Auction Fills Little League Roster; Cut Had To Be Made 8th

Following the auction sale Monday night of all new-comers in the ranks of Little League ball players, every manager in the league had more players than he could say grace over and the hard task of cutting many of them off the rosters before the deadline of May 8.

This is one of the hardest tasks any manager has to do because he has to knock any boy out of the fun of playing ball, but the rules state that no team can have more than 15 players, and the rosters had to be cut to that number within five days of the first regularly scheduled game which is May 13.

A check of the player - rosters of all teams showed that each of the four teams had nine "old men" returning from last year. If it is reasonable to assume that these nine men will again make the teams this year, that would leave each manager only six men to keep from the new boys.

In addition to old players, the Giants have 12 new boys, the Dodgers 14 new ones, and the Indians and Yankees 20 new ones each.

Bids Asked On Lake Leon Road From Ranger

Sealed bids for construction of approximately 3 1/2 miles of hard surface road from Highway 80 south to Farm Market road 570 have been called for by the Texas Highway Department.

Bids of the work will be opened in Austin May 24 and the successful bidder is expected to begin work immediately.

The road to be hard surfaced is Farm Market road 2461. It is the dirt road now being used by Ranger citizens to get to Lake Leon. The road will be hard surfaced to FM road 570 leading from Eastland. The road from the FM 570 and FM 2461 cutoff on to the lake will not be topped at this time.

The work is all in Precinct 1. Fences were being moved back this week and the right-of-way cleared.

Scouts to Pitch Camp at Lake Leon Friday

Several hundred Boy Scouts and Explorers will pitch camp at Lake Leon Friday and Saturday May 10-11 for their annual spring Camporee.

The Scouts will bring camping equipment and under the supervision of their Scoutmasters will set up camp Friday afternoon. The public is invited to attend the campfire that night after the Scouts have cooked their supper.

Field events to take place on Saturday include building fires by hand and steel and by friction, pancake frying race, water boiling contest, sack race, tent pitching, judging, compass signaling, first aid and pioneering.

"This is to be a Patrol Conference on a standard with each Patrol Leader in charge of participation of events and camping," according to John A. Bates, of Ranger, camping and activities chairman.

It is expected that Scout Troops and Posts will enter the week-end camping experience from Stephenville, Jewellville, Dublin, Purves, De Leon, Gorman, Carbon, Lingleville, Huckabay, Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, Breckenridge and Woodson.

The Scouts will prepare meals for breakfast and dinner on Saturday and the Camporee will officially close at 8 p.m. Saturday. Friday night at eight the Scouts will gather by the lake side for the camp fire ceremonies. The Parents and public are invited to attend the campfire and watch the stunts, songs and fellowship arrangements have been made for parking near the lake so families may watch the festivities from their cars.

Saturday morning the Scouts will enter several skills events by friction fire by flint and steel, compass first aid problems judging water boiling tent pitching pancake race signaling pioneering and sack race. After events have been judged Saturday ribbon awards will be made to outstanding individuals and participating patrols. Troop 58 of Cisco took top honors in last year's events.

Baptist Ass'n To Meet At Cisco

Rev. Ralph E. Perkins, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Ranger and Moderator of the Cisco Baptist Association, has announced an association meeting for Tuesday, May 14, which will be held in the East Cisco Baptist Church beginning at 10 a.m.

The Rev. B. L. Davis, pastor of the Cisco Church, will deliver the morning message.

Theme of the meeting will be "Vacation Bible School" and will be discussed by the Rev. A. L. Teaf of Moran, the Rev. Bud Bryan of Deadman and Bill Page of Cisco. Rev. W. S. Buntos, pastor of the Cisco Baptist Church, will give the scripture reading and prayer.

Rev. Davis has been pastor of the East Cisco Baptist Church for only one year. He is a graduate of Howard Payne College of Brownwood, and will graduate from Southwestern Baptist Seminary of Fort Worth this month with a B.D. degree in theology.

