"Everybody in Ranger Wonderful to Us..."

Anything can happen to a newspaper editor and it usually always does.

Over in Mooresville, N. C., for example there is a publisher T. M. McKnight who writes a column for the Tribune similar to this bunch of tripe right here that is dished out three times a week to you readers of the Times.

He was telling the other day about his town being in the throes of "dog days" when nothing at all seemed to be happening and even his best advertisers had reached the point where they had rather go fishing than tend to business, so he latched on to his photographer and they took off for the Catawba river bottom.

Here publisher McKnight and his photographer stumbled around among the bullrushes and canebreaks for hours looking for a likely spot to build a water-front home when the river backed up into a lake behind a new power dam that was being built.

McKnight said that by and bye they came to a break in the underbrush and gazed into a clearing that harbored a group of miserable shacks and hovels.

"And then we saw her," wrote the publisher.

"Slowly winding up the windlass of this old dilapidated well is this statuette young woman carved from the pattern of a Greek goddess, beyond doubt the loveliest creature these eyes had ever seen. The well bucket comes to the top and she straightens up and she is tall and lithe and very, very beautiful."

She is also barefooted, McKnight explains, and garbed solely in ragged shorts and a man's shirt with the tail tied in front in a knot. McKnight went on to do a whole column on the subject, and since the photographer had been along there were also pictures.

Before McKnight's paper came out the following week, this time with a solid page of un-tutored cheesecake identified only as Miss Dorothy Brown, the initial column had stirred up commotion all over the entertainment world and Mooresville was swamped with television and night club scouts and all sorts of big-wigs from Hollywood.

The final upshot was, Mr. McKnight had become the young woman's agent and they were enjoying the highly pleasant spectacle of raking in money by the bushel basketful and trying to decide which engagements to accept, meantime trying to find a break in the proceedings long enough for the lass to make a quick trip to town and get fitted for a pair of shoes.

Well, there's one thing we don't like already about publisher McKnight. We never could stand a guy who started out to tell a story and never finished it.

What we would like to know is, did he or did he not, find a place on that river-bank to build a water-front home?

It seems like everybody from Fort Worth who comes to Ranger goes back home saying nice things about the place, and they take particular pains to say it to the Fort Worth Star Telegram where it is promptly written up with headlines and pictures so that 200,000 other people throughout the state can read it.

Mrs. Herbie King of 2813 Ryan, decided to have a little party for her daughter Ann on her 11th birthday. Mrs. King wanted something a little different from the usual back-yard gathering where

ice cream and cake are served and candles are blown out and wishes made, so she enlisted the aid of five other mothers in the neighborhood and between them they invited 28 other youngsters to join them on a 100-mile train trip to Ranger and back.

For youngsters now-a-days, a train trip is a whole of an event because none of them, hardly, have ever seen the inside of one. Plans were to take the Texas & Pacific to Ranger, have a picnic lunch and catch the 4 o'clock train back to Fort Worth. Everything went along fine except the 4 o'clock train. It didn't show up until three hours late, and the mothers were stuck in Ranger, 100 miles from home, with 28 kids, 29 counting Ann, who was celebrating her birthday.

"Everybody in Ranger was wonderful to us, though," Mrs. King telephoned to the Star Telegram when she got back, causing some guy named Jim Hendricks to get a "by line" for writing the story, accompanied with a picture of the youngsters who made the "party trip by train to Ranger."

Mrs. King said the station manager made arrangements for them to take a trip through a printing company in Ranger and "we wandered around town for a while and everybody was wonderful."

The last publicity of this sort that Ranger picked up was spread around Fort Worth by Barney Capshaw who was manager of the Amputee Ball Club that played here a few days ago, and Capshaw's kind remarks about Ranger were also picked up and spread abroad by the Star Telegram.

Before that it was Dick Darnon and Felix Ankele of the Fort Worth Anglers Club who came out here, dropped their hooks in Lake Leon and caught a pack-up truck full of crappie. They went back and spread the news all over the state.

