Ground was being cleared Tuesday and Wednesday workers began preliminary work on the setting of the foundation.



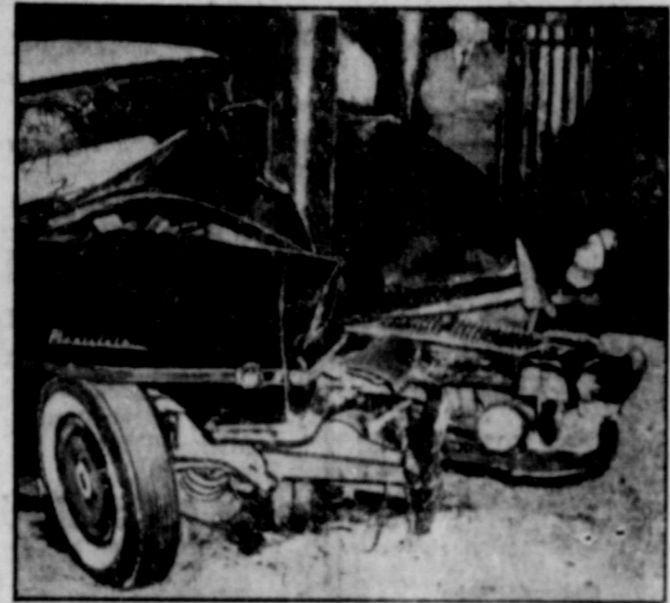

**In The Halls of Government**

**Senator Daniel Wants Honesty And Integrity**

(Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of articles written by the six candidates for governor for this newspaper. Today's article is by Price Daniel. Next: J. Evetts Haley.)

When I announced for Governor on March 26, I said that honesty and integrity in the halls of Government and in a political campaign would be the cornerstone of my program.  
We must restore unity and good will among our people and maintain their confidence in the State Government. To accomplish this, I propose formation of a Citizens' Law Enforcement Commission composed of one Grand Juror from each of the Supreme Judicial Districts of Texas. This

Commission would have the authority to subpoena witnesses and investigate all allegations of past or future misconduct in the State Government. I also propose legislative reforms, including a strict lobby registration law.  
My program also stresses improvements in our Public School System. I believe Texas should have the best Public School System in the nation; it should be financed with Texas money. I oppose general Federal aid to education because it would put us in jeopardy of Federal control over

**ON WATER**

**Commissioners Hike Minimum Rate Here**

A resolution setting up a slightly higher minimum water rate was unanimously adopted by the City Commission Tuesday night.  
This action was made necessary by the increased cost of water to the city since connecting with the new Lake Leon supply. The Commission has had under consideration several plans that would bring enough revenue to pay the flat rate of \$3.743 per month which the City must pay the Water District in addition to the amount that must be paid for water pumped to the City.  
The Commission had delayed putting any increase in the minimum into effect with the hope that

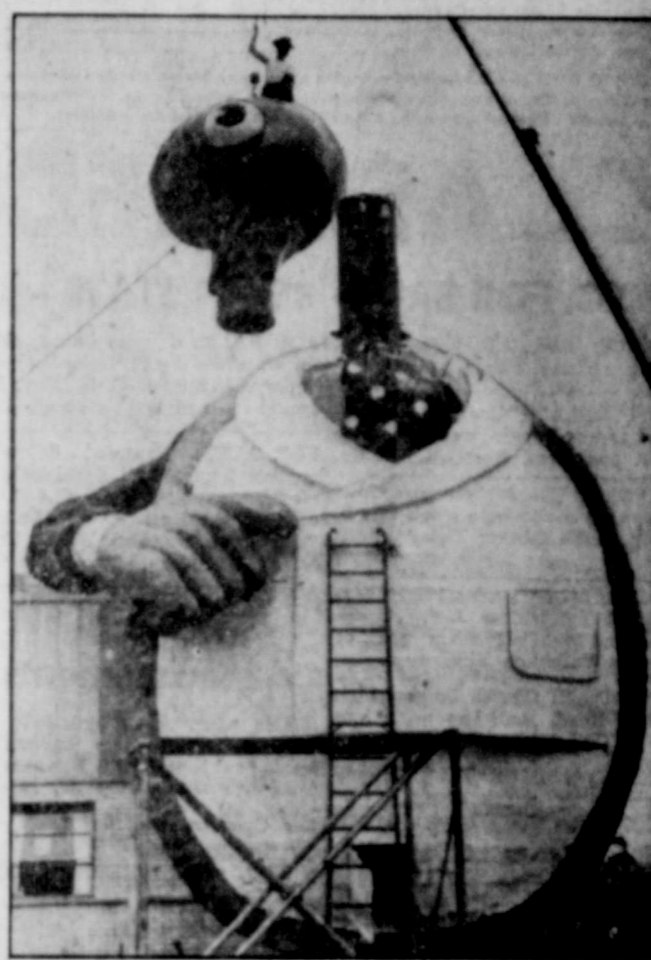
increased consumption would offset the added cost of water from the new lake. However, the inability of the distribution system to provide enough pressure for any considerable increase in consumption has materially curtailed any increase in revenues and has made it imperative that the Commission take steps to remedy the situation.  
The rate as adopted increased the minimum charge for three thousand gallons from \$2.50 to \$3.90 and lowered the price charged for each three thousand gallons over ten thousand from \$4.00 to \$3.50 up to twenty-five thousand gallons, with all over twenty-five thousand gallons being lowered from \$4.00 to \$3.00.  
The new rate will be effective with July billing.

