## All Ranger Churches Plan Easter Services

### 1-in. Falls; Easter Hat Weather Is Doubtful

Some rain gauges measured an inch, others a hair's breadth less than an inch, but for the record the Times checked up a full 1-inch of rain that fell here early Friday morning.

Ranger may or may not have Easter Hat Weather over the weekend as the forecast calls for partly cloudy weather with scattered showers and whether one of them will scatter in Ranger is anybody's guess.

Regardless of what the weather might be doing, Ranger churches are expected to be overflowing Sunday as people of all faiths fill the Sanctuaries in commemoration of Easter when Christ rose from the tomb and thus laid the foundation upon which all Christian religion is based.

All churches have announced that special services have been planned for this holy occasion and many of them are outlined elsewhere in today's Times.

Following a special Easter service Sunday morning at the First Baptist Church when the pastor's subject will be "Alive in the Spirit," the Sanctuary Choir of the Church will be highlighted at the evening service with an hour-

long Easter Cantata entitled "The Seven Last Sayings of Christ."

A similar program has been scheduled for the First Methodist Church when the pastor, the Rev. R. Herman Boyd will speak at the morning service on the subject, "At The Dawn of A New Day." Evening services have been given over to the Chancel Choir which will present a program of Sacred Easter Music.

The Church of Christ at Mesquite and Rusk Streets will have for its theme Sunday "The Lord's Supper," and impressive services have been planned for both morning and night services.

At the Eastside Baptist Chapel the annual Spring Review begins with the pastor doing his preaching and Roy Langston of Temple having charge of the song services. The pastor has said that Easter will be the theme of the morning services at the revival Sunday.

If announcements are lacking from other churches of the city it is because they were not turned in to the Times, but all of them will commemorate in one form or another the sacred day of the resurrection.

It is also expected that many a new Easter dress and many a perky Easter bonnet will make their first appearance all over town because it has been noted that women will wear them if it snows.

## Brashear Game Bill Passes; Up to Senate

Rep. Paul Brashear's Game Bill in a watered down form that did not mention the word "fishing" anywhere in it, passed the House of Representatives Wednesday and has gone to the Senate for further action. If approved by the Senate, the Bill will be signed into law by the governor, providing he doesn't vet it.

Final version of the Bill, H. B. No. 732, read thus:

An Act relating to hunting of wild game on the Sabanna Game Preserve, Eastland County, Texas, prohibiting the hunting of wild deer and wild turkey, providing that the Game and Fish Commission has authority and shall conduct scientific investigations on wild life on the Sabanna Game Preserve, providing that the Game and Fish Commission shall have the authority to regulate the preserving, taking and hunting of wild turkey and deer on the Sabanna Game Preserve, fixing a penalty and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. No person shall hunt, take, kill, or attempt to hunt, take or kill any wild turkey or deer within the boundaries of the Sabanna Game Preserve, Eastland County, Texas.

The Bill then goes on through Eleven Sections setting out various (Continued on Page Four)

## Funeral Services For John Jones Held Saturday

Funeral services for John F. Jones, 90, a former resident of Ranger, were held Saturday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock in Killingsworth Funeral Chapel, with the Rev. Ralph Perkins, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Ranger, officiating.

Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery, with grandsons acting as pallbearers.

Mr. Jones was a temporary resident of Ranger at the time of his death, alternating his residence with his daughter, Mrs. Grover McGowan of Ranger, and a son, Arthur Jones of Lubbock. He died in a Lubbock hospital at 2:20 p.m. Thursday.

Mr. Jones was born Nov. 25, 1866, in Georgia, and moved to Ranger from Henquill in 1919 where he remained until 1946. He was a pumpier with the Illinois Pipeline Company, now Premier Oil Refining Company. He married Alta Arnold on Nov. 13, 1890, in Geneva, Texas. She died on Nov. 18, 1943. Mr. Jones was a member of the Baptist Church of Geneva.

Survivors besides Mrs. McGowan and Arthur, include two more daughters, Mrs. Verdie Chaney of Dallas and Mrs. Milton Loft of Waco; one brother, C. A. Jones of Sulby, 12 grandchildren, 10 great grandchildren, and one great-great grandchild.

## Lions See Film on Cancer Control

Members of the Ranger Lions Club saw a film Thursday on Cancer Control and the seven symptoms of cancer for which everyone should always be on the alert.

