"Bring this card to our photographer at the Gholson Hotel on Thursday, June 20, between 12 noon and 7 p. m., one day only, and you will receive a beautiful Opal Portrait without charge. This certificate is valuable—use it yourself or give it to a friend. Please—only one advertising portrait per family."

Well, there you have it, folks. This guy may be as honest as George Washington, but after the last one that was in here we sincerely hope the people of Ranger have got enough sense, at last, to recognize one of these schemes for what it is. Just don't fool yourself. There isn't any stranger coming into Ranger and give you anything. Make no mistake about that.

The police department tells us there is a pick-up out on one of these photographers who calls himself Ben Brown. They want him over at Albany. After the last such photographer, we are surprised that the Gholson would have fallen for another one. It's poor advertising and worse public relations. When folks go into a place and get skinned by somebody in there, even if he is a stranger, they don't like it.

Go home, Mister. Ranger has a photographer.

Well, as far as Highway 80 by-passing the city is concerned, the people of Ranger can sit back and relax for the next 6 to 8 years, at least, and by that time, we will all be so lousy rich we want cars whether a road ever comes through here or not.

Cox Tells His Side Of Check Muddle

County Treasurer Richard Cox gave his side of the controversial \$150 question today and directed his remarks to W. H. Hailey and County Auditor Harl O'Brien.

Cox declared he isn't being hurt financially by the episode, but the citizens of Eastland County are.

Here in full is the letter mailed to the editors of the Eastland Telegram and The Ranger Times:

"Replying to the statement appearing in last Sunday's issue of your paper by Mr. W. H. Hailey, stating in substance that I, Richard C. Cox, as County Treasurer, 'had infringed on his rights as a citizen and tax payer'.

"Inasmuch as the controversy referred to by Mr. Hailey has to do with my official duties, I desire that the citizens of our county know the facts and then it will be known just what the true record is in this particular matter, as shown on my records and in the auditing section of Eastland County.

"The matter referred to by Mr. Hailey was his beginning on completion of certain terracing supposedly done on a 50-50 basis by Precinct No. 2 and the Federal Government for Mr. Hailey, work being completed May 8, 1954, more than three years ago and on which date I, as Eastland County Treasurer, received Federal Warrant from the U. S. Treasury, No. 83288, made payable to Eastland County, Precinct No. 2, in the amount of \$334.94 as the Federal Government's share of the total cost of construction of terraces for Mr. Hailey. This means that the farmer, Mr. W. H. Hailey, and the Federal Government were to share equally in the cost of such terrace

Two new Home Demonstration Agents have taken over their work in Eastland County and began their duties last week.

Miss Sandra Kirkland is the new HD Agent, and Miss Nancy Weathers is the new assistant. Both young women are graduates of North Texas State.

Miss Kirkland is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Kirkland of Waco. She is a graduate of Axtell High School as well as NTSC. She was a 4-H club member for eight years and won many honors. These included a \$500 Helen H. Swift scholarship in her senior year in high school. This award is one of three presented annually by the Texas Home Demonstration Association.

As a girl, the new agent attended the state leadership laboratory and also went to the 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. While attending college she was a member of the Ellen H. Richards HD Club, and served as vice-president of that organization. She also served as president of Phi Epsilon Omicron.

Miss Kirkland was a delegate at the national convalescence and worked under Dr. Florence L. Schouler in the North Texas State research laboratory for two years.

Miss Weathers will begin her work here as junior assistant extension agent. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Weathers of Stephenville. Miss Weathers is a graduate of Stephenville High School and Tarleton State College as well as NTSC. She was a member of the L. H. Richards Home Demonstration Club at North Texas.

Miss Charlene Eckert, present assistant agent, will transfer to Lampasas as County HD Agent on July 1, and Miss Weathers will take over her duties here.

For one thing, a person resembling a farmer hasn't been seen in town for days. All the farmers in this area, including all their kith and kin, are busily taking time out for lunch as they are waging a war against time and the elements to get their oats and wheat in the barn while the getting is good. They're literally "making hay while the sun shines" and they're staying out of Ranger in droves while the weather stays good.

