

# **Farmers May Ask** For Refund on Gas Tax Paid to Gov't

Bates, extension farm management specialist, that they may now apply for a refund on the Federal tax on gasoline used for farming. The amount claimed must be based on the quantity of fuel used for farming purposes on individual farms and ranches during the period from July 1, 1956 to 30, 1957.

Bates says that all claims must be submitted to the District Diector, Internal Revenue Service, id claims for the past year must in by September 30, 1957. Only ne refund claim per farm operatr will be permitted and each tax laimant is cautioned to mak ertain that his refund request ludes all eligible fuel used.
