City Manager Lester Crossley has announced that the City Commission has retained Dewey Cox, Ranger attorney, to take whatever steps necessary to collect \$54,000 in delinquent taxes which are outstanding on the city's books at this time, and which are long past due.

A spokesman for the City Commission said, "As long as we are going to have taxes, it is not right for some people to pay them and give them a fair opportunity to pay them without any action at all. The attorney said a 6 per cent penalty and 6 per cent interest had already accrued against the delinquent taxes, and he didn't want to add any more to the bill if he could keep from it.

Cox said his first move would be to send letters to all people whose taxes were delinquent and give them a fair opportunity to pay them without any action at all. Peacock is chairman of the Committee which is sponsoring the forth-coming county-wide mental health dinner program to be held in Ranger on Tuesday evening, June 4 at 7:30 p.m. at the Ranger College Cafeteria. The program will include a panel of psychiatric and social science specialists from Abilene.

Dr. Paul Southern, head of the Department of Bible and Religious Education of Abilene Christian College, will emcee the discussion. Panel members will include Dr. Max Leach and Dr. Orval Filbeck, also of Abilene Christian College. Other program participants will include Miss Kay Wren, public relations specialist and Publicity Chairman of the Houston - Harris County Mental Health Society, also Mrs. Leland Croft of Odessa, president and founder of the State Mental Health Development Association.

Peacock stated that "concern for better mental health has heretofore been the primary concern of professional groups, but has now grown into a people's movement in this state. It was further (Continued on Page Four)

## George Harmon Funeral Services To Be Saturday

Funeral for George Harmon, 55, of Strawn, who was fatally injured in an accident early Thursday morning at the Featherlight Corp., about a mile north of town, is set for 2:30 p.m. Saturday at the First Baptist Church in Strawn.

The Rev. J. W. Miller of Cisco will officiate. Burial will be in Mount Marion Cemetery under direction of Baum-Carlack Funeral Home of Strawn.

The accident occurred about 1:30 a.m. Thursday when a tractor rolled over on Harmon. He died at 4:45 a.m. Thursday in Ranger General Hospital.

Mr. Harmon was driving a "front-end loader" tractor, a tractor with a scoop on front, picking up shale to be processed into aggregate at the local plant. He was working on a hill. Evidently the tractor became overbalanced and rolled over him.

Other workmen missed him when he didn't make his usual trip transporting the shale and went to search. They found him critically injured. Marks on the ground indicated the tractor rolled over him and landed upright. The motor was still running.

Mr. Harmon was born Sept. 15, 1901, at Thurber. He lived at Thurber, Mingo and Strawn. He (Continued on Page Four)

Water poured over Highway 80 in three places to the depth of a foot or more. Some way or other, though the water managed to run off before too much damage was done, but if the rain had continued another hour, the town would have been in a glorious mess.

## Sunday Good Day To Sign For Swimming

Parents wishing to enroll their children in the free swimming classes to be conducted by Coach Harold Barrett at the Municipal Pool beginning Monday, June 3,

are advised that this week-end would be a good time to call Coach Barrett and enter their youngsters' names.

Coach Barrett is listed in the telephone book, and his number is 285-W. Somebody will more than likely be around his house all weekend to take down the names.

It is absolutely necessary that these names be secured as quickly as possible because all classes must be arranged before June 3, and that time is not far off. Coach Barrett plans to give each child three lessons a week, and three classes a day will be scheduled, one each during the morning, the afternoon and the evening hours. As soon as the names are in, classes can be made up and parents notified of the time for their youngsters to report.

The swimming lessons are absolutely free, although each youngster will be required to have a season ticket to the pool which will cost \$5. Classes will extend over a period of six weeks and are for youngsters age 6 to 21. Learning to swim is the most valuable achievement a child can make, because there are many times during a person's lifetime when knowing how to swim can mean the difference between life or death.

Adult swimming classes are also being arranged, and all adults, over 21 years of age, wishing to take swimming lessons are also asked to phone Coach Barrett immediately so that their classes can be arranged. In addition to having a \$5 season ticket to the pool, adults will be required to pay an additional \$5 for their lessons. They will last for six weeks.

The pool has already been cleaned out and filled with fresh water and will be open to the general public on Saturday, June 1, at which time there is expected to be a terrific splash as school kids flock to it for the first time this summer.

## Will Cost \$1.00 To Get Pooch Out If He Is Caught

As mentioned before, officials of the City of Ranger none they will not have to pick up one single dog beginning Tuesday morning, May 28, but unless a lot of people get on the ball Monday and have their pets vaccinated and tagged, the town is going to be swarming with un-tagged dogs running around in open violation of the law, and the dog-catcher will have no other choice.

