## State Claims Disputed Minnow Harmless

### Boat Safety Rules To Be Enforced At Leon

In the interest of public safety rules and regulations pertaining to the overloading of boats on Lake Leon will be strictly enforced in the future, it was decided at a recent meeting of the Eastland County Water Supply District Board of Directors.

Two, all persons in boats on the lake will be required to have a life jacket or some other form of life preserver, it was announced.

In the past some people have been going on the lake without adequate safety equipment, according to Elbert Richardson, lake patrolman.

Some of the persons guilty of overloading their boats have been using rented boats according to the patrolman.

Frank Williamson, operator of perhaps the largest boat concession on the lake, said he would be glad to see that his boats were not overloaded for "if the party is too big for one boat, that will mean they'll have to rent another, and I'm in the boat renting business."

Williamson said that he has never allowed boat passengers to leave his dock without life preservers but that "once they get away from the dock, they can take them off and sit on them. I have no control of that," he said.

Mr. Williamson expressed his interest in public safety and said he would continue to cooperate with the board of directors.

### Lone Star Cuts Gas Rate For Air Cooling

Nearly \$100,000 will be saved this summer by persons presently using gas air-conditioning in their homes and places of business, M. L. Bird of Dallas Lone Star Gas Co., vice president, said today.

This saving will result from the introduction by the company of a special summer air-conditioning rate for residential and commercial users. The new rate of 48 cents per 1,000 cubic feet applies to residential customers between the meter reading dates in May and October, and to commercial customers between the meter reading dates in May and October. In 1957, both residential and commercial customers will be billed at the special rate between the meter reading dates in May and October.

"The extremely low rate will also apply to the constantly-growing list of new residential and commercial gas air-conditioning customers daily being added to our system," Bird pointed out.

"Air-conditioning has become a way of life in Texas. Texans are living longer and are healthier and happier when their homes are air-conditioned. Establishment of this attractive rate will make it possible for Lone Star to contribute to the added comfort of many people now seeking the most effective system of cooling at the most economical operating cost."

### Gas Tax Refund Farm Blanks Are Now Available

Eastland County farmers, on July 1 may begin filing claims to secure their five cent Federal gas tax refund for gasoline for farming purposes, Jan. 1 through June 30, J. M. Cooper, county agent, said today.

The forms are now distributed over the county and may be obtained from any of the five banks in the county, at the ASC office, FFA office, Productions Credit office, Farm Bureau Service Office, and at County Agent Cooper's office, who made the distribution of the forms.

The refund will amount to \$1.10 for a 55 gallon drum. For a single tractor kept busy all day this would probably run at high as 50 or 60 cents. Special rules apply to diesel fuels and special motor fuels.

All claims for the six months period must be filed on or before October 1.

The claim should be filed with the District Director of Internal Revenue.

The law provides criminal penalties for filing a false or fraudulent claim. It also provides that any person who claims an excessive amount is liable to a penalty.

opinion there are a few houses built below the 1385-foot level and that during recent rains some of the pools overflowed.

The board has the authority and may inspect and condemn cess pools and septic tanks built below 1385 feet, according to David D. Pickrell, secretary.

Pickrell pointed out that certain state sanitation laws are being violated at the lake and that "Some people have encroached upon the land without our permission."

Mr. Pickrell added that in his

efforts to outlaw the Mexican Jumping Jack minnow at Lake Leon evidently had struck a snag today. The State Game and Fish Commission informed The Ranger Times by telegram that the minnow had not harmed fish population in three other Texas lakes.

### Lake Leon Jumping Jack Ban Stayed?

At the suggestion of Elbert Richardson, patrolman at Lake Leon, the board had tentatively agreed that if the minnow was harmful to the fish population they would prohibit its use in Lake Leon and make an effort to have the minnow outlawed in the country.

One board member told The Times that the board had no idea of discriminating against any particular bait dealer in the action but that "we want the lake operated to the best interests of the public."

The board had been advised by Richardson that the minnow was cannibalistic and that a school of the minnows frequently attacked larger fish.

