WHAT'S... COOKING?

We have now been editor of the Ranger Times for exactly eight months. During that time we have thought very little of anything else except Ranger. Ranger has been on our mind every minute of the day and far into the night. We have never gone to bed at night or got out of bed in the morning without saying a prayer for Ranger.

After all of this we have decided there is only one thing Ranger needs: Money!

There is not a thing on earth wrong with Ranger that a little money won't cure. The City of Ranger needs some money, and the Chamber of Commerce needs some money, and if they only had it we would be on our way like a greased streak of lightning with nothing at all to it.

We have come to this earth-shaking conclusion after reading these Reports on the Community Clinic that have been appearing in the Times from day to day. After the one today there will be three more, one Sunday, another Tuesday and the last next Thursday. We hope and trust you have been reading them, and we hope further that you have clipped them out. We have tried to make each installment about the same size so that they could be found in a neat little package.

In this report on the Clinic, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has taken the 973 suggestions made by 242 citizens attending the Clinic, consolidated them into 64 separate project classifications, and from all this has outlined a program of work for Ranger and for the Ranger Chamber of Commerce.

It is an easy matter for somebody to suggest something which the town sorely needs, and it is an easier matter for somebody to sit down at a typewriter and type off such ambitious phrases as "Improve the Airport," "Pave More Streets," "Build More Sewers," "Install Larger Water Mains," "Restore the Oil Derrick," "Install a Big Advertising Program," and all that sort of stuff.

It is a slight easier to suggest it, and to type it out as something to be done, than it is to do it.

That is the reason we said from the beginning that there was enough material in this Community Clinic Report to keep Ranger and the Ranger Chamber of Commerce busy for the next half-century. From the standpoint of money, it would take nothing less than the resources of the Federal Government to accomplish all the things outlined in the report.

Nevertheless a lot of good—a lot of it—will be accomplished as a result of the clinic and as a result of the report. Ranger has a Chamber of Commerce president, and a Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors. (Continued on Page 8)

More than one hundred thousand severely disabled people in communities all over the Nation will receive their first social security disability insurance checks in August, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of the Abilene Social Security office, which services this county as part of its sixteen county district.

But many other eligible disabled workers 50 to 65 years of age, some of them no doubt living hereabouts, have so far failed to make application to the social security office. Those who have been disabled for work for a long time must apply before June 30, Tuley pointed out, or they will lose their rights to these new benefit payments.

Any severely disabled person who has worked under social security for at least 5 years and who has been disabled for 6 months or more should get in touch with his social security office right away, the social security district manager said.

If he is between 50 and 65 years of age, he may be eligible to have his social security record frozen to protect his future right to disability payments, and also his and his family's rights to old-age and survivors insurance benefits.

"Unfortunately there is a lot of misunderstanding," Tuley said, "as to how disabled a worker has to be to get social security disability insurance benefits or to have his social security record frozen. The rules in the social security law for deciding whether a person is 'disabled' are different from the rules in some other Government and private disability programs."

To be found "disabled" under the social security law, he said, a worker must have a disability which, in the words of the law, makes him unable "to engage in any substantial gainful activity." It must be the kind of physical or mental condition which shows up in the medical evidence, including (Continued on Page Eight)

Highway 80 By-Pass Is 6 to 8 Years Away

Buy A Cake Friday-Help Pave Oak Street

There are more ways than one to get a street paved, the ladies of Oak Street, believe, and they say if you will buy a cake at their bake sale Friday and Saturday to help with some paving on their street, they'll buy a cake at your bake sale and help you fix your street.

That's what they said, and when asked who are the "ladies of Oak Street," they said "every last one of them."

The sale is to be held at Hamilton's Fruit Stand on Highway 80 all day Friday and Saturday. Every lady on Oak Street has been urged to bake a cake and take it to Hamilton's early Friday morning, and they will be there by the dozens, they say.

The Oak Street Ladies have been working a full year signing up people on their street for paving and they are about two-thirds finished. "But we've reached the limit," they say. "There are several elderly people and widows living on the street that, simply do not have the money to pay for their share, and we're trying to raise some extra money through this bake sale and through other means. We will certainly appreciate it if the people of Ranger will let us fill their week-end baking needs at this sale Friday and Saturday."

The ladies also extend an invitation to any and everybody to contribute a pie or a cake to the sale if they so desire, and "We will certainly do our best to return the favor the first chance we get," they say.