The farmers also have a double task on their hands right now as they are harvesting one crop while putting out another at the same time. Peanut planting is going on all over the county in a big way.

At the same time a lot of Ranger people are off on vacations and are therefore out of sight with nothing being heard out of them except a card now and then "wishing you were here."

The fishing business has come to a standstill because the water in Lake Leon is still high and muddy and not much news has been coming from that direction. The Times received several telephone calls from people in Fort Worth last Friday and Saturday asking about the condition of the water at Lake Leon, and when informed that it was still muddy they postponed their visits until another day, possibly.

Most every social club in the city has requested for the summer and where they used to be constant sources of information and news, they are now surrounded by an aura of silence with their members, presumably, trying to keep cool.

The Chamber of Commerce, always a great source if news, is marking time temporarily, until everybody gets through running around. Before embarking upon anything new, although a day never passes but what some Chamber of Commerce Committee is not on the ball somewhere trying to do something for Ranger. A lot of that stuff, though, can't be printed until the time is right for it.

Schools, another tremendous source of news that touches practically every family in town, have all been shut down, of course, all this month and nothing at all is coming from that direction.

Reveling meetings have come and gone and so have the vacation Bible schools and churches are drifting along with nothing very special going on except their regular weekly schedule. Father's Day was the last special event of any size at all and the next thing on the list that might arouse any interest above the ordinary is the Fourth of July which is two weeks away.

About the busiest place in town right now is the Municipal Pool that fills up with kids at 2 o'clock every afternoon. Teen Town manages to stay busy on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday nights and the Little Leaguers and Pony Leaguers manage to get in their baseball games before fairly large crowds of moms and dads.

But for plain old dig news, there just isn't much of it, and if you want to go out and make some, call us and we'll go with you.

Present Issues Do Not Justify Special Session of Legislature

Unless Gov. Price Daniel has more compelling reasons for calling a special session of the Legislature than those he divulged, there is no justification for having one. The recently ended session of the 55th Legislature did a creditable job. The legislation it left unpassed cannot be placed in an emergency category. The purpose of special sessions is to handle emergencies.

In saying that he plans to call a special session later this year, the governor mentioned as measures needing attention the proposal to spend \$100,000,000 for water storage space in federal reservoirs yet to be built; a lobby control act; a law requiring persons practicing before state agencies to register, and a law enforcement commission.

The Legislature passed a number of helpful water bills. The major one, which is to be submitted to the voters for approval next Nov. 5, would authorize the state to issue \$200,000,000 in revenue bonds. This money would be loaned to local areas to build dams and other conservation projects. The idea of buying storage space in federal reservoirs is of doubtful value to begin with and does not justify the calling of a special session.

As Sen. Searcy Bracewell of Houston pointed out, the state already has a lobby control act if the proper authorities would enforce it.

The crime commission, which would be composed of grand jury foremen from over the state, will not serve any purpose which regular law enforcement agencies cannot adequately handle if they will perform the duties required of them by law.

It would be desirable to have registration of persons practicing before state agencies, but this does not create an emergency.

Texas can appreciate the governor's good intentions and his aggressiveness in trying to get an adequate water program for the state and in seeking legislation to deter and punish wrong-doing in public office. The question is, however, whether a special session of the Legislature would do anything worthwhile along these lines.

The governor spoke of a statutory plan for financing the water storage, which previously has been considered as a constitutional amendment authorizing issuance of revenue bonds. This would indicate an outright appropriation for this purpose and probably would necessitate a tax increase. Such a plan is unlikely to be popular with Texans.

The governor's score sheet shows he got 47 of the 51 requests he made to the Legislature. He should rest on that.

