The McCook (Neb.) Daily Gazette, recently published a 75th Anniversary Edition. The publisher, H. D. Strunk, was telling of an incident that happened during the early days of the paper when creditors were about to fold up the place. One creditor in particular, had threatened to put a padlock on the door if a bill for \$140 was not paid by sundown of that very day.
While faced with this impossible ultimatum, a friend hurried into the office to tell Strunk that a lady solicitor was having a field day in a nearby town selling 34 subscriptions for 25 cents.
The publisher rushed to the scene, caught up with the lady, and was immediately solicited to buy his own paper. Asked how she was doing, the lady replied: "I'm having good luck. I must have sold about 45 so far."
And for whom are you working?" asked Strunk.
"Why, sir, I'm working for Jesus Christ," she murmured.
"Well, He's a very good friend of mine, but I happen to own the paper you are selling for 25 cents a year and the people you've sold are going to expect me to do it, and it can't be done for 25 cents," Strunk replied.
The lady explained she was only helping because she thought it was such a fine paper and the Lord had persuaded her to put it into the hands of a few more people. She said she would gladly pay the difference, whereupon she pulled \$140 from a roll of several hundred dollars. Strunk said, and paid him off in new \$20 bills.
Strunk rushed home and paid off his creditor. "Otherwise, this 75th Anniversary Edition might never have been published," he (Continued On Page Four)

Dairymen from all over Eastland County, together with those from Palo Pinto, Erath, Stephens, Shackelford, Brown and Comanche Counties, have been asked to meet in Ranger next Tuesday night, July 25, at 8:00 o'clock, at the Community Club House, for a discussion of the Brucellosis law. Dr. C. M. Patterson, veterinarian of the A&M College Extension Service, will be present to discuss the law and how both plans, "Plan A" and "Plan B" operate.
It is a most important meeting for dairymen since the law goes into effect in about 14 months from now and those who are not in full compliance with the law at that time will simply be closed down, it is said.
County Agent J. M. Cooper, who has called the special meeting at the request of the Extension Service, says it is absolutely essential that all dairymen know just what the law means. "Plan A" and "Plan B" so that they can select one under which to operate.
Two meetings were held in the county last year on the subject of Brucellosis, but the whole program is so important that the dairymen, themselves, requested that another meeting be held so as to remove any possible misunderstanding.
Dr. Patterson is an expert on the law, and his explanation of it, together with his advice, will be most valuable to all dairymen, the county agent says.
For the benefit of out of town dairymen who may not know where the Community Club House is in Ranger, it is in the same block as the Municipal Swimming Pool on the west end of Main Street (except the Club House is one block south of the pool).
A big delegation from counties surrounding Eastland County is expected to be here for the meeting, together with a number of County agents from neighboring counties.

Photographer Runs Head-On Into Laws, Fined \$35, Scrams

That fly-by-night photographer who was going to give away all those "free" photographs at the Ghoslon Hotel Thursday afternoon never did get to snap his shutter, even if a customer had showed up.
He arrived on schedule, all right, set up his camera, licked his chops, rubbed his hands together, and settled down to wait for the first suckers who were not long in showing up, Chief of Police Pop Pounds and City Manager Lester Crossley.
The City of Ranger has an ordinance requiring certain types of all itinerant salesmen, peddlers and non-taxpaying foreigners to have an occupation license before coming into town and soliciting business, which is why the Chief and the City Manager went calling on the man to tell him they would be enchanted to see his permit to operate not only in Ranger but in the State of Texas as well.
With the man being fresh out of permits of any kind, City Manager Crossley, who is also Corporation Court Judge, told him his fine would come to \$50.
After that, if he wished to pay \$25 for a state occupational tax, and \$10 for a city permit, he could continue to carry on his business.
Being also fresh out of \$50 and short on cash of any other variety, the photographer asked for and received permission to telephone his boss, presumably the owner of Magic Valley Studios at McAllen, Texas, which is so close to the border of Old Mexico that all the babies teethe on tortillas and tabasco.
Upon being apprised of the situation the man's boss shouted through the telephone to Crossley that such an outrage couldn't happen to him, but when informed that it had already happened he told the City Manager to let the photographer write a check on him for \$50 and turn him loose.
Crossley told the man in McAllen that while ordinarily he would be glad to extend him that courtesy he wasn't right up-to-the-minute on the status of his back account, and since his only address of record was Magic Valley Studios, Ghoslon Hotel, Ranger, Texas, a place which he had occupied no more than 10 or 15 minutes, he did not feel that was permanent enough to justify the acceptance of his draft.
The voice from McAllen then shouted that he would be up "tomorrow" with a lawyer.
That left the status of the photographer dangling since he would have to either pay his fine or go to jail or make bond.
After the Chief of Police and City Manager had consulted with City Attorney Dewey Cox, it was decided to let the man sign his own bond and release him on his own recognizance, with a stern warning to stick around until his boss showed up the following day.
Soon afterwards McAllen was on the phone again and this time it was a lawyer wishing to speak to attorney Cox. Between them they reached a negotiated verdict of a fine of \$35 which the attorney promptly wired to Ranger. The photographer was released from his bond and when last seen he (Continued on Page Four)

