

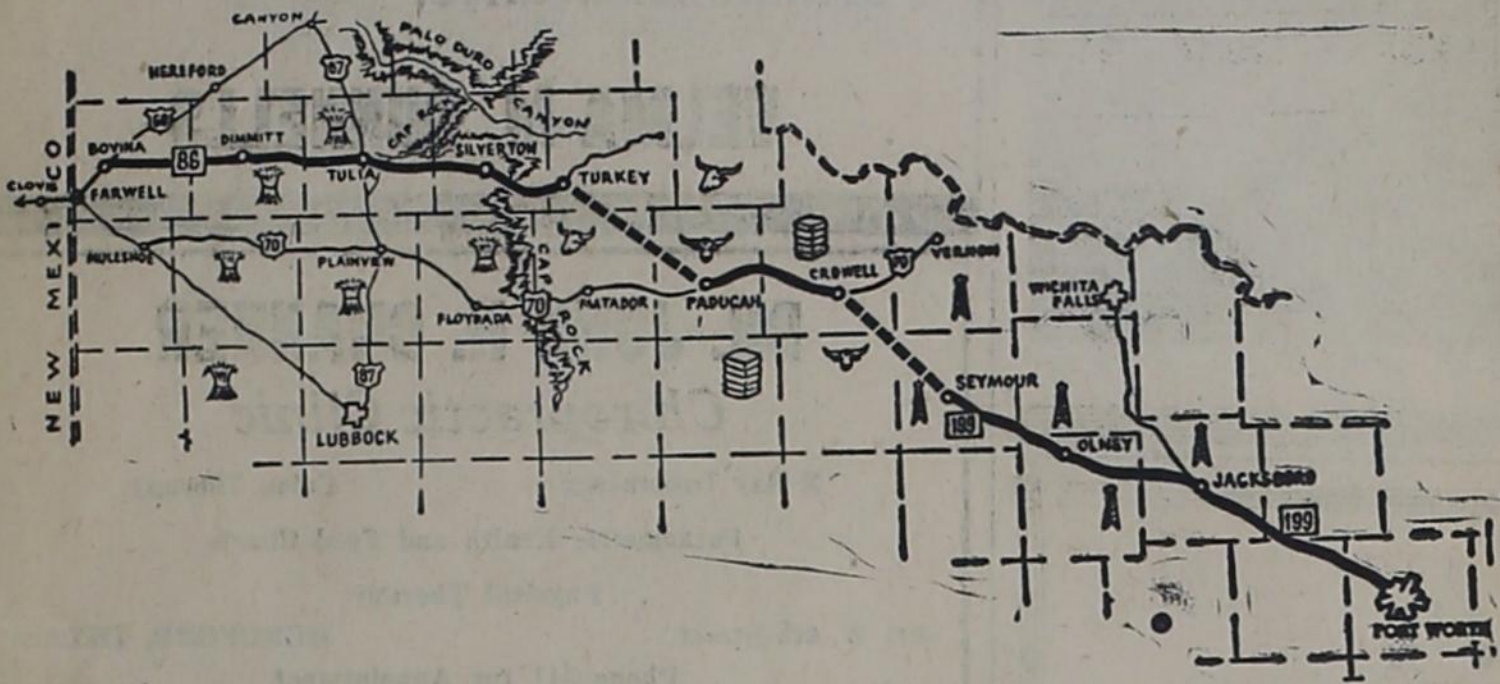

Far-Reaching Highway Improvement Plans for West Texas



Sketch shows proposed improvements and extension of State Highway No. 199 from Seymour (its present terminus) northwestward through Crowell, Paducah, Turkey, Quitaque, Silverton, Tulia, and Dimmitt to Bovina on U. S. Highway 60, just east of the Texas-New Mexico border. Heavy line from Fort Worth to Seymour indicates present State Highway 199. Broken line shows sections between Seymour and Crowell and between Paducah and Turkey which lack construction, and when completed, will shorten the distance into Fort Worth westward from Crowell along U. S. 70 through Paducah, Matador, Floydada, Plainview and points west by 17 miles, and by 32 miles from Turkey, Quitaque, Silverton, Tulia, Dimmitt, Canyon and Amarillo.

