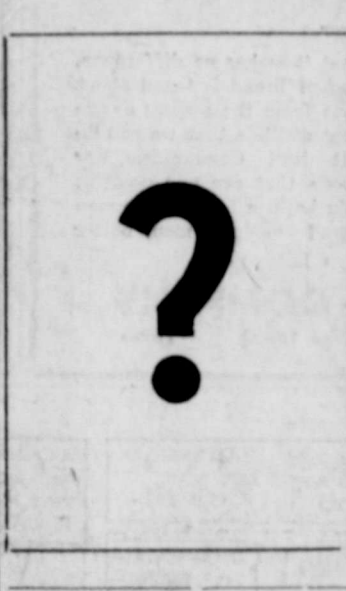

Shackleford he won 556 to 498. In the race for state senator from the 22nd district, Floyd F. Bradshaw received 3234 to Herman Fitts' 2232 votes. Over the district, however, it looked like the race could go either way.

John Lee Smith surprised many political observers in the county by carrying Eastland County with 2250 votes in the race for lieutenant governor. Ben Ramsey was the nearest rival, polling 1958 votes, while A. M. Aikin, Jr. got 1106. C. T. Johnson brought up the rear with 692 votes.

Will Wilson was leader in the race for attorney general in the county. He received 2390 votes to second place Tom Moore's 1720. Third was won by Ross Carlton with 672 votes while Curtis Hill got 386 votes.

John White had little trouble in winning re-election as agricultural commissioner in the state, and Eastland County was no exception. White received 3673 votes to Jim Barber's 1938 and Bill Jones' 738.

Martin Dies did nothing unexpected by carrying the county in the congressional race. He received 3568 votes to Bill Elkins' 1967.

Earl Rudder received 2983 votes in his bid for a first elective term as land commissioner. His only opponent, Ned Price, got 2246 votes.

Jose Owens gained a surprise lead over W. A. Morrison in the race for judge of the court of criminal appeals. He polled 2727 votes in the county to Morrison's 2449.

Robert Hughes received 3119 votes and James E. Norvell 2178 in the race for associate justice of the supreme court, place 2.

Jose James out polled Warren G. Harding, 3408-2199 votes in the race for state treasurer.

As expected, the county approved all three referendums. Resolution one, concerning intergraded schools, was favored 3595 to 939.

The second question, concerning intermarriage of the race, organized approval of county voters by a 3797 to 650 margin, while the last question, calling for the use of interposition to halt the legal federal encroachment was approved 3738 to 708.

Omar Burleson had very little trouble with Dan Kralis. He received 4030 votes in Eastland County to Kralis' 1613. He was also running ahead throughout the district.

A. J. Blevins Jr. was elected county democratic chairman by almost a unanimous vote. Also receiving a high vote was Judge Milburn S. Long, who was seeking re-election as associate justice of the 11th district court of Civil Appeals.

Deaths of 'Cool' Children Are Studied By Commerce Committee

The House Inter-State Commerce Committee, concerned with the death of 14 children in the past 10 years due to being trapped in abandoned refrigerators, has been holding hearings in Washington in an effort to find the solution to this menace. The committee has recommended legislation which would require refrigerator manufacturers to put safety closing devices on their products.

During the hearing, the committee received testimony from Marshall Bartlett, of the General Electric Company, concerning the development of their Magnetic Safety Door Refrigerator. Bartlett pointed out that the door can

be opened from inside of the refrigerator by pushing against it with a 10 to 20 pound pressure. As Bartlett concluded his testimony, Representative Kenneth A. Roberts (D-Ala.) presiding over the committee, told him:

"I want to say that I certainly feel the sub-committee owes you a vote of thanks for coming here today and we appreciate the fine work that your company is doing in this field, and the leadership that General Electric has shown in developing a refrigerator which would be safe for children. I think you certainly are due the thanks not only of this sub-committee but the people of the country for your fine leadership in this field."

Bartlett told the committee that all of General Electric's 1956 refrigerators have safety doors that are held closed by the action of a bar magnet, instead of the usual latch.