Richardson had told The Times Sunday that the minnow was to be prohibited from Lake Leon and that "after the first of July anyone caught with this minnow will be fined."

Various bait dealers told The Times that Richardson had informed them the minnow was to be prohibited and advised them not to stock them.

Principle local source of the Jumping Jack minnow in this area has been D. F. Rose who drives to Zapata, Texas for them.

Although Richardson contended the minnows came from Mexico, Rose said he gets his minnows from breeders on the Texas side of the Rio Grande near Falcon dam.

The minnow is about the largest available in this area and makes excellent bass and crappie bait.

Felton P. Brasher, Sr., president of the Eastland County Water Supply District board of directors said he had no comment to make on the telegram received by The Times.

"We have eight good citizens on the board and it is for them to decide, not for me alone," Brasher said.

C. D. Simpson, who operates a bait house at Lake Leon, said he had never handled the minnows and knew nothing of their habits. Simpson sells only locally-grown minnows, he said.

Rose had informed The Times that he would continue the sale of the minnow until prohibited by law.

"The bait business is our only means of livelihood," Rose said, "and our customers want big minnows. That's why I began getting these."

Richardson, in addition to being employed by the water supply district as patrolman, operates a boat concession, tackle supply store and two bait stands on the lake, it was reported.

Richardson told The Times he had seen the questioned minnow "on television" about three weeks ago and that he learned from this TV show that the minnow was a "rough fish" and that it would destroy other fish in the lake.

"We've got them here in this lake already and a lot of them. We sure don't want any more," he said.

"We're also trying to get them outlawed in the county," Richardson added.

The patrolman said he was under the impression the minnow had been banned from Lake Worth and "I believe Possum Kingdom."

He said he knew of only "about four" people who are selling the jumping jack.

Following is text of a telegram received by The Times in answer to a telegraphed query:

"James F. Davis, Editor—The Ranger Times, Ranger, Texas: Fish population in Lakes, Walk, Devils, Falcon, not hurt by Rio Grande Tetras, Astyanax Fasciatus Mexicanus (signed) Marion Tool, Chief Aquatic Biologist, Game and Fish Commission"

The Times had asked the commission for the proper name of the minnow and a report on the hazards, if any, to a lake in which they might be loosed.

Rose said he would continue to supply the minnow to whomsoever wishes to buy it.

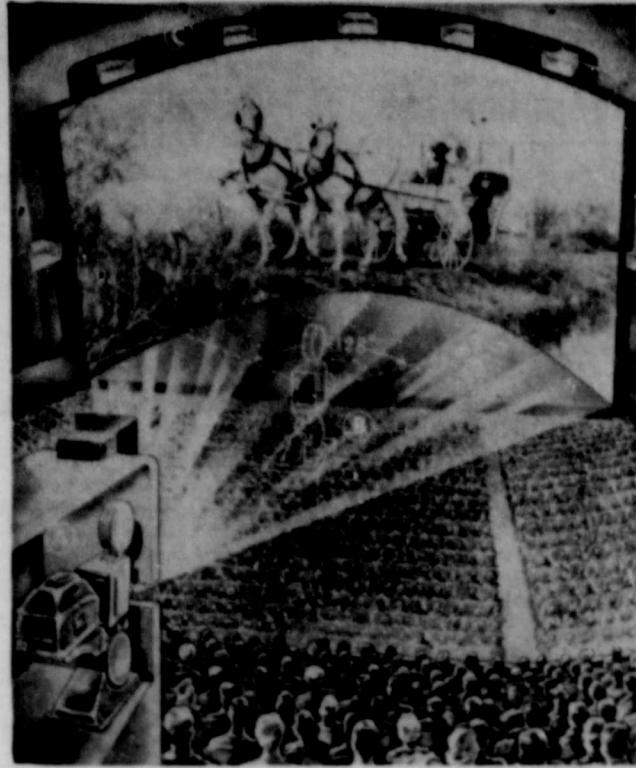