CONSTRUCTION THRU COUNTY DIVIDED INTO THREE PROJECTS

It will be at least another six to eight years before Highway 80 by-passes the cities of Ranger, Eastland and Cisco.

This fact was made known Tuesday by Gordon Smith of Eastland, resident engineer for the State Highway Department for Eastland County. Smith was speaking before a meeting of Cisco business and civic leaders in the community conference room of the First National Bank of Cisco.

Smith said that under the super-highway program, Highway 80 is to become a limited access road from coast to coast and it will be another 13 years before the whole thing is pronounced complete.

The resident engineer said the Highway through Eastland County had been divided into three projects. The first project will be the section from the Callahan County line to the city limits of Cisco. The second project will be the section from Ranger Hill to the Erath County line. The third project will be the section from Cisco through Eastland, through Ranger, to Ranger Hill.

Under this plan, Ranger will be the last town through which the by-pass will be run.

Smith estimated it would be at least a year and a half before work was started on even the first project. He said the by-pass would begin at a point near the West edge of Cisco's city limits and go direct from there to Ranger Hill, passing about one mile or less South of Eastland and Ranger. Near Ranger it is understood there will be a clover-leaf covering approximately 40 acres.

Right-of-way will be bought by the state for the highway, which will need a strip of land 300 feet wide. The Federal Government will pay 90 per cent of the cost.

Smith said the government would prevent the moving of businesses such as service stations, motels, etc., to the new highway, but that all cities would have beautiful access roads with which to attract shoppers and tourists. He said it would be at least six years before they were ready to begin work in Eastland county, and it would take at least two years to put the road through the county, once the work was started.

Chester Dooley Seriously Hurt In Accident

Chester Dooley of Ranger, was seriously injured at the Mingo plant of Ranger Oil Refining Company at 10:15 this morning, Thursday, when the gin poles on his winch truck apparently fell on him while he was in the act of putting them in a working position.

Dr. W. P. Watkins, who treated Dooley at Ranger General Hospital, said he was suffering from a fractured skull, a fractured jaw bone and severe facial lacerations. Dr. Watkins described his condition as serious but not critical at this time.

David D. Pickrell, general manager of Premier, said nobody actually saw the accident and didn't know exactly what did happen. He said fellow-workers at the plant had observed Dooley only a few moments before, however, working with the gin poles of his truck, and it is assumed that they fell on him. He was unconscious when found later by some of the workers.

He was brought to Ranger in a Killingsworth ambulance.

\$397,000 Loaned To Co. Farmers In Ten Months

More than \$397,000 has been loaned to farmers in Eastland County during the ten months ending April 30, 1957, by the Farmers Home Administration, the agency's county supervisor, H. P. Cole, has announced.

Heaviest demand has been for credit to finance farm operating expenses and the purchase of farm machinery.

During the same ten month period the FIA extended credit in operating, emergency and real estate loans to some 18,500 Texas farmers and ranchers for a total of \$54,733,000, the agency's State Director, Walter T. McKay, reported. This is an increase over the same period last year of about \$6,500,000. "The increase is due primarily to the demand from family-type farmers for credit needed to place their farm operations on an efficient basis," McKay said.

Qualifying rounds in the Lake-side Country Club's seventh annual invitational golf tournament will begin Sunday at Eastland. The tournament is scheduled for June 21, 22 and 23.

O. H. Dick and Andy Taylor are tournament co-chairmen and Neil Day will serve as starter. Entry fees will be \$10 and extra barbecue tickets will be \$2.50.

Members of the prize committee are Everett Ploeman, Homer Williams, and W. A. Hall. W. Q. Verner and I. K. Henderson will head the food committee and Neil Day is rules committee chairman.

The tournament will be a match play event in all flights, with a special pro-am tourney to be held June 21 and qualifying rounds for medalist honors taking place the same day. A barbecue will be held Friday night and there.

Dick said all flights would be 18 hole match play. There will be \$1000 in golf prizes awarded.

HELD IN RANGER MAY 2, 1957
BY WEST TEXAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Long-Range Objectives

1. Expanded Farm-to-Market Road program
2. Improve existing school bus and mail routes (early attention should be given the Tiffen road problem)
3. Improved existing Airport facilities
4. Permanent highway to Lake Leon (earliest possible planning should begin on this project—seek State designation on this highway)
5. Work for increased travel on highways affecting Ranger.

