## T & P Railroad In Middle Of \$6,500 Repair Job Here

The 182-year-old U. S. Army finally has a flag of its own! The first one to be made has just been presented to Commander-in-Chief Eisenhower, complete with 145 battle streamers commemorating engagements from Lexington to the 38th Parallel.

Perhaps another battle steamer should be added for the Army's spectacular victory over Specialist William S. Girard.

An eight-column steamer above the banner of the Mount Holly, N. C. NEWS for July 5 reads: "SHOP IN MOUNT HOLLY—YOU WILL NOT GET PARKING TICKETS."

"Your parking meter time has expired, but the local Merchants Association, in cooperation with the Town of Mount Holly, has taken the liberty of putting a nickel in the meter for you.

"If you appreciate this courtesy, please put a nickel in the nearest Five-O-Meter box or bring it to the City Hall.

"We are happy to have had you with us and hope you will come again soon."

What a wonderful idea! But for the sake of the enterprising members of the Merchants Association who have gone all out to make Mount Holly the parking paradise of America, we hope that the cars that line the street are those of SHOPPERS.

In some towns we know of, Main Street is lined with parked cars belonging to the store-keepers, the lawyers, insurance-agents, store clerks and general help before the CUSTOMERS have a chance. But Mount Holly, no doubt, solved this problem before coming up with this splendid invention in progressive merchandising, mutual aid and civic harmony!

The Texas and Pacific Railroad is in the midst of a \$6,500 repair job on all its property in Ranger which is being conducted under supervision of F. E. McDonald, bridge and building foreman, of Big Spring. The repairs are being made on the depot, section houses and barracks.

The depot is being given a complete overhaul and facelift from top to bottom. All of the woodwork on the outside of the depot is being given three new coats of paint. One whole section of plaster ceiling is being torn out on the inside and replaced with new plaster, and all the electric wiring in the depot has been replaced.

Complete Interior Repairs New light fixtures have been installed inside the depot, the floors, walls and ceilings are being repainted and all of the furniture, including the waiting room seats is being refinished.

The section houses and barracks are also being given a complete overhaul from foundation to roof. McDonald said he had a nine-man crew working here with him and they started the repair job the first of last month. They expect to finish it by August 1.

Crew Working West McDonald said his crew started working out of Fort Worth some months ago and are working west. Eastland is the next stop after the work is finished here, and then Cisco. They have already completed repair jobs at Gordon and Strawn.

McDonald said they bypassed Weatherford since the depot there was in a very bad state of repair and it is expected that a brand new one will be built some time later. He said the Ranger depot was the finest between Fort Worth and Abilene, and one of the finest small town depots on the line anywhere.

Two More Grass Fires Break Out Tuesday Just as the Ranger Fire Department thought everybody was being a little more careful about burning trash and garbage, two more grass fires sent the department running to two different sections of town again Tuesday.

The first call was at 9 a.m. at Park Place near the swimming pool, and the second was at 2:27 p.m. on Blundell Street.

Fire Chief Charlie Isabell said both fires were caused from burning garbage and trash in an uncovered can.

The Chief has publicly cautioned Ranger residents twice to put a cover on their trash cans when they set fire to trash and to stay with the blaze until it is safe to leave it. He has also recommended that all dry grass be cut back to a safe distance from around the incinerators.

"Watch what I tell you," Isabell said, "we're going to have a serious fire here because the people won't take the necessary fire prevention cautions around their garbage cans."

School Students Reminded to Get Annuals Tonight All Ranger school students who have purchased High School Annuals are again reminded that tonight is the night to pick them up at Teen Town, beginning at 8 o'clock.

It is said that an impromptu "Annual Party" will be held during which students can exchange autographs and write all those burning messages that are usually written in year books.

Students who have not bought annuals are also invited to be at Teen Town to take a look at them and to add their names to the "Pages of Time" during the autograph party.



## Lake Leon - Crappie Hole

From "West Texas Today" Magazine

EDITOR'S NOTE: Under the above heading, the following article appeared recently in the Vacation Edition of "West Texas Today," official publication of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and was widely circulated throughout the 132 county area known as West Texas. The article was written for the special vacation edition by the editor of the Times and turned in long before the Spring rains caused the lake to overflow for the first time. The picture accompanying this article was taken in front of Morris Newham's lake house on the North Shore. The article follows:

Spreading over 1,800 acres of beautiful West Texas scenery that Boyce House once described as rugged rock-strewn hills covered with post-oak, pecan and mesquite trees, and populated with squirrels, mocking birds, armadillos and perhaps a wolf or two, fabulous Lake Leon, located half way between Ranger and Eastland and slightly south of the twin cities in Eastland County, has this year reached its peak as a fisherman's paradise of the first magnitude.