The film was prepared by the American Cancer Society and brought to the Lions by Dr. W. P. Watkins, program chairman for the day. The special showing was also in observance of Cancer Control Month, which is April.

The seven symptoms for which all people are warned to be on guard against are, (1) Unusual bleeding or discharge; (2) A lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere; (3) A sore that does not heal; (4) Persistent change in bowel or bladder habits; (5) Persistent hoarseness or cough; (6) Persistent indigestion or difficulty in swallowing; and (7) Any change in a wart or mole.

The film pointed out that cancer strikes one in five, and that a cancer of the womb is the leading cancer killer among women, but stressed that cancer could be cured if it was discovered soon enough and the proper treatment was begun. The film urged people not to panic if cancer was discovered, but to see a doctor at once and to beware of "quick" cures.

**WHAT'S... COOKING?**

As we celebrate Easter this year, we do it for the 1632nd time on this approximate date.

The day on which the Christian world commemorates the emergence of the Lord from the tomb was fixed 1632 years ago by the First Council of Christian Churches at Nicea.

The day was fixed for a very practical reason. Up until that time, pilgrims by the thousands traveled to the Holy Land to celebrate the Resurrection. Church leaders decided that Easter should be fixed at a time when the moon was full for the convenience and protection of the pilgrims—the protection being against bandits.

So under the Council's ruling, Easter comes on the first Sunday following the full moon on or after the vernal equinox, the equinox being that season of the year when the sun crosses the plane of the earth's equator making day and night all over the earth of equal length. In the Gregorian calendar this date falls on March 21.

The method of calculating the full moon is fixed on ancient procedures, and while modern astronomers do not always agree with these conclusions, the custom has prevailed down through the centuries.

Under this rule the latest date on which Easter can possibly fall is April 25, which happened in 1943 but won't happen again until 2038. This Easter, being the 21st, is therefore within four days of being the very latest possible time it could come.

To produce some uniformity to the observance of Easter, and to bring the wide variations into focus, the British Parliament in the 1920s suggested that Easter should be observed on the first Sunday after the second Saturday in April. (For this year that would have been April 14.) However, this change was not to become effective unless accepted by international agreement, and so far this agreement has not been forthcoming. The world has been too busy doing something else.

### What's the Use of an Abstract

### Here Is The Complete Text Of Game Bill

Here is the complete text of H. B. No. 732 as sponsored by Rep. Paul Brushbear of Cisco and as passed by the House. The bill now awaits Senate action, after which the Governor will presumably sign it into law.

A BILL To Be Enacted.

An Act relating to hunting of wild game on the Sabanna Game Preserve, Eastland County, Texas, prohibiting the hunting of wild deer and wild turkey providing that the Game and Fish Commission has authority

and shall conduct scientific investigations on wild life on the Sabanna Game Preserve, providing that the Game and Fish Commission shall have authority to regulate the preserving, taking and hunting of wild turkey and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. No person shall hunt, take, kill or attempt to hunt, take or kill any wild turkey or deer within the boundaries of the Sabanna Game Preserve, Eastland County, Texas.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Game and Fish Commission to conduct from time to time, or continuously, scientific investigations and studies of the supply environment, breeding habits and so far as possible the sex ratio of the wild turkey and deer, as well as the factors affecting the increase or decrease, particularly with reference to hunting, disease, over-population and any and all other factors that enter into a reduction or an increase in the supply of wild turkey or deer, in the Sabanna Game Preserve.

Section 3. Pursuant to and based upon such studies, said Commission is authorized and directed from time to time to provide an open season or period of time when wild turkey and deer may be taken from the Sabanna Game Preserve. The Commission is granted the authority and power to provide by proclamation, rule or regulation, periods of time when it shall be lawful to take, hunt, or kill wild turkey or deer. The Commission shall also provide the means and method and the place and manner in which such wild turkey and deer may be lawfully taken, hunted or killed.

