Ground Observer Corp Membership Need Is Outlined

Need for volunteer members in the Ground Observer Corp, was stressed at a meeting on Friday morning, when Area Sergeant Jay R. Hyde of the Dallas Field Center, spoke to the Home Demonstration women assembled for their 7th Annual encampment at Lake Cisco.

Sergeant Hyde showed a film "Sky Watch," giving much information that has been done toward expanding our National defense program, together with that of Canada, our neighbors to the north and other nations concerned in the defense of their own homeland. Sergeant Hyde further explained the need for volunteers, to participate in the Ground Observer Corp program. "This," he said, "is of vital importance to every home represented here. Every person should volunteer for three hours of service each month," he stated.

Counties in the seven county area over which Sergeant Hyde supervises includes Brown, Comanche, Coleman, Eastland, Erath, Mills and Hamilton.

A number of observation posts have been designated in each county, and several posts already begun Sky Watch operations. A new post was designated for Cisco July 26, atop the Victor Hotel, with Mr. Robertson of Texas Electric, to supervise the post. Other posts, eight in all, are designated for Eastland county.

The Gorman Post will be supervised by Joe Collins, local insurance agent, who will enroll volunteers for the Gorman area. Eastland and Ranger Supervisor (Continued on Page Two)

It Looks Like Nuessle Wins!

Final unofficial results of Saturday's Democratic primary election reveal that incumbent Joe Nuessle has won re-election as county attorney by 11 votes—the smallest margin of victory ever recorded in a county-wide race in Eastland County.

Final tabulations reveal that Nuessle finished the race for the four year term with 2857 votes to Earl Conner Jr.'s 2846. Nimrod, one of the smallest voting precincts in the county and the last to report, gave Nuessle a margin of 14 votes—22 to 8—to clinch the victory for the Ranger man. Cisco's Precinct 6, which had first reported 646 votes for Nuessle and 419 for Conner, filed an amended report which cost Nuessle 20 votes and Conner 15. The revised count gave Nuessle 626 votes and Conner 419. That was before Nimrod reported and the five votes Conner picked up in Cisco took away Nuessle's two vote lead and handed Conner a three vote margin. Then the Nimrod precinct reported, however, to complete the ballot counting and apparently gave Nuessle another term as county attorney. Ballots are to be canvassed today.

The county attorney's race was the only county campaign to end that close, but all other races were undecided until late in the night. J. C. Allison came through to win his first elected term as tax assessor-collector by defeating Truly Carter 2984 votes to 2706. In the only other county wide races, all unopposed, Sheriff J. B. Williams received 5673 votes, A. J. Blevins Jr. got 5617 for county Democratic chairman and 91st District Court Judge T. M. Collier polled 5691 votes.

J. T. (Tip) Arther successfully won a second term as commissioner of Precinct 1. Arther beat W. J. Herrington in the race by a vote of 1443 to 1208.

In the Precinct 3 commissioners race, Mark Clark and E. L. (Bob) Carter will apparently be in a runoff. Clark received 289 votes to Carter's 231. E. B. (Bulis) McCollum was third with 184 and R. M. Earp last with 126. Henry Carter, present commissioner, did not seek re-election.

Paul Brashear was an easy winner over Omar Burkett in the race for state representative of the 76th District. Brashear, seeking a second term, received 3426 votes to 2308 for Burkett. He also carried both Callahan and Shackelford counties to make a clean sweep.

Floyd Bradshaw apparently is winner of the race for state senator from the 22nd District. Bradshaw received 3256 votes to Herman Pitts' 2255 in Eastland County, and a check revealed that he was leading Pitts by some 1600 votes throughout the District, most of lead coming in this county.

Omar Burleson received a big vote of confidence in his race for re-election as congressman from the 17th District. He polled 4092

votes to 4687 for Dan Kralis. The vote was about the same throughout the entire District.

County Picks "Losers"
Eastland County voters picked a lot of "losers" in the state races. The county gave W. Lee O'Daniel a vote of 2172 to put him in first place, in the gubernatorial race, but "Pappy" didn't make the runoff statewide. Price Daniel, who led the state ticket by almost 200,000 votes, finished second in Eastland County with 1895 votes. Ralph Yarborough, who will be in the runoff with Daniel, polled 1131 votes in the county while J. Evetts Haley finished fourth with 479. Reuben Senterfitt received 196 votes and J. J. Holmes got only 40.