STAFF OBSERVATION

While no suggestions were made by your people on the following, it is urged that these observations be included in your work program:

1. Remain alert to the need for four-lane construction
2. Study need and possibility for new routes (long range planning)
3. Close cooperation with county, district and state highway departments

PARKS - RECREATION

One hundred and eighty-seven suggestions were made for a general parks and recreation program, and because of this unusual interest we have suggested a separate division for development of the needs in this classification of your new work program.

During the clinic sessions your people carried the work that is being pursued on by the sponsors of Teen Town and urged the support of the chamber in this worthy project. However, the importance of a continuing effort to develop additional and improved facilities should not be overlooked.

Careful attention should be given to your needs in this field, and definite planning should be done relative to financing, supervision and maintenance of both your parks and recreation programs. This is most important.

Capable leadership and a strong committee structure are essential to proper planning and the development of parks and recreation

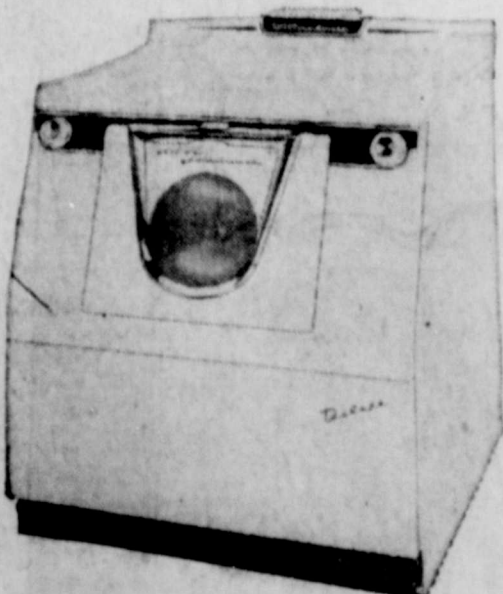

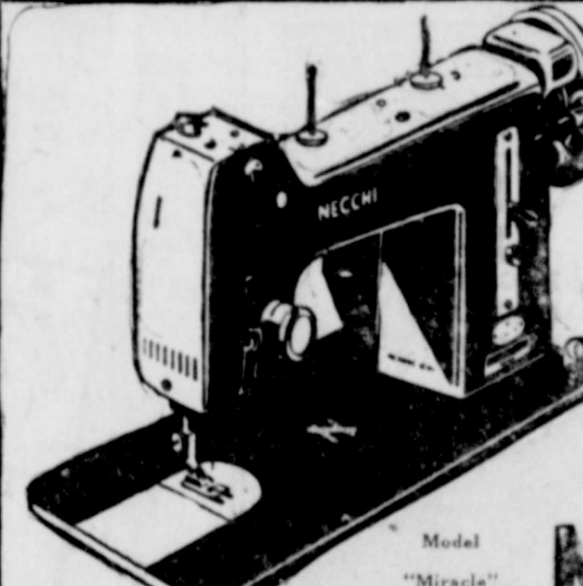

Farmers Advised To Watch for Grasshoppers

College Station.—Farmers and stockmen in many areas of Texas are advised by Extension Entomologists F. M. Fuller and C. F. Garner to be on the alert for possible damaging infestations of grasshoppers during this spring and summer.

Based on surveys made by the USDA, the entomologists say that infestations ranging from very severe to light are forecast for

the Panhandle, with Dallam, Moore, Hartley and Potter counties in the very severe area. Threatening is the term used to describe an even larger area to the east. Possible infestations could occur in Knox, King, Dickens, Motley, Floyd, Briscoe and parts of Crosby, Swisher, Hall, Donley, Armstrong, Randall, Deaf Smith and Castro counties. Also in parts of Wichita, Clay, Sherman and Hansford counties.

Threatening to light infestations could occur in wide areas from the Red River south into deep central Texas. The situation at present, point out the entomologists,

should be watched very carefully. The first nymphs, newly hatched 'hoppers, have been found in the Brazos River bottom and hatching will progress northward with favorable weather.

