### Biologist Gives More Facts On Jumping Jacks

Further clarification about the Mexican jumping jack minnow was received this week from Marion Toole, chief aquatic biologist with the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Toole wrote the following information concerning the Rio Grande jacks, technical name for the jumping jack, for this newspaper:

"These minnows will attain a size of about six inches in length. They are a tropical fish that can not sustain water temperatures below about 49 F and are the kind of fish that tropical fish fanciers keep in aquariums in their homes, placing electric heaters in such aquariums to see that the fish are not killed by cold weather.

Biologists working on some of our northern lakes late last summer picked up these minnows frequently but upon seeing this in the spring, after winter had passed, have been unable to catch any which indicates that they were killed out during the wintertime.

"These minnows occur as native fish in Lake Wain and Devil's Lake at Del Rio and Falcon Lake on the Rio Grande. They have been ever present in those waters and notwithstanding the lakes (Continued on Page Two)

### New Schedule for Social Security Visits Given

Due to the heavy increase in the number of persons calling to see the social security representative at most of the contact stations operated by the Abilene district office, the travel schedule for July-September quarter has been revised somewhat from that formerly followed, according to E. R. Tuley, Jr., manager.

"Some trips have been changed as to time and frequency, and one new contact station (DeLeon) has been added," Tuley stated, "reflecting an ever-increasing interest in the public regarding old-age and survivors insurance."

Self-employed farm or ranch operators past age 65 are urged to check the following schedule and arrange to meet a representative of the Abilene office, Tuley went on, provided (1) the tax return for 1955 has been filed and (2) the individual has already had a gross income of at least \$800 in 1956. He adds that such persons should bring to the interview a copy of the 1955 tax return that can be turned over to the field man, the cancelled check or money order stub showing the tax payment, and some evidence that the 65th birthday has come and gone.

"Depending on the amount of the expected net income for 1956, it is often possible to start monthly benefit checks to these older farm and ranch operators without waiting for the final and exact figures on 1956 earnings," Tuley reported.

### Land Cover Recognized As Most Effective Conservation Practice

Land cover is recognized as the most effective conservation practice used by modern farmers. Its greatest value is perhaps in areas of deficient rainfall, because of wind and water erosion problems, and frequent failure of soil improving crops. Organic litter at the soil surface is a barrier to soil removal by any force. Litter will slow down surface evaporation, lower extremely high soil temperatures, and help keep soil open on both range and cropland.

An important phase of land cover is the management of small grain stubble after combining. Improved machinery and techniques in recent years allows plowing of stubble land with a minimum disturbance of surface litter. This form of tillage is usually done in this area with various types of chisel implements, instead of turning under the stubble with mold board or disc plows as was formerly the custom.

Good crop residue management is of primary benefit to the land because of the physical effects of the organic matter near the surface as influenced by the weather. Runoff from rainfall is decreased, and surface crusting is controlled. Soil is stabilized by an increased organic content.

Organic matter improves the plant food content of the soil, and (Continued on Page Two)

## Election Day Nears; Printer Gets Ballot

The ballots went to the printer this week, following a drawing of names for places last Saturday.

And the Eastland County Democratic Committee fully complied with orders from the State Commission to place three referendum questions on the ballot, all concerning segregation.

The three questions had caused strife in some counties, where County Committees charged that the questions were placed on the ballot to create "hated" and "get Texans' minds off scandals in state government."

### Attorney General Rules Expense Statements Still Must Be Filed

Additional expense statements should be filed by all candidates under an opinion of the Attorney General, County Clerk Johnson Smith pointed out this week. It holds that Article 269 of the Penal Code is still in effect. That Article requires a statement to be filed from 25 to 30 days prior to each election, and subsequent statements from eight to 12 days prior to the election.

This grows out of the opinion of the Court of Criminal Appeals in *Ex parte Sanford*. That case directly concerns the report to a candidate by the contributor himself, but it also discussed the provision of the Penal Code which requires reference to election expenses generally. The Attorney General had previously ruled the Article 269 of the Penal Code was superseded by the Election Code of 1951 and therefore the candidates were required only to file expense statements under Article 14.08 of that code. Now, because of the Sanford opinion that holding is reversed.

This is the effect:

Article 14.08 (Section 214 of the Election Code) requires a state of expenses to be filed from ten days in advance of the election. (For the forthcoming election, July 18th through July 20th).

Article 269 of the Penal Code requires a statement to be filed from June 27 through July 2 (25 to 30 days) and another from July 16 through July 19 (8 to 12 days).

Candidates for county officers or District Officers where only one county comprises their district file with the County Clerk.

Other District office seekers and candidates for state office file with the Secretary of State.

Failure to comply with the requirements of Article 14.08 of the Election Code carries a civil liability and criminal penalty, while there is neither prescribed for failure to file this statement under Article 269 of the Penal Code. The effect of the latter Code in this connection is to punish false swearing in the event of an erroneous report but there is no penalty.

The Attorney General held that these sections were not in conflict since they simply provide for additional statements. Under the Sanford situation a person who spent but did not report an amount between \$10.00 and \$25.00 was doing a lawful act under one statute but an unlawful act under the other. In case of the problem at hand, additional reports are the only consequence.