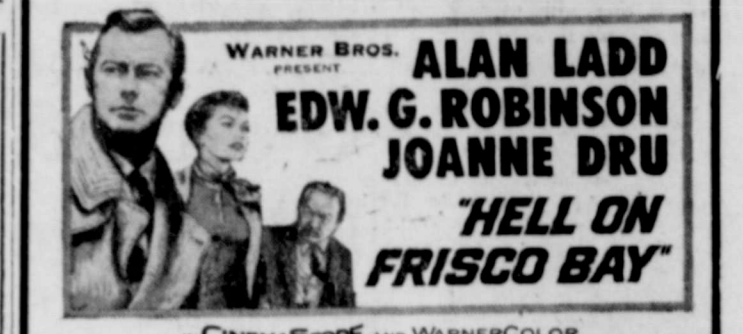

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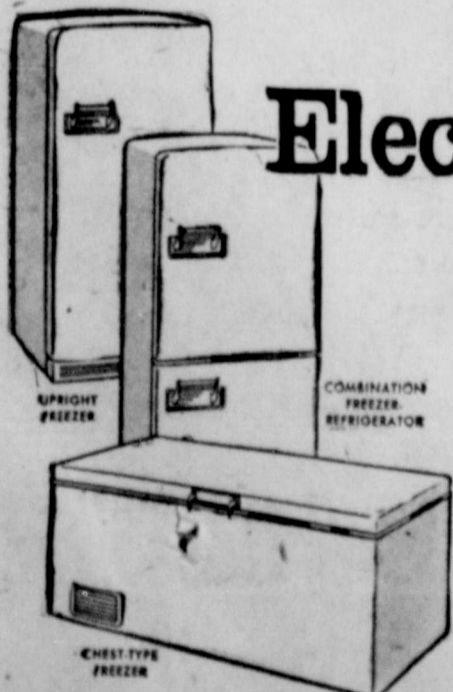
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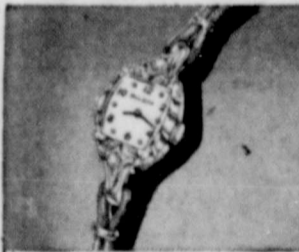

(Continued from Page One) construction, however the record shows that Mr. Hailey has paid only \$167.47 (only 1-2 of what is due). Mr. Hailey said: "I have at no time been unwilling to pay this debt," but on the contrary thereto the records show only part payment has been made. He does not owe the County Treasurer, neither does he owe the Commissioner of Precinct No. 2 but, he does owe the additional sum to the People of Eastland County, and, if Mr. Hailey does not pay an additional sum of \$167.47 to the County, then who is to pay the bill? The People of Eastland County, of course.

"Previously cases of like nature where the farmer or rancher defaulted or refused payment of his 50 per cent (1-2 of total cost) the Federal Government charged back to the account of the Precinct falling to collect from the farmer or rancher having such construction done. To be plain it falls on "John Q Public," the taxpayers of Eastland County "who owns the machinery and equipment that completed the work for Mr. Hailey.

"Mr. Hailey has not at anytime given our County Treasurer a check; but on the two occasions checks were tendered in payment, he gave them to the County Auditor, who in turn delivered each to me. Our County Auditor is not an elective official but an appointee of the Judge of the 91st District Court.

"As to why Mr. Hailey refuses to deal with Mr. Bennett, we all know that the Commissioner's Court of Eastland County voted to proceed with condemnation suit against Mr. Hailey in order to secure title to enough land to proceed with construction of Highway 2214, farm to market highway through the Sta ff Community, at a more reasonable cost to the taxpayers. This suit was commenced Oct. 8, 1956 and final results was that Mr. Hailey received a judgment for \$1,706.14 for 5.323 acres of land. Court Cost was \$37.05 and attorney fees paid by the County in the amount of \$300. Judgment was filed March 7, 1957.

"The above statement has for its purpose to clarify this issue for the tax-payers who own the machinery that did the work, paid all the fuel bills and repair bills, hired the hands that did the work and should be of interest to every citizen of this County. Should Mr. Hailey pay only one-fourth of the cost and look to you for the other three-fourths, or should he be required to pay his cost-share part as other farmers and ranchers do?"

