Cisco Baptist Association Elects New Officers At Annual Meeting

The Cisco Baptist association met in its annual meeting Monday and Tuesday at First Baptist church, Ranger, Monday evening the program featured singing by the choir of First Baptist church of Eastland under the direction of John Dickey and addresses by L. H. Pappcott, state Baptist Brotherhood secretary and Harvey Kimbler of Eastland, District 17 Baptist convention president.

Tuesday morning's session was given to reports of the work of the association during the past 12 months. The special music was by a ladies trio composed of Misses Harvey Kimbler, Harold Hitt and G. E. Dendy of First Baptist church, Eastland. The annual sermon by Calvin Bailey of Second Baptist church, Ranger, concluded the morning session.

Tuesday afternoon the business session of the annual meeting was held. The group accepted one constitutional amendment and rejected another. An amendment to reclassify all department heads as officers of the association and to provide for the nomination of all officers by a nominating committee was passed unanimously. The moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, and treasurer have previously been elected by nominations from the floor. An amendment to combine the offices of moderator and chairman of the executive board was tabled.

Calvin Bailey of Second Baptist church, Ranger, has served the association as moderator this past year. Serving with him have been M. A. Pennington of First Baptist church, Gorman, vice-moderator; Charles Wood of First Baptist church, Cisco, clerk; and J. C. Allison, Bethel Baptist church, Eastland, treasurer.

New officers elected for the year 1956-57 include Ralph Perkins, First Baptist church, Ranger, moderator; Carroll Herring, First Baptist church, Olden, vice-moderator; Clarice Wood, First Baptist church, Cisco, clerk and J. C. Allison, Bethel Baptist church, Eastland, treasurer. This will be Mr. Allison's 13th term as treasurer.

Highlights of the reports for the year revealed by the clerk include: baptisms, 359; present members, 11,557; Sunday school enrollment, 6,983; vacation Bible school enrollment, 2,501; training union enrollment, 3,010; woman's missionary union enrollment, 1,453; and Brotherhood enrollment, 617.

Total gifts were \$358,290 and total mission expenditures were \$128,191 of which \$51,993 was sent through the Southern Baptist cooperative program.

Brazos River Helped Make Texas History

The story of the Brazos river is told in the October issue of 'The Progressive Farmer' magazine. The article "The Brazos - Avenue of Texas History" points out the role of the river in the history of the state.

When Stephen F. Austin brought his first settlers to Mexican Texas in 1821, many of them chose the fertile bottom lands of the Brazos. At Washington-on-the-Brazos, delegates drew up the constitution of the new Republic of Texas in the spring of 1846.

Planters from the Old South brought their slaves and acquired plantations in the Lower Brazos valley. Jared E. Groce built the first gin in the Valley in 1825.

On the west forks of the Brazos in the 1870's, many of the final herds of buffaloes were killed for their hides. The hunters were followed by cowmen who were later joined by farmers.

Around Fort Griffin in the late seventies horse thieving and cattle rustling became so common, citizens formed vigilante groups to maintain order. In the upper Brazos valley there were fence cutting wars between ranchers and farmers.

Discovery of oil near Ranger in 1915 shot that town's population up from 1,000 to 25,000 in a year. Parker county became famed for peaches and watermelons. Freeport, at the river's mouth, shipped vast quantities of sulphur. Waco, seat of Baylor university, built a glass factory and a tire plant. Engineers dammed the river to form Possum Kingdom lake and Lake Whitney.

RESPONSIBILITY

What the parent does makes a more lasting impression than what he says. This is equally true of teaching safe driving practices. Parents remember, whenever you drive with your children, that even a very small child can be influenced by the attitudes and behavior of the driver.

The following rules are offered as a guide to parents in the traffic safety education of their children. 1. Set a good example for your children by your own alertness and caution in traffic. 2. Check with your children's school to be sure that your own safety lessons are consistent with what the children are taught at school. 3. Teach your children to obey all traffic safety rules—to wait for the "go" signal, to look both ways before crossing the street and to watch for turning traffic before starting across.

RANGERS LEADING-LOSING

RJC's 'Snag' Hanson Leads In Pioneer

San Angelo quarterback Jackie Hathorn and Arlington State college halfback Calvin Lee took advantage of early football openings last week to establish themselves as top contenders for offensive honors in the Pioneer conference this fall.