It was contemplated by the commission that this small increase would not seriously hurt anyone, but the total brought in would enable the city to keep current on bills for the Water Department and to finance some changes in the distribution system that would insure better pressure to areas that are at present very low.  
All members of the Commission were in agreement that although they all disliked very much putting into effect any increase, however small, the situation was such that some increase had to be made.

**Commissioners Post Reward For Vandals**

City Commissioners Tuesday night approved the posting of a \$100 reward for information leading to the arrests of persons responsible for the recent vandalism at Ranger Municipal Swimming Pool.  
The Commissioners took the action after the pool was closed down due to vandalism which occurred while the pool was in operation Friday. Workers had to completely drain the pool, scrub it, then fill it again.  
City Manager Lester Cragley said the swimming pool will be open Thursday at two p.m.

A good number of Eastland County girl 4-Hers' names continue to come into the County Home Demonstration agent's office as the deadline for the girls' 4-H camp draws near. All girls must have their \$1.25 deposit and registration slip in to Mrs. Don Hart, Eastland County Home Demonstration agent, by July 16.  
The camp will be held at the Presbyterian camp at Lake Cisco beginning at 10 a.m. July 22 and ending at 3 July 24. Any 4-H club girl in the county and their mother, if they desire, can attend.

Each person attending will be asked to bring their own bed linen, toilet articles, and some food, which will consist of one paper sack lunch, 2 cold cuts, 2 eggs, 12 cookies, 5 slices bacon, 1 large potato, 3 winners, 1 small onion, 1 tomato, 1 quart milk, 1 cup sugar.  
The camp will consist of swimming, miniature golf, skating, a night program, flag ceremonies, devotionals, and three workshops which are Recreation, Handbox, and Crafts. The workshops are to be taught by 4-H club girls serving as junior leaders.  
Crafts will consist of making home made games and making various articles out of cork. These will not cost the girls any extra money.  
"All 4-H club girls and their mothers are urged to come to camp and enjoy the fun and fellowshipships with us," stated Mrs. Hart. **County Clerk's Office Relates County History**

The County Clerk's office in Eastland County Courthouse tells the life story of Eastland County and its inhabitants.  
In this office records are kept on the same subjects in nearly the same way that information has been kept for over 80 years. But changes in the manner of record reflect the progress of Eastland County since 1874.  
The first records were kept in the handwriting of A. J. Stuart in 1874. He was the first county clerk. Earlier transactions are recorded but present county clerk Johnson Smith said that Eastland County was attached to different counties for judicial purposes before actually becoming a full fledged county.  
In the county clerk's office, books are in shelves waist deep all the way around the room. Smith said there are over 1,000 books which are priceless to Eastland County people.  
If the books—over 500 of them in constant use—were destroyed, the only replaceable records are the birth and death records which are also recorded at Austin.  
The only way the books of records, leases, deeds, mortgages, etc., could be replaced if accidentally destroyed, would be by abstracts the public might have, and then there is the great possibility that some of the information would not be correct. For the earlier dated files, there would be no way to obtain them.  
The largest number of books in the office are the deed records. County clerk Johnson Smith said that the 500th book is now being recorded in for the deed records. These contain all deeds, transactions of all deeds, release of liens, oil leases, releases of oil leases. (Continued On Page Five)

**Operation Alert Set Nationally July 20th**

Every radio and TV station in the United States will go off the air at 3:10 p.m. (EST) on July 20.  
For the next 15 minutes the only broadcasting in the nation will be done by 1,250 stations which have joined the Federal Civil Defense Administration's "Conelrad" plan for emergency broadcasting.  
All of these stations will broadcast on one of the two defense frequencies (640 or 1240 kilocycles). They will use only special material prepared for Operation Alert, 1956.  
It will be the first full-fledged test of the ability of the Conelrad stations to reach the public with the all-important civil defense broadcasts which will be the nation's only broadest source of official information and instruction in event of an enemy air attack.  
Conelrad (Plan for Control of Electromagnetic Radiation) is a system devised by the Air Force, the broadcasting industry and the Federal government to make possible the vital broadcasting of official information and civil defense instructions in times of emergency. Under normal broadcasting, it