"If I fail to protect the interest of all the tax-payers of Eastland County, apparently as Mr. Hailey would have you believe; then why not turn all of the County Treasurer's business over to the County Auditor and let him be County Commissioner of Precinct No. 2, County Treasurer defacto, Legal Advisor and or any other duties that he cares to assume and it appears to me that he has tried to assume them all.

"Under the direction of your elected official, Mr. B. M. Bennett, county commissioner, Precinct No. 2 I held up this check to let him have time to make a careful study of this matter. Mr. Bennett waited over 3 years for one-fourth of the County's money and I am quite sure he has been more than fair."

(Continued from Page One) of business, such as service stations, motels, cafes, etc., to move to the new highway, but that all towns would have beautiful access roads.

If Ranger wants to do something smart it can start thinking right now about making those access roads so attractive and inviting that it will be impossible for a motorist to drive past one without turning in to Ranger.

Outside of paying them with pure gold, maybe that's where we need to put such traffic-stoppers as the old oil derrick, and some well placed signs telling the folks that right here is the site of the greatest oil boom the world ever knew and to please come in and look around. Tourists can be brought in here, and now is the time to start thinking about it and planning on how to do it.

C. B. Pruet, president of the Chamber of Commerce, told this writer some little while back that he thought the new road would be of great benefit to Ranger. He looks at it this way: Ranger is the first stop out of Fort Worth - 100 miles away. Of course, there is Weatherford, but it is also going to be bypassed, and besides, being only 25 miles out of Fort Worth, folks want to be ready to stop for anything by the time they get to Weatherford. By the time they get to Ranger, the next stop, they will be good and ready to pull into town.

Mr. Pruet is also of the opinion that if Highway 80 is worth anything to Ranger now as an outlet for the movement of goods that might be manufactured here one of these days, the new highway will be all the more valuable from the standpoint of a manufacturer, giving him an even faster artery over which to move his products to other parts of the nation.

And there is another thing Ranger and Eastland and Cisco should be happy about, even if the road is going to miss them by something like a mile. We were reading only last night where this new Highway 80 is going to miss WHOLE COUNTRIES that it now goes through. And if you think those folks aren't yelling. This is certainly one of those cases if I ever saw one where it is bad but it could have been worse.

Whether our recent articles about summertime jobs for teen-agers had anything to do with it or not, we don't know, anyway we received a personal communication from the U. S. Department of Labor this week saying the reason many employers shied away from opening their doors to teen-agers was their fear of running afoul of the Federal Child Labor Law.

That thing is a complicated mess if there ever was one. Of course, it was enacted to prevent a lot of abuses that prevailed once upon a time in cheap factories throughout the country that were working children and teen-agers night and day like slaves and paying them about a third as much as they would have to pay an adult.

And there are enough skinflints in the country today who would be doing the same thing were it not for the protection of the Child Labor Law. Of course, we are not talking about anybody around here. We mean those big factories in the big cities, especially in the garment industry, that go in for cheap dresses and clothing—they were the principal offenders. And there were others, too.

As a matter of fact, kids can't even work in factories any more. The law says "they must not work where goods are manufactured or processed, nor in mining, manufacturing, processing, or similar work." There are certain types of jobs they can hold around those places, perhaps in offices, but not where the goods are being made.

Also in any type of business, even the nicest and safest, employers must maintain all kinds of records relative to their employees under 18 years of age. The big places which are able to offer a lot of employment, had just rather not fool with it.

G. F. Castleberry Funeral Service Is Held Tuesday

George Franklin Castleberry, prominent Eastland businessman and rancher, was buried this morning after his death Sunday in Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Mr. Castleberry was born March 30, 1885 in Myrtle, Mo., the son of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Castleberry. He came to Texas with his parents in 1896 and attended Eastland High School. Oct. 7, 1908 he married the former Miss Lottie Pettit.

He engaged in farming and ranching at intervals and for many years owned and operated a feed store in Eastland. He finished the unexpired term of his brother, J. E., as county commissioner in 1953, after Ed's death.