John Lee Smith finished first in the lieutenant governor's race in Eastland County, despite the fact he could do no better than third statewide. Smith got 2350 votes to Ben Ramsey's 1969. A. M. Aikin's 1109 and C. T. Johnson's 386. Ramsey led the state race and Aikin apparently gained a runoff berth.

In the race for associate justice of the Supreme Court, Place 2, Robert G. Hughes polled 3230 votes to James R. Norvell's 2122. Norvell was out front by a very narrow margin throughout the state, however.

The county gave Jesse Owens 2800 votes and W. A. Morrison only 2465 votes in the race for judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals. Morrison had a comfortable lead over the state though.

The county picked a winner in Jesse James in the race for state treasurer, giving him 3443 votes to Warren G. Harding's 2195.

County voters also were on the winning side in the Land Commissioners race. Earl Rudder received 3184 votes in the county to Ned Price's 2228.

In the race for commissioner of agriculture, the county went about on the same margin as the state, giving John C. White a win without a runoff. White got 3592 votes in this county while Jim Barber was second with 1044 and Bill Jones third with 742.

Martin Dies was winner of the congressman at large race and led this county by a vote of 5590 to 1975 for Bill Elkins.

Chairmen and Constables
Chairmen and constables were elected throughout the county. Porter Woods got 989 votes to Tom High's 564 in the race for Precinct 1 constable (Eastland). Ralph Veal was unopposed for Precinct 2 constable (Ranger) and received 1091 votes. E. L. Dennis was re-elected constable of Precinct 3 and J. J. Honea beat two other candidates in the Precinct 6 constable's race. Honea polled 787 votes to Marian Watts' 155 and Henry Curtis' 232. R. B. Forehand was unopposed in the Precinct 7 constable's race.

Mesquite May Aid Ranchers In The Future

Mesquite—long a foe of Texas ranchers—may soon aid drought-stricken cattlemen. Feed livestock when ranches are poor, if agricultural experiments conducted by scientists at Southwest Foundation for Research and Education prove successful.

Dr. C. L. Shrewsbury, associate director of Southwest Foundation, said the San Antonio medical and agricultural research center has been carrying out tests using mesquite in livestock feed since the first of the year.

The feed formula tested includes mesquite, molasses and cotton seed meal. Grain will be added to the formula for the next feed tests. Ground mesquite averages 1400 pounds to a ton of feed for (Continued on Page Two)

Veterans Administration Names Three Outstanding Graduates

The Veterans Administration, looking over the nation's 56 crop of veteran college graduates, today named a handless architect from Gulfport, Mississippi, and a police-stricken director of religious education from Waco, Texas, as two of the three outstanding veteran graduates.

The architect is 36 year-old Cronan P. Leblanc, who received his AB Degree from Tulane University in New Orleans. Leblanc lost both hands and an eye in a dynamite explosion in World War II, and learned the skills of his profession by using hooks in place of hands.

Graduation at Baylor University in Waco was a great day in the life of the teacher of religion, William C. Monroe, 24. Korean Veteran with polio.

He received his diploma, Magna Cum Laude. He received a cup as highest ranking Baylor graduate, and he walked up to the stage to get his honors—first time he had been out of his wheelchair in four years. Physical Therapy, begun a year ago, had helped him regain use of his legs.

The other outstanding graduate named by VA's staff in Washington, D.C., was Edward Leslie of Lynn, Massachusetts, 25-year-old Korean Veteran who lost his sight in a bomb explosion in Korea. Graduating Cum Laude from Boston College, Leslie studied economics by listening to recordings made by classmates of lecture notes.

VA named the three outstanding graduates in a press release given to the nation's newspapermen and radio and television representatives at the National Press Club in Washington.

Leblanc is now taking a vacation at his home in Gulfport but intends to follow his new profession of architect. Monroe plans to stay on at Baylor for his master's degree, and then teach religion in colleges.

