Raynee Bradley takes top Fair prize

Wins Grand Champion for second year in a row

For the second consecutive year, Raynee Bradley won the Grand champion honors with her lamb at the Tri-State Fair Junior Lamb Show on Sunday.

Raynee and her lamb won top honors in the Medium Wool Class 4 and Class 9, as well as winning the Breed Champion in that category. Then she and her lamb took the grand champion title. With the first place, she earned \$75; the grand champion title came with a buckle and \$700.

In addition to Raynee, three others from Castro won firsts, as well as other contestants from this area who showed well.

Raynee, 16, was joined by her brother, Beau, 12, who with his lamb won breed champion in the Fine Wool competition, after taking a first in Class 1 of that division. Both showed as part of the Castro County 4-H.

Also taking a first place was Wendy Bradford in Class 2, Medium Wool. Bradford is a fifth grader at Dimmitt Middle School;

Council OKs new plumbing ordinance Atmos Energy asks for rate hike

The Dimmitt City Council voted unanimously to allow anyone, whether licensed or not, to work on plumbing in the city. The council also heard a request for a gas rate increase from Atmos Energy.

While the audience wasn't as big as two weeks ago, a vocal group attended the meeting Monday night to lobby the council on the matter of licensed plumbers. The council voted to ask the city attorney to draw up an ordinance which would require that the homeowner get a permit for plumbing work and then it have inspected by the city.

Despite warnings by plumbers, who said that should a water pipe get hooked to a sewage pipe, it could potentially harm every water user in the city, Mayor Wayne Collins said he thought the permitting process is sufficient to make sure the jobs are done properly.

"Our purpose here is to protect the public safety, but give people the right to work on their own or others' property," he said.

Permit prices start at \$20 and go up, depending on the amount and type of work being contemplated.

The request from Atmos Energy was for a 7.32 percent rate increase, which would mean a cost increase of \$3.29 per month for the average home.

And although the representative for Atmos said this is his company's

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
Bobcats fall to Floydada



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
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Swifts fall to Sunray

first rate hike request since 1999, Collins said that's a bit misleading.

"Just a year or two ago, they asked for a rate increase on some of the services they provide," he said. "This may be the first time since 1999 they asked for a rate increase like this one. But a year ago, they did get a rate increase for services they provide."

The Council voted to suspend the rate increase for 90 days and see what the Steering Committee recommends.

But Collins already knows how he feels. "I'm opposed to it," he said. "They have increased their dividends 15 years in a row. I think they're making enough money. They are a regulated utility and cities have original jurisdiction. We'll try to come up with something with the steering committee, but I don't feel a rate increase is justified."



Castro County agrees with state on 17 of 22 **Texas amendments**

While all 22 proposed state constitutional amendments passed statewide in Saturday's election, Castro County voted a little differently, approving only 17 of the 22. That of course, will have no impact on the overall outcome of the election.

However, of the 22, the five defeated locally were as follows: No. 4, 186-215; No. 9, 191-208; No. 16, 193-195; No. 22, 305-108.

No. 20, 176-214; and No. 21, 168-234. The 17 amendments approved locally were: No. 1, 344-84; No. 2, 257-156; No. 3, 227-193; No. 5, 225-194; No. 6, 236-171; No. 7, 297-122; No. 8, 281-138; No. 10, 383-41; No. 11, 243-163; No. 12, 296-165; No. 13, 344-77; No. 14, 211-197; No. 15, 272-135; No. 17, 325-95; No. 18, 259-151; No. 19, 202-192;

USDA Livestock Assistant Program signup under way

Castro County livestock producers who have suffered grazing losses caused by natural disasters will find some relief through the Livestock Assistance Program (LAP) offered by the USDA, Farm Service Agency (FSA), The LAP sign-up period began August 6 and ends Oct. 24, 2003.

"This program provides additional relief to livestock producers who suffered grazing losses due to severe weather and related causes," said Patricia Elliott, County Executive Director.

"LAP is intended to address the needs of producers who were not adequately covered by the Livestock Compensation Program (LCP), but producers cannot receive payments under both programs for the same loss," said Elliott.

Elliott added, a producer's LAP payment will be reduced by the amount(s) theproducer received under 2002 Cattle Feed Livestock Program, CompensationProgram - I and Compensation Livestock Program - II regardless of whether the LAP payment is for 2001 or 2002.

Authorized by the Agricultural Assistance Act of 2003, LAP provides \$250 million, nationwide, to livestock producers for grazing losses that occurredin either 2001 or 2002. Under LAP, a producer's grazing land must be located in a county that was declared a primary disaster area under a Presidential or Secretarial declaration.

