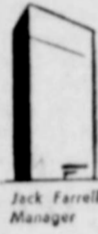

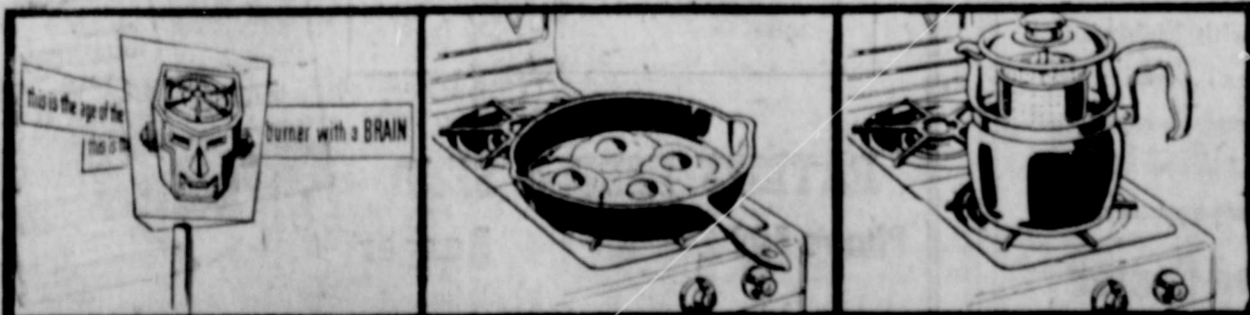

on new purchases of Series E and H saving bonds, Guy Parker, county chairman, announced today.

Parker said Series E and H bonds purchased currently will now yield 3 1/4 percent per annum, compounded semi-annually, when held to maturity. The former rate was three percent.

Parker gave the following information on the increased interest rates:

Another improvement in the new bonds is higher interest paid to holders who find they have to cash their bonds prior to maturity. Both redemption values for the new E bonds and interest payments on the new H bonds are substantially increased for the earlier years.

For example, the redemption value of a new E bond is increased so as to yield 3 percent at the end of 3 years, compared with 2 1/4 percent heretofore, and to yield 3.20 percent at the end of 6 years, compared with 2.64 percent heretofore.

The improved rates apply automatically to all E and H bonds purchased on or after February 1 persons who have bought these bonds since that date need not take any further action to assure getting the improved terms. This is true even though the E and H bonds purchased since February 1 may have imprinted on them the former (and now obsolete) tables of redemption values or interest payment scales. The issue date shown on each bond will be controlling in determining the actual redemption value or scale of interest payments, and banks and other paying agents have been furnished tables of the new values. The new E bonds mature in 3 years and 11 months and the new H bonds in 10 years and 8 months.

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

When the new junior United States Senator from Texas made his first State-wide race (in 1938 for Attorney General), your columnist handled the publicity in his campaign and we traveled together for six months.

There were lots of opportunities to observe his campaign. He was absolutely tireless and went at top speed from morning till night. When he went up to a group of, say, five men and one boy, he would shake hands with each one, including the lad, and hand him a card, as he did all the rest. I commented on this and Judge Yarborough said, "When I was a boy and a candidate came up to a group of voters, he never saw me at all and I felt 'left out.'"

In meeting a voter, the Judge

would always learn his name and make some comment, such as "Are you any kin to the doctor by that name over in Palestine?" The answer usually was, "No, but I've heard of him." When I remarked afterward that Texas was a big State—(hardly a novel comment!)—and that it would take a lot of time to inquire about the kind-folks of every man he met, the Judge replied that a man takes pride in his name; he likes to feel that it stands for something in the eyes of others and, if he himself had not achieved deeds that the world considers great, he takes a measure of pride in the fact that someone else bearing that name has given it some degree of renown.

He was right, of course.

Senator Yarborough has a good sense of humor. During that 1938 campaign, he entered a lawyer's office and introduced himself. The attorney said, "Yes Judge, I've been hearing lots of good things about you among the people here." After leaving the office, the candidate walked down stairs—(the office was on the second floor)—and then paused at the foot of the steps to consider for a moment which way to go. As he stood there, he heard the lawyer call to his secretary, "What did that young man say his name was?"

When the Judge came back to the car, he chuckled as he related the incident.

Asphalt Coated Picksacks Are Attacked By FB

A drive to knock out one of cotton's worst enemies was announced today by Mitchell Campbell, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

The farm leader urged all persons interested in the welfare of the cotton industry to join in the drive to eliminate the use of asphalt coated picksacks in harvesting cotton.

