


Continued from Page 1 No need to go to a nearby state and try for a driver's license, either. Omnibase makes sure an offender can't get a license in fines. surrounding states, too.

In addition, if the warrants aren't cleared up by the time shown at the bottom of the ticket, the addition to Omnibase means an extra \$30 charge.

"It's better to take care of an outstanding warrant right fees for a limited time." away," Young said. "At the bottom of the ticket, it shows the appearance date.

"If a person can't make it, they can enter their plea by mail. They'll get a courtesy form from the officer and it shows them all their Omnibase system. "With options," she said.

"Once it goes to Omni, the \$30 will be on there." Entries in the system should be finalized by Oct. 15, Young said.



In a similar vein, this week, County Commissioners heard from two firms who want a contract with the county to collect outstanding

"If we go with one of those companies, once a fine is 60 days past due, the names would be turned in," said County Judge Bill Sava. "Then the company would have the opportunity to collect those fines and

That service would be used in conjunction with Omnibase, he said.

"I feel that a collection attempt beyond what we do here is really a positive thing," Sava said of the the amount of fines and fees that are owed and eventually labeled uncollectable, we need to take pretty aggressive action and Omnibase is the way we'll start that."

Commissioners will decide whether to go with a collection company at their Oct. 27 meeting. The court's next regulation meeting will be Thursday, Oct. 16, due to Columbus Day, which is Oct. 13.

touchdown. The PAT was unsuccessful making the halftime score 14-6 in favor of the Longhorns.







Why is my Internet so slow? **MENUS**

Isn't the Internet supposed to be fun? For a lot of folks it is, but for those of us with slow service it can be frustrating. There are several factors that can affect your Internet speed: your Internet provider, your modem, the quality of your phone line and even the time of day.

wanted Internet service in you should call the phone Dimmitt you had one choice.

But now with Amarillo being a local call and with the availability of both cable and wireless highspeed Internet, we now have literally dozens of choices, some better than others.

If you still use a modem, there are some things you should know. First, make sure you have a 56K especially out in the counmodem.

Most new computers will come with one, but if you have an older computer you might want to check to make sure it is not a 33.6k or 28.8k modem.

Next, if you can hear any

Ten years ago if you noise in your phone line company and have them fix it.

> Noise in your phone line can adversely affect the speed of your connection. If you do have noise, you might also want to consider getting a filtered modem that can eliminate some of that noise. Most factory installed modems do not have noise filters and do poorly in Dimmitt try.

> Your Internet provider can also be a factor. Not all Internet providers are created equal.

If you're unhappy with your provider call a different one and ask them for a

free 10-day trial account. Most of them will be happy to provide one.

You might want to try out several of these and sign up with the one that does best for you.

Finally, if you're serious about surfing, you've got two choices in Dimmitt wireless or cable.

Both are much faster than dial-up but each has its own advantages and disadvantages.

Wireless is available in a much wider area - even out in the country.

However you have to have clear line of site to their tower.

Cable is less expensive, but if you've got poor cable reception then your Internet service may also be poor.

Both services are "always on" and can support multiple computers at the same time without the use of a phone line.

If you use the Internet a lot, I highly encourage you to look into either of these services.