"The most wonderful crappie fishing a man ever heard of," is the word that was flashed across the country early in March of this year by Dick Darmon, former president of the Fort Worth Anglers Club, and since that time anglers have been swarming in from all four directions and swarming out again to flash more news of sensational catches that have turned this newly-found "Crappie Hole" into a gold coast for Isaac Walton.

Throw Back 40 Darmon, in company with another well-known West Texas angler, Felix Ankele of Fort Worth, made his initial trip to Lake Leon this spring on a more or less exploring expedition. They tossed in their first minnow-baited hooks at 6:30 one afternoon and at 9:00 p.m. they threw back 40 crappie that weighed only a pound apiece, keeping a tow sack full of the burn down variety averaging two pounds or better. The men took off in the general direction of Fort Worth with drums beating and outdoor columnists for all the big newspapers in this area took

up the hue and cry. That was it! They've needed traffic policemen on the lake ever since.

Lake Leon is owned by the people of Ranger and Eastland. Like all other towns in dry West Texas, the two neighboring cities got tired of continually running out of water and decided to do something about it. Somebody spoke to the Federal Government about building a dam across the Leon River and was told by Uncle Sam it would cost \$5.5 million. Ranger and Eastland citizens said to heck with that and pretty soon formed the Eastland County Water Supply District and set about to build a lake on their own hook.

Voted Revenue Bonds In April 1952 they overwhelmingly voted a \$1,500,000 revenue bond issue and sold the bonds to a large syndicate in December 1952. Construction was begun in January 1953 and for all practical purposes the lake was completed in early 1954. Then followed months after months of agonized waiting when the rains refused to come, and Ranger and Eastland citizens were beginning to wonder what would ever happen to their \$1,500,000 investment.

There was barely enough water in the lake to keep the fish alive and all that vast expanse of new lake bed was nothing but a breeding place for dust-laden whirlwinds. But it so turned out that it was a breeding place for fish, too, because nobody had been allowed to wet a hook in what little water there was in more than two years, and from time to time more fish had been added to the water and they had nothing to do but grow in peace.

Comes the Cloud Burst Finally on May 18, 1955, a cloud-burst hit the Eastland-Ranger area and dumped 11-inches of rain on the watershed. Lake Leon rose almost overnight to 62 feet, within five feet of its capacity mark, and Eastland and Ranger had enough water to last them another 10 years if it never rained another drop. A subsequent rain put the lake to within one drop of spillway level. Chamber of Commerce officials of both towns and members of the Water Board jumped into immediate action in planning the lake's formal opening and dedication.

Opening ceremonies covered a two-day period, Sept. 3-4, 1955, during which there were motor boat races, a bathing revue, a fishing rodeo, water ski exhibitions and more oratory than the area had heard in many a day. Dignitaries were on hand from all over the country as Congressman Omar Burleson told an estimated 10,000 people that Eastland and Ranger deserved the plaudits of the nation for solving their water problem without the help of the Federal Government.

Vital Statistics Overall length of the dam and spillway is 5,000 feet, with a maximum height of 87 feet. Maximum depth of water at the dam is 67 feet and the total reservoir area is 28,000 acres feet. (Note: When water stands at 75-feet on 1 ft gauge at the spillway, depth of the water at that point is 67 feet. Seventy-five feet refers to elevation, not depth.)

### Pump House Holds Up Water In Young

While residents in the Young Addition of Ranger sweated and struggled along with practically no water at peak periods of the day, building of the pump house in the 400 block on Hunt Street is holding up operation of the new pump that has been installed to provide more water pressure.

According to water department officials, the new pump is all installed and connected up to the water mains and ready to go as soon as it can get some electricity, and Al Larson, manager of Texas Electric, says he can't install an electric switch panel until they get the pump house built or at least far enough along to permit installation of the panel.

One big drawback is the fact that the mains are in bad condition. The addition is served by six-inch and four-inch mains, most of which have been in the ground for a quarter-century or more. It is estimated that so much rust has collected in the mains within 1 1/2 lengths of time that the inside diameter is considerably reduced, perhaps by 25 per cent or more.

At peak periods during the day, especially in the early evening hours when the rest of the town is watering lawns and shrubs, Young residents are hard-pressed to get enough water to wash dishes. Many residents in the Young Addition have to get up at 5 o'clock in the morning to turn their lawn sprinklers and to water flowers and shrubs.