Lee scored three touchdowns and kicked one extra point in the Rebels' 25-0 victory over Wharton to grab the scoring lead with 19 points and place second to Hathorn in rushing with 71 yards in 10 carries. Hathorn scored all three Rams' touchdowns in a 19-7 opening win over the Hardin-Simmons freshmen. He ranks second to Lee in scoring with 18 points and holds the rushing lead with 76 yards in 30 carries.

Bobby Walls of Tarleton State College compiled the best rushing average last week. He carried the ball five times for 54 yards and a 10.8 yards-per-try average as the TSC Plovoys topped Allen academy, 20-12.

J. D. Hanson, Ranger Junior college halfback, demonstrated his ability as a pass receiver and kick returner, though his team lost its opener to Paris, 7-20, last week. Hanson returned two kick-offs for a total of 37 yards and caught two passes for 25 yards. This gave him the conference lead in both those departments.

Quarterback Ewing McLauren completed the two long passes to Hanson in five passing attempts to lead all passers in total yards and average-per-completion, with 85-for-42.5.

Jerry Flemmons, TSC quarterback, had the best completion average with four-for-six and a 79-yard total. Hathorn pops up again a close third in this department with four successes in eight attempts, for 69 yards. Bobby Manning, ASC quarterback tossed the Rebels' only complete pass, good for 25 yards.

The battle for team honors again shapes up as a two-way race between defending champion San Angelo and 1955 runner-up ASC, which finished one-two in most departments last year.

San Angelo's Rams unveiled a well-balanced offense that ate up a total of 361 yards in the opener last week. ASC reeled off 252 yards on the ground to top San Angelo's 239, but the Rams' took the passing lead with 122 yards via that method.

TSC passed for 98 yards and Ranger for 85, with ASC bringing up the rear with a mere 25 yards on aerials. The Plovoys rank third in rushing with 170 yards in the first game, and Ranger is fourth with 99 yards.

Defensively, Arlington state allowed its first opponent 106 total yards, to hold a slight edge over San Angelo.

The Rebels were the only team not scored upon last week, and grabbed the scoring lead with their 25 points against Wharton.

Schreiner institute will make its 1956 football debut this week at Victoria college, giving the Pioneer conference a full five-game slate. Other games find ASC hosting potent Del Mar, TSC at Paris, San Angelo hosting Texas Tech fresh and Ranger at Tyler.

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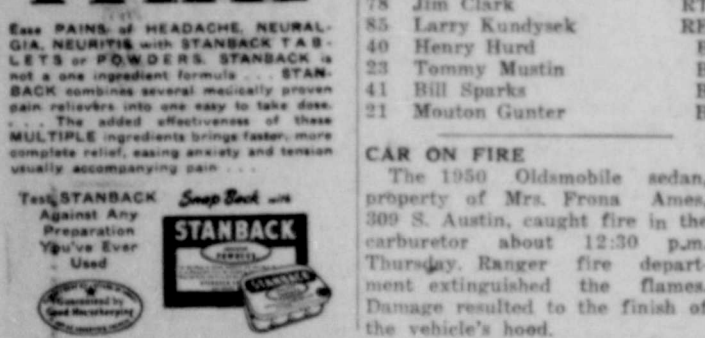
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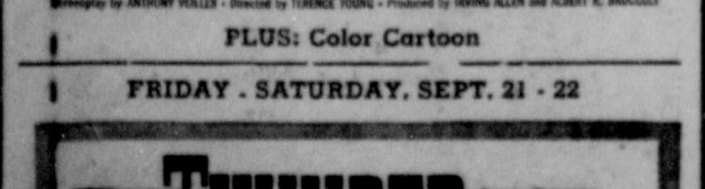

aces this year, we are providing a glossary of terms which will help clear away some of the shrouds of confusion that might otherwise prevail. Of course, experts, such as you, and current players and ex-players who know all about it, do not need this information:

Single Wing—this has nothing to do with crippled airplanes or wounded birds; it's an offensive formation built around a half-back who stations himself four or five yards behind the line and is flanked by the three other members of the backfield.

T-formation—another offensive formation built around the quarter-back who stands directly behind the center and either passes or hands the ball off to one of the other performers who arrange themselves in a horizontal row behind him, thus giving the appearance of a "T."

