And there was the deer that shot the hunter. Ed Stanley of Weed Heights, Nevada, had drawn first blood by shooting the deer, and as Stanley bent over his prey, the deer gave a lusty kick, hit the rifle and — bang! Stanley went to the hospital with a bullet in his knee.

In Knoxville, Tenn., Golden Gibson reached absent-mindedly for a cigarette, stuck a two-inch firecracker in his mouth and lit it. From his hospital bed he announced he had given up smoking.

In Alpena, Mich., Roger Cole's car was run into by a house. He was parked on the shoulder of U. S. Highway 23 when a house-moving crew approached, and the side of the house clipped the side of Cole's car.

In Dallas, Mrs. Edward Lee Coward investigated a noise in the bedroom, reported back to her husband, "Honey, there's a car in your bed." There was, too. The auto had missed a turn in a sky-scraper parking garage next to the hotel where the Cowards lived, leaped six feet through space and crashed through the wall of a third-floor bedroom, landing in Coward's bed.

Mrs. Loretta Lewis, of Charlotte, N.C., considered herself lucky when her car landed at the bottom of a 50-foot embankment alongside a railroad track while she remained unhurt. She felt even luckier seconds later when a train roared by, side-swiped the wreckage of the car, and she was still unhurt.

Ranger May Get Big Turkey Meet Here

Ranger may be in line for a gigantic meeting of all the turkey growers in this section of the state as the result of an invitation extended Thursday night by the Central Texas Turkey Growers Ass'n which met at the Ranger Chamber of Commerce.

Hardly Tidwell, of Desdemona told members of the association of a recent visit he made to Texas A & M College and a conference he held with heads of the research department and virus laboratories. Tidwell said he learned in this conference that Texas A&M was planning a series of four meetings to be held in widely separated sections of the State, and these meetings would take the form of "schools" to be conducted by heads of the research department in cooperation with the Texas Live-stock Sanitary Commission.

Tidwell obtained a promise from A & M officials that one of the meetings would be held "somewhere" in this area, probably in January or February, and the Association voted here Thursday night to call that "somewhere" down specifically and have the schools conducted in Ranger.

The Association authorized Tidwell to finish negotiations with the College to hold the meetings in Ranger, and a formal invitation was extended by R. V. Galloway for the group to meet here and promised to help with the publicity and everything else necessary to make the meeting a success.

Members of the Central Texas Turkey Growers Ass'n voted unanimously to accept the Ranger invitation, and to do everything necessary to get the other meeting scheduled here.

Tidwell, who is one of the largest turkey growers in Eastland County, having raised about 15,000 turkeys this year on his ranch near Desdemona, said the A & M meeting would be educational and instructive, and would inform the growers as well as the public in regard to various diseases of flocks, which are always confronting the industry, and how to control them.

Growers, Processors, County Agents, Vocational Ag Teachers and Feed Dealers from a 12 or 15-county area will be invited to attend the meeting in Ranger, as it will be the only one held in this area by A & M College.

Hart Fraser of Cisco is president of the Central Texas Turkey Growers Association and presided over the meeting here Thursday night. Mrs. Aubrey Kincaid of Ranger is secretary.

The Ranger High School Bulldogs brought their 1956 football season to a close Friday night in a tie with Winters for second place in District 7-AA by scrapping the favored Blizzards to a 13-13 deadlock before one of the slimmest crowds ever to attend a high school football game in Ranger.

Vast sections of empty seats spread all over Bulldog Stadium as the hardy faithful huddled under piles of blankets to witness the performance of two clubs whose efficiency was cut into deeply by the biting cold that closed around everybody like the inside of a deep freeze. As many people were watching from automobiles as were sitting in the stands.

Neither side was able to muster up the drive and speed they showed in previous games and the fact that they were able to get up any steam at all was a tribute to both eleven.

Favored Winters, who was doped to win by at least eight points, came out a little better statistically but the points on the scoreboard were exactly even and that's what the boys pay off on when all the bets are in.

Ray B. Lilley Is New Owner Crawford Drug

He was on the ground floor from the time the talk of sale started and he knew what the business was.