Royal Strawberries For The Family King



Did you know that the strawberry is a member of the rose family? So it is and it got its name from the ancient practice of placing straw beneath and around the berries to keep them in perfect condition as they grew and ripened for a king's or emperor's enjoyment.

Still befitting a royal feast, springtime strawberries are found on practically every American table. There's something about this luscious crimson berry that puts us all in the mood for making a variety of tempting dishes. One of the most effective uses we can make of the strawberry is to treasure its goodness in a sweet spread to be enjoyed every month of the year.

If you and your family would relish a royal feast now and long after the strawberry season is past, try this short-but-recipe for Strawberry Jelly. It makes eleven medium glasses of sparkling jewel-toned jelly—each fit for the king or queen of your house!

Strawberry Jelly

Yield: about 11 medium glasses (5 1/2 lbs. jelly)

3 3/4 cups juice (about 2 1/2 qts. ripe strawberries) 1/4 cup lemon juice (2 lemons) 7 1/2 cups (3 1/2 lbs.) sugar 1 bottle liquid fruit pectin

First, prepare the juice. Crush thoroughly about 2 1/2 quarts ripe strawberries. Place in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 3 3/4 cups juice into a very large saucepan. Squeeze and strain the juice from 2 medium-sized lemons. Measure 1/4 cup into saucepan with strawberry juice.

Then make the jelly. Add sugar to juice in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. At once stir in liquid fruit pectin. Then bring to a full rolling-boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim off foam with metal spoon, and pour quickly into glasses. Cover jelly at once with 3/4 inch hot paraffin.

Royal Strawberries For The Family King



Did you know that the strawberry is a member of the rose family? So it is and it got its name from the ancient practice of placing straw beneath and around the berries to keep them in perfect condition as they grew and ripened for a king's or emperor's enjoyment.

Still bedding a royal feast, springtime strawberries are found on practically every American table. There's something about this luscious crimson berry that puts us all in the mood for making a variety of tempting dishes. One of the most effective uses we can make of the strawberry is to treasure its goodness in a sweet spread to be enjoyed every month of the year.

If you and your family would relish a royal feast now and long after the strawberry season is past, try this short-boat recipe for Strawberry Jelly. It makes eleven medium glasses of sparkling jewel-toned jelly—each fit for the king or queen of your house!

Strawberry Jelly

Yield: about 11 medium glasses (5 1/2 lbs. jelly)

3 1/2 cups juice (about 2 1/2 qts. ripe strawberries) 1/4 cup lemon juice (2 lemons)
7 1/2 cups (3 1/4 lbs.) sugar 1 bottle liquid fruit pectin

First, prepare the juice. Crush thoroughly about 2 1/2 quarts ruddy ripe strawberries. Place in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 3 1/2 cups juice into a very large saucepan. Squeeze and strain the juice from 2 medium-sized lemons. Measure 1/4 cup into saucepan with strawberry juice.

Then make the jelly. Add sugar to juice in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. At once stir in liquid fruit pectin. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim off foam with metal spoon, and pour quickly into glasses. Cover jelly at once with 1/4 inch hot paraffin.

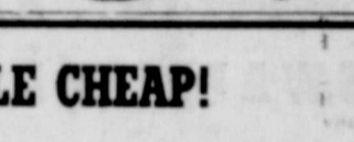

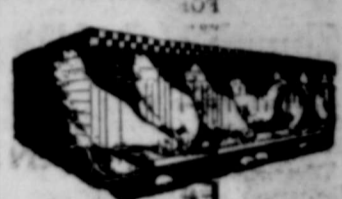

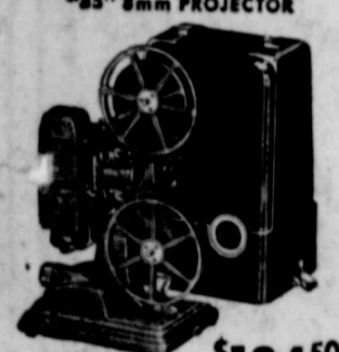
