From every crossroad, hamlet and village in the United States to the mightiest of our metropolitan centers; from the most humble old age pensioner to the most powerful and influential people among an aroused citizenry, the alarm has gone out.

A delegation of high National Guard officials, accompanied by Capt. Cecil Carr, commanding officer, formally accepted the new \$80,000 National Guard armory building in Ranger Wednesday after a tour of inspection, and was handed the keys by the contractor.

Representing the Armory Board were Col. John Lyons of Dallas and Derrel Nicholson of Austin, and representing the State Board of Control was Aubrey Smelser of Austin. Insurance representatives were also on hand to give the building their final approval.

Built to serve as headquarters for Service Battery, 648th Armored Field Artillery Battalion, 49th Armored Division, the new building is one of the finest structures in Ranger and is situated in a prominent place on Highway 80 where it can be seen by hundreds of thousands of people annually.

Formal Opening Officers and men of Service Battery, in cooperation with the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, are beginning their plans for a formal dedication of the building which will be almost a state-wide affair.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, it is a matter of public knowledge that more than half of all our hospital beds are being occupied by mentally ill patients, and

WHEREAS, these sick folks are helpless in themselves to acquire the necessary attention and treatment to allow them to most nearly recover and return to their normal life, and

WHEREAS, mental illness is recognized as a menace to the public health of our community, state, and nation, and

WHEREAS, the State of Texas is now appropriating only the meager sum of \$2.50 per patient day to take care of housing, food, medical and psychiatric care, and other essentials to give the 16,000 mentally ill in the hospitals of this state a decent chance to recover, all of which is entirely inadequate, and

WHEREAS, a greatly increased interest in this health problem should be developed and maintained by our citizenship as a whole, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that our church groups, civic clubs, public school organizations, Junior College organizations, and citizens throughout our community assume their respective responsibilities and influence to the end that mental illness shall be consistently and effectively reduced in our community, state, and nation.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I, A. H. WILLIAMS, Mayor Pro-Tem of the City of Ranger, Texas, do hereby declare the week of April 28 through May 5 as Mental Health Week in the City of Ranger, and urge that all citizens, clubs, and organizations unite to carry out the purposes and intent of this resolution.

Mental Health Week Points to Crusade Against Mental Ills

Governor Price Daniel today called upon all Texans to join the crusade against mental illness, the state and nation. In proclaiming April 28 to May 4 as Mental Health Week, the Governor said, "Mental illness is no longer hopeless, as evidenced by the increased rates of improvement and recovery in our mental hospitals. We can help the mentally ill of Texas to be restored to their families and communities by concerned citizen action."

B. H. Peacock Aids Mental Program

B. H. Peacock of Ranger, has spent some time in Austin during the current session of the Texas Legislature working for a more effective program in the treatment of mentally ill. He has appeared before the House Sub-Committee on Appropriations in support of an increase in funds for the program, and has done considerable work in furthering passage of the new Mental Health Code which was the basis of a recent constitutional amendment passed by the voters of Texas.

Peacock says the present Legislature has done much in improving treatment and facilities for the mentally ill in Texas.

More Than 50 In West Texas Area Have Used Them

More than 50 other towns in the West Texas area which have taken advantage of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Clinics to discover what their people were thinking about in the way of future progress for their respective localities, have been lavish in their praise of the results obtained. Most of the towns said the clinics were not only profitable, but a lot of fun as well.

Ranger is to have one of the City-Wide Clinics all day next Thursday, May 2, and it is expected that at least 1,000 people will take part in it at some time during the day. It will be conducted by Ralph Duncan, WTCC Community Clinic expert.

Writing in the Cisco Press in 1952 when that city held one of the Clinics, editor J. W. Sisson asked, "What is the Community Clinic Worth to Cisco?"

"We asked that question," he wrote, "yesterday at a meeting of the Agriculture and Livestock Committee. And Mr. Ralph Duncan of the WTCC, who has been here all week to help with it, was quick to answer."

"Duncan" said, "This meeting alone has produced 27 different ideas for work projects and every one of them are worth a great deal to Cisco. He went on to explain that other meetings had also produced as many, or more, brand new ideas."

"Our people are thinking and talking. They're becoming increasingly conscious of the needs and opportunities of our city. The clinic is giving our people an opportunity to really examine their city and hunt for methods to improve it."

Sisson went on to say about Cisco: "And that's just what is happening. We've attended several of the meetings and the people are seriously and genuinely interested. The interest shown is the sort that it takes to build a good maintain strong communities. The clinic is going to be worth much to our city."

"When it's over, the Chamber of Commerce plans to take as many of the ideas as possible and start to work on them. Dozens of committees will be assigned to working out the projects."

Word from Kermit Another editor, writing in the Winkler County News in February of this year, has this to say: "We want to tell any of you people who, for one reason or another, might have missed the Community Clinic, you really missed something worth while."