Pet owners have had two weeks in which to have their dogs vaccinated and tagged since the City Commission announced that the "Dog Ordinance" would be strictly enforced, beginning Tuesday, May 28, and not more than 25 people have complied with the directive up to now. There is no telling how many hundreds of dogs there are in Ranger.

The Commission took the action it did for two clearly stated reasons. First, three-fourths of all deaths reported from rabies in the entire United States last year took place in the State of Texas. And most of the Texas deaths took place in a small circle around Dallas and Fort Worth. The City Commission ordered the vaccinations in Ranger in order to lessen the danger of rabies as much as humanly possible.

At the same time, by requiring that each dog have a City dog tag fastened to a collar around its neck, the City could have some control over stray animals, a need which could answer the many complaints about them by picking them up and putting them in the dog pound.

The City has had this power all along, but wished to give the people time to secure the new tags before exercising its pick-up power to the limit.

City Manager Lester Crossley said many dogs may already have tags, but cautioned their owners to be sure they were the right kind of tags. Tags must be strictly brand new and up to date to count.

Beginning Tuesday, when dogs are picked up and impounded, it will cost the owners \$1.00 pound (Continued on Page Four)

Defense attorneys Earl Conner Jr. and Allen Dabney requested that the judgment be entered, thus indicating there would be no appeal. Crawford would be eligible for parole after about 4 years under the 15-year sentence.

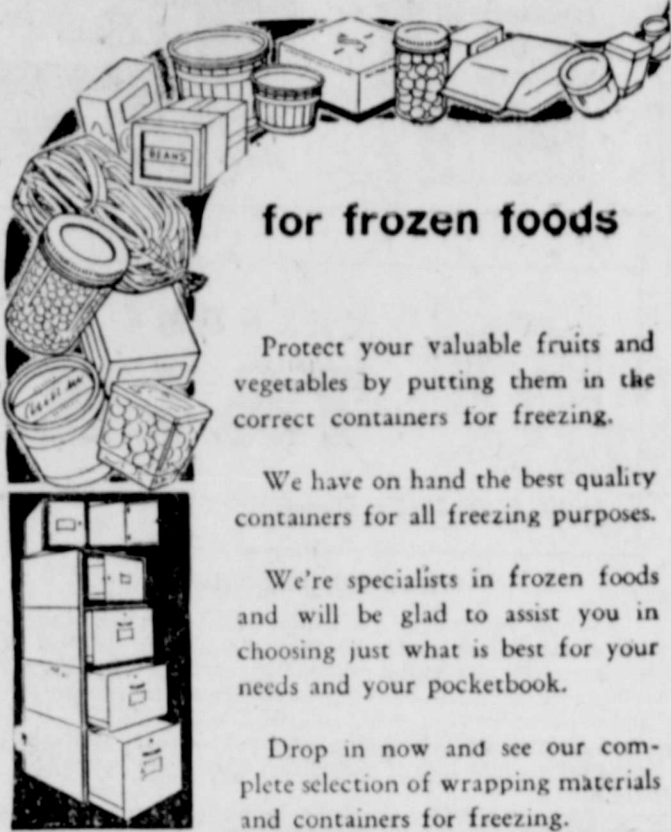

### Local Citizens May Have Money Coming To Them

A lot of Eastland County citizens may have money coming to them that they know nothing about. Thousands of North Texans are entitled to reopen claims for a refund of income tax previously disallowed for sick pay exclusion under the 1939 Internal Revenue Code, according to A. E. Focle Jr., administration officer of the Abilene Internal Revenue office. A recent Supreme Court decision has allowed a taxpayer's claim for sick pay exclusion under the 1939 Internal Revenue Code. This decision makes it necessary for the Internal Revenue Service to reconsider thousands of claims for sick pay exclusion for tax years of 1953 and earlier under the Epsmeier decision for tax years of 1953 and earlier that were originally disallowed.

The Internal Revenue Service officials estimated that the claims would average between \$10 and \$50 each, amounting to some \$400,000 to \$500,000 total. Focle emphasized that taxpayers who have not filed a claim in the past are not eligible to file a claim now. He advised the taxpayers who have filed Epsmeier claims in the past to write to the Sick Pay Exclusion Section, Internal Revenue Service, 2601 Pacific Avenue, Dallas, Texas, giving full details concerning their claim and request that their claim be reconsidered.