The time to do the most effective job of controlling 'hoppers, emphasize the specialists, is before the young leave the hatching grounds. Roadsides, field margins, ditch banks and idle lands bordering cropland should be watched carefully for the appearance of young 'hoppers. When numbers justify the use of control measures, several insecticides are readily available for doing the control job

and include aldrin, dieldrin, heptachlor, toxaphene and chlordane. The entomologists suggest that the local county agent be contacted for complete details on control measures and when and how they should be applied. The insecticides are poisonous to man and animals as well as grasshoppers and the manufacturers directions should be followed closely, say Fuller and Garner.

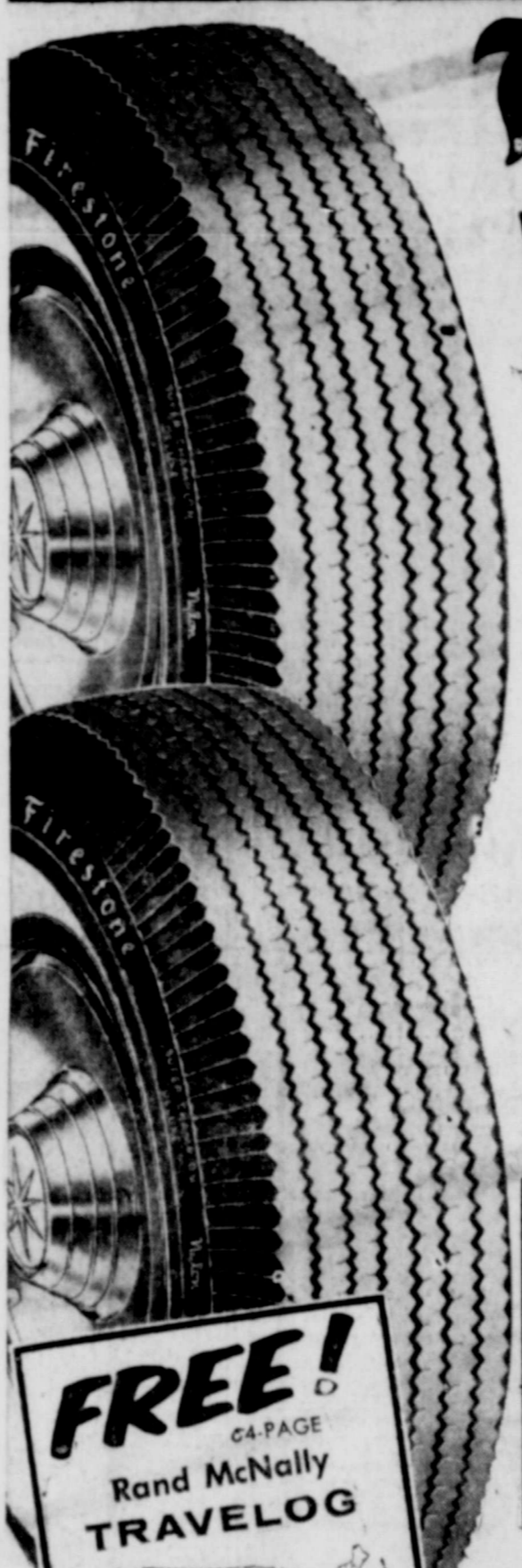

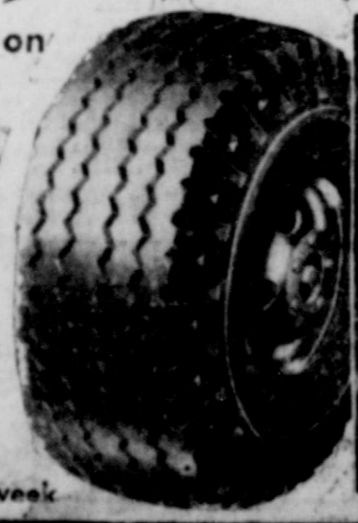

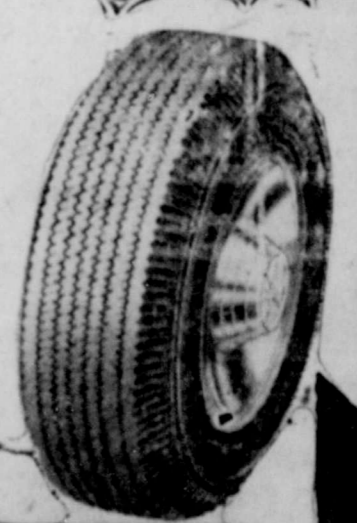

On one occasion, Judkins defended a man who was accused of having gone into a man's place of business and beating him over the head with a club.