If any of you people saw City Manager Lester Crossley and a strange looking fellow from out of town prowling around the creek beds in Ranger this past week, scooping up water in a soup ladle, examining mud puddles and otherwise acting suspicious, they weren't crazy with the heat as you would have every right to suspect. They were hunting mosquito larvae.
The City of Ranger has made application to the Disaster Relief people for help in securing enough insect spray to go over the city three or four times in an effort to get rid of all the mosquitoes that accumulated during the long wet spell.
As usual, when applications of this kind are made, the disaster agencies send out a man to make sure you need what you say you need.
That stranger was the man. He said Ranger didn't need any mosquito relief.
He said there were no mosquitoes here.
Not only did he not find any larvae in any of the water he scooped up, but he went so far as to take the bite test.
He yanked off his shirt last Wednesday night and went all over town, stopping at all the places where he figured he would congregate if he were a mosquito. Nothing half way about that man. Did he get mosquito bit? No!
He informed City Manager Crossley he was sorry but no further mosquito relief could be expected from the Disaster Agency. He said they would go ahead and help pay for what spray has already been used, but beyond that they wouldn't touch us with a ten foot pole.

New Service Station Seeks Lease - Operator

The Browder Oil Company, of Fort Worth, is seeking an operator for the new super service station which is nearing completion on Highway 80 in East Ranger, it is announced by E. L. Clapp, sales manager.
Clapp said the new station would be leased on a gallonage basis, and is expected to be ready for operation as soon as the proper operator can be found.
Browder Oil Company purchased the 351-foot of frontage on Highway 80 from C. E. Wheat, the property having been part of the right-of-way of the Jake Hammond Railroad.
The new station will be equipped with six pumps of the latest design with decorative lighting. The driveways are concrete and 200 feet in length. There are two tile rest rooms and ample (Continued On Page Four)

A new plan by which quantities of city water can save a lot of money while keeping their lawns and shrubs beautiful through the months of July, August and September, has been adopted by the City Commission after being worked out and submitted by Water Commissioner Pat Thomas.
The new plan applies to residential users only, and does not apply in any way to Commercial or Industrial users, it is stressed.
Under the plan, any residential user of water whose bill averaged at least \$10 a month last year for the months of July, August and September, can pay 20 per cent more this year and use all the water he wants. The city will not even bother to read his meter, and he will know in advance exactly what his water bill is going to be for the three months.
For example, if a person's water bill averaged \$10 a month last year for the months of July, August and September, he can sign up to pay 20 per cent more, which is \$2, making a total monthly bill of \$12, and drain Lake Leon dry if he so desires, at no further charge.
By agreeing to pay 20 per cent more than his bill for the three months last year, the user will know in advance what his bill is going to be for the three months of July, August and September, and his meter will be taken off the list of those to be read. At the same time he will have unlimited use of water.
City Manager Lester Crossley said in addition to this, however, the user would have to pay his regular sewer charge of 75c, and his sanitary charge of 50c each month, as usual.
Anyone being eligible to take advantage of the plan (having an average bill of at least \$10 a month for July, August and September last year) and who wishes to sign up for it, is requested to call at the water window at the City Hall and make his wishes known.
Crossley said it was absolutely necessary and required that a person come to City Hall and sign up in order to take advantage of the rate, and this must be done before July 30.

Road Maps Due for Change

There are 3,394,500 miles of roads and streets in the United States, and motorists trying to find where they want to go on this fantastic network are expected to use more than 140 million road maps this year.

Commercial map makers, oil companies, turnpike authorities, tourist groups, chambers of commerce and automobile clubs print and distribute maps, some of which are crude, colorless approximations of what motorists can expect ahead. Other maps are accurate, colorful and helpful.

But since the first highway map was published in 1910, maps have slowly built up a reputation for themselves as the most difficult things in the world to fold. Most motorists who try to get a map refolded find soon enough that they might as well be trying to fold a highly tensioned bed spring.

Some map makers have eliminated the folds by the simple expedient of making the maps smaller. But, because motorists expect to travel long distances quickly, small maps are not satisfactory.

However, several marked improvements in maps seem to be in the making. One company is making a roll map that does not have to be folded. Instead, you crank it. The big drawback with this one, which is mounted on the dash panel, is that you must buy it. With free maps around, it is unlikely that roll maps will sell in large quantities.

One map-making group is said to be considering the idea of marking roads with black lines if they are not safe for night driving. Considering that it is considerably safer to drive on roads that have their hazards marked with reflective signs that can be seen at night, good lights illuminating dangerous spots, or such simple devices as white lines to emphasize the shoulder of the road or the centerline, such marking of maps makes sense.

One national magazine recently suggested that billboard-size maps be located along major highways. With a place in front of them for cars to park, such maps would make motoring a little easier. "Map ahead" signs would be located a few hundred yards ahead of the billboard-map parking place, so motorists could slow down and pull off the road to find out where they are and where they want to go.

It seems that even the all-important roadmap is in for some changes.
