### Cooper Says Pecan Trees Are Tribute To Patterson

"Those trees are a living tribute to J. C. Patterson," County Agent J. M. Cooper said, looking at a grove of pecan trees.

Cooper, who himself has continually plugged pecans as a factor that could level off the county's agricultural picture, explained his statement, saying, "Patterson was the man who caused these trees to be planted."

It seems that Patterson, back in 1929 when he held the job Cooper now fills, decided that he would work to see that 200 Eastland county farmers plant five acres of pecans.

Nuts were germinated and made ready to plant and then distributed free to the first 200 farmers joining the "Thousand Acres Pecan Club."

Club boys and vocational students donated their work and gathered nuts from heavy and

regular bearing trees. The nuts, after they were germinated, were then distributed at Eastland, Carbon, Cisco, Gorman, Ranger and Rising Star in March of 1930. Sufficient nuts were given to each member of the club to plant five acres, allowing five nuts to the hill in rows 30 by 60 feet making 24 hills to the acre and 120 trees to the five acre plot.

Farmers agreed to plant the nuts as instructed, to protect them and at the proper time to bud or have them budded to approved western varieties.

A few nursery grown trees were planted in order that farmers would have bud wood for working the groves. Then pecan budding demonstrations were given.

The trees were planted. Today, almost 26 years later, they do indeed stand as a tribute to J. C. Patterson.

### Mechanical Brain To Be Operated By Piggly Wiggly

This mechanical age — what will they think of next? After seeing two new cash registers that are to be installed in the local Piggly Wiggly store put through their paces Thursday afternoon by Al Fowler of the National Cash Register company, one is inclined to believe that it may be possible for that old demon of a bottleneck — the check-out counter — to soon be relieved of congestion.

The machines, according to Fowler, are engineered for protection at the check-out counter of the customer, the checker and the firm.

With a string of buttons, similar to an ordinary cash register — we don't know, never having owned a register, but have paid out several for merchants, with our purchases — the operator plays "take your money" at the, or he, rings up your purchases.

Then afterwards, or for that matter, during the process of relieving you of your bills — to say nothing of your change — if an error is made, the machine will make the correction and show it on the slip, make deductions for coupons, add additional purchases after totaling — then record the amount of money or check you hand the checker and compute your change — if you have any, we never do — and the transaction is complete.

The machine will not wrap, tie, sack or lug your groceries to your car — yet.

# Peanut Production In County Ranks Near Top

## Eastland Second in State; 11th in U.S.

Eastland County is the eleventh ranking county in the United States in number of acres of peanuts planted, the latest census report released by the United States Department of Commerce reveals.

The county ranks second in the state behind Comanche county, which is the top ranking county in the entire nation.

Eastland County farmers planted 23,515 acres in peanuts in 1954, the census report shows. Total pounds harvested that same year were 3,831,570. The county ranked only 47th in the nation in the number of pounds harvested, and Comanche county ranked only 27th. That reveals the severe drought this part of the nation has undergone in the last few years.

Peanuts harvested for picking or threshing from 1,270,386 acres on United States farms in 1954 total-

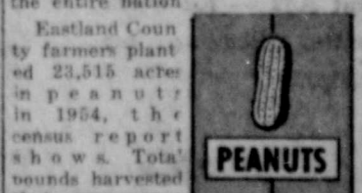
ed 884,664,110 pounds, with 1,095,748 acres, or 86.2 percent, in 100 leading counties producing 807,121,165 pounds, according to the 1954 census figures for ranking counties.

Eastland county farmers planted some 1.5 percent of all of the nuts planted in the nation. Comanche accounted for 2.8 percent of the U. S. total.

Among the top 100 counties in peanut acreage, 37 were in Georgia, 20 in Texas and 13 in North Carolina.

Top ranking county in number of pounds harvested in the U. S. was Southampton, Virginia, planting 29,604 acres, the county producing 47,692,127 pounds.

"The Magic of Fire" is a part of some 30 hours of demonstrated lectures developed at Dallas where headquarters for the accident prevention and health division of the bureau's Region VI are maintained.

The demonstrations are laboratory reproductions of fire and explosions which cause such headlines as "Mother and Son Burn

to Death in Fire Caused by Gasoline Being Used for Cleaning Clothes," and "Terrible Toll in Gas Explosion at Grade School, Electric Spark Blamed," and hundreds of similar ones seen almost every day in newspapers.

"What is fire; what causes explosions?" is asked and then answered in words and actual demonstrations.

## Students Advised Of WOE Law by Vets Administrator

Young men and women planning to attend school this fall under the new War Orphans education law should file applications as soon as possible to avoid unnecessary delays in receiving their first allowance check, Scott R. Harrington, manager of the Veterans administration regional office in Dallas said.

Application forms are available at all VA offices.

Persons eligible for schooling are those whose veteran parent died of injuries or diseases resulting from military service during World War I, World War II or the Korean conflict, he said. Students generally must be between 18 and 23 years old.

Prompt action is needed, Harrington, explained, because normally it will take about three months from the date of application to the date the initial check is placed in the mail.

When the first checks do arrive, however, they will cover the entire period during which the students were in school after Oct. 1, the beginning date on which the law authorizes payment.

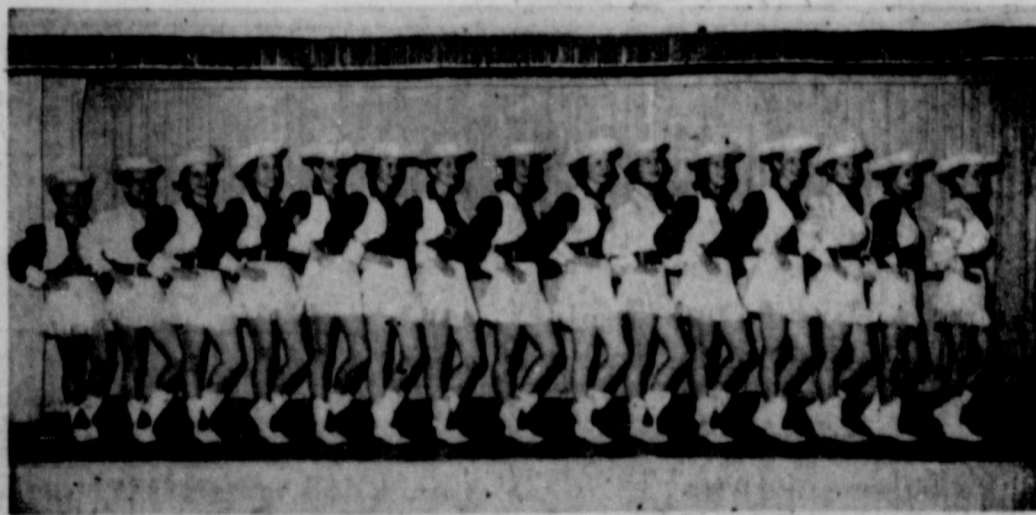