Come again, all you folks. Ranger is glad to have you.

Mr. Bobo was found dead at his residence about 9 a. m. Sunday. He was in downtown Ranger Saturday greeting friends and "feeling fine," he said.

Mr. Bobo was born Feb. 1, 1892 in Ranger where he continued to live all his life. He was a farmer, and a member of the Church of Christ.

Mr. Bobo was married to Della Madewell in Ranger in 1914. She died March 25, 1950.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. Richard W. Hanberry of San Antonio; two brothers, Justice-of-the-Peace Charles Bobo and Edward Bobo of Ranger; three sisters, Mrs. Susan Hunt of Ranger, Mrs. Park Wenzler of Fort Worth and Mrs. Howard Cole of Houston.

The building industry from the Atlantic to the Pacific has hailed the government's twin move to spur homebuilding among lower and middle income families as a shot in the arm that was needed to set off a new wave of construction of lower to moderate-priced homes throughout the country, beginning at once, since the new regulations go into effect immediately.

The new move cut in half and less than half the down payment required on FHA and VA insured mortgages, and at the same time boosted the interest rate on loans from 5 to 5 1/2 per cent, a step that will loosen up more money and make more loans available.

Homebuilding money has been hard to get for the past several weeks because the lending agencies have figured that such a move was in the offing and they have held off making loans until the new interest rates were effective.

Contractor M. L. Lawson has run into that trouble right here in Ranger.

While the slightly higher interest rate might be more attractive to lenders of money, it will make very little difference in the monthly payments of the man who builds a new home. Roughly the increase figures about 1 1/2 per cent per \$1000 on a 25-year loan, and about 16 per cent per \$1000 on a 30-year loan.

Down payments have been whacked tremendously as shown by the following scale:

FHA VALUE	New Payment	Old Payment
\$ 6,000	\$ 180	\$ 300
8,000	240	300
10,000	300	700
12,000	600	1,200
15,000	1,050	1,950
20,000	2,400	3,200

Thus it can be seen that one of the so-called "lower priced" homes of around \$10,000, can be built with a down payment of only \$300, which is \$400 less than formerly, with other down payments dropping in proportion.

The increase in FHA interest rates does not affect the 4 1/2 per cent rate on home loans guaranteed by the VA. This rate is fixed by Congress, and any increase would have to be approved by both House and Senate. Moves to up it were killed in the House this year. The new down payment schedule and the new interest rates were greeted by the National Association of Home Builders.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

PLANNING YOUR WILL In planning your will, your lawyer will want to know your true wishes; and then, to help you realize them, he will want to know a few vital facts.

Are you married? Any children or grandchildren? Previously married? Widowed? Your age and those of your beneficiaries? Legal residence? Health? Why these questions?

You'll have to work out your plan in view of the laws governing death taxes, property laws, and if you are married, separate and community property.

Age? If you wish to set up trusts in the will, your age and those of your beneficiaries may help you decide whether, for example, to use capital of the trust fund as well as its income for the beneficiaries.

Your residence? Most important, since state laws govern many items of personal property.

Do you plan to move to another State? If so, consult its laws. Many people who come to Texas from other states should see that their wills conform to and take advantage of our laws.

Some people live half the year in Texas and half elsewhere. If you do, take steps to nail down your claim to reside in one state or another, to avoid needless litigation and possible claims to taxes in both states.

Your health? If possible, have your will drafted while you are in good health and clear minded. Contests, though relatively rare in Texas, still do take place. In some cases, for example where non-relatives inherit, it may be a good idea to give reasons for these bequests in your will and to tell why you may have left some relative out (for instance, where a child has been taken care of by gifts or in other ways.)

How to Break Baby Into 'Big' Water Is Told

Part of your pleasure at the beach, lake, or swimming pool is showing Baby how much fun it is to kick and bounce in lots of water.

Chances are he thoroughly enjoys his tub bath, and he may have had fun, too, splashing in a shallow pool. Still, he's likely to be dubious, or even alarmed, the first time he is taken into a large expanse of water.