GROUP FORMED TO PUT STATE HIGHWAY 199 IN SPOTLIGHT

Communities from over a 350-mile area—from Fort Worth to Dimmitt in Castro County—have banded together under the name of Highway 199 Northwest Extension Association to work for an improved highway that will move their West Texas country 32 miles closer to Fort Worth.

Good roads advocates meeting recently, Tuesday, March 18, 1947, in Seymour included representatives from Turkey, Paducah, Olney, and Fort Worth. From this meeting came plans for improvements along the route by closing existing gaps between Seymour and Crowell, and between Paducah and Turkey. Other plans include unification of the route numbering from Fort Worth to Bovina in Parmer County on U. S. 60 through extension of the present State Highway 199—between Fort Worth and Seymour—from Seymour northwestward over proposed new construction from Seymour to Crowell, along present U. S. 70 to Paducah, along new construction to Turkey, and thence along and supplanting State Highway 86 from Turkey westward through Quitaque, Silverton, Tulia, and Dimmitt to Bovina.

Hubert Lee, Paducah, was elected chairman; Lee Vardy, School Superintendent, Turkey, vice-chairman; and J. O. Butler, Seymour, secretary-treasurer. Two committees were appointed to assemble data for the nine counties along the route, pertaining to marketing and transportation needs, and a right-of-way committee, whose commitments from those county responsibility would be to secure courts concerned with right-of-way problems in extending and improving the proposed route, and the proper assembling of said data into an acceptable form for presentation to the State Highway Commission at a later date.

Crowell, County Seat of Foard County, was selected for the next meeting.

It was brought out at the Seymour meeting that in addition to the mileage saving and unification and simplification of the route under one number (199), the plan also would open a popular week-end motor trail from Fort Worth and Dallas to Palo Duro Canyon State Park.

LAST RITES HELD FOR SHERIFF BROWN SUN.

Funeral services for Garland Wiley Brown, Sheriff of Castro County for the past 13 years, were held Sunday afternoon in the Dimmitt Baptist Church, with the pastor, Rev. M. J. Lee, officiating, assisted by Rev. Ural S. Sherrill, pastor of the Dimmitt Methodist Church.

Sheriff Brown, who had been confined to hospitals at Lubbock and Dimmitt for the past few weeks, was 58 years old and had lived in Castro County since 1917. Prior to becoming a peace officer Mr. Brown was a Castro county farmer.

The high esteem in which Sheriff Brown was held by the people throughout this area was attested to by the large throng of sorrowing friends and relatives who gathered to show their respect as last rites were conducted for the popular peace officer Sunday. The floral offering was large and most beautiful.

Sheriffs from throughout the Panhandle, including Bill Adams of Amarillo, were honorary pallbearers at the service. Highway patrol cars provided escort for the procession.

Active pallbearers were Clem Maples, Lint Merritt Tim Height, Olan Rice, Percy Estes, Houston Fowlkes, Peck Wyer and Goodwin Miller.

Mr. Brown, a native of Mississippi, came to West Texas in 1917. A decade later he moved to Castro county, and in 1934 he was elected sheriff.

He is survived by his wife, a daughter, Mrs. C. G. Maples, Jr., and two sons, Bernard and J. R. Brown all of Dimmitt; his mother, Mrs. F. E. Brown of Lockney; three sisters, Mrs. Hugh Counts, Lockney, Mrs. Suzetta Draper, San Antonio, and Mrs. Reed Harper, Modesto, Calif., and three grandchildren, Sonny and Wayne Brown and Judith Mayfield.

Interment was in the Dimmitt cemetery.