The county must have been approved after Jan. 1, 2001, and a designation requested no later than Feb. 20, 2003, and approved. subsequently Contiguous counties are not eligible.

For those counties designated as a disaster area for 2001 or 2002, additional LAP eligibility criteria must be met for each year. A county musthave experienced an average of 40 percent or greater loss of normal precipitation for four consecutive months during the applicable year and suffered at least a 40 percent grazing loss for three or more consecutivemenths in a calendar year in order to be eligible for that year.

A county may meet eligibility requirements for both 2001 and 2002; however, a producer in that county may receive a LAP payment for only one of the

Although LAP is a grazing loss program, payments are based on the lesser of the calculated pasture value or the value of livestock allowancemultiplied by the producer's maximum grazing loss. The eligible amount is 50 percent of the loss amount.

A producer must have control of adequategrazing land to support the eligible livestock. During 2001 or 2002, a livestock producer must have suffered a 40 percent or greater loss of grazing production for three or more consecutive months dueto drought, hot weather, disease, insect infestation, flood, fire, hurricane, earthquake, severe storm or other natural disasters.

"Because funding for LAP is limited, a national factor will apply," said Elliott.

"This factor will be announced after the sign-up period ends."

The 2003 Act requires that an adjusted gross income (AGI) limitation apply - a change from previous LAP provisions.

A \$40,000 payment limitation also applies to LAP assistance. The total value of all applications will be determined and, if in excess of \$250 million, will be adjusted proportionately.





Cotton Report

Cotton futures hit limit up for the second consecutive day on Thursday and closed at their highest level in more than two and a half years on the back of bullish supply/demand data released by USDA.

The supply/demand report, based on a field survey of crops as of Sept. 1, placed 2003-04 U.S. cotton production at 16.9 million bales, lower than the 17.1 million bales estimated in the previous month's report. The figure was slightly less than market expectations due, in part, to the department's unexpected cuts in the Southeast. Traders had expected to see an increase in production in the region to help offset the crop losses in Texas.

In addition to a shrinking U.S. crop, other supportive elements of the report included an increase of estimated U.S. exports to 12.0 million bales and the slashing of projected ending stocks by 500,000 bales to 3.8 million bales.

World production was cut more than 2.0 million bales to 93.36 million, and ending stocks also were lowered by roughly 2.0 million to 32.22 million bales. China's production was cut 1.5 million bales to 25.5 million.

The department's decrease in the Chinese cotton production figure was made before China's Ministry of Agriculture released a report this week saying it "recognized" that adverse weather will cause a reduction in the size of the country's cotton crop. According to the report, cotton lint estimates have been cut drastically. Based on the ministry's data, traders now project a Chinese crop of between 22.9 to 23.8 million bales.

"This figure, from the world's largest cotton producer and consumer, was as surprising as a shot out of the dark," said one market observer. "If the reports from China are true, this could completely reshuffle the world's supply and demand for cotton."

Other fundamental support for the market came from the prospect of damage to the U.S. crop by Hurricane Isabel which currently is tracking across the Atlantic in a westerly direction and could be a threat to Florida and the southeastern U.S. next week.

"With the U.S. cotton crop still behind and cotton bolls open, the heavy rain Hurricane Isabel might produce would be a detriment to the yield and quality of the crop," an analyst said.

The weekly crop conditions report released by USDA demonstrated how late the U.S. crop is for this time of year. As of Sept. 7, only 35 percent of bolls were open nationwide compared with 24 percent the week before, down sharply from 49 percent last year and the five year average of 52 percent. As for the condition of the crop, 50 percent was in good to excellent condition compared with 52 percent the week before while 19 percent of the crop remains in poor to very poor shape.


In other news, USDA's weekly export report was disappointing to most in the market due to the small amount of sales concluded in the week ended Sept. 4. Net upland sales fell from a week earlier to 29,800 bales, the lowest level of the new marketing year.

Export shipments also dipped slightly to 115,400 bales. According to traders, shippers are watching the rising Step 2 rate for upland cotton and could make an effort to ship larger weekly volumes if it continues to improve.

On the spot cotton scene, activity increased considerably. Online sales by Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers in the five trading days ended Sept. 11 totaled 84,421 bales compared to 55,784 bales the previous week. Wednesday, more bales were sold in one day than were sold the entire previous week. A rise in the futures market allowed producers holding old-crop equities to trade at a beneficial level resulting in online sales of 59,403 bales for the day. For the week, prices received by producers selling their cotton online ranged from 47.41 to 53.61 cents per pound versus the previous week's 47.70 to 48.98 cents per pound range.