So, to be sure that he will like the experiences and want to go again, take it easy the first time

you carry him out to "dunking" depth, advises an article in the August issue of Better Homes & Gardens magazine. Make it a happy experience for him.

Holding your child securely, move slowly into the water. At first, wet just his feet, letting him get accustomed to the water touch as he goes into his bath. When he decides he likes it, ease him gradually, still holding him securely.

Next, hold him chest-down in the water with your hands so he can splash and paddle, the article suggests. If he gets a mouthful of water, lift him to your knee, lean him forward, and pat his back until he stops sputtering.

Coast Fishing Reported Tops

AUSTIN.—Coastal fishing right now is at its best, according to all reports reaching the Texas Game and Fish Commission. They are catching boat loads of all kinds of salt water fish from Fort Arthur to Port Isabel, and a hundred miles out in the Gulf.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 44c of Article III, providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State, providing for the payment of such bonds, creating an agency to administer said fund and to perform other duties prescribed by law, limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted, and providing for the calling of an election and the submission thereof.

RELATIONS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS.

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section therein to be known as Section 44c, as follows: "Section 44c. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as may be conferred by law. The qualifications, composition, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the several Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The authority of the Board to issue such bonds shall be exercised in such form, denomination and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest, and that they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practicable in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas including river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized or authorized to be created under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 52 or Article III, Section 32, of the Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storage, conservation, transmission, improvement, extension or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transmitting water therefrom to domestic purchasers, or for any use or more of such purposes or methods.

TV Sets Favorite Nesting Place For Cockroaches

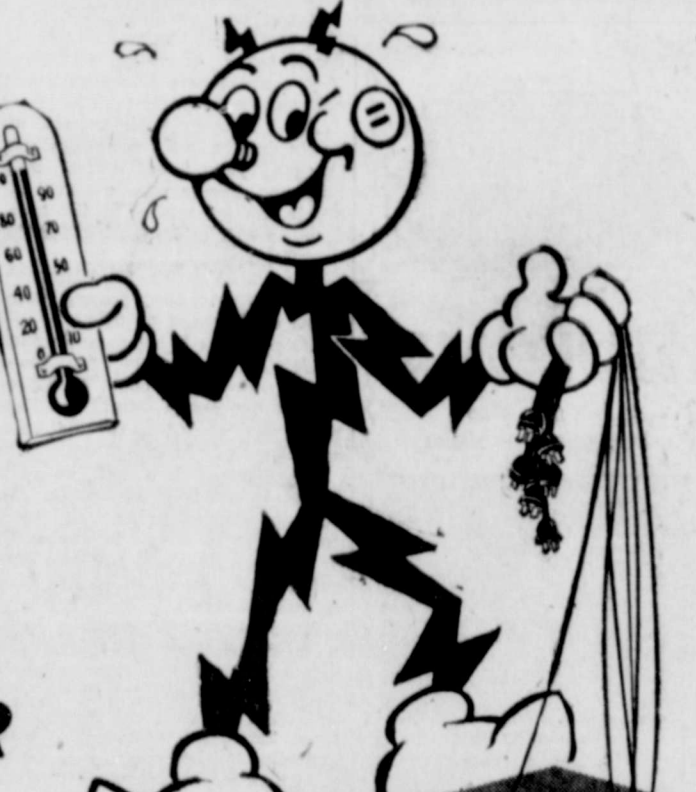

He can hitch a ride in the TV set, be carried to other sets and hence be introduced into other homes. He likes radio almost as well.

lengthwise brown stripes that appear just behind the head of the larger and common German roach. Chlordane and deodorized malathion are among the most effective controls of roaches. Malathion is also effective against resistant German roaches. Thorough application is essential for good control. Spray all cracks and crevices and other places where the roaches may be hiding, but do not spray in the TV set, warns Fuller. But a small amount of powder may be sprinkled around the edge of the case.