He said retail stores in the area are being urged not to stock asphalt coated picksacks. He also asked farmers to let the retailer know their feelings in regard to this type sack.

The asphalt coated sack, he pointed out, is a major source of tar spots in cotton yarn and fabrics. Such fabrics often are downgraded and sell for from 10 to 20 percent less than normal value.

Although no part of this loss shows up on the farmer's invoice when he sells his cotton, he loses just the same. The mill must eventually reflect part of the loss back to the farmer in the price paid for cotton.

The purchase and use of the asphalt coated sack represented only from 5 to 8 percent of the total in 1956 as compared with from 45 to 50 percent the previous year. The Farm Bureau president said the reduction was due to the active efforts of a number of organizations, agencies and their leaders during the spring and summer of 1956. He called for the same cooperation in 1957.

"If we do not continue our efforts to completely eliminate the sack," he said, "it is likely that its use will again increase."

He said retail stores in each community should be contacted. "Large stores not to stock asphalt coated sacks. Ask them to concentrate on selling plastic dot, plastic coated and plain duck sacks. That way, we'll all benefit," he stressed.

### National Home Demonstration Week To Be Observed In County

Each of the 10 Home Demonstration Clubs in Eastland County are joining six and one half million other homemakers throughout America in the observance of National Home Demonstration Week. The week, April 28 to May 4, improved living depends upon ex-

carries the theme "Christian Homes the Hope of the Nation". There will be displays in the different towns in the county, special observance in some of the Eastland County Clubs, and Wednesday May 1, there will be a special Home Demonstration Council meeting.

Home Demonstration work is an educational program planned by the homemakers and conducted cooperatively by the Extension Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the land grant colleges, and the county government. Through the program, families learn to apply the latest approved methods developed by home economics research. The general aim is to strengthen home and family life by helping women become more efficient homemakers and more effective citizens in their communities, States, and Nation.

"Women play a vital role in maintaining the home. They do most of the family buying and exert a major influence on the character and personality of family members. Today the margin between income and cost of necessities—food, clothing, and shelter—is small for most families, so expert management of resources. In the rapidly changing pattern of

modern living, homemakers need an up to date, reliable source of information that will help them in solving problems of the family and community. Home demonstration work is designed to meet that need," Mrs. Don Hart, county agent said.

The program offers the newest reliable information on such subjects as foods and nutrition, clothing, housing, home furnishings, household equipment, home management—including long range planning—health, safety, child care and development, family relationships, family economics, good business practices, marketing and consumer buying, and public affairs.

The aims of National Home Demonstration week are to further acquaint the general public with home demonstration work, to help families understand better their part in planning and carrying out the extension program, to stress research that relates to the home and family and to encourage its use, to interpret the scope of home economics and its contribution to family and community life, to recognize the work of volunteer leaders, and to inform people about the duties of their local home demonstration agent, and how to take advantage of their assistance.

Anyone is eligible to join a home demonstration club and there are no dues. According to Mrs. Minnie Mae Hart, Eastland County Home Demonstration Agent, it is hoped that the emphasis of this

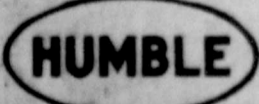

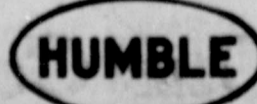

Employers Can't Give Hot Checks For Payrolls

AUSTIN — An amendment to... the Texas "hot check" law that... takes employers liable for paying... their employees with checks that... "bounce" has been signed into... law by Gov. Price Daniel.

Charles T. Lux, executive vice-... president of the Retail Merchants... Association of Texas, said the new... amendment closes a loophole in the... "hot check" law. "Until this... amendment was signed, a retail... business or any other place of... business that accepted worthless... checks presented in good faith by... workers had practically no legal... recourse to recover its loss," Lux... said.

"Now under the new amend-... ment employers who give checks... that prove to be 'hot' are subject... to criminal prosecution and may... be fined up to \$2,000 and sent to... jail for 90 days if the amount in-... volved is less than \$50. If the... amount of the worthless check is... more than \$50, the penalty is... from two to ten years in prison... and a fine up to \$10,000."

Lux said there were several... hundred cases in Texas last year... where employers paid off their... workers with worthless checks... causing the places that cashed... these checks to lose many thou-... sands of dollars.

Prosecution of these cases under... the Texas "hot check" law was... difficult because provisions did not... cover checks given as wages or... salaries for services.

Lux said the new amendment... was endorsed and supported by the... members of the Retail Merchants... Association of Texas.