Lilley is himself a registered pharmacist, a graduate of the University of Texas School of Pharmacy. He is married and has three children, Stephen, 6, who is in his first year of school, Theresa, 4, and Paula, 3. He will move his family here just as soon as he can find a place to live, not later than mid-December, he hopes.

For the time being the Crawford's will remain with the firm until Lilley becomes thoroughly adjusted and settled, and the firm's name will remain the same, until further notice.

The band played a musical number dedicated to the sweetheart entitled "Ain't She Sweet."

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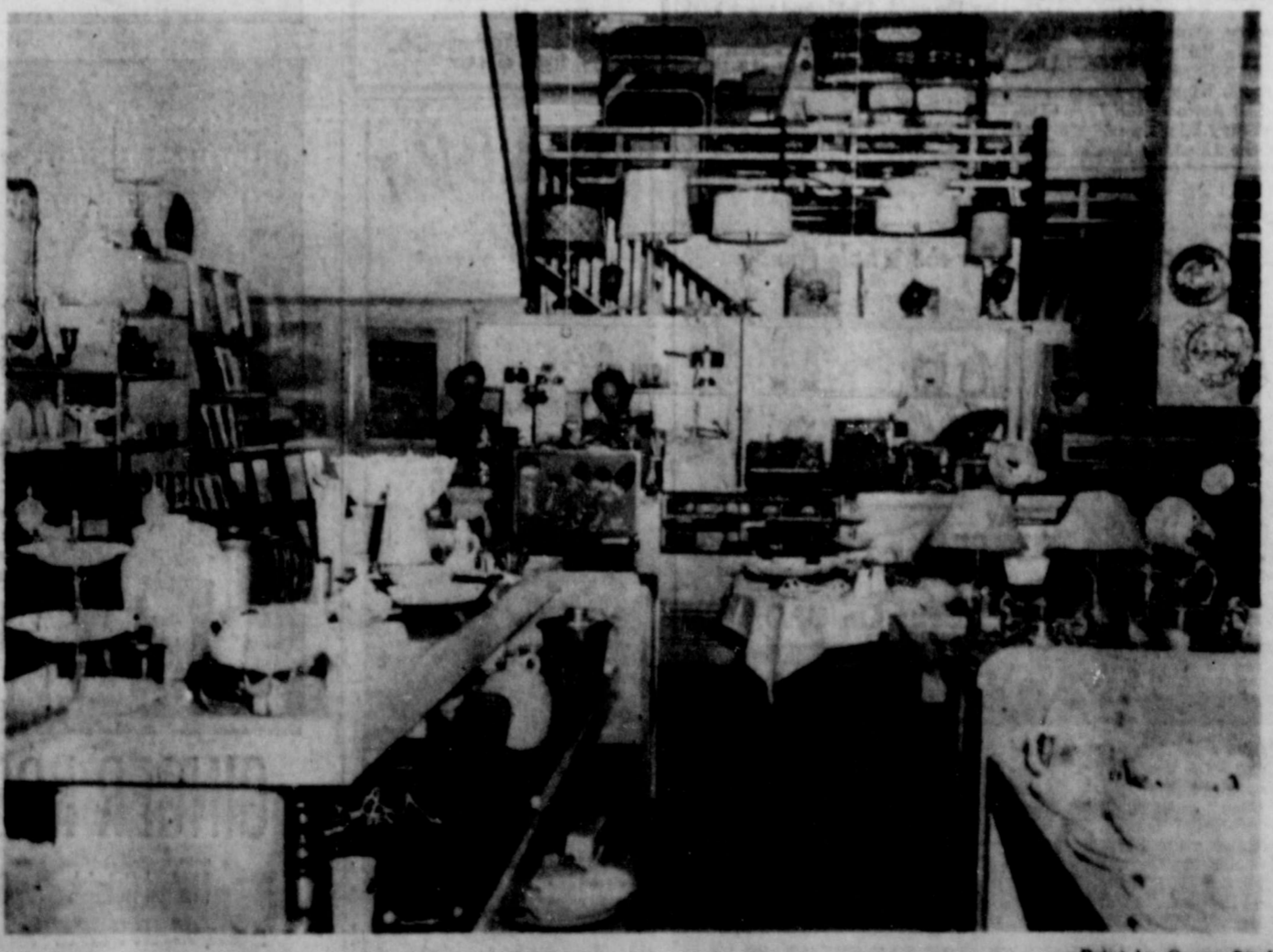

