

This equipment could not be carried under the back seat cushion because that is where the side curtains were stored. When an Old Ford Driver was caught out in a shower, everybody piled out to help put up the curtains. These did pretty well in keeping out the rain until they had been used three or four times, and then all the isinglass windows would begin to fall out and they were put up only for Style. Most drivers would cut a hole in the curtains on the front left hand side so he could stick his head