CONELRAD CAR RADIO dial marked at 640 and 1240 kilocycles for any emergency will come in handy when all radio stations go off the air at 3:10 p.m. on July 20, and then some return to broadcast special civil defense material on these frequencies as part of Operation Alert, 1956. The 15-minute nationwide Conelrad test, first of its kind, will test radio stations' ability to switch to the Conelrad system of broadcasting in an actual attack so that emergency instructions could be radioed to the public without putting enemy bombers to their targets. Civil Defense authorities are hoping the public will mark these radios for future emergencies.

Then last winter the Panhandle went to the other extreme. Twenty-nine inches of snow fell on Hereford, and the rest of the "panhandle received well over 20 inches.

We'll trade the heat for the snow anytime.

### Ideal School Sizes Fought Out As Educators Meet At A&M

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, (Spl.) — How many pupils should a high school have? The question was answered Tuesday at Texas A. and M. College.

chief of local school administration, Department of Education and Welfare, Office of Education, Washington, D.C., said at the meeting of Texas school administrators, that "many authorities say and the report of the committee for the White House conference on education, also states, that a high school should have a minimum of 300 pupils, or 75 pupils per grade and 12 full-time teachers; and that the minimum size of an elementary school should be 175 pupils and seven teachers for a six-grade school."

#### Possible Advantages

Mr. Fitzwater declared that "for years authorities have advocated and the White House conference on education report likewise states, that a school district should have at least 1200 pupils and 40 teachers; but they also point out that those of that size cannot be adequately self-sufficient from an educational standpoint and that there are possible advantages in efficiency and economy in those that are considerably larger."

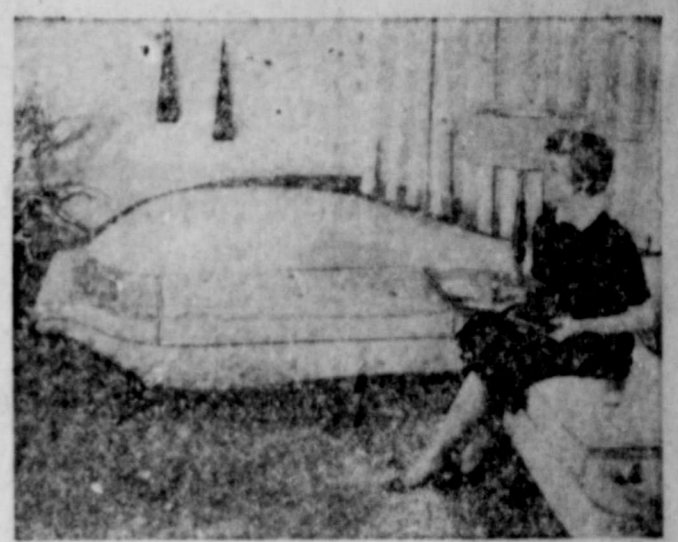
"However," Mr. Fitzwater said, "only a small portion of the school districts in the nation, about 11 per cent in 1954-55, employed 40 or more teachers. Furthermore, most recognized units established in recent years fall considerably short of the minimum size recommended."

The speaker said that the "progress Texas has made in reducing the number of its school districts is outstanding. According to information collected for use in the White House conference on education only five states had a larger percentage — wise reduction in the number of their school districts from 1948 to 1955; in 1948 Texas had 5145 districts but in 1955 only 1875, a reduction of 63.5 per cent."

"Moreover, in the same period, still speaking of Texas, the number of one-teacher schools was reduced from 1200 to 217; the number of school districts operating a school from 900 to fewer than 50; and the percentage of districts, not school systems, employing 40 or more teachers was more than doubled."

"These are indications of significant change, or major improvements in the school administrative structure."

More than 300 are attending the meeting of the Texas Association of County Superintendents, Texas School Administration and the Texas Association for Instructional Supervisors.

### Parents Are Urged To Get Birth Proof for School Children Early

The State Department of Health today asked all parents of children who will enter public schools for the first time in September to make requests "now" for copies of the children's birth records.

Most school systems require a birth certificate to prove the child was six years old on or before September 1.

"Making early requests for birth records will save parents and us time and trouble," said State Registrar W. D. Carroll.

Last year the department processed more than 60,000 requests during the months of August, September, and October.

"This year we're trying to avoid the fall bottleneck," Carroll said.

"We're ready to give immediate service to applications coming in between now and mid-July."

All parents have to do is furnish the child's name and date and place of birth, the mother's maiden name and the name of the father. That information plus the statutory fee of fifty cents, will buy anyone a copy of their birth certificate—provided the original certificate is on file.