Motorized Armor to Parade for Johnson

Capt. Frank Sayre, commander of the Cisco unit of the National Guard, has assured officers of Service Battery in Ranger that his unit will be here in full strength on Saturday, May 18, to take part in the dedication program of the new headquarters property here, and also to take part in the parade.

The Cisco unit will parade its huge motorized 195 bowitzers which many people in the Ranger area have never seen, and which are the real war horses in modern day front line combat.

Capt. Tom Feeley, commander of the Breckenridge unit of the National Guard has also promised to have his outfit ever here in full strength and will parade another battery of bowitzers. In exchange for Breckenridge participating in the parade here at 5:00 p.m., Ranger's Service Battery will take part in the Breckenridge parade to be held earlier in the day as a part of that city's Army Day celebration.

The Eastland County Sheriff's posse has also accepted an invitation to ride in the parade, full strength, in their colorful new uniforms. The posse has captured prizes all over West Texas, even winning in the Fat Stock Show parade at Fort Worth.

In addition to Major General Albert Sidney Johnson, commander of the 4th Division, more high army brass is accepting invitations daily to be on hand for the big doings here which bids fair to be about the No. 1 Army Day Celebration in Texas with the top general having a star role on the program.

Lt. Col. Ralph M. Trolinger, battalion commander of the 648th Armored Field Artillery, has signified that he will be here, and so has General Clayton F. Kerr, Division Artillery Commander.

As the program now stacks up, Capt. R. Bruce Harris of Abilene, formerly of Ranger, who was the first battery commander here in 1948, will introduce General Kerr on the dedication program, and General Kerr will introduce Major General Johnson.

Mayor W. F. Creager and C. R. Pruet, president of the Chamber of Commerce, have parts on the program, with Creager giving the address of welcome and Pruet making a talk on what the guard has meant to Ranger and Eastland County.

Other parts of the program will include introduction of guests, introduction of the battery, sweetheart, who has already been selected, and who bids fair to win the prize as division sweetheart, Miss Jennie Pittman of Eastland.

The parade is scheduled to be held at 5:00 p.m. Saturday afternoon, May 18 with the dedication program at 6:30. The barbecue will follow at 7:15. Every man and woman and child in Ranger is expected to be on hand, together with the better part of Eastland County.

Hick Halecomb's name really was Hick. He had it changed by legal action from Wilbert.

There was another politician whom Hick didn't exactly admire either. The man was governor at the time and, in tribute to him, one of the Austin hotels featured a "hillbilly dinner" on a sheet which was attached to the menu. Knowing Hick's view, the waitress would detach this sheet before handing the menu to Hick.

A new waitress did not know about this. As she handed him the menu, Hick was talking to friends, and, without skipping a word, he detached the sheet, crumpled it into a wad and dropped it on the floor, and kept right on talking.

He enjoyed needling his friends but did it in such a humorous fashion that they were amused, too. For example, he would pretend that he could not remember my name. He would greet me, "How are you this morning, Mr. Chouse, Brouse—", then he would pretend to catch himself as he was in the act of uttering "Louise" and would at last come out with the right name. In turn, would call him "Halbrook", "Howcome" and three or four more names before saying "Halecomb", Foolish? Of course, but we were amused and so were the bystanders—and that did not displease either of us.

