



Bockholt's tests show that difium methyl arsonate gives kills of 90 to 99 percent in Dallisgrass; earing Bermudagrass strong and healthy. However, he advises against its use on St. Augustine wns, and cautions against getting on flowers or shrubs.

Almost anyone who sells lawn upplies can provide disodium ethyl arsonate, which is known under a variety of trade names. Here's how you use it:

Mix four to five ounces of the hold detergent - in two to four gallons of water, and apply in a fine mist spray from a hand or shoulder-pack sprayer. Thi imount will cover approximatel 1,000 square feet-more actual Dalsgrass area than will be found in he average lawn. It should be applied during periods of lush growth spring or early summer. After ou apply the chemical, wait two to three days before watering your




