the intent of congress and so obviously favor those states where they hope to win votes," Burleson said.

Young Named City Manager In Eastland

Jimmy Young, formerly city clerk of Eastland, has taken over as city manager following the resignation of A. E. Taylor who leaves Eastland Friday for Mount Pleasant where he will become city manager.

Young was named city manager at a closed meeting of the Eastland city council. He has lived in Eastland since 1933 and is a graduate of Ranger Junior College.

A Simple, Effective Tax Program

(An Editorial)

The federal income tax law, says the former Commissioner of Internal Revenue, T. Coleman Andrews, has become "so hopelessly complicated" that a very few even of those who wrote it, understand it today.

To make the hodge-podge still worse, the former No. 1 tax collector of the nation says, the rates have been made so high—ranging up to 91 percent—that they are now confiscatory . . . punishing those who manage somehow to achieve success despite the roadblocks the income tax law puts in the way."

By way of contrast, the National Association of Manufacturers has proposed a simple five-year plan for gradual reduction of this steeply graduated surtax rate.

VISIT IN RANGER

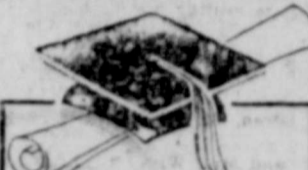

Seesee, New Game Bird, To Be Released In Palo Duro Canyon

Another new game bird, described as "a hair smaller than bobwhite quail," is being introduced into Texas in an effort to bulwark native upland game species.

It is the seesee partridge which originated in Pakistan, according to the assistant director of wildlife restoration of the Game and Fish Commission. The first air shipment of sixty-seven seesees is being held in pens in the Palo Duro Canyon area, south of Amarillo, where the first birds will be released after they have recovered from the exhausting flight.

The new species are found in the dryer parts of West Pakistan and are accustomed to rugged barren areas.

Meanwhile, wildlife biologist A. S. Jackson of Canadian, who supervised receipt of the seesees, reported progress on a previously introduced exotic wild game bird. A Cottle county rancher said he

saw a female red-legged partridge and young. This is the first brood reported of this large game bird which was obtained from Spain.

The original shipment of the red legs was received in West Texas last year. A second consignment recently was released in that area. Both red legs and seesees were obtained by the commission through the U. S. Fish and Wildlife service.

Restoration authorities constantly strive to adapt new species to various areas and point to the incredible success with Chinese ring-necked pheasants as justifying the effort.

The Palo Duro Canyon country which will receive the first seesee shipment also is scheduled to get seed stock of wild Aoudad sheep which are on order at this time.