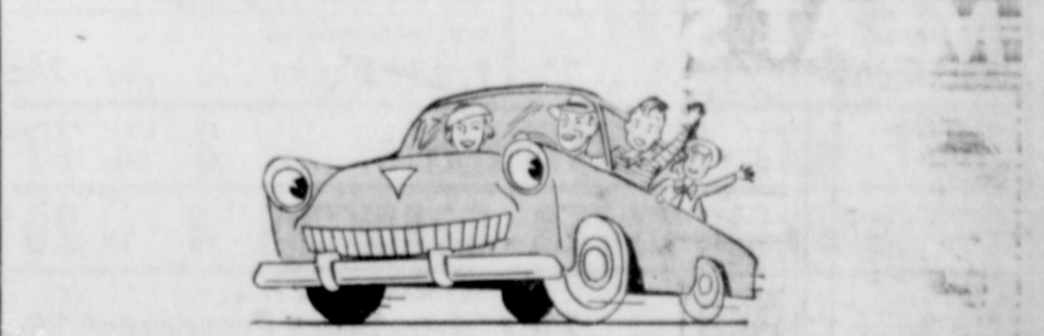

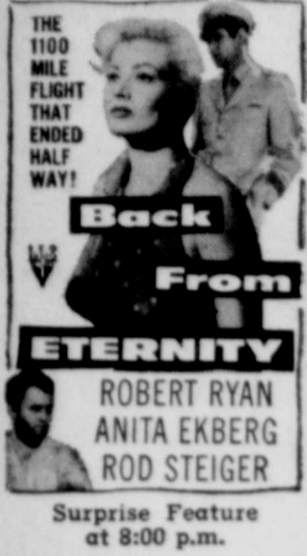

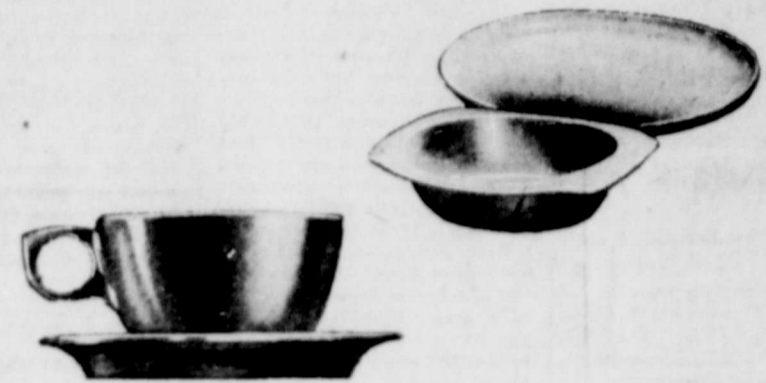

during the long siege of recent rains. The high water at Lake Leon had already posed many problems by covering up a lot of roads in the area, especially the road to Staff, and a newer and bigger rise will just cause that many more, although they are at work now raising the roadbed with rock and gravel.

People with bathhouses are having their troubles. Many owners say their cables are already stretched to the breaking point and some of them were talking about cutting the cables Thursday morning.

Reports say the roads are a terrible muddy leading to the dam, and are impassable in several places around the lake.

Nimrod Wins First Place In Contest

The little Eastland County community of Nimrod has won another honor. Most recent award to go to the community is first place in the district pasture improvement program sponsored by the Texas Plant Food Educational Society in cooperation with District VII, Texas A&M Extension Service.

First prize was \$100. The communities were judged on progress in range and pasture forage production and use, soil crop and livestock management, improvement on farm and home, health conditions and service, social improvement and progress in publicity.

The Nimrod Community, which was a winner in last year's community improvement contest, also edged the third place in the District Rural Neighborhood Contest, sponsored annually by Farmer-Economist Magazine in cooperation with the Extension Service. The purpose of the contest is to stimulate individual family and neighborhood effort toward farm, house and neighborhood improvement.

Communities are judged on increasing and managing family income, improving health conditions and services and farm and home, and encouraging social participation. The contest is open to all rural communities in Texas.

Other winners in the pasture improvement contest were Newburg in Comanche County, second place and \$80; Soda Springs, Comanche County, third and \$65; Stag Creek, Comanche County, fourth and \$55; Armstrong, Bell County, fifth and \$40; and Amity, Comanche County, sixth and \$50. First place in the Rural Neighborhood Program went to Newburg. Other winners were Soda Springs, second and \$75; Nimrod, third and \$50; Dog Ridge, Bell County, fourth and \$50; and Little Flock, Bell County, fifth and \$50.