Monroe flew more than 80 missions as a radio operator with the air force in Korea, before being stricken with polio. Before entering the air force he attended Crozier Tech in Dallas. The explosion which crippled Leblanc occurred at Camp Shelby, Mississippi, while he was serving as a staff sergeant with an infantry regiment.

VA pointed out that all three veterans waited until they had adjusted to their handicaps before enrolling in school under Public Law 16, the Vocational Rehabilitation Act for Disabled Veterans. The two southwestern veterans were given counseling and other assistance by VA Regional Offices at Jackson, Mississippi, New Orleans, Dallas and Waco.

Prices On Broilers and Fryers Should Be Popular To Consumer

Supplies of broilers and fryers are making prices which should prove popular with consumers. August supplies are expected to be 20 percent above a year ago with an average of nearly 25 million birds going to market weekly. Prices are running 20 to 22 percent below last year.

Too, the USDA announced that the turkey crop is at least a third larger than a year ago with heavy breed hens and toms making up most of the excess.

Food shoppers will also find plenty of beef available. Large quantities of all grades are expected for August.

Fresh plums and Bartlett pears are two plentiful fruits listed. The plum market has hit its peak supply in August and prices usually break.

Other plentiful listed for August include fresh and processed lemons, peanuts, peanut butter, rice and hens.

The USDA suggests that meats featuring broilers and fryers or even turkeys be used during the coming month because of the supplies and favorable prices of these food products.

herd feed and 1000 pounds to a ton for calf fattening. "We tried feeding the mesquite without any grain in the ration," Dr. Shrewsbury said. "This does not work well. However, we feel that if grain and mesquite are combined in the ration, the formula may have value. We expect to test this in the near future."

C. E. Doolin of Rio Vista Farms near Big Wells, Texas has pioneered the use of mesquite in livestock feeds. J. B. Thompson of Crystal City is planning a feed business based on mesquite and has contracted for the mesquite harvesting on Doolin's ranch.

*Doolin has fed 1200 calves on the mesquite feed during the past

three years and reports that they have gained an average of two and a half to three pounds daily. No feed records were kept so the cost of grain cannot be figured. Most of the finished calves brought top prices on the San Antonio market.

Medium sized bushes are used in preparing the mesquite for food, using the woody part of the plant and avoiding leaves and twigs. The mesquite is cut by hand, gathered in piles and cured for about two weeks. It is then fed from the piles into a Fitchbrough Chipper. This machine will chip three tons of mesquite per hour from the piles, then blow the chipped mesquite into a truck. It requires three men to operate and the operating cost, not including labor, is \$2 per hour.

After going through the chipper, the mesquite chips are ground through a hammer mill and come out ready to use in the feed. The final product is fibrous, with fibers about a fourth of an inch long.

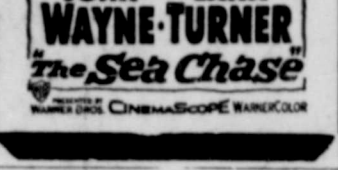

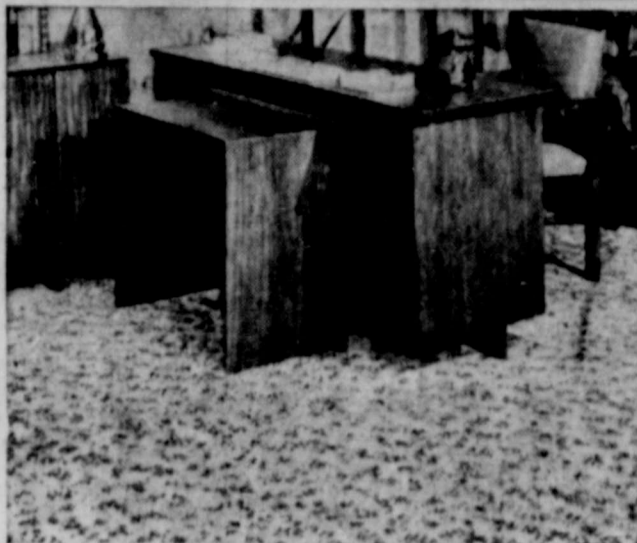