Paul Hinds had everybody on both sides of the stadium holding their breaths when the score stood 13-13 and he had a kick for extra point coming up. Winters probably prayed a little faster and a little harder than Ranger because when Hinds drove his toe into the ball it went sailing wide of the mark in one of the few misses the star quarterback has had all year. The fact that Hinds was badly shaken up a couple of plays previously and almost had to leave the game may have had something to do with it, but he had that as it may, the ball sailed wide and it was a splendid try nevertheless.

Winters drew first blood as a direct result of a 79-yard run turned in by their right half Maurice Hollie. Paul Hinds miraculously caught this gent and stopped him from behind on Ranger's 1-yard line, and moments later Winters fumbled with Ranger recovering on the one. The Bulldogs failed to gain, however, and Hinds punted out with the Blizzards returning to the 30. From there they worked the ball down to the 6 from which point quarterback Johnny Pope carried it over and Mack Young converted, making the score 7-0, as the first quarter ended.

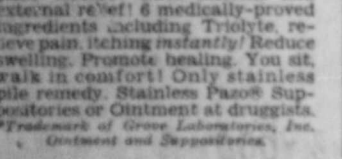

Driver Training May Soon Be Required Course

High School Principal Charlie Garrett told members of the Lions Club Thursday that Driver Training courses in the schools may soon be required subjects for graduation. Garrett was principal speaker at the Thursday luncheon and talked on the driver training program in the schools, pointing out that it was now considered so important by the state that it is due to become a required subject sooner or later.

Principal Garrett said statistics showed that the greatest number of accidents were caused by the 16-25 year age group, with the ages 16-18 causing most of them in this bracket, and with the 16-year-olds causing most of them in the 16-18 year bracket. He said since the automobile had come into being around 1900 it had killed more people than had lost their lives in all the wars this country had fought since the time of George Washington.

Figures compiled by the State Highway Patrol show that fewer teen-agers have accidents who have taken driver-training than any other group of people.

The Driver Training Course usually lasts one semester, at least six weeks of which are spent in classroom study. The student must also have completed at least six hours of actual driving before he is tested for a driver's license. The drivers tests are given by the State Highway Patrol Officer.

A total of 1,146 4-H Club boys and girls and Future Farmers took part in the junior livestock and poultry exhibits during the 1956 State Fair of Texas, breaking all previous records for participants. They came from 196 out of the 254 counties in the state.

Acker Everett Gets Promotion

Acker Everett, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Everett of Ranger, has received his second class promotion to Electrical Engineer 2nd Class, it has been learned here. Acker is presently aboard the USS Current. After Christmas he will be stationed in Morria Island as an Electrical Technician with a submarine fleet.

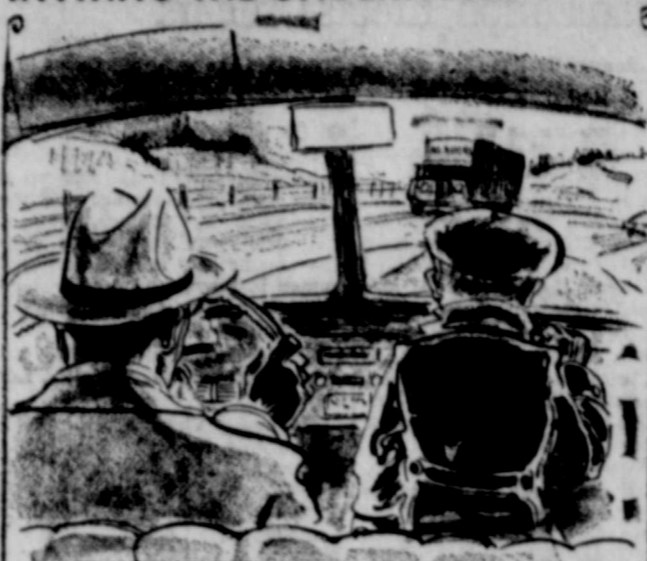
