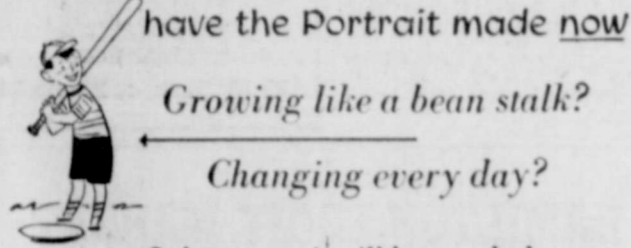

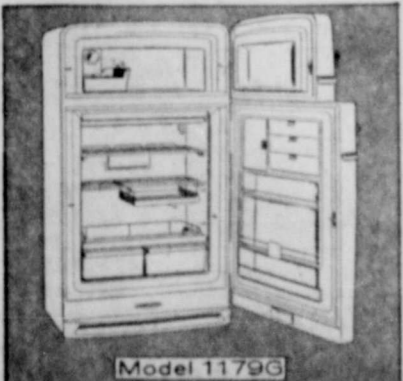

**VACATION TIME!**

**IT'S THE LAW in Texas**  
A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

**BUILDING YOUR HOME**  
When you are ready to build, you will find that the law helps in many ways to make your home enjoyable and secure.

Have you decided on the type house you want and the amount you want to spend? If so, then let's go into details!

1. Your lot: Junior's school or your church may be nearby, but find out—

(a) Whether they are planning to run a highway through the area or nearby, or make any improvements for which you can be assessed.

(b) What "covenants" or restrictions run with the land? To protect residents, the plats or basic deeds of some neighborhoods call on you to build a certain size or type of house. Do you want to and can you afford to?

(c) Easements. Either you or your neighbors may need to run pipes, or string wires over each other's land or to share a driveway. Have the abstract checked carefully to disclose any easements.

2. Zoning Ordinances: For your protection the local government frequently zones some areas, for example, for single houses only, for multiple dwellings; for retail stores, for manufacturing, etc.

Unless the local governing body changes its zoning ordinance, no filling station, for instance, can go up next to you in a residential area. Neither could you turn your home into a store. In any case, you should find out what your neighborhood zoning rules are.

3. Building Codes: Be certain that the plans and construction will meet the requirements of the local building code as to size, location and structure. Municipal ordinances usually impose strict standards for the building, the plumbing and the electrical wiring. In many cases only licensed building tradesmen are permitted to make the installations.

4. Financing: Financing contracts protect both you and the lender. Unless you pay cash, you will use credit to pay for your house, most likely a deed of trust or a land contract. Your installments often include principal, interest, insurance and taxes. Under a land contract the lender holds title to your house until you pay for it. If you fall behind, the holder can take the house back. With a deed of trust, the lender has a lien which he can foreclose if you default. You may get some of your money back on the principal; but you may also have to make up any loss the lender makes in re-selling the house.

Well worked-out contracts can help make your dream house come true. A construction contract or a so-called "earnest-money" agreement or receipt is no job for an amateur. Too many legal details are involved. Your lawyer is trained by education and experience to protect your best interests in contracting and closing real estate deals.

You know what you want. You should be careful to get what you want through careful planning and a properly prepared and executed contract.

**SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS**

**OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH**

A small shipment of fish for stocking ponds was received by cooperators of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District at Cisco last Wednesday. Fish are furnished to district cooperators in this area by the Fish & Wildlife Service from the Federal Fish Hatchery at Burnet.

Farmers receiving fish were J. G. Harlow, E. E. Donelson, J. W. Henderson, John Reed, J. S. Wilhelm, Bill Stegall, C. H. Williams and Mrs. Norman Lehman. About 40 other requests for fish have been submitted recently which the hatchery hopes to fill by fall. The hatchery reports the heaviest demand for fish than they have had in years. In the past three years over 100 ponds have been stocked by cooperators in this vicinity. Many of these ponds are now furnishing excellent fishing.

When farm ponds are properly stocked and fertilized they will support 300 to 500 pounds of bass and blue gills or redears per acre. The yield to fishermen should be about half this amount or around 200 pounds of usable fish per acre of water. The average natural fertility of ponds in this area probably produces about 100 pounds of fish per acre although only 20 to 30 pounds of usable fish are normally caught.

Fortunately good ponds for watering livestock are usually good ponds for fish production. Best ponds for either are deep with yet not excessive watersheds. The watersheds should be large enough to maintain the water level in the pond, yet not be so large as to pass too much excessive water through the pond to deposit silt and carry away pond fertility.