"And it was fun, too. Those attending were given cards on which to write recommendations for improving Kermit after Winkler County. This took place after Ralph Duncan of the WTCC had given them a talk. After the cards were filled out, Duncan took some of the recommendations and read them aloud asking for further enlightenment from their originators, and this brought on more lively discussions which were interesting to the extreme."

"One of the best parts of the clinic we attended (the Store Employee Club) was the statement by Mr. Duncan that if enough people in Kermit wanted a thing and got behind it and pushed it, they'd get it."

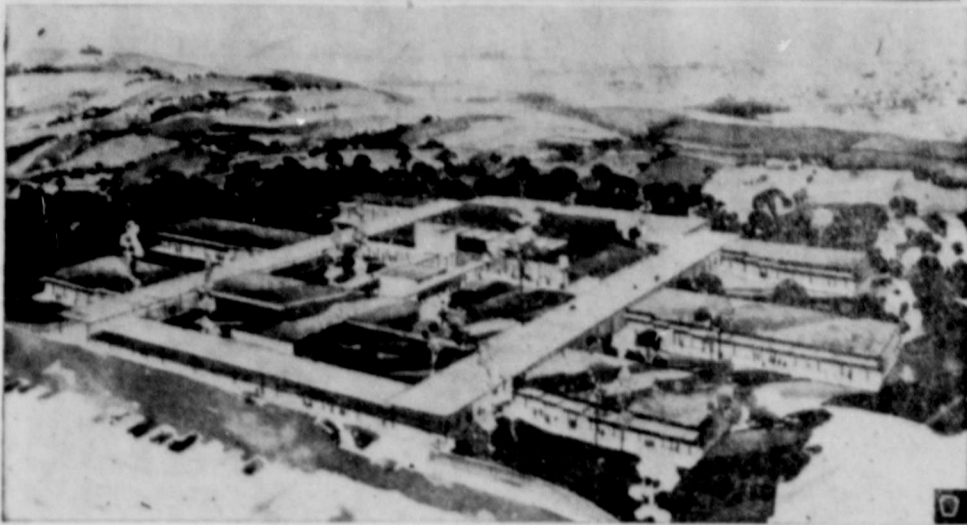

A jilting by a girl "who was both devout and beautiful" was one of the reasons for Billy Graham becoming a world famous evangelist.

Stanley High discloses this in his book, "Billy Graham: The Personal Story of a Man," a condensation of which appears in the Readers Digest coincident with the evangelist launching a massive Crusade in New York's Madison Square Garden on May 15.

While a student at the Florida Bible Institute near Tampa, young Graham, then a youth recently from North Carolina, was attracted to a beautiful co-ed.

"Billy fell hard and so did she," reports High. "Before the end of the semester they were unofficially engaged. To put an official seal on it Billy—when the time of the annual class party came around—instead of the 25-cent corsage customary for such occasions, went all out and bought her one for 50 cents.

"But it was love's lucre lost. She never wore the corsage."

Instead, she told Billy he was irresponsible, had no clear Christian purpose, and she didn't think he would ever get far or be very important, and gave her affections to another man.

To a friend, Billy wrote: "All the stars have fallen out of my sky. There is nothing to live for. We have broken up."

But the stunned young man buckled down to his studies and pursued the career which since has enabled him to preach around the world face-to-face to 25 million persons, more than any other spokesman for the faith in all Christian history, and to reach millions more by radio, films, television a newspaper column and books.

Nor were his affections long unrequited. A few years later, while still pursuing his education, he met brown-eyed Ruth Bell, daughter of Presbyterian medical missionaries to China. She was beautiful and so devout that she arose at 5 a.m. to pray.

She saw in Billy the answer to one of her prayers and they were married in 1943, a month after both were graduated from Wheaton College, near Chicago. They now have four children in their mountaintop home at Mountreat, North Carolina.

Mrs. Graham eventually met the girl who jilted Billy in Florida.

"I've wanted to meet you for a long time," said Ruth. "I've thanked the Lord so often for answering my prayer about a husband. Now I can thank you for making it possible for him to answer that prayer with Bill."

