



can't even work in factories any more. The law says "they must not work where goods are manufactured or processed, nor in mining, manufacturing, pro-cessing, or similar work." There are certain types of jobs they can hold around those places, perhaps in offices, but not where the goods are being made.

Also in any type of busine even the nicest and safest. er ployers must maintain all kinds of records relative to their employees under 18 years of age. The big places which are able to offer lot of employment, had just rather not fool with it.

Around Ranger, though, such little summertime jobs as would be available to teen-agers, would probably never be affected by the Child Labor Law except jobs that are extremely dangerous. We are glad to note that a good many of our young people have managed to find work here and there for the summer and we wish there were a lot more of it.
