



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Reversible Machine Enabs Dam To Store Surplus Engy



Lowering a rotor weighing 300 tons into posi was one of the final steps in the installation of a powerful mac) recently placed in operation at TVA's Hiwassee dam in Northrolina. The machine, developed and built by Allis-Chalmers, called a pumpturbine. During periods of greatest demand power, usually daytime hours, it uses water to generate electry (left insert); it is then operating as a turbine. When the deed for electricity falls off, usually at night and when surplus or is cheap, the machine can be reversed to serve as a giant pi and force water back through the dam to be stored in the reser (right insert). The unique machine in this way makes pose the storage of surplus energy.