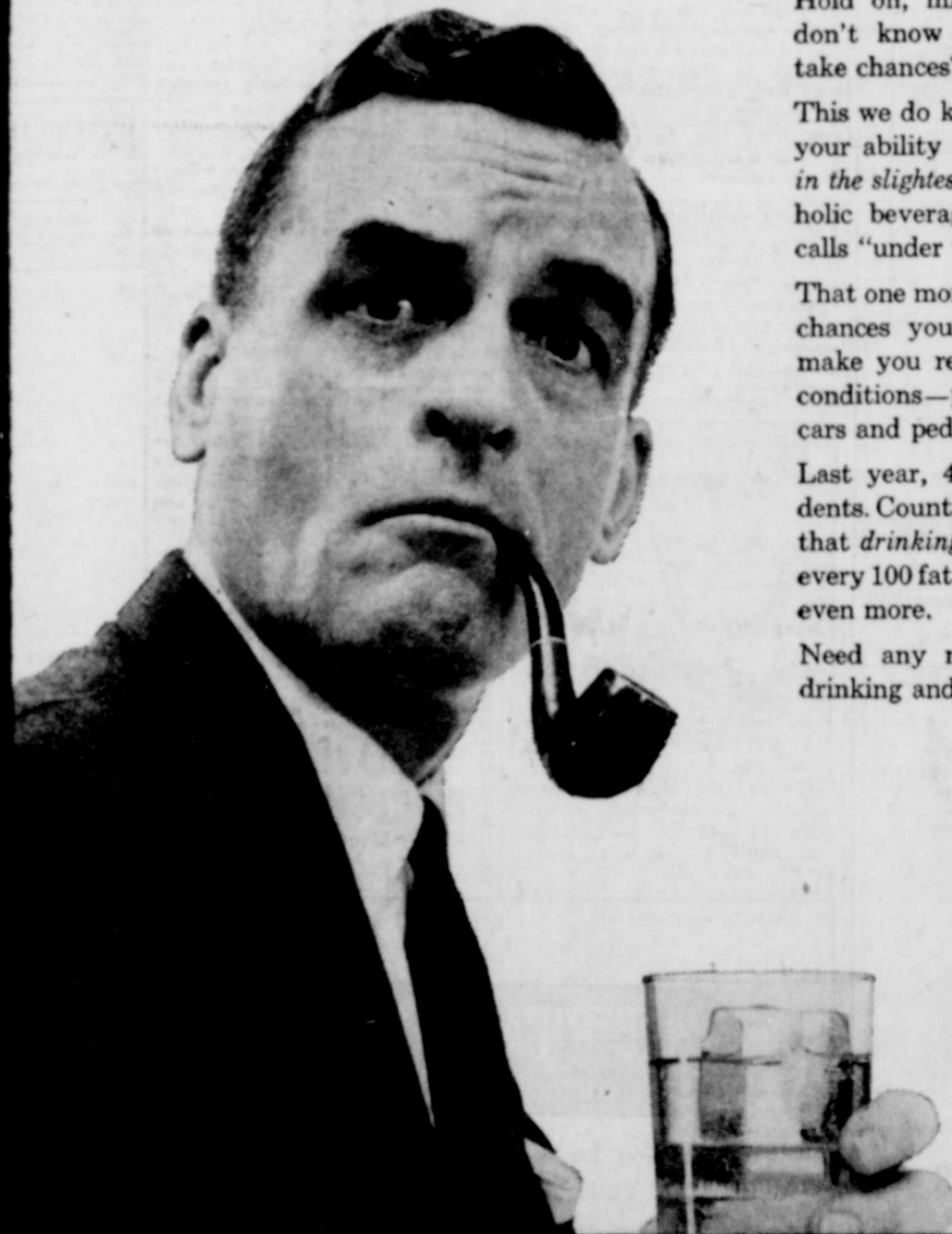

Stroud said: "I think it is pretty clear that, based on scientific data available, there's absolutely no basis to indicate that outboard motors in any way harm our fish populations or their tendency to fight or strike the angler's lure."
When it came to the subject of motors getting the blame for fishermen failing to come home with a mess of the funny money, Stroud recalled his own experience in the TVA waters. "The only way we could catch White Bass for tagging purposes was to dance spoons through the wake of the outboard motor where it bubbled right behind the boat and then we got 'em. If we didn't use the trick we just didn't catch White Bass," Stroud pointed out. Stroud then outlined the study by Dr. Karl Lagler, University of Michigan, on outboards and fish. "The Michigan group took outboards, put them on the back of good boats, tied them by harness to posts in the middle of ponds and circled them for hours and hours, day after day. Then they checked the quality of fishing. At the same time, they had nearby ponds that had no motors on them at all, and they checked the fishing there and could find absolutely no difference in quality of fishing."
The Texas Fish and Game Commission in connection with a federal-aid fishery study recently concluded additional tests which buttressed the Michigan studies. Skin-divers were used to make these underwater observations. The Texas report from fishery biologist John E. Tilton stated: "Surface noises apparently have little effect on fish at depths of over 10 feet. A 10 horsepower outboard motor is used frequently in the diving areas while observations are in progress. No difference in numbers of fish seen or general activity can be seen during periods of extensive use of the motor and periods when the motor is not in use. On one occasion the boat was run at full speed back and forth over a test area. The fish in the area completely ignored the motor noise and continued normal activity. With the exception of a small whirring noise, no effect of the motor below 10 feet was noticeable. The skin-divers ranged in depth from three to 20 feet in an attempt to evaluate the motor effect. Near bank areas a definite water surge could be felt as deep as six feet each time the boat reversed the area."
Other surface sounds are believed to have little effect on fish activity. The fish observed completely ignored common surface sounds such as movement in the boat, talking by helpers on the surface, and even low flying jet aircraft. The Texas experiment which