Wide spillways are always desirable and it is best if water does not run over six inches deep in the spillway. Fish loss through the spillway however is seldom serious.

Shallow water along the edge of ponds is undesirable for fish production. Shallow water often grows undesirable weeds and protects too many small fish from the bass.

Average farm ponds in this vicinity are usually stocked with large-mouth bass and either blue gills or redears. This combination seems to be easier to manage and gives the most fishing in small ponds. Channel catfish are some times added. The bass feed largely on small fish including their own young, and thus help prevent overpopulation in the pond. Bass do not grow well without small fish to feed on such as blue gills or redears. Channel cat are also predators after they get over about one half pound in size.

Fertilizing farm ponds with mineral fertilizer is a profitable way of growing the most fish possible. An 8-8-2 balanced fertilizer is the best to use, but 8-8-8 is satisfactory and more readily available analysis. Usually about 500 pounds of 8-8-2 or 8-8-8 will fertilize the average one-half acre pond for a year.

Ponds should not be fished after they have been stocked until the fish have spawned. After the fish have spawned heavy fishing will improve the pond. There should be no restrictions to fishing as to season or size of fish removed. Removal of both small and large fish gives the remaining fish more food for growth. A well managed farm pond can furnish a lot of both fun and food for the farm family.

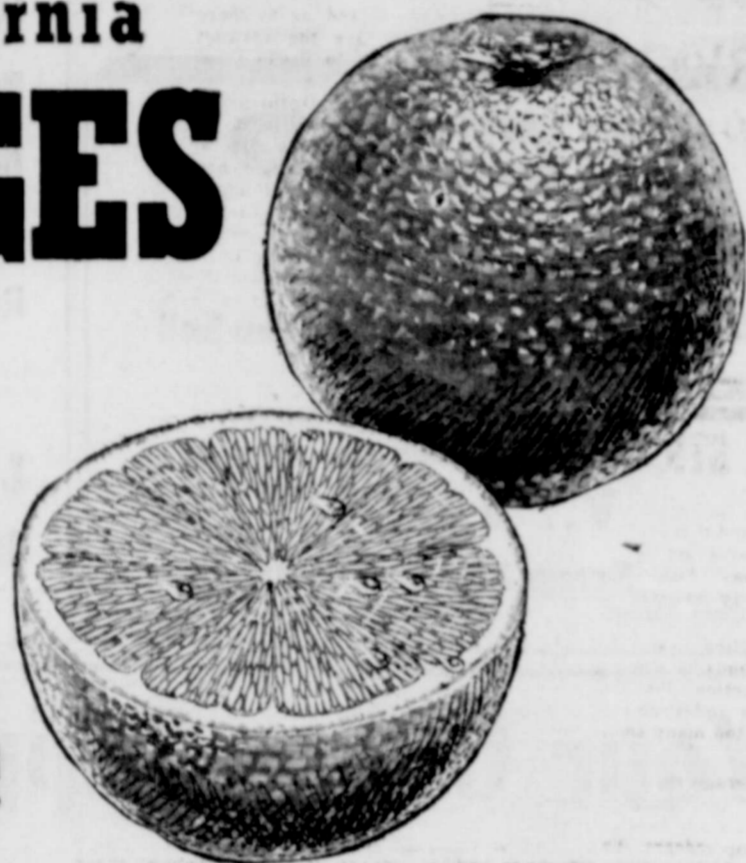

Good Grasses Need Help To Stage Comeback

Areas of the state have enjoyed good rains, but the resulting range vegetation may be undesirable weeds rather than good grasses, which are making a slow comeback on most rangeland. To help nature along and give the grasses a chance to re-establish themselves, make leaves, build a strong root system and make a good crop, A. H. Walker, extension range specialist, suggests a program of resting or deferred grazing.

A grazing and management study conducted by the Sonora Experiment Station over a period of nine years, shows that pastures stocked 12 months and rested 4 months had more and better grass at the end of the nine years than those that were completely rested the entire period. The Deferred Grazing Program Bill has been passed by Congress, but so far no funds have been approved to sustain the program. But regardless of whether or not this bill is activated, the specialist recommends the practice to those ranchmen suffering from poor pasture, for this is the cheapest means of range recovery.

So, Walker advises ranch men to make a close observation of pasture vegetation. Examine the top growth. Take an even closer look at the future. Roots are the food and water suppliers. Grass is your crop if you are in the livestock business, says the specialist, and the management you give it now will largely determine the kind of plants you have in the future.

Ask your local county agent for a publication on Deferred and Rotation Grazing.