The injured man had bled copiously but his wounds had healed completely by the time of the trial. The selection of the jury and the taking of testimony required two days and, throughout that time, Judkins slowly whittled on a stick with a pocket-knife.

The State rested, Judkins then placed the defendant on the stand and that individual identified the stick which Judkins had as the one used in striking the complaining witness. The stick did not impress the jury as being a very dangerous weapon.

Once, when Judkins was going to introduce a State candidate, he was asked by a newspaperman for an advance copy of his remarks.

He addressed a jury without notes, finding his inspiration in the zest of conflict, with a man's liberty of life at stake. He studied the faces of the jurors and when he found it necessary, he elaborated a point, and when he saw he had won acceptance of a contention, he passed on to another.

Judkins did not stride up and down nor did he bellow, although his naturally powerful voice rang out. He waxed sarcastic, indignant or emotional, depending on whether he was tearing into the testimony of an opposing witness or denouncing the conduct of the deceased who had forced his client to kill him, or picturing the happy little home to which the jury should return the prisoner. Which the jury usually did.

As a newspaperman looking for "good copy" and as an individual, I liked Frank Judkins very much.

(Continued from Page One) and a Chamber of Commerce Manager, who know what can and what can't be done, and from the wealth of material they have before them they will select a few projects that can and will be put over. When those are accomplished it will be time to outline some new ones. It is far, far better to select a few, relatively simple projects and actually put them over than to bite off too big a bite and fail entirely. There are many, many suggestions in the report that can actually be accomplished without too much expense and too much trouble. To mention one, for example, is the matter of marking the streets of Ranger. We believe that deal could be accomplished without costing anyone more than one or two dollars apiece if it were worked right, properly organized, properly got off on the right foot with the whole town thoroughly educated on what it was all about, and with the cooperation of everybody. Not

Just a few people, but everybody. Eastland did it for about one dollar per residence. We are sure when the proper time comes, the Chamber of Commerce will give careful consideration to the suggestions made on this project, which is a badly needed one. And there are many others that can be accomplished just as easily, but they can't all be done at once. And none of them can ever be done without cooperation. That is the key to the whole thing. Each project must have wholehearted support, and in deciding where to start the Chamber of Commerce must first decide WHICH projects will GET whole-hearted support. Those are the ones that will succeed. But there are always some people who simply will not cooperate in anything. Progress has to be made in spite of them. When the Civic League of Eastland started out to raise money for street markers by selling house numbers to all the residents, some residents would not give them a dollar for house numbers, saying they already

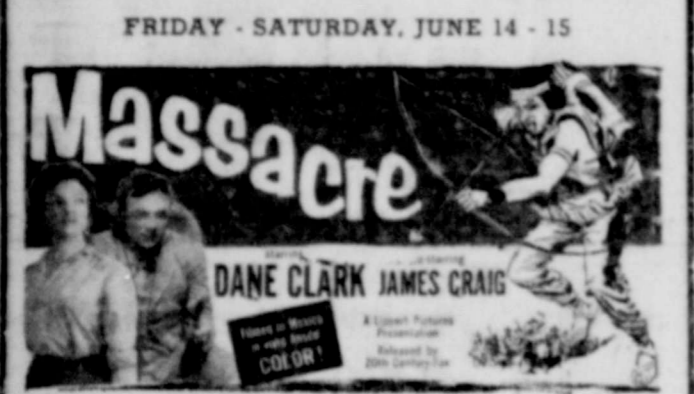

(Continued from Page One) his doctor's report, hospital reports, or special tests. It must have lasted for at least 6 months and be expected to continue for a long and indefinite time. In general, he said, "substantial gainful activity" means the performance of a substantial amount of work with reasonable regularity in employment or self-employment. A person does not have to be completely helpless to qualify under the social security disability provisions, Tuley emphasized. Consideration is given to all of the facts in the individual's situation both medical and non-medical. A person might work occasionally or intermittently and this would not necessarily mean that he was able to engage in substantial gainful activity. Both the nature of the work and the amount of money he earned would have to be considered. A post card or letter mailed immediately to Social Security Administration, Abilene, Texas, stating, "I want to file disability claim," bearing a signature and mailing address will keep any interested reader from losing out because of the deadline.