Statue of Liberty—a deceptive, though age-old play, in which a back or end takes the ball from another back who has assumed a passing stance. The next time you get to see the old girl with her torch aloft you might recall her likeness to a frantic halfback looking for a friendly campaigner who will take the pig skin off his hands before he becomes bloodied by a determined foe.

Flat pass—a short pass to either side of the field which travels a greater distance laterally than it does beyond the line of scrimmage.

Belly series—no connection with "medic." This is a series of T-formation plays built around the fullback who tries to create the impression that he has the ball on every play. Sometimes he does until the other teams gets a bellyful and bends his suit.

Mousetrap—an offensive maneuver in which a defensive tackle or guard is lured across the line of scrimmage, only to be uprooted from either side by offensive linemen. This gentle touch of humor is probably the most "down-to-earth," literally speaking, known to man.

Of course this doesn't answer all the questions that may come to mind during a football game. It's a complicated sport and seems to be getting more so each year. If the play is too difficult to follow or the backs who "go running by on their way to do or die," become an indistinct blur, better adjust your set. If that doesn't do the job, try some drops in your eyes to drive away the cobwebs.

Of course, if all else fails there are two other alternatives open to you: give up the whole thing as bad business or ask your 11-year-old son to explain it all to you—and don't think he can't!

HOME FIRE FACTS AND FIRE SAFETY IN THE HOME

Home is where more than 7000 of the 10,000 building fires occur annually in Texas.

Home is where 400 of the 500 deaths by fire occur annually in Texas.

Home is where more than 200 of the 400 deaths by fire that occur annually in Texas involve children under 14 years of age and persons over 65 years of age.

Home is where the annual loss of life by fire ranks third among causes of accidental deaths, being led only by motor vehicle accidents and falls.

Home is where the average Texan spends more than two-thirds of his time, and where the average person is perhaps more careless with fire than any other place.

A fire burn is always painful and often disfiguring. Asphyxiation by fire gases is responsible for a majority of fire deaths, and this fact makes fresh ventilation of great importance in the home and elsewhere.

Fire deaths are principally due to burns and to the inhalation of carbon monoxide and other gaseous products of combustion.

These home fire facts make the prevention of loss of life or personal injury by fire the first objective of all fire protection, and saving property secondary.

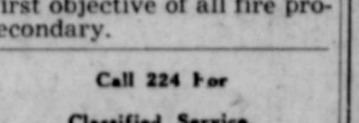

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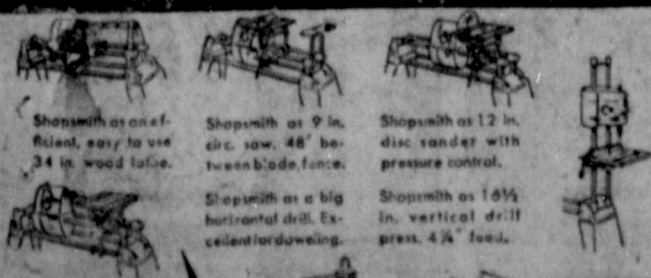

Bastrop State Park With 2300 Acres Is Ideal Camp Spot

Bastrop state park in the famous Lost Pines of Texas exhibits some of the finest work of the Civilian Conservation Corps, both in design and craftsmanship. Red ironstone was used in the construction of the main park buildings and the cabins of "Pioneer Village." The stone fitted excellently into the architect's plans that feature equal massive chimneys, extreme batter of walls and rickish roof lines.

The park's 2300 acres make possible the inclusion of features omitted in smaller parks for lack of room. Its refectory is large enough for a large dining room, a separate cafe, and the park office. There is broad flagstone terracing on one side and smooth dance terracing on the other. Wood and stone carving in this building is remarkable.

The swimming pool is one of the largest in the state, with kiddie-pools at both ends. Chemically treated water is sprayed into the pool, maintaining a pleasant temperature.

The Lost Pines golf course is roomy with both tree and water hazards.

The large group camp has a normal capacity of 125 occupants and can be enlarged to care for 150 or more. Besides its dormitories and facility buildings, the group camp has a large recreation hall, a combination kitchen and mess hall with walk-in refrigerators, large ranges and a complete supply of utensils. An administration building and cooks' quarters make the camp operation easy.

Day campers and picnickers have large shaded areas for their use.

Countless fishing places had become over-populated with stunted perch which were detrimental to stocks of desirable species, and therefore detrimental to fishing as a general rule."