## Cisco To Appear Before Court to Seek New Hiway

CISCO—A delegation from the Cisco Chamber of Commerce will appear before the Eastland County Commissioners Court Monday to ask the County to cooperate with the State in building 13.5 miles of Highway 389 from Cisco to the Shackelford County line.

Paul Brashier, manager of the Cisco C-C, announced that the Cisco delegation would appear before the Commissioners Court. A delegation from Cisco, Moran and Albany went before the State Highway Commission in Austin Monday asking that completion of the Highway 389 improvements be made. They were told that the work would depend on an agreement by Eastland County to share right-of-way costs.

Highway 389 was recently re-paved across Shackelford County, stopping at the Eastland County line. Chief Highway Engineer D. C. Greer told the visiting Cisco delegation in Austin that some consideration should be given to taking the highway off the main street of Cisco and skirting the town on the east side. He estimated the cost of constructing the 13.5 miles would run \$205,000.

"Old Rip" Eastland, one of the prettiest small towns in the state, boasting a population of about 3,600, was also an oil boom city that once had a population of 25,000 or more. Perhaps its greatest attraction today is the body of "Old Rip" which has entombed in a glass case in the foyer of Eastland County's court house. "Old Rip" is the famed horned toad that was buried for 20 years in the cornerstone of a former court house, to be taken out alive when the present one was built. The toad's fans became known in every corner of the world until he died a natural death in 1954. A little more than a year after he was taken from his

Farmer's Gas Tax Refund Booklet Now Available from County Agent

A. E. Fosse, Jr., Administrative Officer of the Abilene Internal Revenue office, announced today that a revised Farmer's Gas Tax Refund guide booklet is now available to assist farmers in submitting Federal gas tax refund claims for the year ending June 30, 1957.

The publication, No. 598, together with claim Form 2240 and instructions for submission of claims are available on request at the Abilene Internal Revenue office. Forms and instructions also may be obtained at county agricultural agents' offices.

Claims should be filed on Form 2240 on or after July 1, but no later than September 30, 1957. Last year a million and a quarter farmers filed claims for refund of the Federal tax on gasoline used for farming purposes, and refunds averaged \$20.

It is estimated that the number of claims for refund filed this year will be close to 2,500,000, and the total refund is expected to increase correspondingly. These expected increases are due to an increase in the Federal gas tax rate from two cents a gallon to three cents a gallon plus the fact that an entire year will be covered by these claims whereas only taxes paid on gas used during the first six months of 1956 were subject to the claims filed last year.

The Farmer's Tax Refund guide explains in plain language the rules and procedures to be followed in filing a claim for refund of the Federal gasoline tax. It also explains conditions under which farmers may purchase diesel fuel and other special motor fuels, to be used for farm purposes, without payment of the Federal tax thereon.

## Girard Case Horrible Example Of Status of Forces 'Justice'

The case of the American G. I. turned over to a Japanese court for trial on murder charges is a particularly flagrant one of its kind, for two reasons.

First, the soldier, William S. Girard, was on duty at the time of the unfortunate incident. He was under orders to guard a gun position during a break in firing practice.

When the iniquitous status of forces treaties were being debated in Congress, Deputy Undersecretary of State Robert Murphy told a committee that they provided "that United States servicemen remain under United States jurisdiction with respect to offenses committed while on duty." Without this pledge, the agreements never would have been ratified.

As a matter of fact, they were ratified only under administration pressure, upon the false claim that they were necessary to induce our N.A.T.O. allies to permit us to station armed forces in their countries to protect them! They were ratified despite the fact that they violated the Constitution and legal precedents dating from the famous enunciation of Chief Justice Marshall in 1811.

In the second place, this case is particularly flagrant in that Secretary Dulles and Wilson have decided that we must go through with the man's transfer to a Japanese court because the Army yielded jurisdiction in the case last month. Why could not the Army authorities in Tokyo have been overruled, when all are agreed that the soldier was on duty at the time?

This is frivolous toying with the life and liberty of an American serviceman.

Here is a young man, drafted into the service of his country, who had no choice as to where he would serve. He didn't ask to go to Japan. Now, following what appears to have been an error of judgment on his part, carried out in uniform and while on duty, he is placed at the whim of Oriental ideas of justice.

The status of forces treaties, among other evil results, create two classes of American servicemen—those at home, protected by their constitutional rights, and those abroad, deprived of them. The effect on morale is bound to be depressing.