Section 4. All orders, rules and regulations pertaining to the regulation of wild turkey and deer as authorized by this Act, shall be adopted by a quorum of said Commission, and only at any regular or special Commission meeting or meetings, of the date and time of which each Commissioner shall have been notified in writing by the Executive Secretary of said Commission or his assistant in his absence, and such meetings for such purpose shall be held only in said Commissioner's office at

Austin, Texas. Any person interested shall be entitled to be heard at such meetings and to introduce evidence as to imminence of waste or depletion, as defined in this Act. Provided that six (6) members of the Commission and five (5) members of said Commission shall constitute a quorum; and provided further that no order, rule or regulation, general or local, shall be adopted at a regular or special meeting of the Commission unless and until a quorum is present.

Section 5. Orders, rules and regulations adopted by said Commission shall become effective fifteen (15) days after their adoption, except in case of emergency as provided in this Act, and shall continue in full force and effect until they shall expire by their own terms, or are revoked or amended by said Commission, or except in case of disapproval by the Commissioners Court of the Eastland County in which the rule, regulation, or order is to be in effect. The Commissioners Court shall approve or disapprove the Commission's rule, regulation, or order at its next regular meeting occurring more than five (5) days after the said rule, regulation, or order is promulgated. If approved the rule, regulation, or order becomes effective immediately in accordance with the terms of this Act. If disapproved no public hearing on a similar proposal for the county in which the Commissioners Court so disapproved said rule, regulation, or order may be held for a period of six (6) months.

Section 6. Immediately after its adoption a copy of each order, rule or regulation adopted by said Commission shall be numbered and filed in the office of the Secretary of State, and the office of the County Clerk and the County Attorney of Eastland County, and a mimeographed copy shall be furnished to each employee of said Commission.

Section 7. The particular regulatory powers herein granted to said Commission shall not be construed to limit other and general powers conferred upon it by law.

Section 8. The Game and Fish Commission is hereby expressly given the power and authority to review its own orders and to modify or revise the same as it shall find the facts to warrant. Any suit that may be filed to test the validity of any proclamation, order, rule or regulation of the Commission, passed pursuant to this Act, must be brought in Eastland County, enumerated in Section 1 hereof, where such order is to be effective, and not elsewhere. Such suit shall be advanced by trial and determined as quickly as possible. In all such trials the burden of proof shall be upon the party complaining of such order, proclamation, rule or regulation to show it is invalid.

Section 9. (a) Any person who shall violate any provision of this Act, or any person who shall violate any proclamation, order, rule or regulation issued by the Game and Fish Commission under the provisions of this Act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction therefor shall be fined a sum not less than Ten Dollars (\$10) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200). Each wild turkey or deer taken or possessed in violation of this Act or of any proclamation, order, rule or regulation issued by said Game and Fish Commission shall constitute a separate offense.

(b) Any person convicted of violating this Act or any proclamation, order, rule or regulation of the Game and Fish Commission under the provisions of this Act relating to hunting in any manner, shall within the discretion of the Court or Jury trying the offense, forfeit such hunting license, for such period of time as the Court or Jury might determine, but such period of forfeiture shall not extend beyond the remainder of the license year.

(c) No person who has had his license forfeited under this Act shall be entitled to purchase or receive from said Commission, or any of its authorized agents, a similar license for such period of forfeiture; and it shall be unlawful for such person to purchase or possess another such license for such period.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this Section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined a sum not less than Ten Dollars (\$10) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200).

Section 10. If any provision of this Act or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the Act which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are declared to be severable.

Section 11. The fact that the present law does not adequately protect the wild life resources of this State, in the area enumerated in Section 1 hereof, of said county, from depletion and waste; and the further fact that the Calendar of both Houses of the Legislature are crowded, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity authorizing the suspension of the Constitutional Rule requiring Bills to be read on three several days in each House; and said Rule is hereby suspended; and this Act shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

### Letters To Editor

M. Editor:

Letter writers to newspapers, sincere or otherwise, usually fall into about 4 groups. (1) Those who have a gripe (2) Those who plead for something for themselves and/or others. (3) The "useful" type who discuss miscellaneous topics, with no prejudice, of common interest and (4) Those who are just plain scared, don't know what to say but feel that something should be done.

The present fiscal budget of 71 billion, 800 million dollars recently submitted to the Congress by the President is one of the hottest potatoes of its kind ever to come before that body for consideration. On account of its huge size and its potential effects upon the lives of every American now and in the future, if passed as is, is not only alarming our congressmen, editors, economists and statesmen, but the plain rank and file of millions of others. So high is it that it is estimated to cost every man, woman and child about \$450. Each can't pay it, you say. Under our present tax schemes you can hardly escape it. If you are one of those who, on account of conditions beyond your control, do not, then your neighbor or the family down the street, will have to pick up the tab and make it up.

