## DIMMITT LAD SELLS BIG TWIN STEERS AT KANSAS CITY FOR \$30.00 PER CWT.

A couple of husky four-year-old twins created quite a stir at the Kansas City stockyards that rainy day. The soaking drizzle seemed to have little deterring effect. Passers-by still lingered for a better look to make certain that they weren't seeing double. "It's true," they had to admit. Maybe it was the twins' warm friendly disposition or perhaps it was the way they gently rooted your hand for a lump of sugar—at any rate, they appeared lone-

The twins showed how much they appreciated this kind of friend by always following Leon around the ranch and bawling for him when he was away. As "Buddy" and "Butch" grew older, they shaped up into fine beef steers. Their purebred blood lines, coupled with the expert care given them by their young master, seemed to be an ideal combination for beef production.

Decides to Show Them Leon's good eye for quality told him that these steers must not be hidden from the public eye. And this might be a chance for "Buddy" and "Butch" to repay their young master for his ceaseless efforts to care for their every need. So it was decided to enter the showing at the Tri-State Fair at Amarillo where they won a blue ribbon. They now were huge fellows, towering high above little Leon, as they passed their fourth birthday and pushed the 1,900 pound mark.



Leon didn't like to face it, but his twin calves had progressed to the point where about the only place they could go was to market. School was in session and the trip to the Kansas City stock yards was out of the question for the youngster. So Leon trusted his father to bring his prize beevies to market for him. When H. L. Crum arrived with the steers, he found that their tremendous size and age proved to be a handicap as far as getting the highest price was concerned. At \$30 per hundred, they still made the young rancher over \$1,000.