The major issue of the Girard case, however, goes deeper than the fate of one man and the capricious acts of officials in Tokyo and Washington. The status of forces treaties never should have been made. They should be denounced by the President. And the Bricker amendment which would provide that no international agreement conflicting with the Constitution is valid, must be enacted.

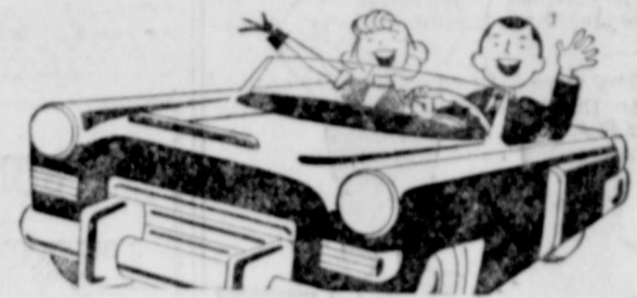

# I GIVE YOU TEXAS

An experience to be prized: In the summer of '54 engaging in a storytelling spree on the King Ranch, during the Southwest Writers' Conference. After a barbecue on the famous ranch, the crowd of several hundred listened to several brilliant story-tellers and me.

One was a renowned lawyer author, another a Mormon writer and another a New Mexico poet and fiction writer.

"The best-laid plans—" A band of criminals was going to rob a bank. After the "joint had

been-cased" and each man assigned his place, the robbery was pulled and the outlaws made their getaway.

It so happened that two little children were playing nearby and they noticed an automobile which was parked for a while. They wrote the license number in chalk on the sidewalk. Policemen learned of this and they rounded up the gang. The license number was that of the get-away car.

That was a classic retort that Walter O'Malley, president of the Brooklyn baseball club, made when

a surgeon who had charged \$9,500 for an operation on a Dodger's hand said he was willing to leave the reasonableness of the charge up to a committee of doctors. O'Malley said in effect, "We will take our chances with a jury made up of men who are used to receiving doctor bills instead of those who are in the business of sending them."

The poet wrote, "I am a part of all I have met." Wouldn't it have been more accurate, "All I have met is a part of me?" The places you've seen, the songs you have heard, the people you have known—all these have shaped your philosophy, colored your thinking, altered your life.

You've got to admire a man who may be down and out and who asks for money but offers to do some work in return. Last summer in Fort Worth, such an individual said to me, "Friend, I need money; do you know of any lawn that needs mowing?" We were in the Hotel Texas lobby at the time and I couldn't see a lawn in any direction but I admired his willingness to work and so handed him a quarter.

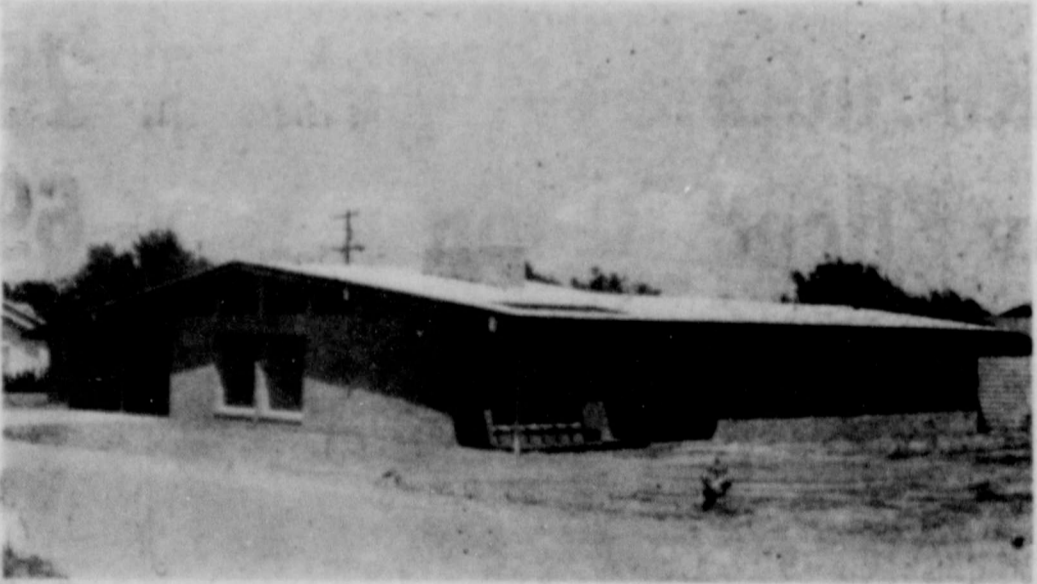