Any reasonable budget set up for the normal, thrifty operation of our government is necessary. But what is alarming about the present situation is this: At the close of Roosevelt's first administration in 1936 the budget stood at 8 billion. When Truman went out of office in 1953 his budget was 53 billion. In fiscal 1957, we have what you see. This is not a partisan, political issue as both Republicans and Democrats are for reducing it. Even Eisenhower himself says it's too high and dares Congress to reduce it. It is.

Aside from the cost, we must look at another aspect of this monstrosity — what it is doing to our country and our economy. You can't have big spending without big inflation. You can't have big inflation without high prices. The two go hand in hand. Higher prices bring on higher operating costs and business has to charge these extra costs to the customer. You business men check up on your costs for the past five or six years. Likely you will find, as I have, that these costs have increased more than 200 per cent.

How does inflation operate? If you bought a government bond back in 1946 for \$75 it matured in 1956 at \$100. But the \$100 you received won't buy now what the \$75 bought in 1946. The United States Government didn't really pay off that \$100. It merely borrowed the \$100 from somebody else with the promise to pay the new customer \$133.33 10 years hence. The philosophy of inflation finance of managed debt is to pay less and less for more and more until finally nothing is paid at all.

What to do about it? There are some who say we are stuck and can do nothing. They are the defeatist type. Good people, too. But I think we can. In the proper spirit and with a just cause, the American people can do anything they want to do if enough of them will arouse themselves and get to hollering. As an evidence of this fact Congress is now in the process of slashing millions from the budget every day. The House itself has already knocked off more than a billion dollars and the job has just begun. They are hearing from the people back home by the thousands.

If you want your taxes reduced, the budget must be reduced accordingly. If you are interested in this program start writing your Congressmen today. Some of those who are working hard on this task are Sam Rayburn, Speaker of the House; Congressman Omar Burdick and Martin Dies and Senator Lyndon Johnson. Others who are very much on the job are Senator Harry F. Byrd, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee; Senator William F. Knowland, Republican Senate Leader and John W. McCrackin, Democratic House Leader. All the other 20 Texas Congressmen are in the fight for reduced taxes according to letters received from the most of them. Write them all and if you need more names I have them. Just a postal card will do but a letter is better. Where you have others working for you suggest to them that they all write a card. They will, for they need a tax cut probably more than you do. I suggest that interested groups and

organizations adopt a brief resolution or statement and let members sign it. Any method used to let your congressmen know how you feel will be effective.

Let's keep fighting. If we go down like Socialist France or mighty England, let's go down fighting with our boots on and our clumps up. Write now.

functions of the Fish and Game Commission with respect to regulating wild life in the Sabanna Game Preserve, setting out penalties for violation of the hunting clauses, and giving to the Commissioners Court of Eastland County certain veto powers over regulations as provided in the Bill.

Rep. Brushbear, himself, who visited the Ranger Lions Club Thursday, told members of the club that fishing in Eastland County would not be effected in any way, nor would anything else with respect to fish and wild life in Eastland County except within the bounds of the Sabanna Game Preserve.

Elsewhere in today's Times is a copy of the Bill as it was passed by the House, and as it awaits Senate action.

Brushbear said if anyone objected to the Bill at all as it now is, they should contact the Senator from this District who is Senator Floyd Henshaw, and he might be able to stop its passage in the Senate, or change it in some manner.

Senator Bradshaw, himself, has said he would be glad to act according to the wishes of the people in Eastland County in regard to the Bill.

Brushbear said it is now out of his hands, as he had written the Bill and sponsored it and got it through the House. Any further action will have to be taken up with the Senate.

Easter was a week later this year than it might have been but for one of the old rules regulating the occasion. That rule is that when the full moon falls on a Sunday, Easter will be celebrated one week later. This year the full moon did fall on Sunday, April 14, so the old

rule became operative, for the first time in years.

The celebration of Christmas is of comparative recent origin, but Easter is at least 1632 years old — an affirmation that Christ did indeed rise from the tomb, which is the heart and core of many Christian beliefs.