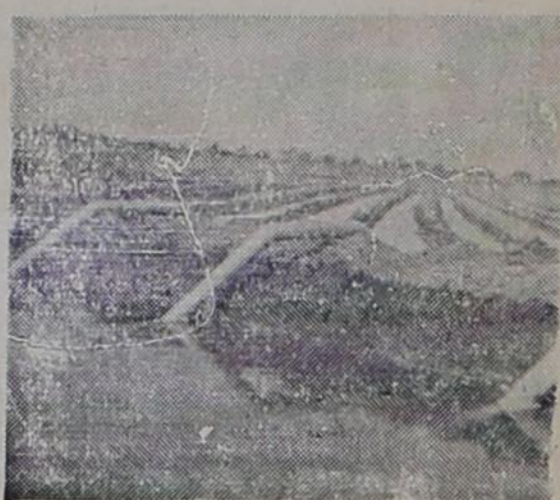

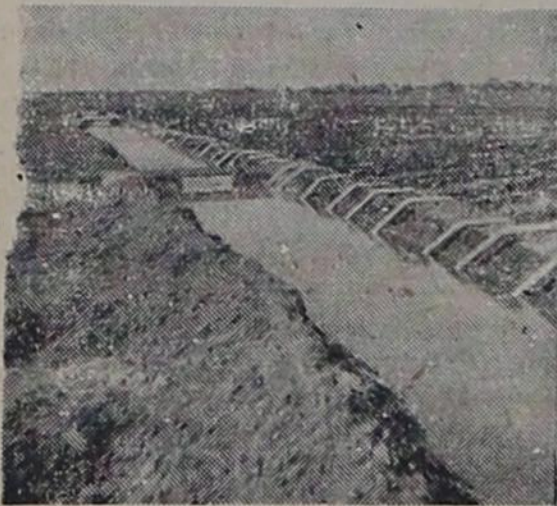

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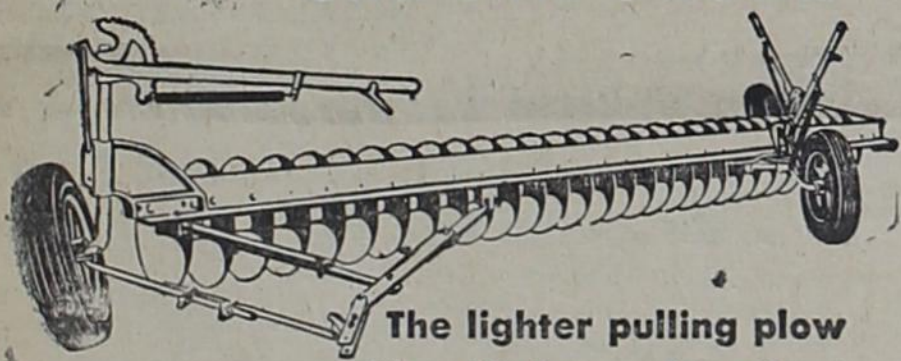

In a magazine article entitled, "Tolerance, we read...no human being can with certainty say what is truth." And as the extreme of tolerance, we are reminded of Voltaire's epigram...I will fight your opinions with my life, but I will fight to the death for your right to hold them."

But when we begin to really think about tolerance, we begin to wonder. "Is it," as Daniel A. Lord, S. J., writes...anything other than a sign of mental confusion and personal cowardice? Is it something we ought to cultivate or root out of our minds? Were decent people tolerant of Germany's latest attempt to rule the world? Or Mussolini's stab-in-the-back of France? Or the Jap's sneak attack on Pearl Harbor?

And what about Christ Himself? Was the Son of God tolerant of the money-changers in the Temple? 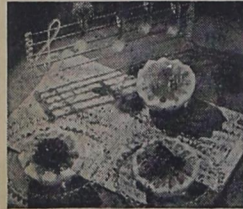