It's a good bet the original will be on hand. Carroll's office keeps track of some ten million birth and death records, some dating back to 1903.

The deeds of trust come next, numbering 104.

The many other different types of volumes range from Criminal Docket and Fee Books and Labor Liens to Index of Wills Filed for Safekeeping and Assumed Name Record Books.

The attorneys use the books the most, the clerk figures, but the loan companies and credit bureaus get in their share of referring to the books.

The average man's name is recorded in the County Clerk's office at least five times—birth, marriage, military record, deeds and mortgages on property, cars, and his death. A man's name could appear five or 500 times easily.

Because of state laws, the very first and oldest records are kept, even though the public doesn't have much use for the older books any more.

The first marriage license issued in Eastland County was back on May 12, 1874. John L. Duffer and Mary S. Howlin got it and were married by Justice of the Peace J. W. Watson on May 17, 1874.

Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Gardner were the first parents in Eastland County to record the birth of a child. Dr. J. O. Stevens delivered a baby girl to them on July 5, 1903.

About 500 of the 1,000 binders are downstairs and have been out of use for many years. The County Clerk and his deputies are responsible for all these books.

Insect damage to the books isn't any problem—they are in constant use most of the time.

However, if the books do get in bad condition and need repair, the only way they can be taken out of the Court House is for the County



"Some people grow when given responsibility; others merely swell."

Clerk or his deputies to go with them and be wherever they are 24 hours a day. Smith said when Eastland County records are repaired, a firm does the work right there in the office, eliminating the necessity of his or one of his deputies' going with them wherever they go.

"This is a service office," County Clerk Smith said. "Many people refer to the records many times for many reasons daily. Seldom does anything upset the routine of this office."

form a cluster. These stations broadcast a common program, with each of the cluster stations on the air for only a few seconds at a time. The frequent switching from one station to another makes it impossible for a bomber pilot to use the radio signals for navigation purposes.

In smaller communities, where only one station is in the Conelrad system, it will broadcast at either 640 or 11240 kc for a short period, then be off the air for a number of minutes. The on-the-air, off-the-air pattern will continue until the end of the Conelrad Drill on July 26.

Radio stations will publicize the Conelrad drill in advance, warning

listeners to expect the interruption of normal broadcasting to shut down and tune to 640 or 1240 home radio sets.

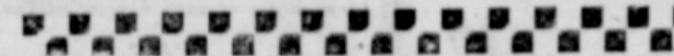

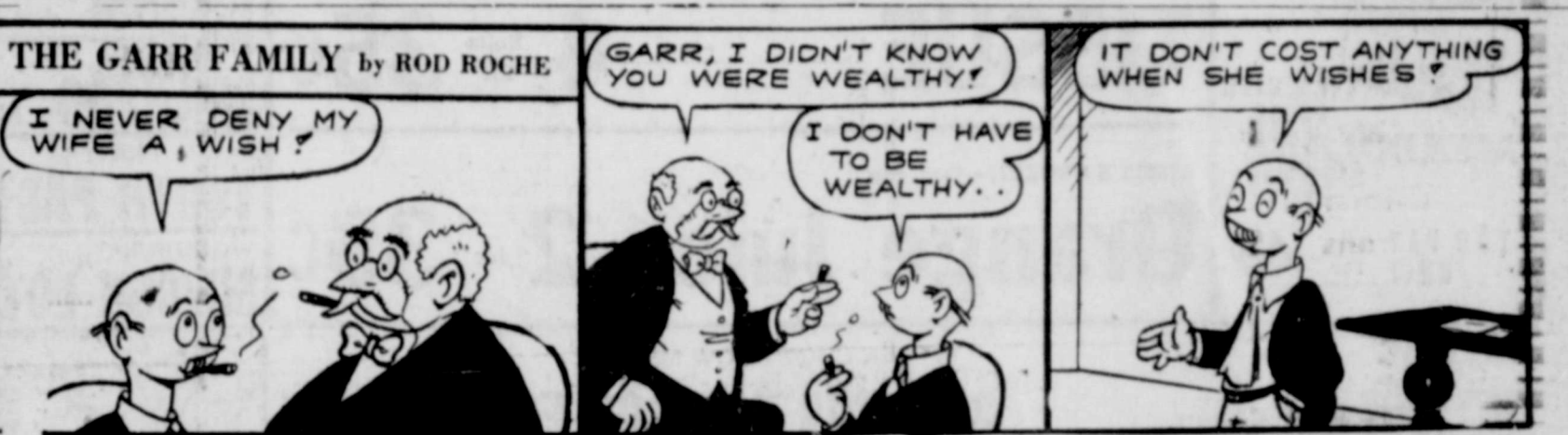
